


Queensland will be defending a nine-game undefeated record when it takes the park against the Fiji national team in the opening game as a three-match Test series in Lautoka on Monday.

The Maroons, under the guidance of State coach Bruce Stowell, have not lost since, ironically, they were beaten on the opening match of a tour of Fiji in 1985. They went down 2-1 in a hard-fought game.

But to the Maroons credit, they bounced back to win the second match of the tour 2-1, against the Fiji national team, then beat strong provincial side Lautoka in the final game of the series, 3-1. Former Brisbane City NSL player and now Bardon player-coach, Garry Bromfield scored all Queensland's goals that day.

Since that 1985 Fijian tour, Queensland has played five further international matches and two interstate games against New South Wales. In 1987 at Perry Park, Queensland beat Fiji 3-1 in their first encounter with the second match being abandoned at 1-1 in the second half.

In the South Pacific championships in Auckland last year, Queensland had a win and two draws against Tahiti, New Caledonia and Auckland. In the interstate matches, Queensland beat NSW 1-0 in 1986 and drew last year 1-1. In the nine undefeated matches since the last loss, Queensland has scored 16 goals and conceded only six in five wins and four draws.

THE 15 FIJI TOURISTS . . .

Here are pen pictures of the 15 players who will wear the Maroon on Queensland's eight-day tour of Fiji which starts on Sunday.

WAYNE EVANS: Age 28. Club: Brisbane City. Position: Goalkeeper. A regular Queensland squad member for the past three years. Played National League with Brisbane Lions before transferring to City two years ago. Began his career in Sydney with Blacktown United. Toured with Queensland to Fiji in 1986 and played in the second match, which the Maroons won.

NOEL GREENHALGH: Age 25. Club: Brisbane City. Position: Defender. Came to Queensland from Irish First Division club Shelbourne and previously played with Shamrock Rovers and Drogeda United. A strong player who is extremely powerful in the air. The Brisbane City captain.

Queensland will play three games while on tour, all against the Fiji national team. The opening match is in Lautoka (5 p.m. kickoff 3 pm. Brisbane time), on Monday, May 2. The other matches are on Thursday, May 5 in Suva (7 p.m. kick-off 5 pm. Brisbane time) and on Saturday, May 7 in Nadi (3 p.m. kick-off 1 p.m. Brisbane time). The team leaves this Sunday on Flight QF 715 at 7.15 a.m. (team assembly at 5.45 a.m. at international airport) and returns on Sunday, May 8, on flight QF 574, arriving in Brisbane at 8.40 p.m.

THE CURSE AND GET A RECORD

Lutwyche United beat the curse of publicity, and Beenleigh to notch their 41st consecutive league match without defeat last weekend.

The Greg Vitulano-coached Division Three side was featured in an article in The Courier-Mail on the day before the match, putting the fear of an upset into the superstitious among the club's supporters.

But the Lutwyche team made sure they didn't fall at the vital hurdle and scored a comfortable 3-1 win. Lutwyche has now equalled the QSF record set by the Brisbane Lions SEQL team which went 41 league games without defeat from the end of 1979 to the end of 1981.

Lutwyche are now chasing the 49-game unbeaten run by Hellenic. They were undefeated in the league from July 1959 to June 1962 — although that period covered the transition from the Brisbane and Ipswich Football Association to the QSF.

While Vitulano said the club was proud of its record, he stressed the team was not obsessed by it. "We take things one game at a time and the record really is more of a bonus for our sponsors, Novak-Tonkin Real Estate," he said.

EDITORIAL

Queensland coach Bruce Stowell has come in for some heavy criticism of late — and most of it unwarranted.

Those that have fired bullets in Stowell's direction would do well to examine Queensland's record in recent times.

The State team has not lost since it was beaten 2-1 on the opening game of the 1985 Fijian tour. The Maroons have played five wins and four draws since. Stowell this month guided the Queensland youth team to an unlucky fourth place in the national titles and last year it was Stowell who masterminded the Australian Under 16 team's win over Brazil. All are achievements which show Stowell is doing his job, and doing it well.

To call Stowell "A Puppet" of the QSF defies understanding. The QSF has never attempted to influence Stowell's selections, nor would he tolerate interference.

To criticise the indoor team shows an ignorance of the full picture. The Super 6 tournament is privately-promoted with the promoters attempting to sell a new concept to Australia. They need name players. Considering the calibre of the overseas teams, it was not the time to experiment.

Also, the involvement of FIFUSA players is still subject to a federal court judge's decision which has been reserved. The Super 6 has FIFA approval. That, and the tournament, could have been placed in jeopardy to involve FIFUSA players.

Although he gave reasons, Stowell may have erred in not giving Jason Kearton the choice of playing in the Super 6. But coaching is about making such decisions. As Stowell's record shows, his decisions in the past have tended to be the right ones. The critics should remember that.

ACROSS MY DESK

Queensland's tour of Fiji starting this Sunday is the next step in a carefully-planned representative calendar that has been aimed to maximise the Maroons' chances of success in the annual interstate clash with NSW.

