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TOUR REFLECTIONS

The English Football Association touring team meet Australia today in the Fourth Soccer Test. They have earned the admiration of the Soccer public by the manner in which they have won the Soccer "Ashes" in three straight matches.

The matches have been contested in fine sporting spirit. The play has been clean and fast, even on the Sydney Cricket Ground "mud-heap".

Last Saturday in Brisbane, Australia, whilst meeting defeat, rehabilitated itself after the Second Test disaster. Harry Robertson, Jock McMahan and Bobby Bignall completely justified their selection. To-day will see Frank Parsons restored as Australia's forward-line leader. Kevin Lake, the Newcastle speedster, has received his big opportunity on the right wing.

The Englishmen, after a brief sojourn in the sunshine of Queensland, are at the peak of their form. To-day's field is ideal for their accurate passing style. It will be a preview of the type of football to be served in the Fifth Test at Newcastle next Saturday.

Next week thousands of fans will take the opportunity of seeing England play concluding tour fixtures at Parramatta, Newcastle and Wollongong.

These fixtures will provide a fitting finale for a tour that will linger long in the memories of those who have witnessed the games. The 1951 English tour has demonstrated conclusively that Soccer football has the speed, science, and spectacular elements that appeal to the Australian football fans.

OFFICIAL FUNCTION NEXT MONDAY

The Australian Soccer Football Association is pleased to acknowledge the co-operation of Sydney restaurateur, Mr. David Bos, and Mr. Paul Adler, managing director of P. & S. Adler & Co., in the arranging of a function in honour of the English football team next Monday night.

It will take the form of a dinner at the Black Tulip Restaurant, George Street, City, followed by a fashion parade by twenty-four mannequins of Miss June Dally-Watkins' studio. The lovely young ladies will parade in Australian sports clothes, and demonstrate the famous Darling Folding Umbrellas. Arrangements have been made for dancing after the display.

TEST REFEREES

To-day's referee, Frank Chidgey, has been one of the State's top-line centre-men for a number of years. He controlled Tests in 1949 against the Hadjuk Yugoslav team. The linesman, R. Wright, controlled the First Test and the first N.S.W. v. England game. Jack McKenzie, on the other line, was a star schoolboy player, and has refereed N.S.W. premiership final matches. They are worthy representatives of the efficient N.S.W. Soccer Referees' Association.

AUSTRALIAN TEST FOOTBALLERS

RON LORD (Auburn, N.S.W.), Goalkeeper. Gained his first Test cap against England at Brisbane last Saturday. Solid in all departments, but particularly brilliant in the air. Seems destined for a great career in international Soccer.

KEV. O'NEILL (Cessnock, N.S.W.), Right-back. Starred against the Springboks, both as right-back and centre-half; also against Yugoslavia as left-half. Versatile, and a tough tackler. Kev's occupation is a mine deputy.

CEC. DRUMMOND (Leichhardt, N.S.W.), Left-back. Back in the lime-light to continue his unbroken run of Test appearances against all post-war Soccer opponents, including New Zealand (1948). Cec. possesses a big-match temperament that will prove invaluable to-day. A french-polisher by trade.

BOB LAWRIE (Bundamba Rangers, Q'land), Right-half and Captain. Learned his Soccer on the Ipswich coalfields, Queensland. Wonderful skill at playing ground passes. Every player who toured South Africa in 1950 speaks volumes for Bob's ability as skipper. Occupation is a school-teacher.

BOBBY BIGNALL (Corrimal Rangers, N.S.W.), Centre-half. This 29-years-old coal machinist is a great favourite of South Coast Soccer fans. His quick turn of pace and ability to recover position have given him his second cap against England.

ERIC DUFF (Woonona-Bulli, N.S.W.), Left-half. Biggest success of Australia's First Test team. A tireless worker, with extraordinary positional sense. Starred for the South Coast in 1949, played in Victoria, 1950, before returning to Woonona.

KEVIN LAKE (West Wallsend, N.S.W.), Outside-right. Shock selection of the team. Kevin's worth was recognised by West Wallsend, who gained his services from Mayfield United this season. Makes his first international appearance to-day.

ERIC HULME (Granville, N.S.W.), Inside-forward. Toured South Africa last year, and played in both winning Test teams. Came through all grades in Granville Association. A beautiful touch in passing, combined with a first-time shot.

FRANK PARSONS (Leichhardt - Annandale, N.S.W.), Centre-forward. Came to prominence with Adamstown club, and transferred to Leichhardt in 1946. Frank is capable of scoring almost impossible goals. His shot comes in as fast as Reg Date's. A school-teacher by profession.

JOCK McMAHON (Leichhardt-Ann., N.S.W.). Although lacking in shooting ability, Jock is probably Australia's greatest artist with the ball. His skill in making openings in the opponents' defence is proverbial. Came to Leichhardt from Churches football.

