Points to Ponder

The Queensland soccer team's reputation is spreading fast throughout the Oceania Confederation following the successful tour of Fiji last month.

It is understood a number of other South Pacific nations are interested in hosting the Maroons and our northern neighbours Papua New Guinea could be the next frontier for Bruce Stowell's squad.

Queensland Soccer Federation officials were ecstatic over the tour, the best by a Queensland team for years. QSF president Ald. Ian Brusasco has no doubts that the Maroons would be welcomed again by the Fiji Football Association.

Touring is a costly exercise and the QSF will investigate all alternatives before next season. Cost is not the only factor though and fitting a tour into the Australian soccer calendar, in a World Cup year as well, could provide problems.

TOUR OFFER FROM PNG?

But a short tour of Papua New Guinea early next season would be an ideal preparation for the interstate clash with New South Wales. On returning from Fiji the Queensland squad and its coach Bruce Stowell were confident they could have beaten NSW.

The Queensland players were treated like heroes in Fiji and the pictures on this page capture some of the action in their three games. Queensland avenge an opening 1-2 loss to the Fiji National team in Suva by beating the Islanders by the same score in Nausori, then downed top provincial side Lautoka 3-1.

And as the pictures show, it was a great tour for Queensland.

GO SOCCER EDITORIAL

It was pleasing to see the Federation, referees and coaches meet together at Perry Park this week. It was undoubtedly a move towards solving the problems which have begun to haunt our game in recent weeks.

But while our soccer mentors were all together on Wednesday night, it is hoped they took the time to get to know each other a bit better.

Communication between coaches at all levels of Queensland soccer is at an all-time low. And that is why we have situations like the events which prompted the QSF management committee to "invite" Lions coach Gordon Arrowsmith to appear at Perry Park on Tuesday night.

Go Soccer is neither criticising nor condoning what Arrowsmith said or how he said it. The point is, if Arrowsmith and state coach Bruce Stowell had communicated more before, during and after the Fiji tour, the problem would never have arisen.

But there seems to be an everdeveloping pecking order and clique among Queensland's soccer coaches and that spells for disaster.

Eighty percent of Queensland's best players are in the two NSL clubs, yet the coaches of those two sides are ridiculed and criticised openly and behind their backs.

Yet in the past 18 months, the pair have achieved as much if not more than any other previous NSL coaches in this state. So are the others jealous that they are not involved?

ACROSS MY DESK . . .

Over the past weeks I have attempted to comment in this column on matters directly and indirectly associated with the administrative aspects of Qld. soccer.

As a paid servant of the Federation, it is not my role to pass opinions on the workings of the organisation.

But this week, Go Soccer Editor Geoff Stead has asked for my views on an aspect he believes should be aired in the interest of developing Queensland soccer, something as QSF Secretary is very much my concern.

The matter arose after Geoff Stead and myself watched the exciting clash between Grange Thistle and Lions at Lanham Park last weekend. After the game, Geoff remarked; "Don't you think it is a tragedy that exciting games like this are not gaining their deserved coverage because the Premier League is always overshadowed by the NSL."

I have to admit, I agreed with his assessment, which prompted him to ask me: "Well, what should Queensland soccer do?"

Although the answer is complex, I firmly believe our Premier League has to establish an indentity for itself. The competition is too good to be playing its present secondary role.

Jack Craig, when Sporting Editor of the Courier Mail, summed it up when he stated, "I recognise your national and Premier Leagues are excellent competitions but I cannot give you twice the space because of that fact — rather it will be necessary for both competitions to share what space is avaliable"


Therein lies the problem — not only do we compete against the other codes, we also find ourselves at top level competing against each other!

Is it therefore worth considering a season of 'Summer Soccer' for the Premier League to give it the opportunity to establish itself as a competition worthy of support from within and outside the code?

Some will argue that the National League is of no benefit to Queensland soccer and without that competition, the Premier League would soon establish itself but after some 8 years the National League appears to be here to stay therefore other alternatives have to be looked at in the interests of our Premier League.

Perhaps we can learn from others and in this respect the basketball organisation ensures that all local basketball competitions finish prior to the national basketball league season commences.