The season has been structured so that the pre-season led into the first intercity games, which have now led into the tour. The benefits of the tour will run onto the next intercity matches and then finally the interstate game.

The annual clash with the Blues is growing in stature each season and a measure of its standing was reflected in the recent comment of Sydney Croatia and former Socceroo.

Robbie Slater, who said: "My only aim at the moment is to get into the NSW side to play Queensland".

The QSF considers it very important to organise representative and tour matches as incentives for those players who chose to play in the XXXX League rather than higher or other competitions.

This tour is a chance for State coach Bruce Stowell to fully assess players before selecting his squad for the interstate match.

FACE FACE

WITH SOCCEROO AND MARCONI STRIKER FRANK FARINA

GO SOCCER: Having started your career in Cairns, did you ever think you would be playing in an Olympics and how does it feel to know you will be marching in the opening ceremony in Seoul?

FRANK FARINA: When I was in Cairns I never really thought about playing in the Olympic games, I never really thought about playing for Australia. I am really proud at the moment and it's just starting to hit home that we've qualified. I am really looking forward to it.

GS: Having played under a number of coaches during your career, who do you rate as the best and why?

FF: I would really like to say that there has not been any one who has stood out because I think I have learned something from every coach that I have had. I suppose the biggest influences on my career would have to be Jimmy Shoulder and Ron Smith who first took me to the Institute of Sport, Eddie Thomson at Sydney City and Frank Arok who I have learned quite a bit off as well.

GS: Your goal against New Zealand in the Olympic qualifying matches was highly acclaimed. What do you rate as your best goal and what has been the highlight of your career so far?

FF: I would say my best goal now would be that goal against New Zealand, because I think it virtually clinched us a spot in Seoul. It was also quite a spectacular goal, so I think it would have to be my best one. The highlight of my career would have to be qualifying for the Olympic games. When we were playing in the (qualifying) tournament, it never really hit home that we were playing to go to the Olympic games. But now, we sit back and think what we have done, it would definitely be the highlight.

GS: As an Australian-based player, how do you feel about overseas-based players returning to take Socceroo shirts for the big games?

FF: I think it's good for the team if the players can fit in. It's a lot harder for them, coming back because they have to adjust to our style. They have to adjust to our team which has been playing together for virtually the whole year around. I don't mind, as long as they can fit into the squad. I think it is a good thing.

GS: Your rise to the top so far has been meteoric. What targets remain for Frank Farina and what advice would you give to any youngster wishing to emulate you?

FF: For me, on the horizon is obviously looking at full professionalism. If I can get overseas I will go. Mainly the security factor of the rest of my life. I have given something like 10 years to football and I would like to get something out of it. The advice I would give youngsters is to enjoy themselves while they are young and not take the game too seriously at junior level. They should try and work on their attitude as they get older and push themselves. They shouldn't rely on other people to push them as they start to break into senior football.

KIERAN COOPER: Age: 25. Club: Brisbane City. Position: Striker. Was the Queensland XXXX League leading scorer last season with 19 league goals and a further four in the finals play-off series. Is the current leading scorer again. Came to City from Irish First Division club Bray Wanderers two years ago and was a member of the Queensland team which played Fiji at Perry Park last season.

IBRO CAHUT: Age: 21. Club: Brisbane City. Position: Defender-midfielder. Former Tasmanian youth player who came to Queensland three years ago to play National League with City. Versatile player making his State squad debut

ANDREW CHAPMAN: Age: 23. Club: Brisbane City. Position: Midfielder. A Queensland youth team player who won selection in the Australian squad for the 1983 world youth championships in Mexico and was forced out with a broken leg. Played in the City National League team. A qualified doctor.

DAVE GALLAGHER: Age: 25. Club: North Star. Position: Goalkeeper. Toured New Zealand with the Queensland team last year and got his chance when regular No. 1 Rob Farrow broke his leg. Held his position for Queensland's annual interstate match with NSW last July. Previously played with Mitchelton and in the Queensland State League with Grange Thistle.

GERRY LINDSAY: Age: 32. Club: North Star. Position: Midfielder. A tough hard-working player who has forced his way back into the State squad after a four-year absence. A former Lions National League player who also played in the Southside Eagles and Ipswich United Queensland State League teams. Formerly from Ireland.

GORDON BUCHANAN: Age: 25. Club: North Star. Position: Defender. A gifted left-foot player who has played three times for the Brisbane representative team. Was a member of the 18-man 1986 Queensland squad that prepared for the annual interstate clash with NSW. Came to prominence with the Grange Thistle side in the Queensland State League before transferring to North Star three years ago.

BILLY WILLIAMSON: Age: 35. Club: North Star. Position: Defender. Former Dundee and Dundee United player who came to Australia six years ago to play National League with Lions. Also has a stint with the Brisbane City NSL team before moving to Easts then North Star. A striker who has moved into the backline with great success. Has two State caps, as a striker against Victoria in 1983 and as a sweeper against NSW last year.

