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Queensland will be hoping to improve on its last clash against Auckland when it plays in the four-team South Pacific Cup competition in New Zealand, starting on Sunday.

The Matt Carson-coached Maroons were beaten 3-1 by the crack NZ provincial side at Perry Park on September 20, 1970. The Courier-Mail the next day described the match as "the state's most disappointing display this year".

"The state's main strength was expected to generate from the midfield but the usually competent trio of Gary Wilkins, Eddie Carigan and Owen Monaghan failed badly and Monaghan was replaced by Matt Jackson at halftime. In fact, the Auckland side's poor shooting was their only downfall and cost them what should have been a commanding first half lead against an apparently nervous and slow-moving Queensland," the Courier-Mail reported.

And ironically, it was current Brisbane coach Mal Bland, who triggered the Maroons downfall. Bland came on as a substitute for the Auckland side and scored the first of their three goals in the 74th minute. Bland capitalised on an error between Queensland centre half George Whitaker and keeper Mark Walker to put the ball in an open net. New Zealand scored again a minute later through Mike Seed while John Houghton added a third. Queensland's scorer was Grange Thistle defender Barry Dann who netted with a 40-yard drive.

Despite the uncomplimentary match reports, the effort is one of only a few black marks on Queensland's record in Oceania. The state team has played nine games against opposition in the South Pacific region.

It has won five of those, lost two and drawn two. In 1954 Queensland played the New Zealand national team for a 2-2. Its biggest win was in 1968 when the Maroons trashed Papua New Guinea 5-0. The only other loss was the 1-2 defeat by Fiji in Suva in 1985, a result Bruce Stowell Maroons reversed in the second test two days later. That defeat more than two years ago was Queensland's last loss. The Maroons are starting to amass an impressive list of results and the team has a creditable record against allcomers over the past 10 years. Over the decade, Queensland has played 17 matches for seven wins, four draws and six losses.

Next week in Auckland, Queensland will play Tahiti on Sunday (7 p.m.), New Caledonia on Tuesday night (7.30 p.m.) and Auckland on Thursday night (7.30 p.m.). QSF President Ald. Ian Brusasco, who will lead the tour, will be hoping to finalise details that will see the South Pacific Cup tournament played in Brisbane next year.

PREMIERS TO BE OUR ONLY NSL HOPES!

Only the team which wins this year's XXXX League premiership will be given the opportunity to contest the NSL promotion play-offs at the end of the year.

The play-offs place will not be offered to other teams down the table if the premiers decline. The startling clarification was made at last weekend's state secretaries meeting where the QSF's Alan Vessey played a prominent part. Vessey has pushed for some months for all details relating to the end of season play-off to be discussed and finalised.

ASF executive director Brian Emery produced all minutes and resolutions relating to the play-off series and the strict rules on promotion eligibility were discovered. Many, including leading club officials in Queensland, considered that all three states would be represented by a side in the play-offs — be it the premiers or the next highest-placed team wishing to enter the NSL. But the ASF resolution is quite clear that only the side finishing top of the respective state competitions in Queensland, Victoria and South Australia, will be able to contest the play-off series. That could mean, in the extreme case, automatic promotion for a side if the premiers from the other two states opt against an NSL campaign.

The various alternatives possible has now made it difficult for administrators to finalise plans for the play-off series. But the secretaries meeting accepted in principal a proposal submitted by Queensland. Under the proposal the play-off series will be at one venue and rotated yearly. The first venue will be decided by a draw.

All receipts from the tournament will be pooled, and after teams deduct allowable expenses, the profits, or losses, will be shared between the ASF and the participating states. The tournament is scheduled to start on Wednesday, October 21, with matches on the following Friday and Sunday.

