

Fund education at 3 schools in rural Uganda

- Nyakabungo Primary
- Kirima PrimaryGreat Lakes High School

Funded by sponsors and donors

1,100 children, many of whom wouldn't otherwise gain an education

Education from Nursery to 'A' level

Great Lakes Regional University

In a safe, healthy, caring environment

Kirima Ltd UK charity, started 1995





Why do we do it?

Link between Ugandan local leaders and schools, churches, Rotarians and individuals in UK

Uganda is one of the poorest countries in the world

Kanungu in the remote South West is one of the poorest regions of Uganda

Families rely on subsistence farming

State education not available or good quality for all children

Uganda has potential for future

Making a Difference

Benjamin was a pupil at Nyakabungo Primary School

Gained his degree and teaching qualification

Now back to teaching at Kirima

Recent progress at Nyakabungo

More sponsors for £2,000 monthly cost New school hall Safety wall as built on hill Playground equipment 2020 leavers year 7 good results Fencing to stop local animals entering school New Headmaster Reuben



Covid in Uganda

40,000 cases total. Tests are available, though less than UK 253 deaths

Very few cases near Kirima schools, none at schools

Airport totally closed for months, with no travelling around country

Schools closed for months, no home internet for learning

Food & economy for selling produce from farms badly effected months

We funded Sept 20 bag of millet/beans for each family and home pack for learning

Since October 20 exam years back only

March 21 more classes back

April 21 all classes back



Challenges

Children remaining at school through to year 7

Children continuing to secondary school

Teachers staying on low salaries, 10 hours from capital Kampala

Health: malaria and other infections common

Weather: heavy rain washed away the toilets in 2019

Roads: school on hill with very muddy roads School materials and books in short supply No internet connection and no electricity

Finance audit systems revamped in 2020 to ensure all money is spent at schools

Trustees all volunteers. Trustees normally visit annually, but not in 2020

Challenges at Kirima and Great Lakes High School

How to have enough books?

IT laptops had downloaded info, how to maintain, enable use, not internet

Water essential, took several projects to solve , river, village source, hill source

Electricity mains, generator or solar power?

Food costs variable, what best diet that affordable and variable?

Group activities essential for weekends/ evenings as boarding schools

The future for the 3 schools?

Well established schools now with 3 good head teachers

Restarting post covid

Continuing to improve quality of education

Introduce computers to support learning?

Continued support from Kirima now

Maybe government funded in the future, when the Ugandan economy has improved
