

# National PSL Roundup

### Marconi Move On

MELBOURNE - Marconi took another firm step towards the 1979 Philips League Soccer title by beating South Melbourne 2-1 at Middle Park.

The loss sent South Melbourne crashing to last place on the ladder but at no stage during the game did South look a struggling team.

Mendo Ristovski, transferred from Footscray for 12 thousand dollars during the week, had a pleasing debut with South Melbourne, scoring the goal that equalised Tony Henderson's opening score for Marconi.

Ristovski's goal came in the 57th minute, and for the next 13 minutes South Melbourne looked capable of at least drawing, if not winning the match.

However there was no stopping Marconi's brilliant Socceroo Forward Eddie Krncevic, who gave Marconi the two points with a memorable back headed goal 20 minutes from the end.

South Melbourne, which has spent heavily to improve its teams, must have been hoping that it had spent some of the cash on Krncevic, who was playing in the Victorian State League before joining Marconi last summer.

This was not one of Marconi's better performances. Melbourne fans have come to expect more from the mighty Sydney team which has beaten Heidelberg 8-1 and Footscray 5-0 here in past matches.

Krncevic, Tony Henderson, Ivo Prskalo and John Russell put on sound performances but the others could have done better.

One of the best players of the match was South Melbourne's Bertie Lutton, who worked tirelessly in mid-field.

Young centre-back Kiri Kvriakouleas played with great poise and authority at centre-back.

Left-back Tony Turner, and central

striker Alun Evans also worked contruct-

Marconi easily could have gone into the lead as the result of a fine run by Krncevic in the 20th minute.

Goal-keeper Peter Laumets blocked Krncevic's shot at the post and as the ball ran free, Mark Jankovics tried to back heel it into the net.

Peter Sharne raced to the ball to help it over the line but South's full-back Mike Pye got there first to prevent the goal.

South Melbourne appealed for a penalty when a shot by Ristovski appeared to hit Russell on the arm, but Tasmanian Referee Jack Johnston turned down the appeal.

A few moments later, Lutton dashed away on a promising run but was stopped by a blatant foul from Ken Lindsay, who was shown the vellow card.

A run down the right by full-back Mike Berry led to Marconi's opening goal in the 33rd minute.

Berry's cross was headed by Jankovics to the unmarked Henderson, who put the ball into the net at the far post.

Just before half-time, Evans ran into the goal area after a cross from George Campbell but Russell intercepted and headed clear to avert danger.

Marconi's majestic sweeper Prskalo made a rare mistake when he ran forward trying to leave Evans off side.

The foil failed and Evans dashed away towards goal. However Prskalo showed great speed to catch Evans and dispossess him with a sliding tackle inside the pen-

South Melbourne's equaliser came in the 57th minute when Evans brought down a cross from Sammy Wright and, Ristovski lashed the ball into the net.

Three minutes later Evans laid the ball

back for a shot by Wright but goalkeeper Allan Maher pushed the ball over the bar for a good save.

Marconi's flying winger Sharne, who played despite an ankle injury, failed to last the match and was replaced by Bertie Mariani in the 63rd minute.

Krnsevic's winning goal was scored 20 minutes from the end, and what a goal it was. Prskalo took a free kick from 40 metres, Krncevic jumped towards the ball and back headed it into the net.

### Two for Reed

SYDNEY - Throwing caution to the wind, Apia kept in touch with the top four by defeating Canberra City 3-0 at Wentworth Park.

But the loss of the bonus point, which an extra goal would have brought, leaves them struggling in their bid to rise to fourth position with six matches remain-

Their busy striker, Ken Reed, collected goals in the 4th and 46th minutes, the first following a blunder by Canberra defender, Keni Kaweleva, and the second a result of an excellent header.

Right-back Bob McGinn netted the third in the 97th minute, after Canberra stopper John Brown diverted the ball just far enough to evade goalkeeper Steve Hoszowski on the dive.

Reed's opening goal resulted from an easy placement after Kawaleva let the ball run free just outside his own goal area.

McGinn made a brilliant right wing run after halftime, squaring the ball cleanly for Reed to head it home.

Canberra's chance to come into the game arrived in the 23rd minute.

Isaac Farrell steered the ball through from midfield and striker Terry Byrne moved into the open.

Apia goalkeeper Greg Woodhouse was fully committed but Byrne shot wide.

After slugging out a draw with Marconi on Wednesday night too few Canberra players showed the fitness required to cope with Apia's four man attack.

Striker Don McLaren got through a power of work in the first half but after running 50/50 with Apia's Socceroo defender Peter Wilson, dropped out of the picture later.

Apia were workmanlike but the display by left back Mark Pullen demonstrated an ability that could bring him into contention for a future National squad

### Sensation in Third Minute

SYDNEY — Two goals in three minutes late in the game enabled Adelaide City to snatch a 2-1 victory over Sydney Olympic at Pratten Park.

