


In 1931 Mr Wilshaw was man-

In 1931 Mr Wilshaw was manager of the Australian team which toured the Netherland East Indies and on numerous occasions has been manager of inter-state teams.

Before coming to Australia in 1920 he was a member of the Staffordshire Football Association Council, being the nominee of West Bromwich Albion and Wolverhampton Wanderers and this honour was conferred on him for services rendered to the game in the Midland County.

In his school days he was captain of the Hanley High School

team and represented his County. He was 440 yards and 880 yards champion runner of the school and in later years won the 100 yards Old Boys' race.





Prior to coming to Australia in 1909 he was assistant secretary of the Tranmere Rovers Club, Birkenhead, Cheshire—one of the oldest clubs in the North of England. He had considerable experience as a referee, serving on the lists of the F.A., Liverpool County and Cheshire County Associations.

Served overseas from 1916 to 1919. Has been connected with the Victorian F.A. for many years and is secretary of that body and represents them on the Australian F.A.

THE FOUNDATION OF ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL

THE FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION was formed in England in the year 1863 and has since promoted and controlled the game of Association Football as a national sport and pastime in England.

The number of players affiliated to the Association is about 5000 professional and a quarter of a million amateurs. This means about 400 professional clubs and 40,000 amateur clubs. These figures are only for England, while the inclusion of Continental clubs and the clubs from various other countries, which are on the increase each season, will bring the number of players of Association football to an amazing total.

The New Zealand Football Association was formed in 1891, representatives at the first meeting being L. Tripp, Don Sinclair, F. Leslie (Otago), J. A. Gibbons (Auckland), Mr Gibbons (Canterbury) and A. M. Henderson (Wellington), who was elected secretary and treasurer.

Formed in 1884 the Otago Football Association is the oldest association in New Zealand, Auckland being formed in 1885 and Canterbury and Wellington in 1889.

The first inter-provincial games in New Zealand were played in 1890, Canterbury beating Wellington at Christchurch on August 16th by two goals to nil, and also in the same year defeated Otago at Christchurch by four goals to nil.

The main trophies competed for are the Brown Shield, presented in 1891 by Robert Brown, of Glasgow, for competition among the various provinces. The Shield was then known as the Association Football Challenge Trophy, but was later named the Brown Shield. The first match for it was played in Christchurch in 1892, Wellington being the first winners, defeating Canterbury nine goals to two. The Shield is now played for by the minor associations of the North Island.

The Chatham Cup, presented by the ship's company of H.M.S. Chamham, is competed for in club competitions. The final is played between the champion club of the North Island and the champion club of the South Island.

The English Football Association Trophy is the premier soccer trophy in New Zealand and was presented to the New Zealand Football Association by the English Football Association in 1925. It is competed for by the major associations and was first run on the lines of the Plunket Shield incricket. In 1928, the challenge system was brought into operation and in 1946 the trophy was played for under a knock-out system—this system to continue until 1949. The present holders are Auckland.

The Peter Dawson Cup was first presented for competition between the major and minor associations of the South Island, but this year it has been decided to make it a trophy for the minor associations in the South Island.

EXPLANATORY RULES

There will be many spectators who are new to the game and others who have forgotten the laws of the game. The off-side rule trips most and a study of the following will enable you to follow the game more easily. OFFSIDE

When a player plays the ball, any player of the same side who at such moment of playing is nearer to his opponents' goal-line is out of play, and may not touch the ball himself, nor in any way whatever interfere with an opponent, or with the play, until the ball has been again played, unless there are at such moment of playing at least two of his opponents nearer their own goal-line. A player is not out of play when the ball is kicked off from goal, when a corner-kick or a throw-in is taken, when the ball has been last played by an opponent, or when he himself is within his own half of the field of play at the moment the ball is played by any player of the same side.

It is not a breach of the law for a player to be in an off-side position but only when in that position he interferes with an opponent or with the play. If a player who is in an off-side position advances toward an opponent, or the ball, and in so doing causes the play to be affected, he should be penalised.

