

Alec Gibb (1888-1976)

Alec represented Australia fourteen times

Alec Gibb was Captain of first 1922 Australian team that toured New Zealand

Born in Ireland, moved to Scotland, Alec migrated to Australia in 1911

Alec went to school which was a military establishment on the "white cliffs." of Dover

The family moved to Musselburgh near Edinburgh after his father's discharge from the Army.

The only time he played football at school was in the streets. Caps were put down for goals and part of the game was dodging the police

He played for a Union juvenile team, which he captained. About 18 years he played for Newton Grange and later Musselburgh Athletic.

He the played a season and a half with second division St Bernard's (Edinburgh)

In Australia he played with Bundamba Athletics in 1912 winning a premiership and then Bundamba Rangers

In 1914 he played for Dinmore Bush Rats and in 1916 for St Helens and in 1925 Ipswich City.

Alec played Right half and was captain of the 1922 Bundamba Rangers Premiership team

In 1923 he became Captain/Coach of South Brisbane Scottish

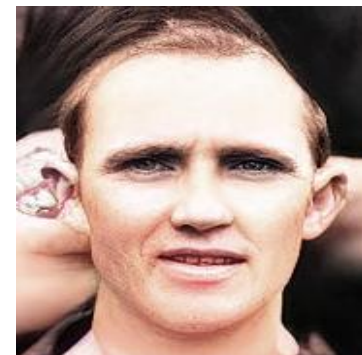
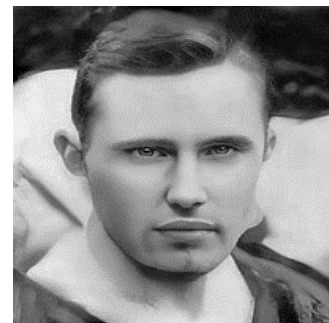
From 1913 to 1924 (with the exception of the war years) he played in every Ipswich and Queensland team and played 16 times for Ipswich and 21 times for Queensland

In the 1922 series in New Zealand Alex was captain and again against New Zealand in Australia

Alec won two medals presented for the best Australian player in both series.

Alec was offered the captaincy of the Australian team against the Chinese XI in 1923 but could not accept for business reasons

In 1970 Alec at the age of 82 attended the Qld Auckland match in Brisbane and donated a Trophy for the Best and Fairest Auckland player to reciprocate his 1922 Medal



Alec continued his association with the game, when he retired as an Ipswich, Queensland and Australian selector and was also President of the local Association from 1926 until 1940.

Alec was on the Queensland Football Association Executive and was Patron of the Ipswich and West Moreton Junior Committee and also wrote for the Queensland times

During the war years Alec was President of the Ipswich Soccer Patriotic organisation that raised funds for the war effort

Alec played centre forward for Bundamba Rangers (old boys) against Latrobe at the age of 59 in 1947

Alec was the first of five from the Gibb family to represent for either Ipswich, Qld or Australia.

The others were Alf, Allan, Lex and Lex (Buddy).

Alec worked for 25 years at Cribb and Foote before retiring in 1954

In retirement Alec played bowls and became secretary of Booval Bowls Club

In 2020 the Gibb-Masters Cup was named for matches between Qld and NSW

* Alec was inducted in to the Soccer Hall of Fame in 2000

*The Ashes

The Soccer Ashes were created after Australia first win over New Zealand(2-1) in Brisbane in 1923.

The ashes consisted of the remains of cigars smoked by the two captains, Alex Gibb and George Campbell and all team members and officials

The ashes were collected by the NZ team manager into a cigarette case used at Gallipoli by W Fisher who was the Australian manager and Qld FA secretary

The case was then set in wood from both countries.

The trophy was played for until 1954 and then lost.it was discovered in 2023 and played for again

SOCCER "ASHES."

MORE THAN A MYTH.

Mr. Alex. Gibb's Contribution.

