2025—Invitation and Connectivity

January brings in a New Year to Trinity United Methodist Church. Looking back on 2024 several events challenged us to rethink a number of changes, both in personnel and reaching out to attract others to Trinity. As 2025 begins, Trinity will begin what Pastor Singh is calling a "Year of Invitation" (see page 2).

How should Trinity define connectivity may be central to its strategy. The Church Council has looked at connectivity in two ways. First, connectivity as *bringing others to Trinity* through its various programs, services, and events. Second, connectivity as *taking Trinity out to others* through increased advertising, increased social media activities, and attending local community events. Although neither approach is new, the emphasis is on increasing connectivity. The third approach to connectivity is through personal interaction with members of our individual communities. Again, this is not particularly new, but the first approach suggests that events and activities will bring in interested parties, and the second suggests that information awareness will attract interested parties to Trinity. The third approach takes an interpersonal focus through a more personal form of *evangelization*.

Think of this from the 6 Degrees of Separation theory, where if you know 44 people, who know 44 people, by the time the sixth interaction occurs you have potentially influenced over 7 million people $(44^6=7,256,313,856)$.

Let's bring this closer to home. If I know 7 people who know 7 people, who know 7 people we have over 5,000 possible influences. If Pastor Singh meets 7 people at a Chamber of Commerce meeting, who know 7 others who know 7 more, the math says he may influence over 5,000 people to seek more information about Trinity, and make connections that *may* lead to Trinity membership.

This is different than door-to-door evangelization, where we hand out our *Newsletter* or other material. It calls simply to be aware of some of our friends who might be interested in Trinity based on special interests we know they have because of the interpersonal nature of friendship. Can you name several friends who might be interested in Trinity's approach serving the Lord?

Take a few minutes and think about that.

Committee on Finance

Greetings and Happy New Year 2025. As Chairperson of the Committee on Finance I would like to share a few words with the congregation.

During the month of November, we heard from Pastor Anil who shared about his travels when he visited John Wesley's home and ministry in England and Wesley's commitment to stewardship.

We read in our Bulletin inserts and *Newsletter* during November the powerful message regarding the Stewardship Tree as it provides the foundation of our faith and commitment to managing God's gifts: Time, Talents, Temple, Treasure, Testimony, and Terra.

We also heard from several members of our congregation sharing what Stewardship means to them. Each shared a unique and meaningful message.

Thanks to Jennifer, Darryl, Archie, Sherry, Sue, Don, John, and Donna. They all said yes without hesitation when asked to share their message with the congregation.

For me there is one word that brings Stewardship together. One four letter powerful word, *Love*. Stewardship can be wrapped up in that one word.

Love God Love your Family Love your Fellow Man Love your Enemy Love your Self Love your Church

I fully believe that it is incumbent upon each of us to take God's love and share it every day.

I would like to report that our church's financial picture is very good. This is due to the support and commitment from each of you. TUMC is blessed to have a faithful and giving congregation. Thanks to all of you for making that possible.

Our committee has recently completed the budget for 2025. During this process we received input from each of the church's ministry areas. The budget was reviewed and approved by the Finance Committee and Church Council at our October meetings.

With the recent and ongoing staffing changes we will see an increase in the Staff Parish budget. We recently hired new personnel to oversee and enhance our in-house and on-line media presence, both new positions.

The Trustees' budget will also see an increase as routine maintenance costs have increased as well as Trinity's property insurance.

The Trustees have developed a long overdue deferred maintenance schedule for Trinity's facilities and equipment and will be monitoring that throughout the year. This will ensure that our physical plant will be maintained at a top-notch level in future years.

Trinity proudly supports at 100 percent our Connectional Giving.

Overall, we will see a budget increase of approximately 9.2 percent over 2024.

As we begin 2025, the Finance Committee would ask that you prayerfully consider your giving level in support of our new budget. With your continuing support the Finance Committee does not see anything that would prevent us from having sufficient revenues to support the 2025 budget.

Trinity's future is bright thanks to the continuous generosity of each of you.

Thirteen Methodist Men met Saturday, December 6th, in the Fellowship Hall for breakfast and fellowship. The meeting was called to order by Don Frye and opened with prayer from Doug Evans at 8:00 a.m.

Jim Williams presented the financials, which stand at \$3265 with a few items still to be accounted for. Basically, Jim said that the Methodist Men are in "pretty good shape". He also noted that along with Priscilla Circle and TUMC members we had donated \$3580 to the UMCOR fund for disaster relief in North Carolina.