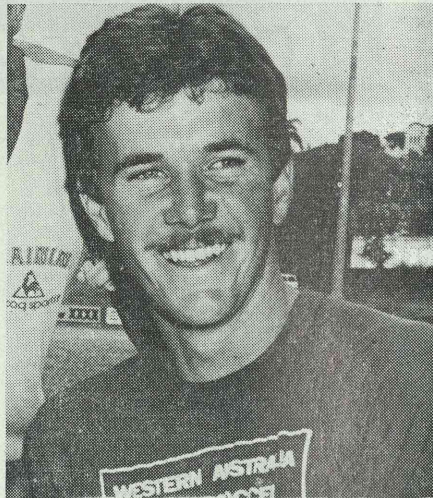

RIGBY WILL BE 1987 TOUR STAR

Australia Under 16 squad shadow player Guy Rigby will take his Thiess soccer scholarship tour to West Germany this year when the annual Lufthansa Youth Soccer tour returns to the Hennef Sportschule.

Rigby won the scholarship and trip last year. And another Queensland youngster could join him as this season's Thiess youth scholarship winner. The scholarship winner will be selected after this season's state championships. To be in the running young players must complete the application forms which are available from club secretaries. Those who nominate will be judged on their overall soccer abilities and achievements through the season and at the state titles.

But anyone wanting to ensure they don't miss the tour can book a place now. Already nearly a dozen bookings have been made. The 25-day trip will include 10 days of training, under a West German FA coach, at the well-appointed Hennef Sportschule near Bonn. The Sportschule boasts a number of outdoor fields and the magnificent indoor stadium. There are also indoor and outdoor pools, a gymnasium and a bowling alley. After Hennef, there will be a homestay with German families and several matches against local German sides. Several days of sightseeing also will be included.

IT'S THOMMO TALKING

While winning the South Pacific Cup in Auckland next week is obviously desirable, I think the most important aspect of the trip is what happens when the Queensland team comes back.

People have short memories, and win or lose, the New Zealand tour will be largely forgotten by the end of the month unless there is reason not to. If the team wins then it is vital the players and the stars of the tour are promoted to the maximum. Hopefully there will be some kind of cup that we can bring back with us which could be featured prominently in splash media coverage of the Maroons return.

Then the team should be promoted as the Oceania champions. And the logical thing then is to challenge off us. We still don't know if the NSW game is on yet. But it's vital that we have that fixture up lunge the other states to take that our sleeves. In case we lose in Auckland.

Unless there is another representative game within a month or so for the Maroons to quickly redeem themselves, this season's representative programme will be seen to have been a failure if we don't go well in New Zealand. And that's despite the Fiji win as people have already forgotten that.

With the Rugby Union and Australian Rules state teams going poorly at the moment, with the right promotion this could be an opportunity for soccer to cover itself with glory — or at the very least seen to be heading in the right direction.

Coalstars were kidding themselves thinking they could get a deferment because they had two players on state duty.

Losing players for a representative game is part of the whole League scene and tests the depth of a club. It also gives an opportunity for another player to press his claim. But one game is where you draw the line.

The Queensland team plays it think the QSF has a duty to ensure, last game next Thursday and I one way or another, that every player is back in time, and ready mentally and physically, to fill his commitment to his club on the following weekend.

If there are factors beyond the federation's control, like flight schedules, then the QSF should change things under their control and postpone fixtures. Clubs do their part by developing and supplying players to the state side. But those clubs who are doing the right thing should not be overly penalised. One game yes, two — no way, because that can cost championships.

Sometimes I think we waste our energies in soccer — like trying to put giant soccer balls on the top of Perry Park.

I think Ronnie has hit his head on his tennis court too many times. Or maybe we could put him inside the ball!

But the biggest waste of energy this week had to be the referees emergency meeting to stamp out swearing in the game. All coaches and officials were summoned to appear at Perry Park to stamp out this blight on our code. And what's more, they wanted everyone there on a Tuesday night. The time when 90 percent of clubs are doing constructive things, like training.

I think the referees should ask themselves, why do players swear? Are they just uncouth people? Mostly I think it is a sign of frustration. I don't want to be seen criticising referees, because I think it is a positive step to get things out in the open.

