



Tennis has a long legacy and strong current presence in Whistler...


- Myrtle Phillips built the first court in Whistler over 100 years ago;
- The Whistler Valley Tennis Club was established at Nita Lake in 1979, followed by the existing WRC, which opened on the Northlands property in 1993.
- The WTA currently has nearly 900 members who joined to support our mission statement: "to keep a viable indoor/outdoor tennis facility in Whistler and grow year-round tennis for our community and guests."





There is a long-standing debt to the community...

• Since 1988 there has been an outstanding debt to the community for a "world class" indoor/outdoor, multiuse, tennis facility in exchange for the extensive development rights for 1,200 bed units which equates to hundreds of town houses and/or condominiums."



Tennis is a growing sport in Canada...

- According to a 2018 Tennis Canada survey, 6.5 mln Canadians indicated that they had played tennis at least once in the past 12 months, <u>up 32% from 2012</u>. The same survey found that the number of "frequent players" totaled 2.9 mln in 2018, <u>up 200% from 2010</u>
- Over the same period of time participants in "youth" tennis has increased 400%.







Tennis is also growing globally...


• 25 different countries from all six continents were represented in the recent rankings of the top 50 tennis players on the ATP tour.





Tennis is popular among a wide range of demographics, especially juniors and families

- Tennis is played by a wide range of demographics across all income brackets, age categories, and ethnic backgrounds.
 Both public and commercial tennis centres are thriving; in fact, there is a growing shortage of available court time across Canada.
- Junior tennis is particularly popular. It
 offers young boys and girls a great
 opportunity to engage in sport and fitness.
 The Whistler Racket Club boasts more than
 2000 kids in its annual summer camps and
 after school programs.





Tennis Aligns with the RMOW's Official Community Plan.

- A reinvestment in tennis recognizes the need for a **balanced and integrated resort and community capacity** that includes physical, social and environmental considerations. (Policy 4.1.2.1)
- Support for tennis increases sport tourism, events, and health and wellness opportunities that <u>diversify our</u> <u>tourism-based economy</u>. (Policy 6.5.1.1)
- Tennis supports shoulder-season tourism development opportunities, including <u>weather independent recreation</u> <u>options</u>. (Policy 6.5.1.3)
- Tennis programming <u>encourages interaction between residents and visitors</u>, so that residents can share their passion for the community. (Policy 8.1.1.3)
- Tennis provides an opportunity to support ongoing provision of facilities and *programs for youth*. (Policy 8.10.1.3)



There is a strong correlation between tennis and skiing, making a racket club highly complementary to the resort's appeal among visitors

- Although tennis is very affordable, widely accessible, and broadly popular among all demographics, the sport retains considerable appeal among those with high disposable incomes, which is similar to skiing.
- According to Wealth-X-Data, tennis is the fourth most popular sport in the U.S. among people with high net worth and high disposable incomes, right behind skiing and golf. These are the same people that can afford a destination vacation to Whistler.






There is a strong correlation between tennis and skiing, making a racket club highly complementary to the resort's appeal among visitors

- Many of the world's most famous ski resorts feature year-round tennis clubs. For example, Austria's Kitzbuhel hosts an annual ATP 250 and Gstaad hosts the Swiss Open.
- Head and Volkl both manufacture tennis and skiing equipment.
- Novak Djokovic, currently the world's #1 ranked tennis player, comes from a family of professional skiers and has credited skiing with his success at tennis.
- Local hero Andrée Janyk introduced her children, Mike and Britt Janyk to tennis. Both became successful members of the Canadian national ski team. Andrée believed that tennis is a good cross training tool and instills good sportsmanship because each player acts as his/her own referee.







Tennis plays a vital role in the Whistler economy


- Whistler has proven to be very attractive as a destination for tennis tournaments.
- Historically, the WRC hosts over 25 Tennis BC sanctioned events each year, the most of any facility in the province, drawing ~2000 tournament players to the facility during all months of the year and in all weather conditions.
- The annual economic impact of these events on the local economy is estimated to be greater than \$3 mln. The positive economic benefits of the WRC also include the employment of tennis pros, front desk staff, and maintenance services.
- The WTA's recent online survey of non-residents revealed a "strong desire" to visit Whistler for the "primary" purpose of tennis.

 Tennis can also drive more visits to the resort as a secondary activity. A 2018 Destination B.C. report titled "Global Ski Strategy Consumer Research" found that many ski tourists are looking for other activities to do when visiting Whistler in the winter.




Tennis helps to weather-proof Whistler

- An indoor/outdoor tennis facility is aligned with Whistler's long-standing goal to become a four-season resort.
- Global warming makes it even more imperative to have wet weather and extreme hot weather recreational
 opportunities for our residents and guests.

