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ENGLAND FASCINATES AUSTRALIA!

Last Saturday the 42,150 attendance was treated to the greatest display of Association football ever seen in Australia. The Englishmen scented mastery early, and revelled in pattern-weaving movements, as elaborate as they were speedy and spell-binding.

Bobby Langton (we saw from whence his nicknames of "The Bolton Bombshell" and "The Lancashire Flyer" were derived), "The General" Jimmy Hagan, Hurst, Kieran, Bamford, Sewell and Co., were all in superb form. The Englishmen, until to-day, have not been extended. We can draw a rough parallel to the 1949 Yugoslav tour. The Yugoslavs completely outclassed N.S.W., but were very fortunate to maintain a 3-2 majority to the final whistle of the First Test.

After seeing England's tour matches to date, it is obvious that our hopes of heading them in to-day's Test are not exactly at peak. The Australian team assembled last Wednesday. Their determination under the expert guidance of Bob Lawrie demonstrates that they will be a much more solid combination than the N.S.W. eleven of Saturday last. They will force the Englishmen to concentrate on a type of football that is an essential feature of heading them in to-day's Test are not exactly at a peak. The Australian almost unsullied in the Dominions.

AUSTRALIAN PLAYERS FIND THEIR FEET

The first clash with the Englishmen was an ordeal for N.S.W. players. Australian sportsmen have a tremendous capacity to learn, so Australia's Test team will rise to the occasion admirably to-day.

The players in the "Green and Gold" to-day have won their positions in an exhaustive series of trials, which have extended to all States. Two players, Eric Duff and Malcolm Wild, will make their international debut. Dicky Kemp, N.S.W.'s pint-sized touchline star, is making a welcome return to the Australian team.

In all tour matches replacements will be allowed for injured field players until half-time. Replacements for injured goalkeepers will be allowed at any stage, which, in the event of a mishap, will preserve the game as a spectacle.

The English touring team's visit is expanding Soccer's horizons to a marked degree. The example of clean play, teamwork, making use of the open space, and keeping the ball in play, is an eye-opener to all who follow the World's Premier Football Game. After to-day's match, all will look forward to the return of the English Soccer team for the Second Test on the Sydney Cricket Ground.

SAMUEL BARTRAM (Charlton Athletic): Born 22/1/14 at Simonside, County Durham. Played as a schoolboy in almost every position except goalkeeper. Signed for Charlton Athletic 13th September, 1934. Toured South Africa 1939, and again played for England 1941-42. Played in the Charlton teams that made football history by moving from 3rd to 1st Division in two consecutive seasons, 1934-35, 1935-36. Sam has played in four consecutive Cup Finals! In business as a sports outfitter and printer.

HARRY BAMFORD (Bristol Rovers). Gained three caps as a schoolboy whilst playing in the centre-forward position. Signed as an amateur before the war with Bristol City and Ipswich Town. Joined the Rovers in 1945, upon returning from Army service in Burma. Six feet tall, weight 12st. 10lbs.,

Harry is a great full-back who never wastes a ball or a pass.

JOHN McCUE (Stoke City). Signed as a professional for Stoke City upon turning 17 in 1940. Army service from 1942 until the end of the war occasionally made appearance with Stoke impossible, but he was able to appear for the British Army on seven occasions. John classes his best match for the Army against a strong F.A. eleven, when he was able to keep the great Stanley Matthews in check. 5ft. 11in. and 11st. 5lbs., John McCue is a qualified F.A. coach.

DEREK PARKER (West Ham United): Born 23rd June, 1926. Signed professional for the "Hammers" in October, 1944. Played for the English Football Association in seasons 1949-50 and 1950-51 against R.A.F.. Also for the Football Combination against Diables Rouges. Interested in cricket

and tennis during the summer months.

REG FLEWIN (Portsmouth): Captained the famous "Pompey" to championship of the First Division in 1948-49 and 1949-50. Born 28/12/20 at Portsmouth. Played for England versus Wales 1944. Represented the Royal Navy against Army, R.A.F. and Holland. Toured Canada and United States 1950. Whilst in the Royal Marines during the war Reg acted as a P.T. instructor. Is a qualified football coach.

SYDNEY OWEN (Luton Town): Born 29th September, 1922, at Birmingham, Warwickshire. Played for Formans Road school, and gained a schoolboy cap. Signed for Birmingham City in 1945, whilst playing in the left-half position. Transferred to Luton Town in June, 1947, switched to centre-half the following season. Whilst serving with the R.A.F. he was selected to represent Combined Services Central Mediterranean against the British

Army of the Rhine. Plays cricket for Bedfordshire.

