# Welcome

The 1st Pacific Cup was a very simple idea, founded in a Portuguese holiday resort in March 1999 during the Algarve Cup.

Australia, China and the USA had joined five European nations in, at that time, the biggest women's soccer tournament outside the FIFA Women's World Cup and the Olympic Games.

It became apparent the Pacific region should create its own major tournament so as not to depend on tours of Europe for high quality international competition. Now, after more than a year of close partnership, the 1st Pacific Cup has become a reality. The tournament will rotate between the core countries of Australia, Canada, China, Japan and USA every two years. New Zealand has been invited to participate in 2000.

The choice of stadia, including Olympic Football venues Bruce Stadium and the Sydney Football Stadium has already raised the highest expectation. In addition matches featuring, China and the U.S.A. will be televised live to their home fans. The series will be broadcast in Australia with the support of SBS Television.

Australian Women's Soccer takes much pride in having the opportunity to launch this great tournament.

Canada have for many a year been overshadowed by champion neighbours USA on the world women's football scene, but are a quality outfit in their own right, having competed in the last two World Cup finals tournaments.

Yet after finishing twelfth at last year's World Cup, Canada now appear to be building for the future, recently appointing Eve n Pellerud, the coach who led Norway to the 1995 World Cup crown, as well as a 1991 World Cup silver medal, and bronze at the Atlanta Olympic Games. It will be interesting to see how much of a Norwegian influence he injects into the north Americans' game.

Pellerud brings to the Pacific Cup a new look combination, with just nine of the 1999 World Cup side. The other half of this Canadian outfit includes seven new talents, all aged in their teens and each having made their international debut this year.

But can Canada survive the absence of star act Charmaine Hooper, the FIFA World All-Star who featured in such dynamic fashion when the Canadians were last here back in January 1999 for the inaugural Australia Cup?

Yet keep an eye on new number ten Christine Sinclair, the 'baby' of the team at age sixteen. The striker has played in all six internationals so far under Pellerud, scoring a goal against Norway plus a double against Denmark in the process.

Australia last faced Canada in two matches immediately prior to the World Cup, the Matildas 3-1 victors before ending their preparation with a 2-0 loss. However, both teams have experienced significant change since that time.

World number two China would love nothing more than to finally shake off the bridesmaid tag this September at the Olympic Games.

Dazzling skill, extraordinary attacking combinations, and a dash of speed are what makes China one of the most enthralling teams to watch. Their amazing run of form at the 1999 World Cup saw them equal favourites to claim the title despite taking on home side USA who had the entire nation behind them.

But uncharacteristically, the Chinese sat back against the Americans come the final, and failed to play their normal game against the slower US defence. The chance slipped by and the World Cup was lost in the famous penalty shootout. The misery was doubled, this the second consecutive time they had lost to the Americans in a major world event. The Atlanta Olympic Games was the earlier occasion, going down two goals to one.

At the time of printing, China's team for the Pacific Cup was yet to be culled from a squad of 22, but their side could include as many as seventeen of their World Cup combination.

Superstar Sun Wen is hopefully amongst them. The 27-year-old maestro captained her team to the 1999 World Cup final, earning via her own stunning individual performance the Golden Ball as the most outstanding player at the event. In addition, she was the equal top scorer with seven goals alongside Brazil's Sissi. Sun Wen then became the first female to be amongst the finalists for the Asian Football Confederation's coveted Sanyo Asian Player of the Year award.

Sydney Football Stadium will host the Matildas' clash with China, with the Aussies hoping for a repeat of history. The last time China visited our shores back in late 1997, the Matildas pulled off their greatest ever result with a 2-1 win over the Olympic silver medallists to win the final of the Tri-Nations Series in Canberra.

Although overshadowed by their champion Asian neighbours China, Japan have been the quiet achievers of women's football, having competed in every major world tournament in recent times.

However, after their highly creditable eighth place finish at the 1995 World Cup, followed up by a seventh placing at the inaugural Olympic Games tournament, Japan's 13th place at USA '99 would have been a major disappointment to the side. Their grouping at the World Cup proved tougher than first anticipated, up against Russia who quickly became the surprise team of the tournament, plus defending champions Norway.

With a new coach at the helm in Shinobu Ikeda, and a large turnover of players, Japan enters this inaugural Pacific Cup with a side which includes only eight 1999 World Cup survivors. Several new players will make their international debut here in Australia.

Japan is traditionally a quick, skilful attacking combination, tactically sound, and entertaining to watch.

The Matildas last took on Japan in 1996, shortly before Japan's Olympic Games campaign, the spoils shared in a 2-2 draw. In a rare statistic, all but one of the six matches played between our two nations has resulted in a score draw.

The tension and excitement builds daily as we draw ever closer to the Olympic Games here at home.

The Matildas continue to progress steadily along the twelve month journey upon which they embarked last September when coach Chris Tanzey first took over the reins. Based at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra, the Matildas commit 30 hours over six days each week to training and team preparation.