GARY IRELAND: Age: 21. Club: Mount Gravatt. Position: Midfielder-striker. Has returned to Australia after more than three years overseas, with much of that playing indoor soccer in the United States Played with former England player Rodney Marsh in the Tampa Bay Rowdies team and was a member of the British Allstars which won the US indoor championship Has played in England and recently coached in Saudi Arabia. Making Queensland debut.

BILL McDERMOTT: Age: 22. Club: Eastern Suburbs. Position: Midfielder-striker. A former State youth player making his first appearance in a senior Queensland squad. Has represented Brisbane twice at senior level. A former Wynnum player who turned down a reported \$10,000 bid by the Lions NSL team a year ago. Joined Easts only this season. The son of one of Queensland's most entertaining rugby league players of the 60's.

STEIN GRODUM: Age: 23. Club: Eastern Suburbs. Position: Defender. A towering, solid defender who is beginning to make his mark on Queensland soccer after returning to the game 12 months ago after giving the code away for several years. Was chased by Brisbane Lions to play National League this season, but opted against a move to consolidate his place at Easts. Clinched his State squad selection with a sound game in Brisbane's 3-2 intercity win over Gold Coast last month.

STEVE PERRY: Age: 33. Club: Redlands United. Position: Defender. Played for Australia 25 times from 1978 to 1981, mostly during the period when Rudi Gutendorf was the Socceroo's coach. A former Western Suburbs (Sydney) and Brisbane City National League player who has appeared for Queensland 13 times, making him the most capped player within this State squad. Toured New Zealand with Queensland last year. Has been player-coach with Redlands in the XXXX League for the past two seasons.

MARK BRUSASCO: Age: 27. Club: Coalstars. Position: Striker. A powerfully-built striker who was Queensland's most successful scorer last year finishing the six-match representative season with four goals. Played National League football with Brisbane City as a teenager and was a member of the Australian U/21 team which played in the 1979 Oceania Cup in Noumea. Won the 1981 Rothmans Best and Fairest Medal while playing in the State League with Easts. Was a Queensland Schoolboy Rugby Union player before turning his attentions to soccer. Scored 10 goals for Coalstars in the XXXX League last season.

PAUL COCKBAIN: Age: 23. Club: Southport. Position: Striker. Is the first Gold Coast-based player to win selection in a senior Queensland team. Clinched his first Maroon cap with a sensational performance for the Gold Coast representative side against Brisbane in the intercity match, which was the main selection trial for the Fiji tour. He had a hand in both Coast goals in the unlucky 2-3 loss to Brisbane. Works as an assistant greenkeeper at the multi-million dollar Sanctuary Cove Resort.

BRUCE STOWELL: Position: Coach. A former Bradford (England) player who came to Australia and played with Pan Hellenic in Sydney, winning the Rothman's Best and Fairest Medal in 1976. Coached in the National League (Western Suburbs) and the NSW State League before accepting the position of Queensland Director of Coaching in 1983. Since coming to Queensland, his State teams have played 14 games for six wins and four draws. He also has guided Queensland to a win in the 1985 National Youth championships and coached the Australian U/16 team to the quarter-finals of the world championships in China (1985) and

Bruce Stowell's quotes in the press this week more than proved he is able to defend himself in the light of rather bizzare criticisms from various quarters.

The matters concerned do not require further comment, but I believe two very valid points should be highlighted. If players are not capable of taking an extra midweek session, even at the level at which we are playing, then I would suggest they take a very serious look at their involvement in the game and whether their commitment is up to the standard required.

Mount Gravatt's Gary Ireland is fast developing into one of our game's newest personalities and his work with youngsters is making him a real favourite.

In Australian football there is too much of an emphasis on people running to the ball rather than running and playing with it. Work like that being done by Gary Ireland, and I believe others including his brother Simon and Mick Mulvey, must be encouraged, and, as can be seen in Gary's case - the kids will respond.

Already this season there have been a number of promotions that have shown Saturday night foothall is what the fans want.

North Star have done well with good crowds and last weekend at Acacia Ridge a huge crowd was building for the derby with Inala City until a freak thunderstorm washed out the programme. Irrespective of the league, if teams are playing top football and clubs are prepared to promote their game, the fans will flock to a Saturday night

Which makes me wonder, why don't the Ipswich clubs get their lights upgraded and play some Saturday night games. What else is there to do in Ipswich now that Broncos fever has reduced the local rugby league team to the Ipswich hang-gliders?


The next two matches could decide Lions' tenure in the National League and the struggling side can afford to take no less than maximum points from the two home matches.

The statewide Ampol Cup, the longest singly sponsored football knockout competition in Queensland, is the QSF's equivalent to the English FA Cup, and each round is contested as if it were a Wembley final.

The current holders of the prized Cup are Coalstars, who beat Olympic 5-3 in a thrilling final at soccer headquarters on August 23 last year. The two finalists have testing opening ties over the coming week.

Cup football has a reputation of producing giant killers and some upset results are certain before the first round draw proper is done.


