Dear Mr. Princi,

A copy of the letter which the Secretary of the Federation of Soccer Clubs in New South Wales sent recently to players and officials has been forwarded to me by the Secretary of the Australian Soccer Football Association.

I am writing to you about this circular because it contains reference to me and also to Mr. Gasman, Secretary of the F.I.F.A., which were unauthorised and to which I take exception.

In my view, a group of clubs wishing to withdraw from an established Association should do so in a constitutional manner and for the good of the game in the region in which they have their headquarters should do so without resource to sensational and inaccurate statements. Moreover, such a course of action may harm the organisation and discredit the officials responsible. Progress is better made by evolution than by revolution.

I feel it my personal duty to tell you how much I regret that my name has been used in connection with the recent reorganisation and that views and sentiments which I did not express should be used in a public circular. Some changes for the improvement of football in New South Wales may be necessary: I wish they could have been made

without causing embarrassment. I much hope that for the good of New South Wales Soccer, the dispute which has occurred will be speedily and amicably settled.

Today we welcome F.K. A HISTORY of the F.K. AUSTRIA

The football club Austria is successor to the "Weiner Amateur Sportverein," established in 1911, and the latter successor to the "Vienna Cricket and Football Club," established in 1894 and the oldest but one club in Austria.

July 6, 1957

Discrepancies arose among the "Cricketers," the, that time, popular name of the home club, among their players, officials and members, on account of which the majority turned its back on the home club and established the "Weiner Amateur Sportverein," which was admitted to the Austrian Football Association as a member in 1911 and immediately placed within the highest class of players on account of its highly cultured playing.

The name of the club was to be found mostly in the centre of the schedule of the championship. The individual style of the team, however, was outstanding already at that time and did not change more or less until today. The team was not anxious about the victory only, but above all about pleasing the onlookers and acquiring new friends of the beautiful game. Therefore the slogan was: "Rather die in beauty than force success by fighting means." Without giving up their style, they achieved the goal set by any team by increased efficiency, to be winners in a championship or a Cup contest, in 1921. The first victory of a Cup was won against strongest competitors. During the following three years the players had to learn that playing alone is not everything in football, but that a steady form can be attained only then, when body and fighting spirit are being properly put in during the play and not neglected. Success did not fail to appear. Out of titles to be conferred in the years of 1924, 1925 and 1926, 5 were won: 2 championships and 3 Cup victories.

Professional playing was introduced in Austria in 1924. The name "Amateure," which was already well-known throughout all of Europe, could not be kept any more for that reason, so was changed to "Fussball-Klub Austria" by the general assembly in November, 1926.

The team won the Mitropa Cup twice, in 1933 and 1936, became Austrian champion 5 times, 1924, 1926, 1949, 1950, 1953, winner of the Austrian Cup twice, 1948 and 1949, and 10 times winner of the Viennese Cup, 1921, 1924, 1925, 1926, 1933, 1935, 1936, 1948, 1949 and 1950.

The heavy blood letting in 1954—national players Melchior, Stojaspal, Aurednik and Kominek, almost a complete forward line, emigrated—offered a big chance to the gifted rising generation of the Austrian. The young Austrian players became a distinguished part of the team, even if they are still lacking the experience of their predecessors. The appointment of the former Austrian federal captain, Walter Nausch, as trainer warrants that the young players will attain their maturity with all possible dispatch.





REFEREEING AN OLYMPIC FINAL

By R. J. WRIGHT

WHEN the editor, Mr. Alan Forbes, asked me to write an article on the above subject I mentioned the difficulty in knowing exactly where to commence, with numerous events happening so quickly any attempt at concentrating on one particular item being nigh impossible.

Many thousands of words have already been written in connection with the Olympic Games, even though with the passing of time these memorable events quickly fade, but to the participants and those who were for-

tunate enough to be in Melbourne, perhaps not all but some of the outstanding events will always remain as treasured memories-one of those being for myself, namely the Olympic Final.

Saturday, 8th December, dawned in what may be called typical European football weather-a mild temperature with occasional light, misty rain. With strict timing the two participating teams, Yugoslavia and Russia, took the field at 2.25 p.m. Bob Mann, of England, and Maurice Swain, of New Zealand, my two linesmen and myself following a few moments later.

Even with the language barrier no method of interpretations were requested, neither were any given. Laws of Soccer football being universal, any attempt at imposing last-minute instruc-. tions would most probably only have confused players of both sides.