With the Australian Soccer team who arrived at Auckland by the Wanganella recently came a real casket of ashes to be the stake of the three Test matches that are to be played between the Commonwealth and New Zealand (states the Auckland "Star" in a recent issue). Admittedly the idea of playing for "the ashes" is cribbed from international cricket, but on the outcome of this season's matches between Australia and New Zealand depends the custody of a casket of actual ash.

It happened this way. At the conclusion of the New Zealand eleven's tour of Australia in 1923 George Campbell, captain of the New Zealand team and Alec Gibb, captain of the Australian team, sat puffing cigars at the farewell banquet, and dropping their ashes into the same tray. Mr. H. G. Mayer, who, with Mr. H. I. Graves was managing the New Zealand team suggested that the ashes in the tray should be made the stake of future Soccer matches between the Commonwealth and the Dominion.

The ashes were placed in a plate safety-razor case 4in. long by 1in deep and 2in. wide, which Mr. W. Fisher, Secretary of the Queensland Football Association that year, had carried with him at the historic landing at Anzac Cove. He gave it to Mr. Mayer, who offered it as a suitable receptacle for the ashes.

With the cigar ashes in it, the metal case was soldered, and subsequently enclosed in a casket of Australian and New Zealand woods. The body is of Australian maple, and the lid and base of rewarowa—New Zealand honeysuckle. It is surmounted with a Soccer ball of silver, with a silver kangaroo between the twin fern leaves of New Zealand, with the letters "N.Z." in blue enamel.

On the underside of the lid an inscribed plate tells the story of the ashes, while the base bears a silver plate with the following inscription:

"New Zealand and Australian Soccer Ashes. This casket is made of New Zealand and Australian woods and was presented by H. G. Mayer manager of the New Zealand team touring Australia, 1923 season. The ashes are contained in a canister inside this casket."

Clarence Shenton (1901-1934)

Clarrie represented Australia eleven times

Clarrie was selected in first Australian team to New Zealand in 1922

Born in Laidley he moved to Childers and then lived in Ebbw Vale. He was a natural sportsman

Clarrie went to Central Boys School then played for Ipswich Grammar and was selected in the Ipswich Schoolboy team in 1914

He played for Bundamba after leaving school before moving to Wynnum in 1918 with his father who was a Methodist priest

He played a season of Rugby with the Gordon Club in 1919 and a season of Australian Rules as Wynnum did not have a soccer club

When Wynnum Soccer Club was formed in 1921 he joined and he made such an impression at Wynnum in their inaugural season that he was selected in the first ever Australian side to tour New Zealand at centre half. He turned 21 on the tour

Clarrie represented Queensland seven times from 1922-1924

He played for Wynnum from 1921-1924 and Thisle in 1925 (Vice Captain)

His football career was short-lived and he settled with tennis as his sport of choice where he became President of the Ipswich Tennis Association and the clubhouse was named in his honour (Shenton House)

Clarrie was a partner in Walker and Shenton who were Stationers and Sports goods retailers

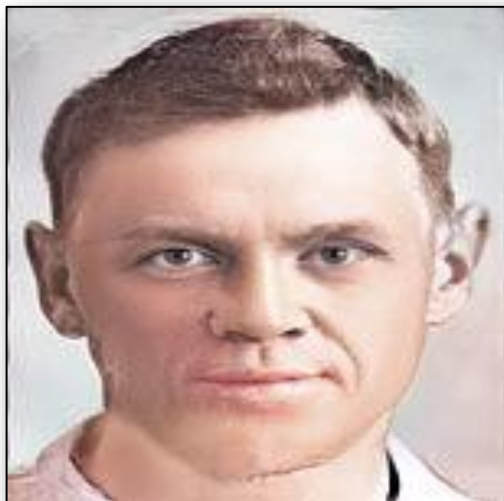
He was a member of the Ipswich Rotary Club and President of the Ipswich Grammar Old Boys Association, and a trustee of the Ellenborough Street Methodist Church