I would be interested to receive input from players, coaches, club officials and the media on these thoughts, which I stress again, are of a personal nature and not QSF policy.

NOT JUST BLACK AND WHITE

THE REFEREES' POINT OF VIEW . . .

By the time this article is printed the first meeting between the referees, coaches and the QSF will have taken place so its fair to express in print some of the problems we as referees see in the game.

I must say that we don't believe we are and wide to improve the overall standard blameless in the current situation, but have been the first to react to what appears to be a worsening of factors of the game. Let me list some of the prob-lems that must be faced by those responsible for running soccer.

13th June. 1985

• Increasingly rough play, sometimes viscious and violent, in all levels of the game. This problem is being condoned by clubs and ignored by referees.

Increasing use of foul language both on and off the pitch. It's all very well to send players off for swearing when most of the bad language is coming from the spectators or the bench.

Lack of respect and protection for match officials. I know referees like anybody must earn respect but that is very difficult when Club loyalties play an overriding part of any opinions formed.

(This problem is highlighted by the increase of dissent and "dumb insolence" on the part of players and coaches. Why should a referee be insulted just because he made a decision that did not favour your side? Many players snipe away at referees during a game, making remarks denegrating the official but not falling into the category of dissent. This is designed to erode the referees confidence and make it easier to manipulate him).

Too many clubs. This means too many matches to be controlled each weekend, talented players are spread too far of the game, and too big a variance between the standards of teams in the same divisions.

Many will say the answer to these problems, or most of them, lies with the referees. They already have the power to caution or send off players who break the laws. This seems a satisfactory way of saying "we are not responsible it's up to vou."

If referees were to apply the letter of the laws in each game and hand out red and yellow cards as the laws suggest, it is highly probable that many games would never finish. Consider who would rate the major criticism from the clubs, media and players for "spoiling the game" ... you guessed it — the REFEREE.

We are not talking about punishing those guilty on the field that is only part of the problem. We are talking about an attitude of mind in which all sections of the game recognise the problems and accept the responsibility for doing their part to rectify them.

When sections of the game forget about just winning or losing; when clubs put aside their own club loyalties for the good of the game and talented players are able to demonstrate the skills of soccer, then we may be getting somewhere.

(Once again I should stress these are my own personal views and not the official view of the ASRF.)

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

SPURS COACH CALLS FOR MORE SOCCEROO SUPPORT

Visiting Tottenham Hotspurs coach Peter Shreeves has called on the Australian public to get behind the Socceroos in their bid to reach the world cup finlas in Mexico next year.

Shreeves was full of praise for the Australian team after its tournament win in Melbourne last Sunday, beating crack Brazilian side Vasco da Gama 2-1 in the final.

"Australia got to the final and won it on merit. I thought Vasco would be too good but the Australians have made me eat my words. The Australian public and media should now get behind the team because its a good side," Shreeves said. It was Australia's first major tournament win, apart from the success in the Merlion Cup, although the opposition in those tournaments was nowhere near the class of Spurs, Vasco and Italian side Udinese.

Australia picked up \$100,000 for the win, although the players received just \$1,000 each with the rest going "into a pool for later."

One of the stars of the Spurs team, Argentine World Cup star Ossie Ardiles, guested for Sydney Club St. George last Monday, and it took the tiny midfielder only three minutes to display his English First Division form.

Ardiles was pulled down on the edge

of the Marconi penalty area after a 35m run and then smashed his freekick against the crossbar.

And although St. George lost the tie 1-0 to fall deeper into the basement of the northern division, coach Frank Arok was not an unhappy man.

"Ardiles was a real professional and did everything that was required. We just didn't put the ball into the net," Arok said.

It was an unhappy day though for Brisbane City coach Jim Hermiston in Melbourne last Monday, with the scores level at 0-0 at half time, Sunshine George Cross exploded in the second half to score three goals in 11 minutes.

George Cross striker Carl Gilder was the best player on the park, consistently winning headers and laying the ball off expertly. In an evenly contested first half there was no support for Gilder particularly as his co-striker Ossie Latif was held by the close marking Ray Junna. In the second half Latif managed to break clear and score two fine goals.
