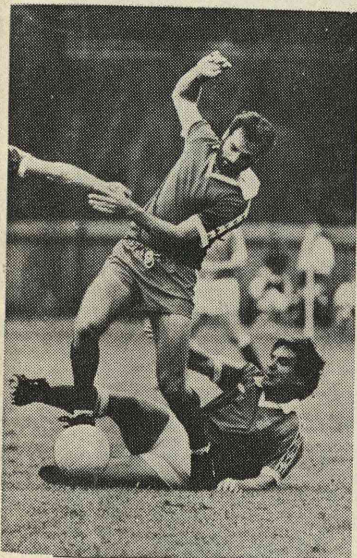

THE QUIET REVOLUTION IS STARTING TO SHOW

For perhaps the first 75 of the 99 years that soccer has been in existence in Queensland, the home and the stronghold of the code was in Ipswich.

While most people recognise that since the loss of the city's top players in the mid-fifties the Ipswich clubs never regained their former strength, many have failed to appreciate the quiet revolution that has occurred at Ebbw Vale.

Ipswich United is more than just a new name for an old team.

It represents one club's determination to restore Ipswich to its rightful place in Queensland football. In order to achieve this aim a development program was launched some five years ago. It was based on a simple plan which must bring ultimate success.

The plan is simply this:

- (1) To develop the club's fund-raising base.
- (2) To develop amenities which will make the day an outing enjoyable for club supporters.
- (3) To encourage local talent by —
 - A — providing good coaching
 - B — limiting imported players (players who did not play junior football in Ipswich)
- (4) To produce and maintain a professional attitude to all things concerning football.

How successful has the approach to planned development been?

Well, to answer that question look at the results over the past four years —

A — State League premierships: Fourth twice, Fifth twice.

B — Ampol Cup: Third, First, Second, Third (tie).

Yes, it is true that other clubs have performed better, BUT, Ipswich has achieved the results while growing in strength and confidence. In South-East Queensland this has been matched by no other club. In the past 25 years no other club in Ipswich has had such strength in its playing staff.

No club in Queensland has a better record in knockout competition since the start of the State League.

So the quiet revolution is working. For those in Ipswich who long for a return

to the Golden Years of Ipswich soccer, come and watch Ipswich United on Sunday. They may not destroy their opposition the way Bundamba Rangers did in 1957 (five internationals in the side) but their performance will be worthy of the teams of the past.

And remember, the team from Ebbw Vale is growing in strength and will continue to grow until Ipswich is the undisputed king of Queensland soccer once more!

THE BIG PROGRAM

The Ipswich United committee has arranged a great program at Ebbw Vale this Sunday for Ampol Cup Final Day.

The committee is billing it "Back to Ipswich" and hope to create a country-like atmosphere which will make it a great family day and certainly in terms of entertainment — real value for money.

At the Stan McCrae stadium — which heading outbound along Ipswich Road is on the left opposite Ebbw Vale railway station — there will be merry-go-rounds horse and sulky rides and pony rides.

Ipswich United's generous sponsor Jacaranda Dairy will have fresh dairy product samples for everyone to taste.

And if that's not enough there will be music, prize cows, cheer squads, soccer queens plus of course, the big soccer clash.

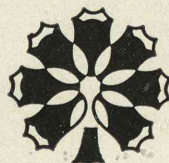

Jacaranda Dairy Sponsors Ipswich United

FIVE FAVOUR IPSWICH

Five of the eight State League coaches not involved in this weekend's Ampol Cup Final believe Ipswich United will win the trophy.

All eight found the result difficult to predict and stressed they considered it would be a tough, close match but Mauro Saftich (Valley Trident), Con Pharenou (Brisbane Olympic), Mick Banks (Across the Waves), John Ward (Capricornia) and Iain Kesson (Brisbane Lions) opted for Ipswich.

George Pagan (Townsville), Ian Runcie (Twin Towns) and Tony Lowndes (Brisbane City) went for a Townsville win.

The coaches though made their predictions last week and before they knew the outcome of last weekend's fixtures or any possible injuries or suspensions in the two Cup final teams.

Below is a summary of each coach's opinion.

IAN RUNCIE (Twin Towns): Townsville — Both defences are very even in that they are very good but Townsville appears to have more up front. Wormley, McGuinness and Trovalusci are a great forward line and will be the difference.

CON PHARENOU (Brisbane Olympic): Ipswich — Townsville are a hard side to beat but they don't create as many chances as Ipswich. Ipswich have had plenty of scoring opportunities in recent weeks but the luck hasn't gone their way. Townsville have had all the luck so far in the competition and I think it may run out. It will be a hard encounter but I think it could be even 2-0 or 3-0 to Ipswich if they get the breaks.