He was also the Patron of several cricket clubs

Sadly Clarrie died in 1934 at the age 34. A life lost too early

His brother Maurice who played for Bundamba Rangers died in 1940 age 36

Both preceded their father William who died in 1944



Moses Burton (1896-1975)

Mosie represented Australia on one occasion

Moses immigrated to Queensland from Scotland in 1920 on the Ship “SS Euripides”

He was an Engineer in Scotland and a miner in Ipswich

Mosie played for Bundamba Rangers Premiership team in 1922 and Tristram Shield winners in 1923

He represented Qld against New Zealand in 1923

He was selected in 1923 to play one match against New Zealand in Brisbane as Inside Right

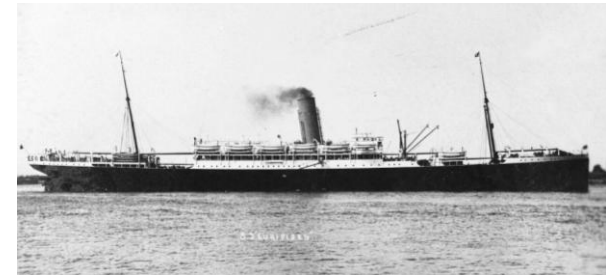

Cliff Gedge (1899-1973)

Cliff represented Australia three times

Cliff was selected in 1923 for Australia against New Zealand at Left Back.

Cliff was the first player born in Ipswich to be selected

Career

Represented Queensland Schoolboys in 1912

Represented Ipswich against a Chinese XI in 1923

Represented Ipswich and Qld against New Zealand in 1923

Represented Ipswich 8 times and Queensland on 4 occasions

Played for Dinmore Bush Rats when selected in 1923 and was in the 1923 and 1925 Premiership teams

Turned to Goalkeeping after a knee injury

Also played for Booval Stars, Bundamba Athletics, and was in the 1922 Bundamba Rangers Premiership team

Represented Ipswich in Cricket

Cliff was selected by Johnny Peebles in his best Australian team from 1922-1933



Jack (Toddy) Edwards (1900-1988)

Toddy represented Australia three times

Toddy Edwards was selected in 1924 against Canada in Australia at Outside Right.

(Green and Gold worn for the first time)

He was subsequently advised another player would play, but eventually played after an uproar and the team refusing to play.

Toddy was playing for Blackstone Rovers when selected

Before the big match started it was reported that the Australian players took decided objection to Edwards being dropped for Mitchell. They adopted their attitude on the principle that once a player was selected he should play. It was stated that the team would not go on without Edwards and the officials were at once confronted with a delicate situation. Conferences took place, and it was finally resolved by the Australian executive, by nine votes to two, that Edwards should play. The news of the dispute caused something of a sensation and was the cause of free and outspoken comment. The Press were informed that Edwards refused to stand down in favour of Mitchell. The voting shows that this action was officially endorsed'

Toddy was again selected for Australia in 1927 for matches against Chinese XI and Bohemians (Czechoslovakia)

Career

Toddy played 26 times for Ipswich and 19 times for Queensland

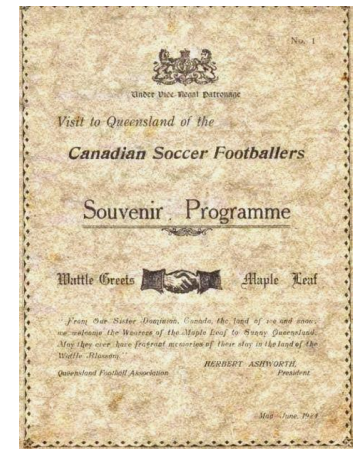

Eric was selected in 1924 for Australia against Canada in Australia at Left Half

Playing for Dinmore Bush Rats when selected

Career

Played for Ipswich and Qld against a Chinese XI in 1923, and for Qld against Canada in 1924

Eric was a St Helens Junior and member of the 1923 Dinmore Bush Rats Premiership team and the 1922, 1924 and 1928

He was also proficient in playing Gum Leaf solos and performed at the reception for the visiting

