






People by Peter Spier

Let There Be Peace on Earth: And Let it Begin With Me by Jill Jackson & Sy Miller




Peaceful Protest: The Life of Nelson Mandela

Resist! By Diane Stanley






Peace: 50 Years of Protest by Barry Miles
