DAVID COSTA: Age - 24 Club - Mount Gravatt. A sound defender. Good in the air and tackles well

PETER TOKESI: Age - 32 Club - Brisbane City. A tough defender who is very competitive but always fair.

BILLY WILKINSON: Age — 31 Club — Bris- DANNY WRIGHT: Age — 18 Club — Brisbane bane City, Back after a season off injured and Lions. Young Socceroo who is also a regular keen to do well in his favourite leftback position.

GREG MARSHALL: Age — 19 Club — Bris- FRANK PIMBLETT: Age — 25 Club — Brisbane City. A brilliant midfielder and captain of his club's National League side.

> RUSSELL STEWART: Age - 18 Club - Mt. Gravatt. Key player in Australian Youth team midfield. Very skilful and has a powerful shot.

> PHIL THOMPSON: Age - 28 Club - Eastern Suburbs. A good reader of the game and an excellent passer of the ball. Unlucky not to have played in a National League team.

> STEVEN HOGG: Age — 23 Club — Brisbane Lions. Former National player who wants to regain Socceroo honors this year. Tireless worker and a great tackler.

> STEPHEN GLOCKNER: Age - 18 Club Brisbane City. Queensland Youth Team striker considered unlucky not to be in National side.

> BILLY WILLIAMSON: Age - 30 Club - Brisbane Lions. Could transfer to City this season after an inconsistent year at Lions last season. But at his best a speedy, good finisher.

CHARLIE YANKOS: Age — 24 Club — Heidelberg. A regular in his club's National League team and a very tough defender to beat.

IAN DOBSON: Age - 26 Club - Croydon, A central defender making his debut in the Vic-

JOHN YZENDOORN: Age — 28 Club — Heidelberg. A sweeper with 13 National Cups and 13 state appearances. One of this sides best

JIM CAMPBELL: Age- 27 Club - Heidelberg.

Former National team player and long time state representative.

KEN MURPHY: Age — 27 Club South Melbourne. Gutsy midfielder who has played five times for Victoria

STEFAN MILA: Age - 32 Club - Polonia Experienced player who reads the game well and can dictate play.

CHARLIE EGAN: Age 24/Club — South Melbourne. One of the most dangerous strikers in the National League. Has represented both country and state twice.

STEVE WOODIN: Age — 28 Club — South Melbourne. New Zealand 1982 World Cup team member. Now settled at his club after a restless vear last season

DOUG BROWN: Age - 25 Club - Preston. Making his third state team appearance. One of Preston's most valued players and leading scorers.

GEORGE CAMPBELL: Age - 26 Club - Sth. Melbourne. Diminutive striker who has a good turn of speed and fine finishing ability.

PAUL LEWIS: Age - 26 Club - Green Gully. Only a relative newcomer to the Victorian state squad but will go well if he can repeat his club form. A



# Perry is a State Team "SURVIVOR"!

Four years have passed since Queensland played its last full interstate match and when the maroons take the field against Victoria today, there will only be one player in the squad who also took place in the game against New South Wales in 1978.

That player will be Brisbane City fullback Steve Perry, who played rightback for Queensland in its unlucky 2-2 draw with the Blues. The team that took the park that day was:

The team that took the park that day was: Goalkeper — Kim Wishart, Defence — Perry, Col Bennett, Jim Hermiston, Alan Niven; Midfield — Steve Amos, George Potter, Larry Gaffney (a late replacement for the injured Eddie Spearritt); Forwards — Steve Dolan, Barrie Fairbrother, Barry Kelso; Reserves — Alan Marley, John Paterson and Ron Millman.

Bennett and Niven were originally named in the Queensland squad for today's 100th match but the big Lions central defender is injured while Niven is on international duty with the

socceroos in New Zealand.

Just as today's team is playing its first match under a new coach, Bruce Stowell, Qld. were under the guidance of another new man in 1978 — the then director of coaching, Denis Ford. And it must have been a delighted Ford who watched his team go two goals up against the much favoured New South Wales team that boasted eight internationals including Todd Clarke, Murray Barnes, Peter Sharne and Phil O'Connor.

Queensland's lead came from goals by Steve Dolan in the 37th minute, after good lead up work from Fairbrother and Kelso, and a Fairbrother header off a Niven cross in the 61st

minute.

Queensland seemed to be headed for its first with over a fully representative NSW side for 21 years until two goals in four minutes midway through the second half evened the scores. Slack defence in the 63tht minute allowed Barnes to head in a Terry Butler corner, then

shortly after, the speedy Sharne broke from the halfway line and carried the ball all the way before slipping it past Wishart.

NSW finshed strongly and it was only brilliant defending by Hermiston in particular that kept the southerners from increasing the score.

While Perry has the honor of being the only player involved today that was "capped" in '78 there are several more "survivors" from Q'ld's last appearance. That match was in 1980 against touring Italian side, AC Milan. Once again Queensland drew 2-2.

The team that took the park against AC Milan was: Goalkeeper — Tony Scanlan; Defence — Steve Perry, Col Bennett, Jim Hermiston, Alan Niven; Midfield — Steve Hogg, George Potter, Gerry Lindsay, Phil Thompson; Forwards — Barry Kelso, Ron Millman; Reserves — Nigel Lownds, Billy Wilkinson, John Ogden and Wilson Maelaua. The coach was Ron Smith. Ogden came on for Lindsay and Maelaua substituted Kelso.

The Queensland defence and midfield played an excellent game but finishing let the team down on the day. The Italians led 1-0 at half-time, with a goal in the 13th minute from Carotti, and went to a 2-0 lead by the 50th minute thanks to a goal from Roberto Anton-

olli.

Man of the Match, Jim Hermiston got Queensland back in the game in the 53rd min. when he blasted a freekick around the wall and into the top lefthand corner of the goal. The goal inspired the Maroons and Queensland's constant pressure paid off when Millman headed home a Niven corner three minutes from time.

### A YEAR OF HIGHLIGHTS

The full interstate match against Victoria is only the first of many planned activities this year to celebrate the Centenary of Queensland soccer.

The XXXX pre-season tournament, the first Queensland Soccer Federation run pre-season competition at Perry Park, is now in full swing with matches at Perry Park on Wednesday and Friday nights.

This week on Wednesday night, Taringa plays Sunnyside (6.30 p.m.) and Valley Trident is pitted against Grange Thistle (8.30 p.m.) on Friday Lions plays Easts (6.30 p.m.) and Mount Gravatt plays Acacia Ridge (8.30 p.m.) The final round of matches is on the following Wednesday night after which will be played the semi-finals and the finals.

The interstate match against Victoria is the first of two full interstate clashes this season. On May 8 at Perry Park Queensland will play New South Wales in a match where both sides are guaranteed to field their strongest sides.

June 15 has been confirmed for the big international clash between Australia and England at Lang Park. England could now field one of their strongest sides while Australia is likely to be coached by former England boss Ron Greenwood while Les Scheinflug is in Mexico with the Youth team for the world youth championship finals.

In all it should be an exciting year and one in which to get involved in Queensland soccer.
