



# The English team in Ipswich(1925)

Queensland Times (Ipswich, Qld. : 1909 - 1954), Tuesday 16 June 1925

#### Soccer Englishmen arrive

Welcome at Ipswich It was a large expectant crowd which waited on the Ipswich railway platform last night for the arrival of the Sydney mail train, to bid welcome to the now famous English Soccer touring party, who, were enroute to Brisbane; but it was a disappointed throng which left the station a quarter of an hour or so laterThe Englishmen. were apparently not expecting any cheers and kept their seats: in the train; but seated at the little tables in their compartments, smoking and playing cards, they looked a.singularly fit and health lot, with their ruddy faces, slightly bronzed by, the bright Australian sunshine.

It was quite two or three minutes before they could be located but in the end Mr John Lewis, the Manager of the party, was persuaded to step on to the platform. A short, white-haired gentleman, was immediately surrounded: by members of the West Moreton exeecutive and others; and listened attentively to a short welcoming-speech by the Mayor Alderman A. T. Stephenson. "to think we could defeat such a formidable combination," said the Mayor, "I doubt whether they will beaten during their visit to the Commonwealth but I am sure Ipswich is capable of putting up-a solid game." Three rousing 'cheers for the Englishmen broke from thee crowd, while a porter shouted "All aboard."

## Soccer Wizards. The English "Pros" West Moreton beaten triumph for Science Machine like combination. "By Left Back"

" Something of the real beauties and delicate artistry of Soccer were revealed by the English "pros" against West Moreton on the North Ipswich reserve yesterday afternoon, and 4000 people left the ground after the 90 minutes' play, amazed at their superlative skill. The Englishmen revealed the charm of the round ball game, and led some to understand the magnetism which draws hundreds of thousands of people all over England to worship at its shrine. As Mr. Lewis said at the semi-official reception, tendered the team by the Mayor, at the North Ipswich workshops, in the morning, "It is the only real game of football" England won by three goals to nil, but it was easily

discern-ible that they were out purely to educate the crowd, and not to score goals. England's record for

won 12, goals for 68, goals against 5. Batten tops the list of scorers, with 16, Simms comes next with 15, and Williams, after yesterday's coup, has also 15 to his credit, whilst the others are under six. Before 3 o'clock there were not more than 2000 people on the ground, but the train from Brisbane brought with it a few hundreds and by the time the match commenced the crowd had been increased to over 4000.

The gate of £280 is probably the biggest amount taken at a Soccer match in Ipswich, on a day other than a holiday. One or two changes were made in the published teams.

England experimented with Len Graham, play-ing him inside right to Walsh, in place Simms, and on the Ipswich side "Spokes" Pedley was unable to turn out, his understudy E. Rumble, of Bush Rats, taking his place. The climatic conditions were almost ideal; the rain, which had been threatening all the morning, happily held off, and grey clouds shut out the dazzling light of the sun, and the zephyr which blew straight down the field was to light materially to affect the flight of the ball. Ipswich, looking spick and span in jerseys of black and gold and black knickers, filed on to the field first amidst salvos of applause; the Englishmen, wearing cream shirts tucked into black knickers made an unoste-tatious entry to the ground, hopping over the fence near the entrance. As they jumped on to the ground the wonderful physique of the English-men was most marked, Caesar and Elkes especially attracting attention, and in comparison the Ipswichian's looked almost frail.

E. Hudson, of Brisbane, as follow:- H. Hardy; C. Spencer and S.Charlton; J. Hannah, J. Hamilton, and W.C. Caesar; F. Walsh, L. Graham, W. Williams, J. Elkes, and S.Seymour Ipswich: L. Halls; J.Routledge and M. Burns; J.Williams, L. Warrell, and S.Teasdale; J.Edwards, W. McDowall, J.Potts, E.Rumble, and A. Williams. England won the toss, and defended the Woollen Mills goal.

From the kick-off; they took the ball from Ipswich, and at once assumed command of the play. As they piloted the ball with the ease and skill of a child floating a boat, and slipped it from one to the other with superb accuracy, the crowd was amazed. Their wonderful footwork, their uncanny manipulation of the ball, their great headwork, and, above all, their smart team work, superseded anything seen in Ipswich before. The Ipswichians were out-marshalled and out-played, they were swept off their feet, and for a while the Englishmen toyed with the ball at their will. The wizard Elkes had them absolutely bewildered with his marvellous footwork. Tall and strong, with a clumsy sort of run, the young Hotspur was the "brains of the English van-guard;" he engineered openings for his partners, and was always the prime mover in any action.

Though watched by three Ipswichians, Elkes could do practically as he liked with the ball; he walked right through them. His footwork was superb, and time and again he tricked his way through three and four Ipswichians in a bunch. It was all so delicate, too - just a little flick of the foot, sufficient to divert it only a matter of inches. The ball just seemed to glide off his foot when he made a pass. The game was just 10 minutes old when the first goal came, and Elkes was the master mind

The movement was initiated on the left wing, where Seymour crossed prettily, Williams accepted, parted to Graham, who slipped the ball over to Elkes, and the giant forward, with-out any hesitation, but with a big sweeping movement of his right foot, crashed it into the top of the net. It was a brilliant goal. All this while, Ipswich had been suffering badly from nerves; their kicking was faulty, and the forwards, in dropping back to assist the defence, only got in their way; the team was disorganised. Play was mostly on Elkes' wing, but Graham and Walsh often got moving, and Teasdale, crude but persistent, did a lot in keeping them quiet. The crowd roared when Ipswich did eventually make a move, although it bore no fruit. McDowall was the instigator. He burst through and made a good opening for Edwards. The winger was hotly pursued down the wing by the big Caesar, and as he shot was sent tumbling on his head. Charlton cleared.

