

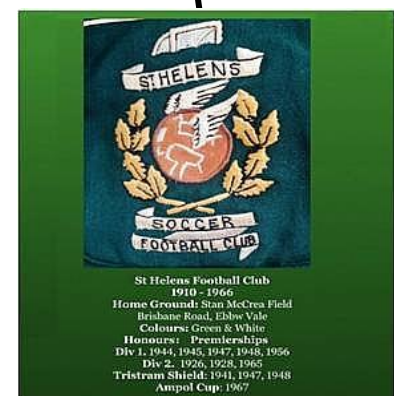
**A PROUD FOOTBALL TRADITION**

The Ipswich Knights Football Club history began with the beginning of football played in Ipswich and Queensland.

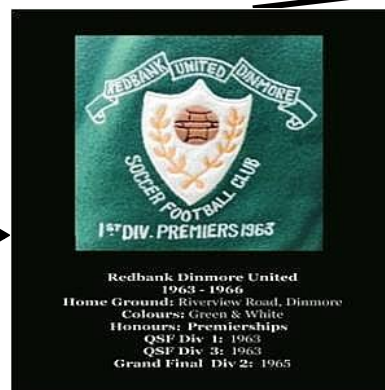
Dinmore Bush Rats, Blackstone Rovers, St Helens and Bundamba Rangers were among a number of Ipswich clubs who collected dozens of Premierships, Shields and Trophies between them from the 1880's through to the 1950's and were pioneers of the sport in Ipswich and Brisbane.

In the early 1960's, first Dinmore Bush Rats and Redbank Seekers joined to form Redbank Dinmore United. Next, Blackstone Rovers and Bundamba Rangers amalgamated to create Coalstars Football Club. Soon after St Helens and Redbank Dinmore United joined to become St Helens United. St Helens United senior team played as Ipswich United from 1978 to 1989.

Finally, St Helens United and Coalstars amalgamated in 1997 and the Ipswich Knights Football Club was launched.

Notes: Blackstone Rovers did not field a team in 1896 and 1897. Some of their players went to Bush Rats mid-1895 and the club went “bung“ Ipswich Rovers were formed that year and elected to play at North Ipswich Reserve. However, there is some evidence to suggest Blackstone Rovers members were behind Ipswich Rovers so there may be a direct relationship, but we don't know if this may constitute a split or continuation. Ipswich Rovers may have reverted back to Blackstone Rovers from 1899. Neither club existed at the same time. 'Old Sport' writes Blackstone players were interested in joining the new Ipswich Club, is Ipswich Rovers. This QT story also mentions Blackstone players were interested in joining Ipswich Rovers, with many of those mentioned having played for or were on the committee of Ipswich Football Club (1894). It was reported that Sergeant Wurt drill instructor for the Defence force introduced Soccer to Blackstone. He played under the name of Fred William his given names as to not incur the wrath of his commanding officer Merged with Bundamba Rangers to form Coalstars in 1965 Colours: Red and Black striped shirts with white shorts and black socks with red tops

## The Dinmore and New Chum/Dinmore Bush Rats Situation:

**Dinmore** and **New Chum Bush Rats** were separate clubs. There are reports of games against each other, and their respective presidents Lynch and Jeffrey were selected to the West Moreton British Soccer Association in 1893. By March 1895, Lynch becomes President of Bush Rats while references to Dinmore disappear after 1894. There is also a reference to Bush Rats suffering a player decline in April 1895. Such a player drain may be explained by mine worker numbers waxing and waning in the period, possibly forcing the two clubs to merge to survive. For the purposes of this list, the original Dinmore Bush Rats are being treated primarily as a historical constituent of Ipswich Knights. The two Bush Rats revivals have cultural and family links to the original club. As such history prior to 1966 will primarily be seen as shared between Knights and the revival clubs.

Bush Rats would also go on to play at Dinmore's ground at Nunn's Farm. At this time Dinmore captain Caddies became Bush Rats captain. Dinmore continued on without Lynch for a season, before folding. In 1892 Dinmore Football club elected to merge with the Dinmore cricket club. Lynch was president of both clubs, as Dinmore FC's captain W Caddies played for both. Dinmore Cricket club is considered "old" (ie ex-) by 1896 and neither are they listed in the fixtures for the 1894/5 cricket season. It seems the entire cricket/soccer club folded in 1894. Some players like Caddies then followed Lynch to Bush Rats, and Bush Rats took up the Dinmore field at Nunn's Paddock. My theory is Dinmore is the cricketers from Dinmore Cricket Club playing football in the winter. Erskine calls this team Dinmore Reliance, and while it's true both Hudsons and Bognudas were playing for the football club (the two families which own the Reliance Pottery), both families also played cricket. I think it is just the district team which played at Nunn's Paddock

After his death, the Bush Rats ownership was held by the State until being transferred to Ipswich Knights in 2016. Knights still co-own the ground, which the Ipswich Council rents for the latest iteration of the Bush Rats.