GORDON HURST (Charlton Athletic): Born 9th October, 1924. Represented Oldham schoolboys and later Lancashire county. In 1945-46 season, Gordon played for the Royal Navy team which toured Holland. His biggest moment in football came in 1947 when he gained a Cup Winner's Medal, being included in the Charlton team which defeated Burnley at Wembley. Keenly interested in swimming.

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
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

LEONARD KIERAN (Tranmere Rovers) wing-half. 5ft. 11½in., 12st. 7lbs. Born at Birkenhead. Joined Tranmere in 1942, and has since played with that

Many clubs comprising players of one nationality playing in the Sydney Metropolitan League and junior competitions are thriving. They play a positional game, complete with all the team-work and finesse that has made Soccer the world's most popular sport.

Dutch, Polish, Hungarian, Jewish and Italian teams are amongst those in the Metropolitan League. Schoolboy grades have also gained an influx of new players. For instance, the Wollongong district has a prospective Australian player in young centre-half W. Tschischkan, who could easily develop into an Australian Soccer star.

BIG INCREASE IN JUNIOR SOCCER STRENGTH

BOB LAWRIE (Bundamba Rangers, Q'land), Right-half and Captain. Learnt his Soccer on the Ipswich coalfields, Queensland. Wonderful skill at playing ground passes. Every player who toured South Africa in 1950 speaks volumes for Bob's ability as skipper. Occupation is a school-teacher.

ERIC DUFF (Woonona-Bulli, N.S.W.), Left-half.
21 year-old painter, who was the surprise selection
of the team. Played well for South Coast against
England, and clinched his place for Australia. Represented the Coast against the Hadjuk Yugoslavs in 1949.

TOM JACK (Brighton, Victoria), Centre-half. Commenced professional football in Scotland at age of 17½ years. Tom played for both Third Lanark and Dumfermline before migrating to Australia two and a half years ago. Toured South Africa last year. A traveller by occupation.

E. "DICKY" KEMP (Wallsend, N.S.W.), Outs de-right. The "Mighty Midget" of Wallsend. Elusive, an accurate cross, and a first-time shot. After some grand displays against the 1947 South Africans, "Dicky" lost his place to Granville's George Sanders. His deeds to-day will make up for his lack of height.

GEORGE RUSSELL (Leichhardt-Ann., N.S.W.). George makes his second international appearance to-day. A tireless worker who is always ready to turn defence into attack. Came from Cessnock to Leichhardt after army service, and has been one of the reasons for the Reds' continuous successes.

HARRY ROBERTSON (Leichhardt-Ann., N.S.W.), Outside-left. Coolest left-flankman of recent years. A product of Sydney churches' football, Harry went into Leichhardt's first team at 17 years of age, and has missed few games since. Played against the Slavs and Springboks.

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SOCCER FOOTBALL IS AN ART!

Soccer must be accepted as the ONLY FOOTBALL CODE. It is not HANDBALL. None of the players, excepting the goal-keeper, are allowed to touch the ball with their hands. A Soccer football player must have control of the ball with head and both feet, combined with accuracy of passing and 90-minute stamina, to be a success. The adaption of these skills into the general formation and team-work makes a worthy Soccer

team.

Eleven players form a Soccer side—five forwards, three half-backs, two backs and a goalkeeper. The duration of the game is 45 minutes each way.

Only the goalkeeper is allowed to handle the ball, and then only in the penalty area. He must not take more than four steps while holding the ball, otherwise a free kick (defined below) is given.

The ball is kicked off from the centre of the field optionally by the side which loses the toss for choice of goals. After each goal, the game is recommenced in the same way by the eleven which did not score. A goal is only scored when the ball crosses the goal line between the posts.

When the ball goes behind, it is kicked off from within the goal area

nearest the point it went out.

If the ball is played behind by one of the defending side, a player of the attacking side kicks it from the nearest corner flagstaff. This is called a corner kick.

When the ball goes into touch, a player of the opposite side to that which played the ball out throws it in from the point where it left the

field of play.

In the event of intentional handling of the ball, and tripping, kicking or holding an opponent, and charging an opponent from behind, by the defending side in the penalty area, the referee awards a penalty kick, which is taken from the penalty mark with all the players, except the kicker and the opposing goalkeeper, standing at least 10 yards from the ball.

A free kick is given for any of the above infringements committed outside the penalty area. The kicker's opponents must not approach within

10 yards of the ball.

A player is offside when he takes, or attempts to take, a forward pass in other than his own half, and there are not at least two opponents in front of him. It is not an infringement to stand off-side.

A goal cannot be scored direct from a kick-off, or goal kick, or from free kicks, except when they are awarded for handling, tripping, kicking,

striking or illegally charging an opponent.