Don Fry then previewed the group's 2026 plans. He noted that we will have three (3) pancake breakfasts on January 18th, February 15th, and March 15th. The Chili Cookoff will be held February 1st, and two picnics will be held on June 1st and August 31st.

Discussion then ensured about having a "cold weather" picnic where attendees could sit outside and enjoy the winter weather. A decision was made to investigate this for 2026. Discussion then turned to setting up a time and date to take down the holiday greens. It was decided to do this in conjunction with our next meeting on January 4th.

New business included a discussion on replacing some of our Christmas wreaths that are in bad shape. Rick Decker reported to the group that Niantic Christian Church that has several outreach programs in Illinois similar to TUMC (e.g., Blessings in a Bag) had been broken into and all the food as well as Christmas gifts and other items were stolen. A motion was made to send \$100 in support of the church's missions, which was passed unanimously.

Don Frye ended the meeting asking for prayers for several members and the meeting was closed in prayer at 9:55 by Pastor Anil.



Church Council 2024–2025

Overview. The Church Council did not meet in December. At its October meeting committees and staff were asked to write an article for this edition giving an idea of what it/they do, what was accomplished in 2024, and what is being looked forward to in 2025. Pastor Singh reported in the November 2024 issue of the *Newsletter* his review of 2024 and plans for Trinity in 2025. In this part of the *Newsletter*, you will find articles from the major committees and some staff that review what was accomplished in 2024 and what they plan on accomplishing in 2025. To help with understanding their duties, most reports have included a description of what that committee or staff do for Trinity.

TUMC Council Chair

Council Chair is the position in the United Methodist Church who meets and works with the Pastor, Lay leader, and Committee leaders to guide and fulfil the vision and mission of the Church. In my words, for those who have gotten to know me, this is like "herding a bunch of cats". All kidding aside, this position is a fun and challenging endeavor to listen and engage with our various committees and encourage everyone to discuss "openly" related items that arise throughout the year and "needs" for the future. It has been a very challenging year to replace two key members of our church who held very prominent roles in our worship services. The good news is that we all came together, took up the challenge, and filled those positions with individuals who will grow in their new roles to enhance our church in coming years.

The new year will provide more challenges and opportunities for us to continue to grow at Trinity. We have initiated a Stewardship campaign to encourage everyone to strengthen their spiritual and time commitment to ensure that we are able to fulfil the goals of the vision we have set forth in our community. With that in mind, I encourage everyone to "reach out and spread the word" in the community and find those who need our love and compassion and offer our services.

I am so grateful and thankful to everyone who participates in the many offerings at Trinity and pray we can do even more in 2025.

2024 Trustees Year in Review and Visioning for 2025

At the beginning of 2024 the Trustees had a seamless transition from its former chair, Wilson Lear, who as a contractor brought a wealth of experience to his position. Wilson helped to oversee projects ranging from improving the Sanctuary sound system, improving TUMC signage, sale of the Parsonage, and many, many other projects including the initial work on the parking lot refurbishing.

2024 in Review

In 2024, the Trustees took on one of our largest projects since the 2022 re-roofing project. Namely, refurbishing TUMC's parking lot, which was about twenty years old. The milling and resurfacing gave us the opportunity to bring the parking lot up to code. It also allowed us to add more handicapped parking spaces near the entry to the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall; the refurbishing eliminated the rough walking surfaces, improved storm water runoff, replaced many broken wheel stops, and eliminated the wheel stops in the middle of the parking lot, which were tripping hazards.



One of the missions of the church is the support for homeless families known as Family Promise. Two of the rooms on the second floor have been

converted to accommodate a homeless family for a week or two.

The Trustees also replaced all the windows on the north side of the church with new



hurricane impact rated windows. This completes the replacement and protection of all church windows, except the large stained-glass window behind the altar.

The Trustees developed a Deferred Maintenance Spread Sheet to help future Boards of Trustees, Finance Committees, and Administrative Councils to plan for future repairs, when they will be needed, and how much should be budgeted for the work. This was completed and distributed to the responsible committees for input. Every time we repair or replace a system it will be noted to aid future planning.

The Trustees also converted 100 of the original blueprints of the buildings into digitally scanned files. This means the files will no longer deteriorate due to light and heat. Trustees in the future will have legible building plans to help them make decisions. The files have been distributed to members of the Trustees as a means of duplicating and saving the information in case a disaster strikes, and the originals were lost.

Doug Evans replaced the phone system and upgraded the fire suppression panel, which saved operating expenses, and has continued to improve the energy efficiency of our major systems, such as air-conditioning, and lighting. Thereby saving the church on its monthly bill to Florida Power and Light.