#### A Store of tricks.

As the game progressed, the Englishmen displayed their store of tricks; they were at once as education and an object lesson in the art of Soccer. Each man was a scientist and a master of his position, and the manner in which they weaved pretty patterns with the ball was wonderful. Cool as cucumbers, even when hotly pressed by the Ipswichians, they parted with the ball without hesitation, with just a flick of the toe, and at head work they were brilliant. It cannot be said that Williams greatly impressed at centre forward. He was always quick and ready to take ad-vantage of any opportunities, but his all round work lacked the polish of his confreres, and his shooting was not always accurate. Stanley Seymour, from whom people had been led to expect so much, was apparently looking after his limbs, for frankly he did not do much on the left wing, though given a goodly share of theball by Elkes. He did not appear to overwork himself, but he displayed flashes of brilliance, and his centres were perfect. Graham. the English international half, who was playing at inside left, was another who contented himself with mere parlour play, but he was well watched by Sam Teas-dale. Ipswich were very quick on the ball, and infused plenty of dash into their play, but their wild kick and rush methods availed nothing. Each man seemed to feel the occasion in-tensely, and, if anything, did not give of his best in consequence. In the first half, Potts did not see much of the ball, but he showed keen alertness when he smartly intercepted a back pass from Charlton to Spencer and got clean away. He beat Spencer in the race for goal, but his crowning shot flashed across the goal mouth. Shortly afterwards occurred an incident which made the crowd hoot. It appeared that Charlton, in defending Hardy. from McDowall, bumped the latter, who had not the ball. A free kick was given, but it was afterwards ascertained the goalie offended in carrying the ball. Ipswich kept up the good work, and from a cross from the left Ed-wards netted. A shout of "goal" went up, but it was changed to one of disappointment when the referee points for a free kick. Edwards was offside. It needed about 10 minutes for half-time when England registered their second point. Williams accepted a pass from the right, cleverly beat the backs, and netted with a rising drive. Shortly afterwards, McDowall was injured and had to leave the field for a few minutes. There was no further scoring in the first session After the change over, Ipswich brightened up, playing with more confidence, but this served to emphasise the wonderful constructive work of the English halves, especially that of Hamilton.

While keeping a watchful eye on Potts, and the other inside men, he gave his forwards much sup-port, and plied them with pretty passes. Caesar was always well up amongst the front rank and occasionally burst through on his own, but this big hefty amateur international, who was prone to use his weight in the good English style, did not create the impression that Hamilton did. Hannah worked well, but quietly.

Throughout the match he did not do one really outstanding thing, but without him the faultless mechanism of the English side would have been upset, just as a clock minus a cog-wheel. Now the Ipswich halves played well, but in an altogether different way; in fact, their vigorous tactics were in direct contrast to the methodical movements of the visitors. Teesdale, who was conspicuous with his light blue socks, was the best of the bunch. He was bumped often and had more than his share of work to do, but he was a big factor in keeping quiet the English right wing. "Fatty" Williams, on the opposite side, was also prominent, but his opponents were too clever and experienced for him. Charlton was a model full-back; he is fast and kicks very cleanly, and is particularly good at placing a ball. He is an adept at the game which made McCracken, then of Newcastle United, famous, of putting the opposing team offside, and once or twice when Edwards had a clear course down the wing, he ran up and put him offside. Spencer did not come so much in the limelight as did the young Exeter City man, but his play was very sound. Ipswich were less effective against this solid opposition than they would have been had they co-operated more. "Artee" Williams was absolutely starved after the change over, and his partner, Rumble, saw the ball only when he dropped back to assist the defence, but Potts, McDowall, and Ed-wards co-operated in some pretty, pentrative movements, which almost brought the downfall of the English goal on one occasion. It was after England gained a corner on the right. Walsh took the kick, which was clear-ed. McDowall fastened on to the leather, cleverly evaded Caesar and an-other man, and passed to Potts. With delightful precision, the centre passed out to Edwards, who made a diagonal course for goal. When pressed by Charlton, he shot, but Hardy, with cool judgment, picked up and cleared.other preliminary.


#### A Near shave

An even nearer shave occurred a few minutes previously. Potts dashed past Hamilton and Charlton and raced for goal with Spencer in hot pursuit. He was bumped over near goal, but the ball went out to A. Williams, who centred sweetly. Hardy fell and divert-ed the ball, and Edwards, who had cut into the centre, was left with an open goal, but his shot went wide. It must be said that Edwards, McDowall, and Potts justified their selection in the Queensland team. They combined nicely at times, and some of Edwards' centres were splendid. In Charlton, he was up against a man as fast as him-self, Williams and Rumble were not given many opportunities on which to do themselves justice. Routledge played confidently from the beginning, and his kicking was sound, though without judgment. Burns appeared rather nervous and kicked wildly. Burns had a favourite habit of concentrating on the man and leaving the ball. Hardy gave a masterly display in the English goal, and deceived his opponents, when attacked, with clever feinting. When Potts gave to Rumble, who was unmarked about 12 yards from goal in the second half, he ran right out and completely upset the for-ward's calculations. Halls did some great things in the Ipswich goal, but the majority of the shots which he was called upon to save were directed straight at him. Williams scored England's third goal from a corner well placed by Walsh. On the resumption, Ipswich got away, and Spencer conceded a corner. This was nicely placed by Edwards. Hardy tipped the ball, and A. Williams se-cured, but his shot cannoned off the upright into play. It was the last ex-citing incident of a memorable match. The St. George medal for the best player on the English side was won by Elkes, while Wal. McDowall was ad-judged the finest player on the Ipswich side