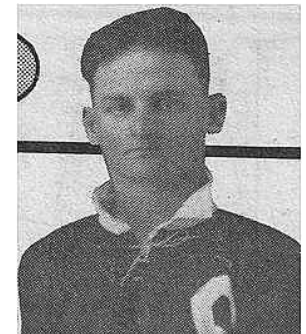

James (Jim) Donaldson (1911-1982)

James represented Australia nineteen times

James was selected in 1931 to tour the Dutch East Indies and played Outside Left. He also represented Australia in 1933 against New Zealand. James was playing for Booval Stars when selected. He also toured New Zealand with the Australian team in 1936 and was selected against Palestine in 1939. James served in WW2 in the 9 Battalion Volunteer Defence Force.

In 1936 James accepted an offer to play with the Granville club in Sydney for employment reasons he returned to Ipswich in 1937 after losing employment due to industrial action.

**James Donaldson has one of the most scarred right legs in Ipswich. Behind one of those scars is a story of perseverance in circumstances which, by ordinary standards, should have stopped him from playing Soccer, much less win international honours. When Jimmy was a boy he damaged a shin, and spent months having pieces of bone taken away in the Ipswich General Hospital. He wore a bandage and a special pad over his injured leg all the time he played Soccer. Jim pulled out of Soccer in 1946 when a piece of pit timber struck the already heavily scarred right leg. He went out of the game at his top.*



Russ Buchanan (1908-1986)

Russ represented Australia eight times

Russ was selected in 1931 and toured Dutch East Indies and played Centre Half and Left Half.
He played for Booval Stars when selected

In the Qld team that played in the first ever interstate carnival in Sydney in 1932

Represented Ipswich 12 times and Queensland 9 times

Member of 1928 Bundamba Rangers Premiership team

Member of the 1935 Booval Stars Tristram Shield winning side

Russ was a carpenter

Played piano with the Russ Buchanan band



Richard (Dick) James (1909-1963)

Richard represented Australia seven times

Richard was selected in 1931 to tour the Dutch East Indies and played Outside Right

Richard was the leading goal scorer on the tour

Richard played for Rosebells Football Club when selected

Member of the Qld team that played in the first ever interstate carnival in Sydney in 1932

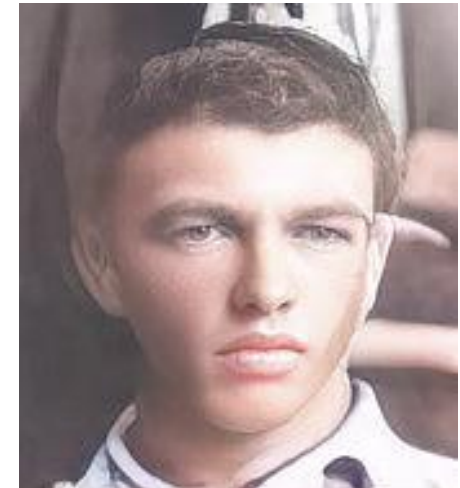
Represented Ipswich 14 times and Queensland 4 times

He played for Bundamba Rangers when selected.

William played 12 matches in 22 days on the tour

Selected for Queensland Junior team in 1922

Played four times for Qld and was captain in 1930

Played Junior with St Helens and also played for Bundamba Athletic, Bundamba United and Bundamba Rangers

Represented Ipswich 22 times and was captain in 1932

Captain of the 1931 Bundamba Rangers' Premiership side and member of the 1927, 1928, 1936, 1937 and 1938 Premiership teams.

Captain/Coach of the 1936 Bundamba Rangers' Premiership side

Founded Strollers Cricket Club

Bill's son Gary was a Qld Schools Junior Representative and Ipswich Kruger Cup player

TOUR OF JAVA - 1931

Four New South Wales players were suspended for life by the NSW Association for going on this tour.