IAIN KESSON (Brisbane Lions): Ipswich — Ipswich are in the box seat. They have a home advantage and the pressure is off them as far as winning the State League premiership is concerned. Apart from the Grand Final which is a long way off, the Ampol Cup is their only immediate chance of winning anything this year. Everything is stacked against Townsville and the pressure and knocks, etc. could take their toll.

MAURO SAFTICH (Valley Trident): Ipswich — We have played Ipswich twice and they are a disciplined and hard tackling side. The biggest thing going against them is that they have been missing easy chances but they make up for this by being very tight at the back and giving nothing away either. If Townsville win it will only be by one goal but I think in a Cup Final, Ipswich will hit their straps and put away the chances.

TONY LOWNDES (Brisbane City): Townsville — In Paul Wormley and Bob McGuinness, Townsville have the two most talented forwards in the State League. Even though the match is at Ebbw Vale, the striking power of Townsville and their ability to put away the half chances will see them through.

GEORGE PAGAN (Nambour Reds): Townsville — This is going to be, without a doubt, a very, very close game. I would like to say it could go either way but if I had to make a decision I tend to slightly lean towards Townsville solely because they have more flair up front. Ipswich are very strong at the back but the Townsville forwards have just that little bit extra which could produce something unpredictable and result in a goal.

MICK BANKS (Across the Waves): Ipswich — Ipswich are a solid side which is very good at the back — just look at their defensive record in the State League. The only problem they could find is keeping control of Bob McGuinness but I can see Ipswich's backs carrying them through.

JOHN WARD (Capricornia): Ipswich — Ipswich are more consistent in their general play and of course have the home ground advantage and will tend to come forward more. The fact that Townsville won the recent State League encounter will work against them I think as I feel Ipswich will be even more determined to prove a point. You should never write Townsville off but I think Ipswich have the determination to win.

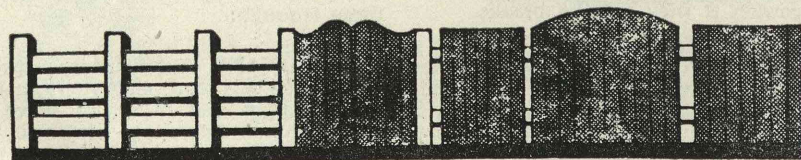

CLEM HAS A SPECIAL CUP FINAL INTEREST

The name Clem Hoffman is fast becoming synonymous with that of Ipswich United and, in addition to sponsoring the successful Hoffman Industrial Cup, he will have a special interest in this weekend's Ampol Cup Final.

Clem is certain to be watching the performance of former Coalstars player Bruce Penman.

Although Clem tends to play down the reason, Ipswich United officials are the first to admit that without Clem's generous support, Bruce may well not be in their side this season.

The story goes back to the start of the year when Ipswich were interested in buying Bruce from neighbouring club Coalstars, and Bruce wanted to play State League, but the transfer fee put on him exceeded the club's budget.

Clem came to the party and donated "several hundred dollars" which, along with a similar anonymous donation, covered the cost of the transfer fee.

Bruce did not take long to slot himself into the Ipswich United midfield and has been a tireless worker this season.

"It was good talent down the drain for him to stay at Coalstars when he had the opportunity to play State League football," Clem said this week.

"Local clubs need all the assistance they can get and I thought that in helping to bring Bruce to Ipswich United I was doing my part.

"We are a local business and I think it is our responsibility to support the people who often support us. Helping to pay for Bruce's transfer was my way of saying thank-you to the Ipswich people."

And Clem is quick to add that he is more than pleased with his investment

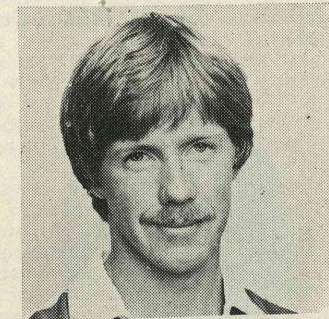
and while he would like to see Bruce score this weekend he won't mind as long as it is Ipswich who are putting the ball in the net.

Clem, 46, has a long history of involvement in soccer. Of Dutch birth, Clem represented the Dutch Army while still living in Holland. Since his move to Australia he has tended to be more involved in the off-field activities of soccer.

His son, Clem, is also involved in soccer and trains an under 12 side at Coalstars.

Clem admits that when the different Ipswich teams meet he finds it difficult to split his loyalties and says he tries to work on one theory.

"As long as Ipswich soccer is progressing I don't care who wins when we play each other," he said.

NEWS FROM VALLEY TRIDENT SOCCER CLUB

The Valley Trident State League clash with Brisbane Olympic at Goodwin Park was an unmitigated disaster for the Blues when they collapsed to a 0-2 defeat that all but ruined their chances for the premiership.