With the coveted Olympic selections looming, it is a constant race to maintain top form, to adjust to each new situation, to demonstrate continual improvement. It's the desire to remain injury-free, to make every minute in training matches count, to live the passion. And in the unique environment of a full-time residential program, it's also about supporting your teammates, and working together as one.

The 24-member Matildas Squad will be cut to 18 for the Olympic Games, and competition for places is exceptionally tight.

The Olympic Team will be announced exactly one week after the conclusion of the Pacific Cup. This tournament is therefore much more than team preparation. Individual performances may all but make or break those selection dreams.

The Matildas are bursting to sink their teeth into this event. As much as can be achieved out on the training pitch, nothing can replicate the pressures, the challenges and the atmosphere of an international match. After the no-show of Nigeria in March, the Pacific Cup will be Australia's first international competition since the Australia Cup in January.

The last meeting between the two was the final of the Oceania World Cup Qualifiers back in October 1998, comfortably won by Australia 3-1 to dash the Kiwis' World Cup and therefore Olympic 2000 dreams. Sadly, New Zealand have not played a single international since that day.

New National Coach Doug Moore will finally lead his team onto the field for the first time in this Pacific Cup, New Zealand's first step towards the long road of qualification for the 2003 World Cup. To help them on their way, New Zealand have in their ranks two players who originate from the USA. Midfielder Simone Ferrara will make her debut for her adopted country, but Rebecca Smith was a late withdrawal from the tour. Marlies Oostdam also takes her place in the side, after enjoying a season's experience in the Australian national league with Victoria Vision.

Dual World Cup champions and current Olympic gold medallists, the USA without doubt lead the way on and off the field by way of their professionalism and unsurpassed track record. The champion nation were here as recently as January for the 2nd Australia Cup, but fielded a young team whilst their World Cup players continued contract negotiations back home. Nevertheless, the inexperienced combination went on to win the event, a reflection of the depth of young talent knocking on the door.

This time around, the star players who became household names both at home and around the world during the whirlwind success of the 1999 World Cup, will grace our shores for the Pacific Cup.

New Head Coach April Heinrichs only took over the reins in February, yet has enjoyed plenty of opportunities to experiment with new combinations, mixing new young blood in with the more established players. Five of the Australia Cup-winning players return downunder once again, alongside twelve of the World Cup champion side. Goalkeeper Briana Scurry was a late withdrawal through injury and is replaced by another young custodian.

Team USA will feature two of the true legends of the game - Kristine Lilly and Mia Hamm. Lilly earlier this month became the first ever player in international football history, man or woman, to notch up 200 caps for her country. The 28-year-old has a current record streak of 64 consecutive starts. Hamm is the biggest name female athlete in the US and holds the world record for international goals with a current total of 118. Hamm is also second in the caps stakes, with a tally of 191. The pair have each played in every World Cup and Olympic Games tournament to date.

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# Regulations

## **TOURNAMENT REGULATIONS (ABRIDGED)**

### **Trophy**

The country winning the tournament will be presented with The Pacific Cup. The Cup shall be held by the winning national association until two months prior to the subsequent Pacific Cup tournament, when it shall be forwarded to the host national association.

### **Players**

Each participating national association may enter 18 players in the 1st Pacific Cup.

For each match, 18 players (11 selected players and 7 substitutes) can be included in the players' list for the match. The 18 players shall be identical with those named on the official players' squad list for each match.

Up to a maximum of five of the seven substitutes may be substituted during each match. Once a player is substituted in a match she cannot re-enter the field of play.

### **Matches played in accordance with the Laws of the Game**

All Pacific Cup matches shall be played in accordance with the Laws of the Game laid down by the International Football Association Board and published by FIFA. In the case of any discrepancy in the interpretation of the Laws of the Game, the English text shall be authoritative.

### **Format**

The 1st Pacific Cup tournament shall be played as a round robin in that each team will play one match against each of the other teams, with three points for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a defeat.

In the event that a match is drawn after full time, two extra ten-minute periods will be played. The golden goal rule shall apply, but if no goal is scored during extra time, penalty kicks shall be taken to determine the winner.

Matches shall be played in accordance with a schedule drawn up by the Organisers.

At the conclusion of the round robin matches, final standings shall be determined as follows:

- a) number of points
- b) goal difference
- c) number of goals scored
- d) score of direct encounter
- e) drawing lots

The leading team on top of the table of final standings at the end of the round robin shall be declared the Pacific Cup Champions.

### **Duration of Matches**

Each match shall last 90 minutes, comprising two periods of 45 minutes with an interval of 15 minutes in between.

For all matches, if, at the end of normal playing time a match is drawn, extra time of twice 10 minutes shall be played, after an interval of five minutes at the end of normal playing time but not between the two periods of extra time. The golden goal rule shall apply, but if no goal is scored during extra time, penalty kicks shall be taken to determine the winner.

Clocks in the stadium will show the amount of time played however they will be stopped at the end of normal playing time in each half, i.e. after 45 and 90 minutes respectively. At the end of the two periods of normal playing time, the referee shall indicate to the fourth official the number of minutes that (s)he has decided to allow for time lost. The fourth official will then publicly display the time remaining.