NSW was in dispute over various issues with the Australian Association

The tour took place in late August – September and the bans were subsequently lifted in January 1932 after the squabbling parties resolved their differences. This was reported as an unhappy tour as there was a player revolt over payment and conversion to local currency.

Selection issues also marred the tour. On the ship home an argument between players saw a chair that had been purchased as set of three was thrown overboard.

*Alec (Buller) Kitching was nominated by the QSFA and was considered unlucky not to be selected



Mervyn Shanks (Born 1910-2001)

Mervyn represented Australia on one occasion

Mervyn was selected in 1933 in the team for New Zealand match in Brisbane

He played for Bundamba Rangers when selected.

Mervyn broke a leg in 1928 playing in a Junior match with Rustlers but went on to the following

Mervyn played Juniors with Kangaroos and St Helens

Represented Queensland seven times and Ipswich twice

In the Ipswich team that defeated New Zealand 5-3 in 1933

Member of 1931 and 1936 Bundamba Rangers Premiership sides.

Played for Rosebells in 1934 Blackstone Rovers in 1937

Mervyn was a labourer

Lex (The Duke) Gibb (1918-1997)

Lex represented Australia nineteen times

Lex was selected in 1938 against India at Left Half. He played for Bundamba Rangers when selected.

Lex's selection meant the Gibbs became the first father and Son to play for Australia.

Whilst at Alpha Football Club as a Junior Dan Roderick suggested Lex move from Left Wing to Left Half and Lex subsequently went on to play for Australia.

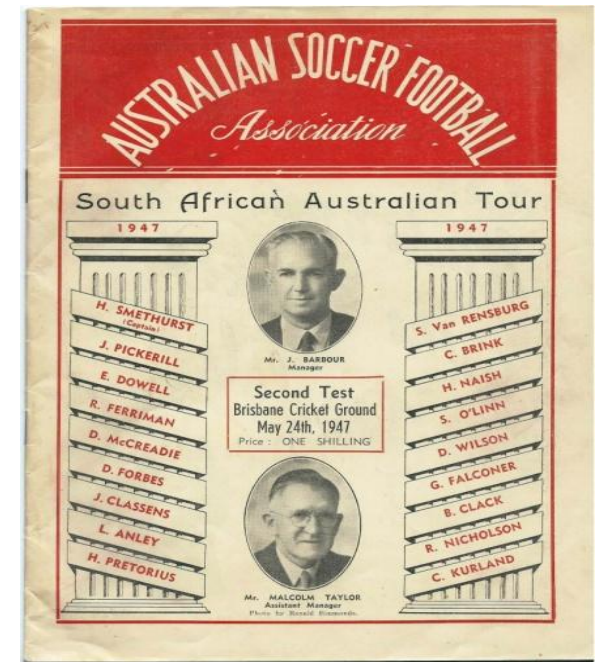

Eric represented Australia on one occasion

Eric was selected in 1938 against India at Right Fullback

He played for St Helens when selected

He represented against the following touring teams

1938 Qld (India)

1939 Qld(England)

1941 Ipswich and Qld (Chinese XI)

Represented Queensland eight times and Ipswich eighteen times

Eric represented Ipswich for fourteen successive seasons from 1928 to 1941 with no more games played until the end of WW2

Captained Ipswich and Qld (1938/1941)

Member of Dinmore Bush Rats Tristram Cup Winners in 1928

Captained St Helens(1931/32 Challenge Cup/Java Cup,

Won the Tristram Shield in 1939 with Bundamba Rangers

Coached Bundamba Rangers in 1946 winning the Tristram Shield

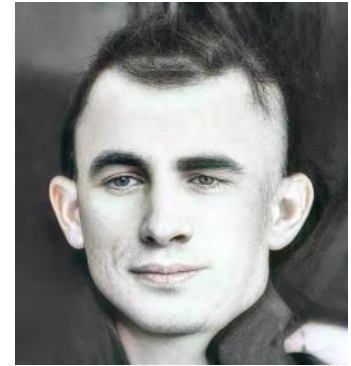
Lifetime member of St. Helens, Dinmore Bushrats and Bundamba Rangers.

