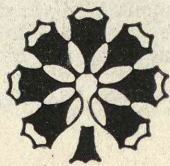

## MOUNT GRAVATT ARE THE CUP FAVOURITES

Mount Gravatt are hot favourites to beat Ipswich United in the Ampol Cup final at Perry Park this Sunday.

That's if the opinions of the other 10 Premier League coaches not involved in the match are any indication.

Seven of the coaches believe the Hawks will win the Ampol trophy for the first time in their history. Three tip Ipswich.

And most agree there will be plenty of goals to entertain the spectators. The coaches were unanimous in tipping a tough, hard fought final.

Generally Mount Gravatt got the nod because the other coaches considered them the most consistent side this season. Many cited the experience in the Hawks line-up and named players like captain-coach Eric Thompson, striker Gary Bohan and midfielder

Craig Dickson as Mount Gravatt's match winners.

But throughout, the coaches who tipped the Hawks believed they were the best all-round side.

The three coaches who went for Ipswich United made their tips on the basis that, on their day, the club could produce brilliant football. They said their midfield was as good as any in the competition and had just as much experience as any other side.

It will be interesting to see which coaches are correct, but one thing that is for certain, the ingredients are there for one of the best, most exciting, hard fought finals in years.

*Here's what each of the other 10 Premier League coaches thinks.*

**BOB BUTCHARD** (Acacia Ridge) — **MOUNT GRAVATT:** "They are the most consistent all-round side in the league. They are particularly strong in the air and have experienced players who are still enthusiastic. They should take out everything this year. I think the final will see goals with a score of say 3-2 to Mount Gravatt."

**RODDY MCKENZIE** (Brisbane City) — **MOUNT GRAVATT:** "It will be a hard even match but Mount Gravatt are a much better put together side — workman like and well balanced. They don't give anything away even when they are struggling. I can see Mount Gravatt getting a lead and holding on to it. Maybe a 2-1 win."

**SYD TUCKER** (Easts) — **MOUNT GRAVATT:** "Mount Gravatt has more striking power. They take their chances better. Gary Bohan and Craig Dickson are the dangermen while Eric Thompson is playing very well. I think they will win by the odd goal."

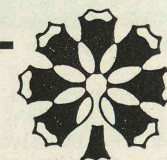
**JIM BAYLISH** (Grange Thistle) — **IPSWICH:** "The Ipswich midfield is slightly better and that will give them a winning edge. I think their forwards and defence are on a par but by controlling the centre of the park I think United will win."

**IAIN KESSON** (Lions) — **MOUNT GRAVATT:** "On consistency I have to go for Mount Gravatt. Ipswich could win if they played above themselves — and they can do it. For on their day Ipswich have a lot of flair. But Mount Gravatt are a grinding side that just keeps on going. And when you make a mistake, they nail you."

**PETER DONOVAN** for George Potter who was away (North Star) — **MOUNT GRAVATT:** "They are the stronger team. Ipswich have the names but some haven't fired this season. Without Ken Gordon I think they would be lost and I think Mount Gravatt can account for him."

**COL THARENOU** (Olympic) — **MT. GRAVATT:** "My heart says Ipswich but my head says Mount Gravatt. I would like to see Ipswich win but I think the Mount Gravatt side is just too good allround."

**GEORGE STECKIW** (Sunnyside) — **IPSWICH:** "They can play a lot smarter, soccer than Mount Gravatt. They are much more technical and that will give them an edge."

**TREVOR DAVIS** (Taringa) — **MOUNT GRAVATT:** "The Mount Gravatt team is a combination of all the qualities needed to win a Cup Final. They have speed, skill and aggression. I think it will be a tight, low-scoring match—possible 2-1 to Mount Gravatt'."

**JOE BELLA** (Valley Trident) — **IPSWICH:** "They are a more experienced side and better balanced. Both have strong defences so I can't see too many goals being scored. But Ipswich have the finishing power and they could win by one goal."

## EDITORIAL

Does anyone know what is happening with Australia's national soccer competition?

If they do, please let everyone else know.

Yes, once again we find ourselves at the end of the season — the time of the year when all our rivals are enjoying tension-packed finals series — and we're still working out what we are doing next year.

And not working it out very well either.

There must be something terribly wrong with the internal structure of Australian soccer if it takes us months on end to make a decision.

The planning for the 1984 national competition, as we understand, began more than four months ago. Ideas were probably formulated even earlier.

A decision was expected to be announced two weeks ago.

And yet we are still waiting for an announcement. Now, following the late decision by NSW to go against the proposed plan (one very few have seen anyway), it may be an announcement we still might not get for weeks.

But to point the finger and blame certain parties is an easy task. Sorting

out the current statement, and sooner than as soon as possible is what all parties should be working at.

Soccer in Australia is going nowhere and will alienate the present supporters and sponsors if we all continue to push our own barrows. The time has come for administrators at all levels to get their heads down and come up with a solution.

If they can't do that then they should get out and give someone who can, a

## Points to ponder

Still at Lions . . . the tip is if NSL coach Simon Kistemaker returns to Europe, and that's not 100 percent certain, a well-known former local player could take over. And it might not be Col Bennett.

*It was pleasing to hear Brisbane City secretary John Ponturo say recently it was "highly unlikely" Brisbane City would ever revert back to its old name Azzurri. The City supporters have adopted their present name well and it has been many seasons since the name Azzurri has been chanted.*

A northside Premier League club is still confused after a recent Premier Reserves match at their ground. Everyone concerned was convinced the referee gave the same player two yellow cards in the same match without sending him from the field. It must have been a long, hard season for referees because a similar thing very nearly happened at Spencer Park recently.

