



Each Kindness by Jacqueline Woodson illustrated by E. B. Lewis




Peace Week in Miss Fox's Class by Eileen Spinelli


Painting for Peace in Ferguson by Carol Swartout Klein

Written in verse, the book focuses on the way the community



came together to begin the healing process through the Paint for Peace effort. Using illustration and photographs of the art and the artists --black and white, young and old--the book is a tool for beginning the conversation with children about how we all have something to contribute to healing our communities.

As the last line in the book says, "The work is not finished, there's much more to be done. But this art shows the spirit of a new Ferguson." (Ages 5-12) [3]



Jubilee! One Man's Big, Bold and Very, Very Loud Celebration of Peace by Alicia Potter and Matt



music that brought peace to many. The power of music continues to bring peace to many today. (Ages 7-10) [4]




The General by Jane Charters


The Peace Bell by Margi Preus



The Forgiveness Garden by Lauren Thompson






The Children's Peace Book by Jolene DeLisa




What Will You Do For Peace? Impact of 9/11 on New York City Youth With an introduction by Faith Ringgold









Malala: Activist for Girls' Education by Raphaele Frier






Peaceful Heroes by Jonah Winter