Our survey of both residents and visitors indicated strong interest in tennis as an alternative activity when

the weather is poor.



0 = Strongly disagree; 10 = Strongly agree Source: The WTA's 2021 Online Survey Results




Tennis is both financially and environmentally sustainable

- There are many examples of financially successful tennis centres in British Columbia, both public and commercial facilities.
- In light of the sport's very favourable fundamentals that we have outlined it is clear that a racket sport centre in Whistler will be financially viable and a huge asset for the community and its residents.
- The sport of tennis is a non-motorized activity that has a very low carbon footprint. It's easy to ride your bike or walk carrying your tennis racket to the game.
- A new racket club would also have a small footprint on the environment relative to a golf course, ski hill, or bike park. It also requires little maintenance and expense to sustain compared to ice rinks and swimming pools.

If we build it they will come!


- Facility improvements and an increase in court capacity were strongly cited as factors that would incent tennis players to use the WRC more often;
- Less than 20% of locals indicate that they currently play tennis as the WRC as often as they would like.






The ASK!

Based on the research and analysis conducted by the WTA during 2021 we have concluded that a reasonable, sustainable, and fair "ask" for the tennis component of a new facility would be as follows:

- Ten Courts: Six indoor; Four outdoor.
- One stadium court for events.
- o Separate courts from pickleball.
- A dedicated tennis operator.
- This provides sufficient scale to host both indoor and outdoor tournaments, and support more programming.
- Our court configuration "ask" is consistent with our survey responses: 90% of respondents indicated at least 8 year-round courts are required to meet demand; 50% indicated at least ten year-round courts.
- A ten court facility is smaller than the original (1988/89) agreement for a 16 court facility and smaller than the proposed 12 court facility in 2008; but it is no smaller than what the WRC had when it opened in 1994.
- The WTA believes that a successful tennis centre requires dedicated tennis amenities and management in order to deliver quality programming and cultivate a tennis-specific culture, either in a standalone facility or as a part of a multi-use racquet sports facility.

The ASK!

The separation of pickleball and tennis courts is consistent with the recommendation of a joint committee that was created between Pickleball BC and Tennis BC in 2021.



PICKLEBALL AND TENNIS

A SOLUTION THAT MEETS THE NEEDS OF BOTH SPORTS



November 14, 2021

Tennis and Pickleball are different sports that have very different needs. A common response to the problem of inadequate pickleball facilities is to add pickleball lines to tennis courts. However, this attempted solution hasn't worked out well for either sport and has often led to on-going frustration and conflict. Tennis BC and Pickleball BC have worked collaboratively over the past year to analyze the issues, research best practices, and produce a recommendation for municipalities across the province.

Our joint recommendation is to build dedicated pickleball courts.



The ASK!

- The WTA supports the vision for a new multi-use recreational facility in Whistler with ten dedicated courts for tennis.
- While we believe that a multi-use facility offers the community a number of valuable synergies, the WTA feels it is important to distinguish some of the statistical differences between tennis and pickleball—most notably, the much bigger size and scale of tennis.
- Pickleball has been very successful in presenting their sport as one of the fastest growing sports in North America, which it is. Tennis is also growing very fast—off a very large base.
- It is a common misconception to think of tennis and pickleball as similar and complementary sports. But they are very different and often conflict with each other—not just in Whistler but in many communities around North America.
- Despite this inherent conflict and the many challenges that come with it, the WTA is working hard to collaborate with the pickleballers in Whistler to realize a mutually beneficial outcome with the Northlands rezoning process.

The ASK!

- Reflecting the WTA's efforts to work collaboratively with other sports in our community, we
 have proposed a "Common Ground" document to members of Whistler's pickleball club. This
 document explicitly recognizes the following four resolute principles of the WTA's official "ask":
 - Support for a multi-use recreational facility that includes a minimum of 10 tennis courts (six indoor and four outdoor) that are run by a dedicated tennis operator.
 - While Whistler's needs have changed in the last 30 years, the local tennis community should not finish the rezoning process being any worse-off than they were when the WRC first opened its doors with ten courts in 1994.
 - In the new facility tennis and pickleball should have separate courts, both for indoor and outdoor play.
 - We support an offsite solution for the recreational amenity.
- Pickleball's official endorsement of these principles remains a "work in progress" as they
 continue to work towards a more formal structure in their organization.
- The WTA has also asked the pickleball community to formulate and articulate their version of a reasonable, fair, and sustainable "ask" that we can endorse. This also remains a "work in progress."