A donated player piano was refurbished and made operable by Brent Rasmussen, who donated his wife's iPad to the cause. It now sits in the Fellowship Hall ready to be played.



We oversaw the renovation of the Library/ Seminar Room in the Fellowship Hall. Roz Miller has agreed to be the Librarian and purchased two comfortable easy chairs to encourage people to use the library for reading purposes. Roz and Brent Rasmussen also provided a small table and table



lamp to provide a more directed reading light and reinforce the personal feel of the newly defined comfortable reading space in the library.

The Trustees approved a request for exterior space for a Medical Plant/Food Forest. The pathway will be at the eastern end of the property and will be educational in nature. The work of planting and maintaining the garden will be by Randi Schwartz, Sam Rhodes, and Paul Green.

The Trustees have negotiated with Florida

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Power and Light to change out our current lights in the parking lot, which will provide an improved quality of light and save the church on its monthly payment.

Two flag poles with solar panels and lights were funded by Joyce Monticelli and installed by Doug Evans at the entry to the campus from Savanna Road. This will help new commers and visitors to identify the entrance.

Refurbishment of the Brides Waiting Room/Prayer Room has been completed. The improvements were managed and financed by Nancy Burnett. Brides in the future will wait in a much-improved environment.

The stove in the Fellowship Hall kitchen was professionally refurbished and rehabilitated.

When Hurricane Helene passed by our area, a section of the fence on the south wall of the Sanctuary was destroyed. Rich Dampf has volunteered to repair and replace the damaged fence.

There were many more projects, but this list covers the major ones.

Looking Forward to 2025

At the first meeting in 2025 the Trustees will establish their major projects for the year.

We will continue energy conservation measures and look at the accessibility issues with the facilities.

As the church ages we expect replacement of older mechanical systems.

We are also looking for the opportunity to talk with the people involved with TUMC's various ministries to better understand their needs as related to facilities and their usage.

Some of the projects that were deferred from 2024 due to lack of funding were: refurbish the Memorial Walkway and replace some of the bricks with names to have family members grouped together. Also, the bricks will be pressure washed and reinstalled with a compacted base and perimeter border. And we will improve the sound system in the Sanctuary for members of the congregation with hearing difficulties.

Staff Parish Relations Committee

S taff Parish Relations Committee or S.P.R.C. as it is more commonly known is the committee within a United Methodist Church that manages all things Human Resources related. This group of approximately 7 to 10 church members is responsible for providing feedback to the District by preparing an annual review of Pastor Anil and his service. We also maintain job descriptions of all positions of paid staff and assist Pastor Anil with any issues that may arise. Annually we prepare the budget that covers salaries, taxes, workman's compensation, and a few other items. Members will serve a three-year term and are asked to serve by the Nominating Committee.

2024 was one of the most challenging years we have had for S.P.R.C. since Pastor Anil was hired. Our long-term Music Director and Media Coordinator came to a new season in their lives and decided to move closer to family. This left two positions that S.P.R.C. needed to hire. There were many long hours of meetings, many emails and much prayer over this hiring process. New positions had to be created, and budgets adjusted. Blessedly, we have filled our open spots, and the Church is moving forward.

Hopefully, S.P.R.C. will not be required to hire any new employees or fill any positions in 2025. We are up for the job though if needed. Our plan is to review and update job descriptions, prepare for Pastor Singh's review, and the prepare the church budget for 2026 over the course of 2025.

TUMC's Finance Committee

The Finance Committee at Trinity is composed of volunteers who, by virtue of other leadership responsibilities, link the committee to other areas of congregational life.

The committee's basic activities include: oversee stewardship, compile a budget annually, raise sufficient income to meet the budget, administer funds received by the church, disburse funds, count and deposit offering, establish internal control polices, recommend proper depositories for church funds, use contributions in accordance with donor's intent and provide for an independent annual audit of church's financial statements.

Congregational Care

2024 was a year of learning and trying things to get more people involved in church and encourage new people to attend church. As I review the events held such as the Fall Festival and Flea Market. both of which were done in 2023 as well, the yielded result fell short of the intended goal. They were successful in getting church members involved in an activity and I am very grateful for the response

from the congregation; however, the events did not yield any new attendees to our services. We may have had a visit from one or two, but in most cases they only visited once.