HARRY ROBERTSON (Leichhardt-Annandale, N.S.W.), Outside-left. Fourth member of the Leichhardt club team chosen in this Test, Harry starred against England at Brisbane. Played his first international against Yugoslavia in 1949. Played in every match of the 1950 South African tour, 17 games, including four tests.

Here are some of the main ones.

1. Highest gate receipts for a Soccer football match in Australia. (£7,501, The First Test, Sydney.)
2. Greatest attendance for a Soccer match out of New South Wales (33,000 England versus Victoria, M.C.G., June 9th).
3. Highest gate receipts for a match outside N.S.W. (£4,204, Melbourne).
4. World record score for an international match (17-0, 2nd Test).
5. Australia's biggest loss in international football (17-0).
6. Record South Coast Soccer attendance (10,500 at Wollongong).
7. Highest attendance and gate receipts for any Soccer tour of Australia.
8. 22,000 attendance at Brisbane Soccer Test.

The record that the tourists hope to break is the score of 136 put up by the 1925 professional team. They had scored 122 goals to last Saturday, leaving 15 goals leeway from the Bundaberg game on.

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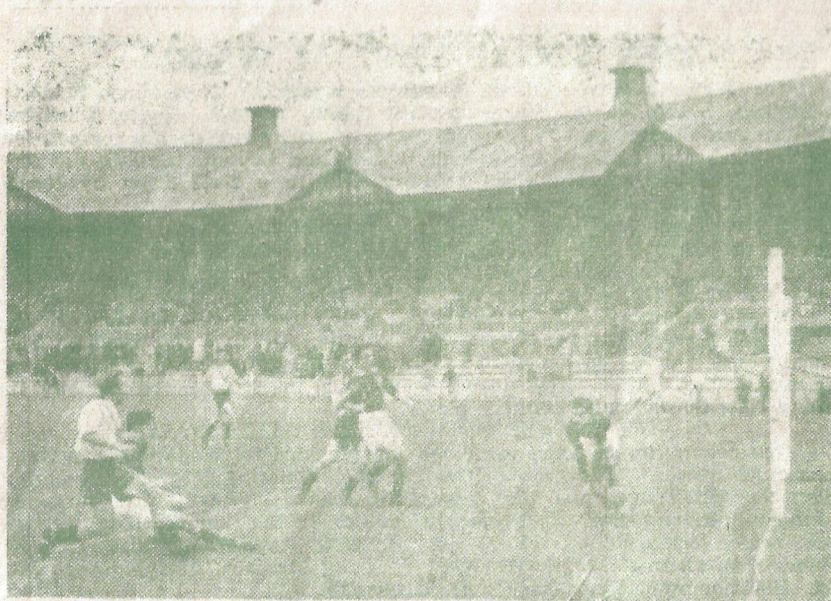

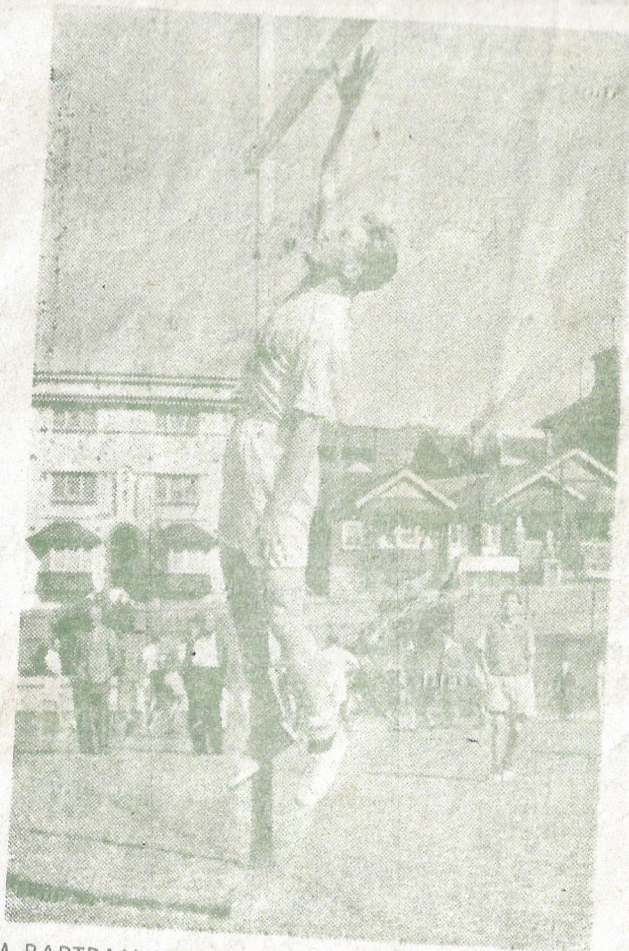
