

Referee: Des Miles, rating 8.

Tony Kinnear, who during the second half of the competition emerged as City's most valuable player, scored the first goal with a breakaway effort in the 25th minute. He almost set up another two minutes later with another break down the right ,but Dennis Dodd just missed the crossbar after accepting the pass. A break down the right and a clear header for Mick Boot resulted in the equaliser some four minutes later.

Mareeba had chances to win in the second half, including one shot which hit the post.

Despite the tremendous pressure on Mt. Gravatt to win this game they came through with flying colours. Steve Clark, Paul Yeuell and Dave Costa responded splendidly in the absence of Eric Thompson, their midfield was faster and more adept at making openings and the Mounts' strikers displayed much more opportunism. Mt. Gravatt got away to a dream start after seven minutes through young Ian Head, who intercepted a back pass from Ian Lawrie to Peter Nielsen.

Another Ipswich defence lapse a few minutes later almost let Mt. Gravatt in again as they stormed forward to try and clinch the title, but Greg Donnelly dived to concede a corner. In the second half, after Head had hammered in his second goal in the 23rd minute, Ipswich started to gain territorial advantage, but many of the moves broke down in the face of the inspired Mt. Gravatt defence.

On one occasion, Mark Davis ventured out of his area and took the unusual step of heading the ball safely out over the sideline. Davis also made two good saves to deny Bryan Kathage and Lawrie and after that the flickering Ipswich fire died. A late penalty awarded for a handball by Nev O'Sullivan was stroked well wide by Yeuell, but he and the others could not have cared less when the final whistle blew.

Townsville United retained their unbeaten home record this year to clinch this 2-0 win over Frenchville and at the time, unknowingly edge their way back into third place.

With this week's Ampol Cup final very much in mind, Tim White rested Mick Geoghegan and Malcolm Tuttle, who had minor injuries, and replacements Keith Royle and Rob Lawson had fine games. Royle in fact won the Lappins Menswear man of the match award. A solo run and great goal from fullback Kevin Johnson in the 34th minute sent Townsville in with a halftime lead.

The first half was an even battle, but the home side should have rattled up a few more in the second half. In the end they had to settle for Chris Young's header in the 55th minute which was set up by a neat run and chip by Lawson. The second half highlight was a fierce 40 metre drive from Royle which hit the upright.

This was after only 11 minutes, twelve minutes later Lazenby put up a "bomb" and Marley was again on the spot to knock it in. Waves only forward of note in the first half, John Wood, had a great solo run through half the length of the field, beat the defence, but his finishing shot was off target.

SYDNEY — Leichhardt did more than enough to beat Brisbane Lions at Lambert Park but their lack of finishing power left them with only a single point from a scoreless Philips League draw.

Leichhardt failed to prise open one of the best defences in the competition due mainly to the skilled work of drilled Brisbane backs Jim Hermiston and Colin Bennett.

The first half left much to be desired with both sides heavily committed to defence

Jim Dempsey turned in a solid game both in attack and defence but the inability of the Leichhardt wingers to cross the ball accurately to the strikers deprived Leichhardt of any chance of scoring before the interval.

The match came to life after halftime and Leichhardt showed more determination up front, but poor finishing and the excellent covering of Bennett and Hermiston denied them goals which the amount of pressure they applied seemed to promise.

SYDNEY — Newcastle United played right into Marconi-Fairfield's hands by presenting them with two penalty goals as they slumped 1-4 in their Philips League clash at Marconi Stadium.

And when Marconi mid-fielder Gary Byrne takes penalties he rarely misses.

And hammering two goals, he completed his hat-trick after a brilliant solo run in the 74th minute.

Newcastle's plan was to nullify Marconi striker Eddie Krncevic by close marking him with John Sneddon.

But that play succeeded only in the early stages of the game.

Roy Drinkwater had Newcastle one up after only 16 minutes when he latched onto a weak clearance 15 metres out and planted the ball home.

But four minutes later, Marconi drew level with Newcastle right-back Paul Reaney fouled Marconi striker Mark Jankovics, and Byrne scored his first goal from the penalty spot.

Then, in the 33rd minute, a long high centre from Marconi defender Ivo Prskalo

found Krncevic in front of the Newcastle goal.

Krncevic soared high to beat Newcastle keeper Phil Dando to the ball and head home

An inexplicable hand ball by veteran Socceroo left-back Col Curran gave Byrne another chance to demonstrate his penalty scoring prowess, and he netted in the 60th minute, sending Dando the wrong way.

Newcastle tried a double change in the 66th minute, with strikers Peter Tredinnick and Malcolm McClelland taking the field for David Jones and Paul Burrows, but to no avail.

Byrne cut out Newcastle defender Sneddon along the right wing in the 74th minute and the tidy little Marconi midfielder beat Dando to slot home the fourth goal .
