

*Alec Gibb (1888-1976)

Born in Ireland, moved to Scotland, Alex migrated to Australia arriving on the ship 'Paparoa' on the 7th November 1911

Alec's future wife sailed on the same voyage.

Alec first played with Bundamba Athletics, then Bundamba Rangers and in 1914 for Dinmore Bush Rats and in 1916 for St Helens. In 1925 he played for Ipswich City

Alex played right half. Alec was Captain of the 1922 Bundamba Rangers Premiership team and was selected captain of the 1922 Australian team that toured New Zealand.

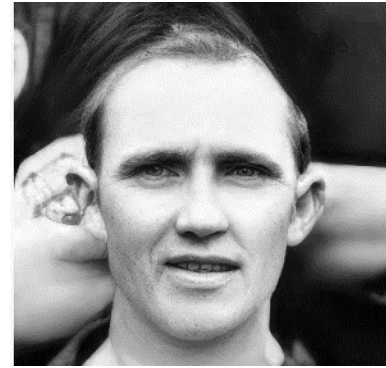
From 1912 to 1925 (with the exception of the war years) he played in every Queensland team.

Alex continued his association with the game, when he retired as an Ipswich, Queensland and Australian selector and was also President of the local Association.

Alec was the first of five from the Gibb family to represent either Ipswich, Qld or Australia.

Alec was a Life Member of the Queensland Football Federation and was inducted into the Soccer Hall of Fame in 2000.

Alf was part of the occupational forces in Japan after the war. Alan became a Sports writer.*

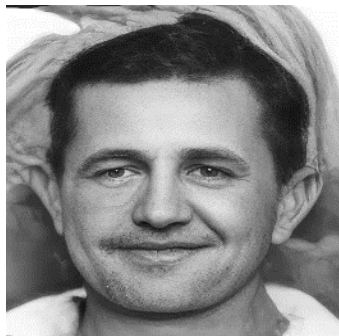
Grandson Lex(Buddy) played for St Helens and Gold Coast United and was selected for Qld three times

Great-grandson Glen Gibb represented Ipswich. Grandsons John and James Richards played for St Helens

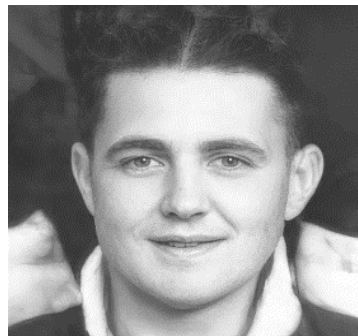