### **Doping Control**

Doping is prohibited. Doping is the use of certain substances or methods capable of artificially enhancing the physical and/or mental capacity of a player, with the view to improving her athletic or mental performance.

Whilst the Organisers do not intend to arrange for any drug testing, it should be recognised that the Australian Sports Drug Agency is legislated to conduct random testing at major events held in Australia. Therefore, every player in a team, including substitute players, may be liable to undergo doping tests. Any player or team that refuses to undergo a doping test or falsifies the results of a test or attempts to do so or if found guilty of having taken prohibited substances, whether intentionally or not, shall be referred to Soccer Australia and/or FIFA. Reference is made to the FIFA Doping Control Regulations, which contain the list of prohibited substances and methods.

### **Referees, Assistant Referees and Fourth Officials**

A referee, two assistant referees and a fourth official shall be appointed for each match.

The referees, assistant referees and fourth officials shall be selected from current international lists.

### **Miscellaneous**

A technical meeting may be convened on the day prior to each match to run through procedures and match activities.

All disciplinary, appeals and protest matters will be dealt with in accordance with FIFA statutes.

For each match, each team will be entitled to a 45-minute familiarisation session on the competition arena. This may be restricted if pitch conditions are poor due to inclement weather conditions. Immediately prior to each match, both teams may be introduced to a small number of dignitaries present. This will be conducted in the usual manner with the team captain introducing each player



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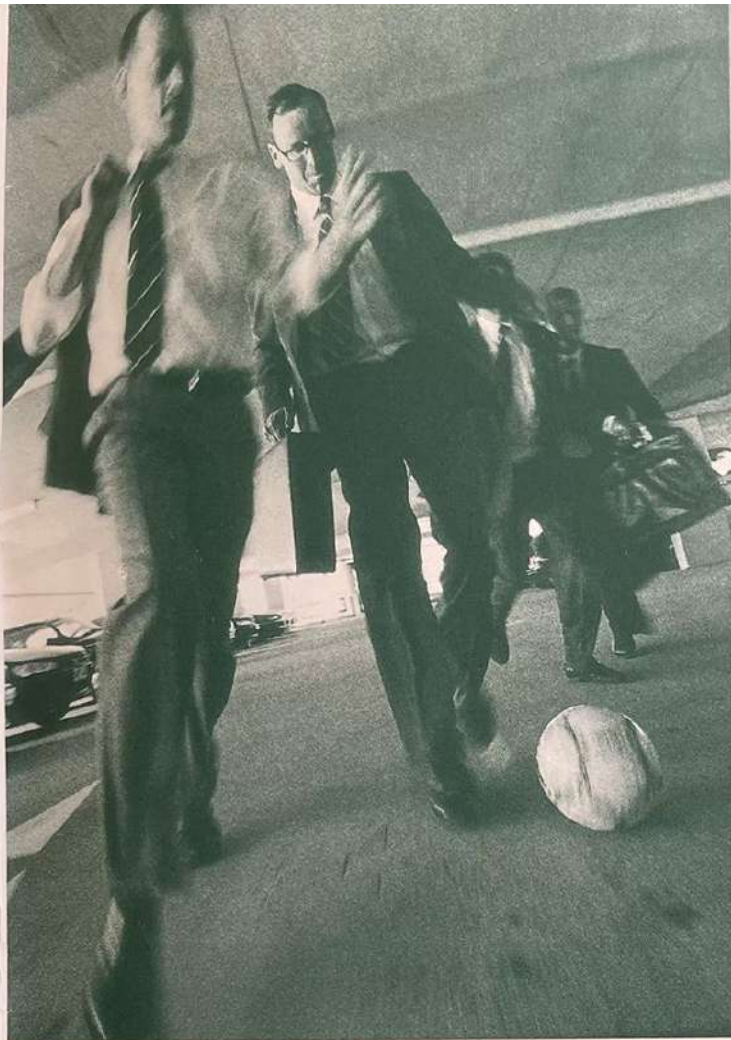
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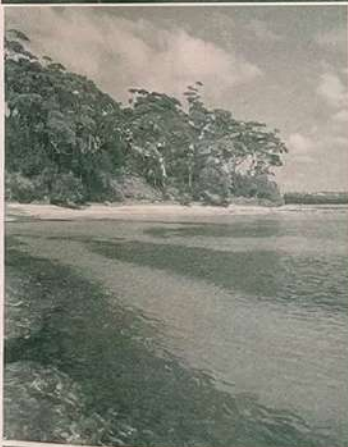
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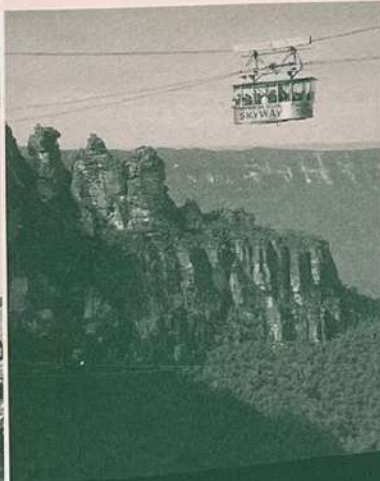
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