The game opened sensationally when John Perin brought down Graham Jennings in the third minute just inside the penalty area.

Richie Bell crashed home the penalty kick. Full of confidence as a result of this early lead. Olympic threw the ball around in cavalier fashion for the next 15 minutes and stretched the Adelaide City defence to the limits.

With Derek Laing and Peter Raskopolous supplying the inspiration from Midfield, Olympic threatened to take charge of the game but were unable to finish off many promising moves.

Adelaide City began to regain their composure and came back into the game with their own brand of flowing football, but they lacked penetration.

The closest they came to scoring before the interval was in the 32nd minute but Ken Wilson scooped the ball away from the foot of John Nyskohus only metres from the goal-line.

Olympic's central defenders Bell and Wilson kept City at long range and their shots from this distance were capably handled by Olympic's young goalkeeper Peter Wilson.

After half-time City played more down the middle of the pitch but a lot of the menace in their forward line disappeared when centre-forward Dixie Deans was replaced through injury in the 55th min-

Depite their cool, precise build up, City found difficulty in forcing their way through the crowded penalty area as the Olympic back-line continued to defend stubbornly.

With 15 minutes remaining Bob Marwe completely missed the ball less than a

metre from the line, when only a touch was needed to provide the equaliser.

Five minutes later the pressure on the Olympic defence finally paid dividends for City.

A well flighted free kick from Chris Kent was converted by John Nyskohus with a flying header.

Three minutes later City hit the front as Marwe atoned for his earlier miss by slamming the ball home from close range during a goal-mouth scramble.

Olympic lost Bell with a bad eye injury immediately after and City muffed two easy chances to increase their tally before the final whistle.

### Top Four Hopes Jolted

ADELAIDE — West Adelaide's Philips League top four hopes were severely jolted by a 2-0 defeat at the hands of Sydney City at Hindmarsh Stadium.

An own goal in the 16th minute and another in the 81st minute did the damage for Sydney City.

West Adelaide played far better than the score indicates and dominated the match for long periods but failed to translate it into goals.

As early as the tenth minute John Kosmina had the Sydney defence in trouble with a fine cross, but Ian McGregor mistimed his header.

And four minutes later Kosmina again took Sydney apart, but shot into the side netting from eight metres.

Sydney took the lead in the 16th minute when Ian Bruce drove in a goal-mouth cross and with the ball heading for safety Peter Tymczszyn accidentally turned it into his own net.

West took time to regain its composure but once it did Sydney was again on the defensive.

Both sides had ample opportunity in the second half with West Adelaide in particular messing up two golden opportunities.

defence but belted the ball into the side netting.

Sydney clinched the victory in the 81st minute after another awful defensive blunder.

John Stevenson robbed David Jones of the ball 30metres out from goal and Stevenson surged forward, drew out Martyn Crook and lobbed the ball over his head.

### **Hat-Trick Roy**

MELBOURNE — A hat-trick by Roy Cotton helped St. George to come from behind to defeat Footscray 3-1 at Olympic Park, Melbourne.

Footscray hit the front three minutes before half-time with a fine goal scored by Zdravko Lujic.

But St. George equalised within the minute and took the lead early in the second half.

Roy Cotton was Saint's hero, scoring all three goals and helping lift his club from bottom place on the League table.

Cotton's first goal came as he worked his way through a crowded penalty area to slash home a square pass from Nick Feoughty.

Then, with Footscray caught square, Cotton breasted down a throw in before beating goalkeeper Steve Potter with a near post drive seven minutes after the interval.



# ANOTHER SUPERMAC?

LONDON — While the Supermac Era is drawing to a close, another "Mac" is about to launch his career.

Steve Mackenzie, the 17-year-o'd former Crystal Palace reserve team player, has been signed by Manchester City for \$500,000. Criticism of City's Malcolm Allison, who engineered the transfer, have ranged from 'outrageous' to a case of 'midsummer madness'. But the young mid fielder has taken it in his stride and is keen to prove his critics wrong.

"I am extra determined to do well at Maine Road, just to prove to everyone who doubted City's wisdom in paying that much money for me," he said.

"After four years at Palace I needed a chance and I think it will do me good.

"If you are going to make your mark in football you have to do it with the English First Division. I feel that I am coming into the start of something new at City. New players are at the club and there is a marvellous spirit.

"The size of the fee does not bother me. I just want to keep learning about the game and get as much out of life member of Palace's winning FA Cup as I do out of football," said Mackenzie.

The tough mid-fielder, who was a member of Palace's winning F.A. Cup Youth side last year, was on the verge of cracking into the big time until last month when manager Terry Venables paid a record club fee of \$930,000 for former England skipper and mid-fielder, Gerry Francis. England Youth manager, John Cartwright, has no doubts that Mackenzie has the talent to develop into one of the game's stars.

"Steve has bags of talent. I watched him develop for four years at Crystal Palace when I was Youth coach." he said.

