NORMAN CONQUEST (Canterbury-Marrickville, N.S.W.), Goalkeeper. Australia's leading custodian of the past decade. Agile, expert on ground saves and placing his kicks. Played against Palestine, China, South Africa (1947 and 1950), Yugoslavia, and now England.

HUGHIE PARKES (Wallsend, N.S.W.), Righthalf. Hughie has a real Test Match outlook—full of vigour and skill that has made the Newcastle district famous in Soccer. Played for Australia against Yugoslavia, 1949.

KEV. O'NEILL (Cessnock, N.S.W.), Right-back. Starred against the Springboks, both as right-back and centre-half; also against Yugoslavia as left-half. Versatile, and a tough tackler. Kev's occupation is a mine deputy.

CEC. DRUMMOND (Leichhardt, N.S.W.), Left-CEC. DRUMMOND (Leichhardt, N.S.W.), Lett-back Back in the limelight to continue his unbroken run of Test appearances against all post-war Soccer opponents, including New Zealand (1948). #### THE ENGLISHMEN'S GOALSCORE RECORD

The Football Association Touring team have scored 94 goals on the Australian tour to last Saturday. In doing so their defence has only been beaten 9 times. Highest individual score in one match goes to Jimmy Hagan, who scored 8 at Launceston. Jack Sewell notched 7—the total score of the match—against An Australian XI at Melbourne.

The structure of English Soccer football was built on discipline. Fitness of players means everything, and the man who keeps the tourists fit is Bob Shotton, who looks after the interests of the Barnsley team during the English football season. Some of the players, especially those who toured Canada last year, have been playing football once (and sometimes twice) a week for the past couple of years, almost without a break. The players are ready to step right into another English season a month after they return.

Last Saturday, after the Australian XI had held England at bay for 35 minutes, England rattled up 5 goals in 11 minutes. Ike Clarke scored 2 goals and Jim Hagan, 3.

The opportunities open to Soccer players for travel are unlimited. Whilst Portsmouth players Reg. Flewin and Ike Clarke are in Australia, their club is touring the Argentine!

Amateur football has a great supporter in English co-manager Frank Adams. He was for 20 years a player of the famous Middlesex Wanderers, and 35 years ago he represented The F.A. Amongst his many trips was a tour of Germany and Spain in 1925.

Mr. Adams is an official of the Wycombe Wanderers Club in the Indian Ind



Mr. Adams is an official of the Wycombe Wanderers Club in the Isthmian League, which he represents on the F.A. Council. He advises that there are 30,000 amateur clubs affiliated to the various County Football Associations. These figures do not include any age group or schoolboy teams, so the magnitude of English Soccer can clearly be seen.

English players wonder why Australia does not send a team to Britain. After a few matches together, Australian Soccer players could develop into a fine side, which would finish with a better record than some Continental tides who regularly tour Britain.