Eric continued to play during WW2 in colliery teams and captained the Ipswich team in 1942

Eric was a member of the organizing committee for the Colliery competition and the Patriot games, he also participated as Captain/player of the Walkers colliery team and he was also a volunteer linesman for matches.

During this period some matches were played against Navy and Air Force teams. These games gave entertainment to the public and also raised money for essential items during the war. Eric's other efforts led him into being Captain the local Miners Rescue Brigade in Ipswich during his soccer years

Eric retired in 1944

Eric's claim to fame is that he was "anecdotally", the first player in Queensland to be paid (2 Shillings)



Eric was a speedway rider of some renown and was offered a place in the Australian team to tour England

He lost an arm in a car accident and the state body, on June 10th 1946 in recognition of his service, played a testimonial match between Ipswich and Brisbane

Eric was a member of the organizing committee for the Colliery competition and the PATRIOT games, he also participated as Captain/player of the Walkers colliery team and he was also a volunteer linesman for matches. During this period some matches were played against Navy and Air Force teams. These games gave entertainment to the public and also raised money for essential items during the war.

Eric's other efforts led him into being Captain the local Miners Rescue Brigade in Ipswich during his soccer years

Summary of a Footballer

Eric Petie was born in Freemantle West Australia on 8th December 1906; his parents returned to Ipswich, Queensland some time later. Like most soccer players of that era, he began his soccer career on the football fields of the local primary school before graduating to Junior Minor Football at the St. Helens football club in the Ipswich suburb of Ebbw Vale. During his life Eric displayed an inclination to be an adventurous person who was willing to put his hand to whatever took his attention. One such instance is when Eric was working as a coal miner which he did for most of his playing years. Because coal mining was a dangerous occupation he could see the need for miners to join the local Miners Rescue Brigade, which he did. He was trained for the dangerous job of rescue and retrieval of fellow workers from mine cave-in and gas explosions. He eventually undertook the role of captain of the Ipswich Rescue Brigade but it is not known for how long he continued to lead the Brigade in the rescue of miners that were either trapped, injured or deceased from colliery incidents.

The first recordings of Eric's playing days are in a club team photo where the St. Helens Football Club Junior Minor team won the Brook's Challenge Cup in 1924. He was the team captain at 17 years of age. He was also in the premiership winning Senior B team at St. Helens in 1926. Winning the premiership promoted St. Helens into the top tier competition and he would have been 19 years of age at that time. Eric's birthday was 8 December meaning that the football season was always completed some months before his birthday.

In 1928 he signed to play for Dinmore Bushrats and then stayed for the 1929 season. Newspaper articles report him playing at center forward during his Bushrats years so he would have shown some flair for attacking football. He would later return to a fullback position for which he is better known. 1928 is the first year that Eric was included in the Ipswich team, on one occasion he played left wing and received praise for his game.

During these early football years he ventured into racing motor bikes and he proved to be very competitive. His ability to race motor bikes earned him the offer of a place in an Australian team that was being assembled to travel to Great Britain and race against a British team, he declined the offer. Newspaper articles record him racing his bikes while he was playing for Dinmore Bushrats in 1928 and 1929. He would have been age 20 and 21 at that time. In 1929 in a one mile race with a flying start, competitors raced around the training track at the local Bundamba racecourse; he won his heat by 100 yards.

He returned to St Helens in 1930 and in 1931 he was appointed captain of the St. Helens team at age 24. He remained at St. Helens as the team captain until the end of the 1938 season. In 1939 he moved to Bundamba Rangers where he stayed until he retired in 1944.

The years of 1937 to 1941 were the years where Eric achieved his highest honors as a footballer. Even though he had an outstanding record of being selected in the Ipswich team from 1928 to 1941, the years between 1937 and 1941 produced Queensland state and Australian team selection, accompanied by the Captaincy of Queensland and the Vice-Captaincy of Australia. He was also awarded the Telegraph newspaper Soccer BLUE.