The first half was somewhat quiet with neither side being able to penetrate each other's defence, it being halfway through the second half when Russia scored their only, and the winning goal. Yugoslavia made numerous attacks but the Russian defence stood firm, giving them their first Olympic Games Soccer gold medal.

I was very fortunate indeed in having two fellow referees, Bob Mann, of England and Morrie Swain, of New Zealand, as linesmen. They gave me every possible assistance, and I shall always be grateful. They made my task considerably lighter.

And so ended what to me was one of the most enjoyable and memorable

events in my life, and one which I was proud to have been able to represent my adopted country-Australia.

Comeron, was talking to Mr. Wensveen, of Indonesia, who was representina Indonesia as a referee, when they both remembered where they had seen each other before. It was just before the last war, when Alec Cameron was touring Indonesia with an Australian team and Mr. Wensveen happened to be the goalkeeper playing opposite during one of the fixtures of that tour. It certainly is a small world!

AUSTRALIA'S TEST TEAM

INTERNATIONAL SOCCER

JOE RUYTERS, Australia's new Test goalie, plays with Wilhelmina (Vic.). He migrated from Holland three years ago, first settling in Perth. He was a Sittardia 1st Division player in his homeland. Although his first appearance in Melbourne was in a night game last summer, he has quickly risen to State prominence and come forward as Australia's goalie.

JIM PETTIGREW, from Cessnock (N.S.W.), is Australia's right full-back, but normally plays centre-half with his Club. A member of Australia's Olympic squad, is a sound and solid defender.

HARRY MURDOCH, left-back, has brought honour to his Club, Balgownie (N.S.W.) by being the first representative player from that Club for 30 years. Though his game last Saturday was his first as an International, his soundness is such that with the aid of his codefenders, Balgownie has the least goals scored against them in the Premiership competition.

KEVIN O'NEILL, right-half and captaincoach of his Club. Cessnock (N.S.W.) is a veteran of many Interstate and International contests. A utility player who can play in the backs or in the forwards, his experience will be a great asset to Australia.

JOE MARSTON, Australia's captaincoach, and recognised as the most outstanding centre-half in Australia, is also captain-coach of Leichhardt-Annandale (N.S.W.). Toured, and played South Africa in 1947, at home, and later went to England to join Preston North End in 1949, consequently becoming captain of that team. His leadership of Preston North End carried them into an F.A. Cup Final, in which they were narrowly defeated. He is the acknowledged pivot in Australia's defence and attack.

BOB YOUNG, left-half, and member of the strong Corrimal (N.S.W.) Club, has represented for Australia. He relies upon accuracy in delivering the ball to his forwards and opening up play.

BRUCE MORROW outside-right. He .plays for Wallsend (N.S.W.), with which

team he is at present playing at centreforward; also played in that position with the Australian Olympic Team. Fast and dangerous, he is equally at home in the centre or on the wing.

SPENCER KITCHING, of Bundamba (Qld.) Club, an outstanding insideforward who has played for Australia. Is a member of the famous State squad tutored by John Pattison. He has proved to be a tireless worker and is a specialist at setting up goals.

GORDON "BUNNY" NUNN, a veteran of many Interstate and International matches. Normally plays on the wing but today he is playing centre-forward. to which position he is no stranger. Was selected as a reserve in last week's game against Austria, but took the field when selected centre-forward, Alan Garside, withdrew through injury. Has retained that position. Club is St. Helens (QId.).

JACK LENNARD, another Cessnock (N.S.W.) representative. Olympic representative and has played in many Test matches. A clever schemer and prolitic goal scorer in the position of insideleft.

GRAHAM McMILLAN, outside-left, Y.M.C.A. (Old.). Olympic representative with a terrific drive in either foot. Has perfect understanding with fellow-State player, Gordon Nunn.

LEN STEDMAN, right-back, Leichhardt-Annandale (N.S.W.) and a reserve for today's game. Has perfect understanding with team-mate, Joe Marston

BILL WILLIAMS, right-half for Woonona-Bulli (N.S.W.); an International. Chosen captain of the South Coast team which met China on Wednesday. A reserve for today's game.

CHARLIE STEWART started playing so young and represented so early in life that many people feel he has always been around. Charlie is still young, however, and a team-mate of W. Williams in Woonona Club. Forward reserve in today's match.