In a fierce, sometimes savage encounter, Valleys won the conflict but lost the match. They were unable to concentrate enough to put together that fast, flowing football which characterised their game only a few weeks ago.

The match began in the manner it was to continue for the rest of the game, fast and furious. Valley Trident had just begun to settle down and dominate the proceedings when square positioning and slack marking allowed Jim Bellas to run onto a through ball and score.

Valleys fought back with great determination but then suffered a most devastating blow when Gerry Lindsay was sent off for addressing a relatively mild piece of invective to the referee. It was indeed foolish of Gerry to ever have opened his mouth but most referees will agree that a competent, confident official in the middle is usually able to withstand such an assault on his ego with something less than a red card. Wollongong coach, Ken Morton, made the same point recently — it's a pity vital matches have to be decided in such a way.

The Valley Trident boys came out in the second half determined to make every effort to save the game but playing a man short at the back — a desperate defence conceded a penalty.

Jim Maclean scored from the spot and immediately provoked an unsavoury exchange which reflected no credit on either team. Try as they might the Blues could not break down a resolute Olympic defence who held on to win by the clear two goal margin.

Valley's ability to carve out a creative pattern was emphasised when subtle schemer Tom Pike was replaced by John Shepherd whose more direct and simple approach was starting to look effective as the game entered its dying stages. All is still far from lost for Valleys but they will have to pull out something for their remaining fixtures to achieve the success their earlier efforts have merited.

The SEQL side rolled to their eighth success by beating Olympic 4-1. It's not that the win was easy, it was just that it was made to look so by the fine supportive teamwork of the Blues. With only one player, Frank Mengotti, with State League experience, the team made up largely of

Colts had an average age of about 20 years. Their performance belied their youth, however, it was Frank bent on making a quick return to the first team, who provided the firepower by scoring three goals.

Mark Blakeney scored the other — a brilliant solo breakaway effort — and in a team which were collectively impressive, captain Robert Monteverde deserves mention if only for his ability to resist off-the-ball intimidation and lead the boys by example to a well-merited victory.

The Senior Colts and Fourth Division teams both had good stirring 2-1 victories over Mitchelton and Taringa respectively, the Colts have played consistently well this season and will go close to winning the finals while if the Fourth Division side had started with the team they now have they would undoubtedly have won a place in the top four.

Another Valley Trident team became the victims of an administrative tangle when Romano's under 13 team arrived to play a vital match at noon which had been rescheduled for 10 a.m. That forfeit has cost the team the premiership and the disappointment of the boys after their especially fine effort this season is not hard to imagine. Never mind boys that championship is still there for the taking.

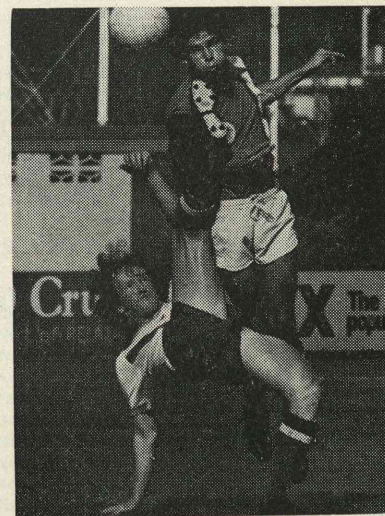

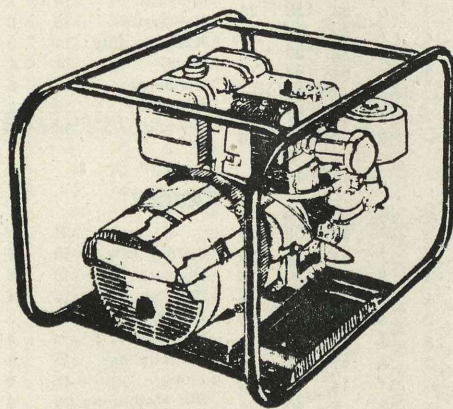

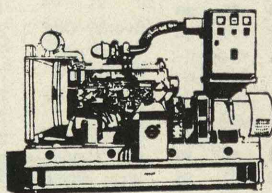

Has a son playing in the U/10's. Keith still keeps his hand in by turning out for the club's Commercial League team, and playing as well as ever.

EDDIE BELCHER — Left midfield—Eddie only played with Thistle for four seasons. When last heard of Eddie was playing in a band for C.M.F. obviously he's one chap who likes to blow his own trumpet.

BARRY DANN — Centre half—On this auspicious day, Barry couldn't get into the team he was the only reserve! A one club man, Barry has spent nearly all of his playing career and most of his coaching career with Thistle. Currently Football Manager of the club overseeing all the senior football activities. Was first choice centre half for Queensland on a number of occasions at the height of his playing career.

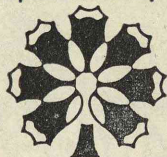