The year of 1938 was a proud year for Eric, in this year he was appointed the Captain of the Queensland team and Vice-Captain of the Australian team and to add a little more satisfaction to his year, he was awarded the Soccer BLUE which is a Best and Fairest award, donated by the Telegraph newspaper and judged by their soccer reporter. He was 31 years of age. The soccer BLUE is only a small blue badge that attaches to the button hole in the lapel of a coat but carries great prestige because it is awarded for being the best among your peers. Eric won the award above fellow state players and international representatives.



In his reasoning summary of why Eric Petie was awarded the Soccer Blue, the reporter wrote "But month after month he has maintained his form varying not a little on the days I have seen him. Club man, State player or International, I see the same dour Petie. I see in him all the attributes of that style of player that is the very salt of the game". Newspaper commentators saw Eric as not being a brilliant flashy player but as a very consistent, strong, determined and reliable player that was cool in a crisis.

In 1939 Eric left St. Helens and joined Bundamba Rangers which in that year won the premiership for the third consecutive year. In 1940 there was disruption in the club when the club committee decided to go into recess rather than affiliate with the Queensland Soccer Football Association, this resulted in players leaving the club and joining other clubs. Eric played a prominent role when he and other concerned members of the club set about resurrecting the situation by recruiting more players and committee members, after which they affiliated with QSFA. Eric encouraged his younger brother Raymond to be the club secretary, which Raymond nominated for and was accepted. Following the restructure of the club, Eric was appointed the club delegate for Queensland Soccer Football Association meetings and was also appointed as captain of the team. With a new committee and some new players the newly formed team performed creditably in the 1940 competition by finishing fifth of eight teams, one place ahead of the team that most players left to join.

Leading Bundamba Rangers again in 1941, Eric and the team improved their position on the premiership table by moving into third position. In 1941 at age 34 he continued his captaincy of the club team and the Ipswich team despite there being other Queensland and international players in the Ipswich team.

In 1941, a newspaper article titled MEET THE WINNERS, the author said of Eric Petie, "Ted (Eric) Petie claims the proud distinction of having represented Ipswich (Q), at soccer for thirteen (actually 14) successive seasons against Brisbane and hopes to add further to that score. He is one of the most sensational full-back produced by Queensland. In addition, Ted (Eric) has been in the Queensland team eight times..."

Although the newspaper article MEET THE WINNERS credits Eric with representing Queensland on eight occasions, only seven occasions have been verified to date. It can also be confirmed that he was the team captain on three of those occasions. An enquiry was made in 1981 at the office of the Queensland Soccer Federation at Perry Park in Brisbane to have access to past records for the names of players who were selected to play for Queensland. In reply to the request a QSF officer stated that most of the records held by the QSF were destroyed in 1974 when flood waters entered the office of the QSF. The destruction of records has put reliance upon newspaper reporting and other printed material to verify Eric's representative career.

The years of 1942/43 were very unique years for Ipswich soccer, the Brisbane/Ipswich football competition was shut down because of domestic effects caused by World War 2. The Bundamba Rangers football grounds and neighboring Bundamba racecourse were taken over by the Australian Army for the war effort.

In an effort to keep the sport active in Ipswich and provide spectator entertainment as well as raising money for essential purposes, two new competitions were started and conducted under the rules of the Queensland Soccer Football Association. They were the Collieries Competition and the Patriotic Games and although they were promoted separately and for different reasons, the matches appear to be conducted as a joint competition. Newspaper reports appear to indicate that the same organizing committee conducted both the

Colliery Competition and the Patriotic Games and although played on the same days and against all teams, they may have had different grand finals. The four teams of Bonnie Dundee, Walkers, Klondyke and New Chum that formed the Collieries Competition also played teams in the Patriotic competition which included RAAF 1 and RAAF2 plus teams from what were deemed to be essential industries.

