TOP YEAR

Today's match against New South Wales caps the biggest and most successful representative season ever undertaken by the Maroons.

Under the astute guidance of coach Bruce Stowell and Captain Frank Liddell, the Queens-land side is yet to be beaten in five games over the past four months. In fact, the Maroons have not been beaten since they went down 1 - 2 to the Fili national side in Suva in May 1985.

Queensland's representative program this season began with a two-match series against the Fijians in Brisbane in March. Despite the limited preparation, the Marcons trounced the exciting Fijians 3-1 in their opening fixture, with Coalstars' striker Mark Brusasco netting twice in his debut match. The return match, again at Perry Park three days later, was shrouded in controversy and was terminated in the 60th minute with the scores locked at 1-1.

Last month, the Queensland team flew the Maroon flag in New Zealand where they played in the four-team Auckland FA Centenary Tournament. The Maroons opened the tournament with a stylish 4 - 0 win over Tahiti, with Lions' striker

In their second match, Queensland found New Caledonia to be determined and frustrating opposition, and despite a glut of possession, were held out to a scoreless draw. That result turned the final match against hosts Auckland into a tournament-decider with Queensland needing a win to take first place.

Although the game ended in a 1 - 1 draw with Brusasco again being the scorer, it was one of Queensland's finest performances. The team not only fought back from being a goal down in the second half, but rallied after the tragic first half loss of goalkeeper Rob Farrow who broke his leg.

"I have stuck by the squad that performed so well in New Zealand because I think those players should be given the chance to show the people the same high standard of football they produced in Auckland," said Stowell.

ROBSON IS OUR MAN OF When England Captain Bryan Robson transferred from West Bromwich Albion to STEEL

When England Captain Bryan Robson transferred from West Bromwich Albion to Manchester United for nearly \$4 million, he was destined to become one of the game's greats.

And the gutsy midfielder certainly did not let down his new club, nor his country. Indeed, if the 30-year-old Geordie was to switch clubs again, his transferr fee almost certainly would be double the last asking price.

In recent years Robson has led his country to the World Cup Quarter-Finals and his club to a triumph in the FA Cup Final at Wembley. And throughout his amazing rise to fame, Robson has battled a run of injuries which almost certainly would have ended the career of any lesser player.

But Robson is the man of steel. His robust, whole-hearted style has won him admirers around the world. And today he is set to capture the hearts and support of the parochial Queensland supporters when the Maroons take on New South Wales in the annual interstate clash.

Robson is one of the best-credentialled guest players ever to come to Australia, and undoubtedly the first player of his calibre and standing to appear here while still at the peak of his career. His style is certain to blend with that of Bruce Stowell's Queensland team, and together they will form a unit which the Blues will find difficult to beat.

Robson comes into a team that is defending its title as interstate champions, after beating NSW 1 - 0 at Perry Park last year. Today's game is undoubtedly the most important of the season. But the England captain has proved repeatedly that he is a big-match player.

One man cannot win a game, a point Robson will be first to admit. Only teamwork and total commitment for 90 minutes will ensure victory over NSW. Robson has never given less than 100 percent in any game and today will be no different.

Today, Bryan Robson may be our guest, but at the same time he is certain to typify the Queensland spirit.