LAW 9 Tripping, Kicking, Jumping at.—Neither tripping, kicking, striking,

nor jumping at a player shall be allowed. "Hands."-A player (the goalkeeper within his own penalty area excepted) shall not intentionally handle the ball.

Holding, Pushing.—A player shall not use his hands to hold or push an opponent.

A. GRAVELL: Goalkeeper, 24, physicist, 5ft. 10in., 12st. 4lb. Plays for Box Hill, Melbourne.

G. NUNN: Centre forward, 21, signwriter, 5ft. 10in., 12st. 2lb. Plays with Bunbamba-Brisbane. Represented since school days. Represented with his state against New South Wales and South Africa. A very fast runner and very dangerous when near goal. He should do well in New Zealand.



J. HODGE: Right wing, 20, miner, 5ft. 9in., 10st. 9lb. Plays with West Wallsend-Newcastle. Represented inter-district three occasions and with New South Wales against Queensland. A newcomer to big football—has every indication of being a prospect for greater representation. Crosses well and can shoot for goal.

NEW ZEALAND TEAM

ROBERT (BOB) KING (A): Goal. Recognised in Auckland as a very brilliant goal-keeper. Praised by South Africans last year who thought him to be the best goalie they had met during the whole of their New Zealand tour, including all Tests. Has exceptionally safe pair of hands; rarely fumbles; always cool under pressure; wonderful anticipation; powerful kicker; quickly turns defence into attack with his skilful placements from the goal area; hard to bustle; would occasion no surprise in Auckland if chosen for New Zealand against the Australians in August. North Island, 1948; and Auckland, 1948.

RAY HODGSON (A.): Left Back. Has been a solid back since secondary school reps., when he represented Auckland in Skerret Cup series at Wellington in 1939 and at New Plymouth in 1940. Chosen in the 1946 Auckland side which won the English Football Trophy from Canterbury at Auckland. Subsequently chosen in North Island side. North Island and Auckland. 1948.

A. HARRIS (W—Waterside): Right back. A very consistent player, hard to pass. Has perfect understanding with his partner. Has represented Wellington on a number of occasions, also New Zealand against South Africa, three Tests. North Island and Wellington, 1948.

D. McKISSICK (W — Railways): Right Half. A recent arrival in the country. Excellent ball control, a constructive player

good on attack and defence. North Island and Wellington, 1948.



M. GORDON (C—Western): Needs no introduction to soccer public; has represented Canterbury and New Zealand on many occasions. Three Tests v. South Africa, 1947. South Island and Canterbury, 1948.

P. TRAYNOR (W—Waterside): Left Half. One of the fastest players on the football field, either with the ball at toe or not. His ability to turn defence into attack marks him as a dangerous player. Has represented Wellington on a number of occasions. Wellington, 1948.

HOWARD HUTCHINSON (A): Left Half. Undoubtedly one of the finest halves in the country today. Can adapt himself easily to any style of play and is never known to waste a ball, many goals scored have their origin in his clever placing. Captain, two Tests v. South Africa. North Island and Auckland, 1948.

B. SARGENT (W—Institute): Inside Right. A young player who has been playing consistently good football, combines well and is a powerful and deadly shot near goal. North Island and Wellington, 1948.


J. KIDD (Wanganui): Inside Left. A clever inside forward, combines well and is quick to seize an opening; a deadly shot with either foot. Has represented Wellington and New Zealand. North Island and Wellington, 1948.

V. SMITH (Technical): Constructive half-back, made a good impression against South Africans, who had a very high opinion of him, represented New Zealand.

T. METHVEN (Air Force): A recent arrival; very clever player; half-back and inside forward.

R. N. SMITH (Western): A very constructive player, has represented Canterbury on many occasions.

J. SHARPE (Stop Out): A speedy winger who knows how to cross a ball. Has represented Wellington previously, also New Zealand against South Africa.



G. SMITH (C — Western): Probably the most brilliant forward in New Zealand; very dangerous in front of goal; has represented New Zealand. Four Tests, South Africa. South Island and Canterbury, 1948.