"He is a brave and intelligent player who is extremely receptive to ideas. There are no doubts about his character when the going gets tough, and he never hides.

"He must keep learning about the game and as a player he must quicken up. Steve will never have any pretensions to being a sprint champion, but he must work on his speed." Cartwright said Mackenzie's maturity far exceeded his tender years.

"You just have to look at the way he handled his transfer. He was quite willing to go to Belgium to play for Anderlect.

"You have to have a lot of confidence to contemplate that sort of move," he said.



### THE AMERICAN SOLUTION

The Soccer boom in the United States, initially regarded as a nine days' wonder by sceptical Europeans, has started the alarm bells clanging this year.

North American football, a tiny fledgling less than 10 years ago, has suddenly developed into a full-sized predatory bird.

At one time it was reliant on a trickle of European players to protect and sustain its appetite, but now it launches itself across the Atlantic, swooping down to pick off the top stars.

Restrictive measures to halt the growing exodus of Dutch professional players to the North American Soccer League (NASL) were introduced recently by the Royal Netherlands Football Association.

They include a total ban on players going to America for three months during the Dutch Soccer season and restricting loans to 12 months.

The ban, which will come into effect from next season, is designed to prevent

possible influence on results of Cup and League matches.

The most celebrated Dutch player now in America is the legendary Johan Cruyff, formerly with Ajax Amsterdam and Spanish club Barcelona, who came out of retirement to join Los Angeles Aztecs.

Other Dutch professionals now in the U.S. include former World Cup stars Willem Van Hanegem, Wim Rijsbergen and Johan Neeskens.

Neeskens still only 27, turned his back on Europe to join New York Cosmos, turning down a move to top English club Arsenal.

It seemed to many that Neeskens had "sold out" to the American dollar, robbing Europe of a leading player it could ill afford to lose at a time when World class players are scarce.

West German Soccer fans similarly mourned the day "Kaiser" Franz Beckenbauer deserted his empire for the dollars of the United States.



His abdication two years ago hastened the decline of Bayern Munich and the West German national side, two teams he had led to the most glittering triumphs.

It also worried the nation's Soccer Administrators, who banned further moves abroad until the 1978 World Cup finals, in which West Germany badly missed Beckenbauer's poise and skill.

Gerd Mueller, like Beckenbauer, had played in the West German sides which won the 1972 European Championship and the 1974 World Cup, as well as installing Bayern Munich in a three-year reign as European club champions.

But he clashed with the club and left for the United States.

Apart from Beckenbauer and Mueller, West Germany has not lost any other top players, but their Soccer authorities have been worried, like the Dutch, about the loan system.

The National Football Federation (DFB) executive ruled last April that a player who signs for a foreign club cannot return to West German football until July 1 the following year.

DFB press chief Wilfried Gerhardt said the step was taken to eliminate the difficulties and disadvantages short-term transfers caused Bundesliga clubs.

It primarily affected moves to the United States or Canada, where West German players could collect rich pickings from close season "guest appearances" before returning home he said.

"The American Season runs from March to September and that impinges on both ends of our season," Gerhardt said.

"That has serious consequences for our clubs and we wanted to stop the adverse effects."

West German clubs were perturbed at the prospect of wealthy American clubs having first claim on their players, even if, for the time being at least it was merely an overlap of a week or two.

The added complication of European Football Union (UEFA) rules prompted European Footballer of the Year, Kevin Keegan to drop plans for a three-month stint with the Washington Diplomats this summer. It would have made England international Keegan ineligible for Hamburg's opening games in next seasons European Cup. The fear in England is that the Americans will not stop at loaning players, but will want to buy them permanently.

At first it was second and third division players who drifted across the Atlantic, but a shudder ran through the First Division when Manchester City's star winger Dennis Tueart packed his bags to join New York Cosmos. Clubs already facing financial problems have been held to ransom by players who have threatened to ask for transfers if they are not allowed to play in America during the close

As yet opinion is still divided. Many experts believe that American Soccer will seriously impinge on the British scene, robbing it of both players and managers.

Others argue that despite the current upsurge in popularity, American Soccer will eventually dwindle and die. The next 10 years should provide the answer.

### Ipswich Points to Ponder

LIONS and Ipswich United appear to have a reasonable sister club relationship on the administration level.

On the playing field the "family" situation obviously does not exist. In the SEOL two weeks ago Lions were comfortably placed at the top of the ladder losing only one game to Brisbane City.

Now they are equal leaders with Coalstars after losing to Bundamba, 3-2 to Coalstars and 4-1 at Ebbw Vale to St. Helens in the last two games. These two teams are the major partners in Ipswich United.

This points to a great local derby next week at Bundamba with Coalstars a chance for the title and St. Helens a chance of making the final four if they beat Coalstars, and our tip is they will, which may make the Ipswich United relationship a little unfriendly in the next few weeks.