But if we are going to have meetings, let's make them at a time when everyone can get there, and let's talk about more important things than swearing. I'd like to see the new time-wasting rules clarified for one thing.

I have said it before and I'll say it again, match of the day double-headers at Perry Park must be introduced on a Sunday.

I know there were big crowds at a lot of grounds last weekend, but how many would we have got if the Brisbane City-Lions game preceded by the second division clash between Wynnum and Croatia had been played at soccer headquarters?

Slow to settle down, the home team were dismayed to find the referee pointing to the spot after keeper Jeff Keating had made a brave save at the meet of an opposing forward. One down and still seeking the rhythm, The Gap went further behind when a back pass left the defence in disarray.

Finally the league leaders started to pick up their game, began strong moves together and started to show the spirit and determination they are capable of. First, Chris Battersby tore the defence to shreds down the right flank for Dave James to score and then a Dave Vincenzino shot was only parried by the keeper for Pail Reuss to hammer gratefully home.

Two-all and The Gap laid siege to the Capalaba goal, but the winner would not just come and in the end, The Gap players were relieved just to have got out of jail. Tony Harris, with a formidable game in the centre of the defence, Sandy Woodside showing great control and passing skills and Dave James "Mr. Perpetual Motion", were the pick of the side on the day.

The Gap Reserve side really turned on the fireworks in the second half to crush a dispirited Capalaba side by eight goals to nil. REFEREES DEFEND THEIR STANDARDS

Dear Sir,

Your editorial in the April 30th. edition suggests that there is a "groundswell of discontent" caused by a decline in the standards of refereeing. If this were to be true then it would obviously be a matter of great concern to the ASF Qld. Division. It is of course difficult for referees to measure the extent of any discontent. We become so used to the "blatant referee bashing" you mention that it is sometimes hard to recognize constructive criticism.

Unfortunately it is no easier for us to determine whether the standards of refereeing are really falling. It is hard to accept the statistical evidence that you offer. To use the number of penalties awarded or the number of players sent off as an indicator of poor refereeing is similar to blaming the police force for the rising crime rate because they are arresting too many criminals. Perhaps it is the standards of the players which is falling. Players commit fouls, referees do not.

Consistency is one of the attributes of a good referee. Given the multitude of variables involved in any game it is one of the hardest respects in which to satisfy the high standards expected. You infer that it is here that our standards are falling. The same claim has been made as long as the game has been played. It is hard to back views on either side of the argument with firm evidence.

I do believe however that the A.S.R.F. in Qld. has evidence that our referees are reaching high standards. Three of

our members were included in the list of 20 elite referees for this years NSL. In each of the past two years we have had members ranked in the top five in the NSL; and one of our men is currently among the seven F.I.F.A. listed officials in the country. Qld. referees compare favourably with any in Australia and Australian referees have proved themselves at international level.

Secondly we have a right to take pride in our coaching system for referees. We have 10 former senior officials inspecting our 69 active members each week-end; and a former international referee is in charge of our coaching and training. It gladdens my heart to see the product of their efforts in the enthusiasm and quality of referees joining the ranks of class one and senior officials. These men have worked extremely hard to achieve a measure of the consistency (which you rightly ask for) and other attributes of a good referee.

It is easy to say standards are slipping and make the all too common cry that things aren't as good as they were. I don't accept it to be true. The A.S.R.F. is proud of its referees. We know the efforts they make to improve their game. To that end we will always welcome constructive criticism. We would like it to be specific and substantiated by tangible evidence.

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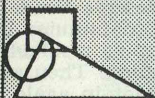
UNLUCKY DRAW FOR CROATIA

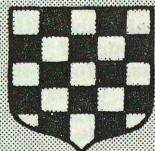

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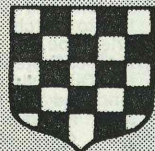