So, the focus for 2025 is to develop events for the congregation we currently have, meaning more adult oriented activities that our congregation can invite friends to and more outreach to our community to encourage church attendance. I have tried some things (i.e., the postcards to invite or let someone know they are missed) but am not satisfied with the outcome. So, I will be looking



for new ways of engaging the congregation and hopefully they will get excited enough to invite others to come. We do need younger people and families in our church, but the few events we have done have not brought them in, so in 2025, I hope to discover new ways of outreach to the community.



Our visitation ministry, and that is what visiting truly is, a ministerial outreach of love and caring, has been slow in developing as well. I came up with some ideas in 2024, such as adopting a shut in and being a "minister" to that person and got no volunteers, so back to the drawing board. I have a few very willing people who will visit others, but this is a ministry that needs wholehearted dedication from more than a few. God bless the few who are willing.

So, we have things in place to minister to others and to each other, but what I hope to see in 2025 is more involvement in reaching new people for our church.

The Priscilla Circle is made up of Women of Faith at Trinity United Methodist Church. Their goals continue to support women, children, and youth throughout the world as well as our community and Trinity United Methodist Church.



During 2024, we sent various types of cards to not only members of the Circle, but to members of the Church that might

need love, support, and comfort. We will continue to ensure cards are sent to everyone within the Trinity family.

Our Heifer project (*Noisy Change*) is collected monthly on the third Sunday of each month. This year we were able to send over \$3,600 in monthly increments which the Heifer Program will triple match the donation. Our goal is to continue collecting monthly and prayerfully increase this donation in 2025.

Our *House of Hope* collection is monthly on the first Sunday of each month. In 2024, we collected over 1,200 pounds of food. Our goal is to seek additional ways to collect food and



increase our 2025 donated amount.

The Ladies Spring Tea was held this year in May with an attendance of 104 ladies. A fashion show and tea were held and enjoyed by all. Proceeds from the Spring Tea provided 18 cases of Horizon Milk to the

Blessings in a Bag Ministry.

Outreach to the Trinity community is our annual *Craft and Bake Sale* held in November. We had 18 art and craft vendors from the community attend. This gave us an opportunity to provide our Church's outreach and worship hours to everyone that came and attended the event. We were also able to give \$1,000 to United Methodist UMCOR in support of hurricane relief throughout Florida and affected areas.

The Hooks and Needles group functions as a subgroup of the Priscilla Circle as a small group varying between 5 to 10 depending upon the season of the year. The ladies in our group are members of the Priscilla Circle or the TUMC congregation or friends of TUMC. We enjoy knitting, crocheting, quilting, embroidering and/or just working with their hands. Together 17 prayer shawls/lap robes have been completed and are waiting to be gifted by a member of the

Visitation Team to an individual in need of a "hug" from our Lord and Savior, Jesus. We pray as a group over each completed prayer shawl or lap robe that



the recipient will feel the arms of Jesus around them in their time of need. We have yarn and needles available for anyone who would like to join with us. All are welcome!

During 2024, the Priscilla Circle provided many special opportunities to share our love with the congregation. We give two Hug-Me-Bags to church members in February (one to keep and one to share), Mother's Day carnations, Palm Sunday crosses at Easter, and a special Christmas gift after the Christmas Services.

We also help with the Flea Market that is set up outside in the church yard. We also help with the Fall Festival. Methodist Men are in charge of putting the greens up in our sanctuary and other Christmas decorations. We also take roles in Christmas and Easter plays.

2024, I believe, was good. We lost 3 members, and gained 3 new members. One month we had 23 members in attendance, which was our best attendance. Our free picnics were great, we had at least 100 or more who attended. We also invited our first responders to our pancake breakfast and our free picnics. We also made a donation when the hurricanes came this year of a \$1,000 to UMCOR.

Our group is now cleaning up after Fellowship Hour and kitchen, and we pick-up the bread and sweets donated by Publix, and take it to the homeless.

Looking forward to 2025. We are working on a *Chili Cook-Off* coming in February. We plan to do a membership drive at "Jumping

Jenson" on Thursdays where they close the roads in town and have food and other crafts for sale. It's so crowded there is hard to get through. We will see about getting permission to set a table with brochures that tell our community what we have to offer.

- Better communication with newspapers, radio stations, and any venue of advertisement I can find
- Develop a more connectional relationship with other Methodist churches in our area, inviting them to concerts and events we host
- Encourage a couple congregation members to attend Jensen Beach Chamber of Commerce breakfasts to inform Business owners of our missions, push the church, and their business
- Considering creating a "SHARING BOARD" where Trinity members can "advertise" their business and congregants who are looking for services can hire Trinity member business. This would include a *ride share* component, where those needing a ride can ask for rides or, if you can provide a ride, information on when and where you can drive.
