to play for Australia and those aims are boosted by recent selection in the national team training squad.

STEVE PERRY: One of Oueensland's most consistent defenders since coming to City from Wests in 1978. Plays either fullback or sweeper, and was the local PSL player of the year last season. Has made two appearances for Socceroos, against Greece last year and Wisla Krakow this scason.

BILLY WILKINSON: A natural left side player in the defence and tonight will be making his first appearance in a Queensland shirt. Has been here only a few months from Scotland but with City in the PSL is one of the most relentless tacklers in the competition.

GEORGE POTTER: Has been a key figure in the PSL since its inception, playing with distinction for both City and Lions. Plays either sweeper or fullback and this former fulltime professional in England has been a regular State team member since his arrival in 1977.

COL BENNETT: Easily the most experienced international in the Queensland ranks. Formerly of Apia in Sydney, he has played 55 times for Australia, which includes 29 full internationals. The big stopper played in the 1974 World Cap finals and is still in contention for the next campaign.

JIM HERMISTON: One of the best known players in Australia because of his outstanding professional performances with City and Lions in the PSL. Brought to Australia by Grange Thistle in 1977. Could play anywhere in defence or midfield and would have been in current national squad but for one Scottish under-23 appearance.

ALAN NIVEN: The longest serving Lions player in the PSL, being with the club since 1976. Usually plays left-back for club and Queensland but his natural attacking flair makes him an ideal midfield player also.

LARRY GAFFNEY: One of the most consistent Australian born players in the PSL. Hails from Wollongong and has been

NIGEL LOWNDS: Has been the regular with City since the League began. Has a Queensland keeper since joining Lions at high work rate and gets his chance when the start of 1978. Has expressed his desire he plays for Australia against Queensland next week. Most aggressive midfielder.

> TONY BRENNAN: Hailed in the south as one of the finds of the season and has impressed sufficiently to win selection in several national trial matches. Has tremendous speed and shooting power and looks one of our best prospects for World Cup selection. Lions centre-forward.

> BARRY KELSO: Another of Queensland's boom strikers in the PSL, and plays with City. Essentially more dangerous on the left side and his form has picked up after a slow start to the season. Has carned the declared respect of majority of PSL coaches and will also trial for Australia next week.

> RON MILLMAN: One of the new non-PSL players in the team but has played many matches for Queensland because of his outstanding speed and consistent goalscoring form. Plays for Southside Eagles and is the current leading State League striker.

> STEVE DOLAN: This attacking midfielder is skipper of State League leaders Thistle and is another automatic State team selection. Can be equally effective as a right winger and has never failed to impress in matches of this nature.

> ALAN HUGHES: Plays either in midfield or up front with Lions in the PSL and has played a number of matches for Queensland. Leading Queensland goalscorer last season and is another player now back to form after a tardy start.

> PHIL THOMPSON: This diminutive midfielder is one of the players who makes Mt. Gravatt tick in the State League. Very similar to Dolan in stature and style of play and his ability is backed up by effective shooting power.

> KIM WISHART: Product of Ipswich football and City's regular keeper in the PSL. Has turned in many brilliant performances away from home to earn praise from southern critics. Unlucky in that he has stiff national team competition and may also have to play second fiddle to Lownds tonight.

Canaries' Careers 1978-79

CLIVE BAKER: Got through to make MICK McGUIRE: Made only 11 first two First Division appearances last season after progressing from the Youth Team through the Reserves. A confident goalkeeper in this season's Willshire and Anglo-Scottish games when covering for the injured Roger Hansbury and absent Kevin Keelan. At 5'9" he makes up for his lack of height with his agility which also serves him well on the cricket pitch where he has captained the England under 19 cricket side.

KEVIN BOND: A first team discovery at fullback last season after junior experience with his former club, Bournemouth, Moved in at right-back when John Ryan went into midfield and strung together 28 First Division appearances in the second half of last season. A skilful and constructive six-foot defender who has developed a fine understanding with fast-raiding winger Jimmy Neighbour.

IAN DAVIES: Former Welsh Youth International, Davies was a club apprentice and has moved into the first team squad, getting his debut in three games for the League side in the 1976-77 season and two more last term. Has been playing in American soccer during the close season for Detroit Express and can play at left-back or on the wing.

DUNCAN FORBES: Duncan has been at the heart of the Norwich defence for ten seasons and still shows as much verve and tenactiy as any teenager. Has made 352 first team appearances, scoring 13 times. Now appointed Club Captain, he first joined City for just 10,000 pounds from Colchester.

ROGER HANSBURY: A former club apprentice, Hansbury stepped into the first team for the last four matches of the 1976-77 season and then added a further 14 to his record last term. This 22-year-old from Barnsley has made good progress since joining Carrow Road as a junior in 1973. Unfortunately he made an unlucky start to the season by injuring his hand in the pre-season games which forced him to miss early matches.

PHIL HOADLEY: This centre-half started his career with Crystal Palace and was later transferred to Orient for 30,000 pounds. In seven years with Orient he made over 300 first team appearances before signing for Norwich recently.

team appearances last season but that was better than the previous season for Mick because he was dogged by injury and missed out on the entire campaign. This skilful midfield player was born in Blackpool and joined Norwich from Coventry City for 50,000 pounds in January 1975. This former England Youth International has had a summer with Tampa Bay Rowdies and should make a bold challenge for a first team spot in the new season.

MARK NIGHTINGALE: Signed on a "free" transfer from Crystal Palace in the summer of 1977, he hails from Salisbury. Made his debut in his only game for the League side last season but is booked to cost City 2.500 pounds when he has completed ten first team games. Was originally with Manager John Bond at Bournemouth and played in the same England Youth side as Kevin Reeves.

GRAHAM PADDON: This mid-field player was in the Norwich side which won promotion to the First Division in 1971-72. Was transferred to West Ham in a deal which brought Ted MacDougall to Carrow Road. Graham came back to Norwich in November, 1976 but in the third game after his return suffered a compound fracture of his leg which forced him out of football for almost a year. Returned to League football last season and has spent the summer in the States playing for Tampa Bay Rowdies.

MARTIN PETERS: The 1978-79 season is part of a special Testimonial Year for one of England's 1966 World Cup heroes, Martin, first team skipper for Norwich and three times the Club's Player of the Year, added a further 34 games to his City appearances record last season scoring seven times. This former England midfield player (67 caps) signed from Spurs for 50,000 pounds in March, 1975. Played over 300 games for West Ham before becoming Britain's first 200,000 pound player when signed by Tottenham in March, 1970 in a deal which took Jimmy Greeves to Upton Park.

TONY POWELL: After being an ever-present in the heart of the defence last season. Tony now appears to have cemented his position in the City team after playing in various roles since joining the Canaries from Bournemouth, Born in
