Former Socceroo coach Les Scheinflug has warned Queensland to watch NSW's goalscoring ace, Zlatko Nasteovski in the inaugural State of Origin clash at Perry Park on Saturday evening.

Nasteovski scored 20 goals in the 26-match NSL fixture program, just three short of John Kosmina's all-time record set in 1982.

The Marconi whiz is expected to be the key player in an attacking NSW outfit and Scheinflug tips Nasteovski's finishing abilities could surprise the Maroons.

"Nasteovski is dynamite around the box, and particularly on freekicks. Queensland should be very aware of where he is, on an off the ball," Scheinflug said.

Scheinflug, a former Lions coach who has an intimate knowledge of Queensland soccer, believes the Maroons best chance of winning the Origin match is to capitalise on their unbridled enthusiasm for the match.

"This is Queensland's big game of the year, I am sure it means much more to them than for some of the NSW players," Scheinflug said. "Queensland will have enthusiasm and genuine commitment of their side, but the real danger will be if Eddie Thomson fires up the NSW team before the match.

"NSW are such a good side that if they really click, they could bang in five or six goals."

Thomson has predicted that the match will feature plenty of goals, possibly with a 3-2 or 4-3 scoreline. "I have named players who will attack all day and I think the fans are in for a real treat," he said.

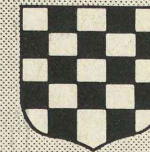

TALKING

All eyes will be on Nick Meredith in the State of Origin match this weekend—and I tip that it is exactly what he needs to snap out of his current form slump.

Meredith was a sensation in last year's Interstate game and his fierce low cross from the left powered into the net off Charlie Yankos for Queensland's winner. In that match, and many other times last season, Meredith looked as if he could be anything.

Unfortunately on many occasions this season, he has looked nothing.

But Nick obviously is a player who thrives on atmosphere and there should be plenty of that in the build-up to Saturday and on match day itself.

Sub-standard performance is often linked to preparation and Meredith can enjoy an atmosphere packed preparation for this weekend.

Wednesday was State training, there's an Origin Dinner of Thursday, back a team medical and light run on Friday and then the excitement of Match Day. It will all be unique and special.

And Nick should try to soak up as much as he can. This isn't going to Cleveland to play Redlands or Lanham Park to play Thistle. This is Queensland putting itself up against the best New South Wales, and in many regards Australia, can offer.

The best advice I can offer Nick Meredith is to soak up the atmosphere and then go out there on Match Day and do what he knows he can do and all of Queensland hopes he will produce.

The only disappointing aspect of the Origin Match is its timing.

Through unavoidable circumstances, it has just been tacked onto the end of the season.

The QSF has done well to get the game off the ground, but we should now be looking to cement it into a date which suits everyone next year and compliments the entire season program — both of the NSL and State Federations.

With the NSL going summer, ANZAC Day looms as the ideal time.

The NSL season will not be long over, which will ensure players like Alan Hunter, Steve Jackson and Danny Wright are still fit, while our local competition will have been going long enough for the Intercity series to be staged as the final selection trials.

The ASF said it would set aside a date for Interstate games. The QSF should now demand that April 25 be it — and nothing else be scheduled in opposition. The other aspect of this weekend is that I am sure it

will be the making, or breaking of the Brisbane United concept. If we are seen to be competitive, I am sure support for the idea will be unlimited.

On paper, Queensland doesn't have a chance, but Perry Park is a great leveller and the maroon shirt a great inspiration.

Those players Bruce Stowell has given the chance to be involved in the first State of Origin game should be honoured. They are the representative of Queensland soccer and in their hands, they carry our future.

If State of Origin doesn't work, then it could be a long time before the maroon shirts are trotted out again.

I gave Lordie a bit of a serve in this column a few weeks ago and he came out in the Cup Final last weekend to show he is anything but a weak link in the North Star team.

But perhaps bigger things are in store for the giant No. 1.

I can recall bagging former Lions keeper Jason Kearton in this column and look where he has ended.

If big Noel continues to be motivated by critics like myself and maintains his recent rate of improvement, I am sure the rewards will come his way.

Les Scheinflug proved himself to be a wise and perceptive coach in his assessment of Russell Stewart last weekend.

Scheinflug still rates the midfielder highly and said Stewart only needed the right coaching to be developed into one of Australia's best players. I have never doubted that and would relish Russell in my team.

Watching the State of Origin from the terraces this weekend could be the best thing to happen to Russell since he was dropped from the Queensland starting line-up in 1986 when Bryan Robson played.

Russell came on for the final 15 minutes and played superbly.

Players of Russell's class don't lose their ability, they only lack direction, instruction and motivation.

Russell has always thrived when the chips are down. It's up to him now to prove people like Scheinflug and myself right, or to be content to waste such gifted talents.