**It's that time of the season again—the time when some clubs begin "stacking" sides to win lower division Premierships or a semi-final berth. Anyone who plays in a lower division against a club with higher side no doubt has had experience of coming up against a team vastly different to the one played in the first round. Indications are some of the worst offenders are some of our most prominent clubs.**

*It looks like Lions might go ahead with plans to re-turf their magnificent Richlands No. 1 pitch. Apparently the club has been advised the grass is dying at root level and the present surface has only a limited future. The field is undoubtedly one of the best playing surfaces in Australia and hopefully the club will not lose anything in the re-turfing.*

**The axe is about to fall on about six clubs, and some of them not in the lower divisions, whose debts have reached alarming proportions.**

## THE 'UNEMPLOYED' COULD HEAD FOR RICHLANDS . . .

**The number of top-line coaches presently out of work should ensure Brisbane Lions has little trouble finding a replacement for Simon Kistemaker, who is to return to Europe next month.**

The list reads like a Who's Who of local soccer.

Joe Gilroy, George Pagan, Fred Robins, Mal Bland, Gyula Vincze and the Saftich Brothers Nereo and Mauro. And not to forget interstate, former Socceroos coach Rale Rasic is now available after being sacked by South Melbourne.

Added to that formidable list, Lions have Iain Kesson still on staff while former NSL team captain Col Bennett has made it known he is keen to take over the coaching reins.

With such a wealth of talent and character available, the Lions board would be foolish to make a rash and hasty decision.

The club is certain to get other applications as the prospects of the job surely must make it one of the most appealing in the country.

Most of the hard work has been done at Richlands. The team has been rebuilt and the youngsters in the Lions NSL side can only get better with experience.



The youngsters have proven on more than one occasion this season they have the ability, and now need direction and encouragement to become a strong side in the league.

But in selecting the new coach, there is much to be taken into consideration. Not only past performances, but personality, style, outlook and aims.

To sign a big spender like Rasic could be out of the Club's scope. Rasic is unlikely to want to work with a team totally made up of youngsters and possibly would want to attract several experienced southern players. That may not be a bad idea, but the cost could be.

## LIONS HAVE AUSTRALIA'S TOP JOB!

To re-appoint Joe Gilroy, Gyula Vincze or even George Pagan for that matter could be interpreted by some as a step backwards, as all previously coached at the club.

Obviously in practise that may not be so, but the club would have to ensure the reasons for the earlier splits were no longer existent.

Coaches like Mal Bland and Col Bennett are young as far as NSL coaches are concerned and are former team mates or opponents of many of the present Lions squad. A young coach may find it difficult to win the respect or maintain the discipline of players in the same age bracket.

But the counter argument is Jim Hermiston at City — but then he was an exceptional player.

The Saftich brothers have strong ties with the Italian community and it would be extremely unlikely they would be approached, or accept, the Lions job.

Our pick from the above group is Fred Robins. Robins had exceptional success with Mount Gravatt and achieved good results with the Queensland and Queensland Youth teams. Many of the Lions players were in fact in that national championship-winning Youth team.

He is a seasoned, qualified coach, who could well handle the position, and the players.

But according to the Lions directors, any appointment is some months off. And if one tip doing the rounds is correct, maybe a new coach may not have to be appointed!!

# FEEDBACK WANTED ON QSF PROPOSALS

The re-structuring of the administrative side of the Queensland Soccer Federation has begun and the re-structuring sub-committee is eagerly anticipating feedback on its proposals.

A 17-page outline of the possible new format has been sent out to all clubs and interested parties and the sub-committee has welcomed comment from as many persons as possible before it finalises the proposals.

The proposed format is radically different from the present QSF administration and was devised from an original draft prepared by QSF secretary Alan Vessey after a study of a number of organisations.

Essentially, the proposal provides for a governing body of directors who are either elected or a nominee from a specific area of soccer. The directors work through designated standing committees.

The proposed standing committees include areas such as: Brisbane Professional Leagues, Brisbane Amateur Leagues, Finance, Technical, Disiplinary, Independent Appeals, Sponsorship and Promotion, Media, Board of Trustees, Medical and Sports Medicine, Junior Soccer Development, Women's Soccer Development, Referees Development, Country Soccer Development and Marketing.

The internal structure and parameters of each standing committee is outlined in the proposal, but each reports back to the board of directors, which would meet

monthly.

In a radical change to the present set-up, each League — professional and amateur — will elect its own chairman annually. There would be a vice-chairman and six committee members who would meet weekly from March to October to administer the day to day operations of their respective competitions, similar to much of the workload of the present management committee.

The other standing committees are relatively self explanatory with each administering that particular area. The size of each committee varies according to its anticipated workload.

The Council will not be done away with totally but will become the Federation Consultative Council.

It will be a forum at which all representatives of soccer in the state will have the opportunity to put forward submissions for consideration by the directors and their committees.

The Council would meet annually, probably in February.

Voting will be weighted similar to the present set-up with the Premier and Intermediate Leagues clubs having two votes and the Amateur clubs and affiliates having a vote each.

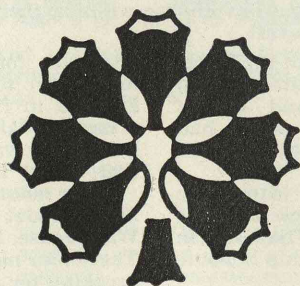

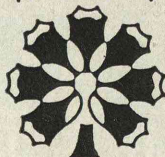