Eric's contribution to the continuation of soccer during this two year period was considerable. He was a member of the committee that organized and conducted the matches; he acted as a neutral linesman for other teams as well as participating in the competition as the captain of the Walkers colliery team.

At this time in Eric's working life he was a colliery manager and there is no doubt that he would have used his position as the colliery manager to urge the owners (Walkers) to provide some monetary support to the Walkers team nominated for the Colliery Competition.

With the return of the Brisbane/Ipswich competition in 1944, Eric signed on for one last time with Bundamba Rangers and he called time on his career at the end of the season, just a few months before his 38th birthday. He had competed for 16 years in top grade football.

In 1945 he was appointed coach of Bundamba Rangers and although they didn't win the premiership, the team won the premier shield knockout competition, the Tristrams Shield.

Eric played for three clubs during his football career, St. Helens, Dinmore Bushrats and Bundamba Ranger. Each of these clubs bestowed upon him honorary life club membership for services to their clubs.

On the 25th of January 1946 Eric was involved in a motoring accident. While waiting to turn onto Brisbane road at Booval, a truck that was turning into the street where Eric was waiting, ploughed into the driver's side of the car, critically injuring Eric. His five year old son Lance was in the car by his side. As a result of his injuries, Eric's right arm was amputated above the elbow.

Messrs. A. Thurburn and Dan Roderick (Qld captain and Australian rep.) headed a committee that organized an intercity testimonial match between Ipswich and Brisbane to raise money as a benefit fund to assist Eric and his family through his recovery period.

The inter-city match was played at Bundamba Rangers ground on 8 June 1946 with an Ipswich/Brisbane schoolboys match played as the curtain raiser. Eric's son Graham was the captain of the Ipswich schoolboy's team. The local newspaper reported that many Brisbane soccer supporters were expected to attend the testimonial match in support of Eric Petie who was held in very high esteem by metropolitan players.

To Dan Roderick, captain of the premiership winners, Bundamba, captain of the first Queensland team to beat New South Wales for four years, and centre-half for Australia in the second Test match against Palestine in Brisbane, goes "The Telegraph" Soccer Blue for 1939.

Although not a brilliant player, Roderick has earned for himself the title of Queensland's best Soccer player his season because of his efforts which have been most consistent throughout the season.

There is no stronger club man in Queensland than the hardy, hard-working Bundamba centre-half, and to him goes the credit as Bundamba's savior in the premiership campaign.

He has proved himself a master in defence, and although his methods of attack are along orthodox lines he is of great assistance to his forwards on the offensive.

Roderick was announced his intention of not leaving his club football, but in the meantime will make other players of his club realize that this award, which is far from a light matter, will make him a valuable asset.

After all he is a man of only 26 years of age and has many football years to run.

WHEN Soccer star Cliff, Sander transferred to Azzurri, his club St. Helens received a 10/- transfer fee.

Now, four years later, defence as a half-back, St. Helens want Sander back, but it will cost them £500.

The £500 fee imposed by Azzurri on Sander is a record for a Soccer player in Queensland.

It followed a recent approach by St. Helens for Sander's services.

Was suspended

Azzurri then suspended Sander for a brief period for what is believed to have been strong criticism by Sander of his club officials and supporters following incidents after the last Azzurri match at Heath Park.

This suspension led to Sander being withdrawn from the Queensland team which played New South Wales the following Saturday in Sydney, in the Australian Soccer championship final.

Azzurri officials are awaiting St. Helens' reply to the transfer fee demand.

International suspension 1960-1963

Australia's membership of the FFA was suspended in 1960 after disobeying FIFA mandate on recruiting foreign players without a transfer fee. No further Australian teams were selected until 1963. This ban cut short the International career of many Ipswich players.

This period also saw the end of an era in Ipswich soccer with rich Brisbane ethnic clubs signing Ipswich Internationals.

From 1922 to 1938 there was an Ipswich player represented every year except in 1927, 1928 and 1936.

From 1936 until 1958 Ipswich teams won 16 of the 20 Premierships
