An Invitation to Connect...

...tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, His power, and the wonders he has done—Psalm 78: 4

What is it that makes a church thrive? The simplest answer is that it, the church, has connected with its community. This is why many churches today are located in the middle of residential areas. When cities and towns were smaller, the church's location often was right downtown, where people gravitated for shopping, eating, events, and discussions. As cities expanded, some churches continued to meet locally, and others began to find locations based on ease of access. And, as populations change, churches morph from traditional approaches to religion to a more “liberal” or “praise-oriented” approach to services.



So, where is Trinity as it turns 66 in 2026? Are we a healthy church? Do we connect with others on a number of spectrums? Are we growing or just holding our own? Where will we be in 2036? It depends! A healthy church reflects its community. A healthy church is adding to its congregation, both in terms of numbers but also in terms of attracting new members of various ages, interests, and other demographics. An important demographic for growth lies in attracting younger families, with children who will become the next generation of worshipers.

Over the last quarter of 2025 we have looked at evangelism as it affects individual relationships with God and why it is often difficult to discuss with others, even neighbors. Evangelism seems to be difficult, especially for protestants with traditional approaches to religion (e.g., Methodists, Episcopalians, Lutherans). However, evangelism can be looked at differently if we see it as simply *connecting* with others in our community.

So, how do we make that initial church connection with others in our community? We all know others whom we think would connect positively to Trinity. How can we get people who we know to attend? Pancake breakfasts, line-dancing and Tai Chi sessions, musical performances are good connectors, but the best is actually asking others to attend, to connect with Trinity. In this regard we will be asking you to identify families or individuals who you think would connect well with Trinity. We are not going to ask anyone to go out and knock on doors. Instead, we are planning a targeted relationship campaign based on your input.

More to come during January but start thinking now who you think might find a connection with Trinity and why Trinity would be a church they could relate to.

Then Jesus said to Simon, ‘Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people’—Luke 5:10

Everywhere we turn, machines are replacing people. Last summer, the *Wall Street Journal* reported that auto factories in China have refined their automation processes so thoroughly that factory floors can theoretically run “dark,” obviating human beings who require light to do their jobs.

Combine this with Artificial Intelligence (AI), which can provide us with partners that can help us research virtually any topic, analyze massive amounts of data in seconds, and create works of art that would take a human hours or even days.* Pretty soon, humans will see little need for one another to get work done.

Rapid changes in technology may seem like a curse to many, but to people of faith, it may be a blessing in disguise: Human beings will always need (and perhaps even come to crave) a loving, caring, supportive, physical human presence. This is something we Methodists can provide in abundance!





Matthew



OVERVIEW

One of the Gospels, this book is an account and testimony of Jesus Christ. It was written by Matthew, an educated tax collector who was one of the original Twelve Apostles. His account is unique in that it was written for the Jewish people, to persuade them that Jesus was the promised Messiah. Matthew understood the importance of supporting his testimony with Old Testament prophecy, which he cited more than 50 times. The book is a balance of stories, teachings, miracles, and prophecies.

Matthew gives the genealogy of Jesus Christ going back to Abraham. When Joseph is hesitant to wed Mary, an angel appears to him and tells him not to fear taking her as his wife. Matthew also tells of the Magi, Herod's slaughter of babies, the escape to Egypt, and Jesus's family's return to Nazareth.

Matthew shares the Sermon on the Mount. Of the 23 parables included, nine are original and include the Parable of the Sower, the Parable of the Ten Virgins, and the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats.

Of the 18 miracles mentioned, Matthew tells of two that are unique: Peter walking on the sea, and the coin found in the fish to pay the temple tax. A healing of two blind men may also be unique.

Matthew's account refers to Peter as the Rock of the future church. He also shares Christ's prophecies that the kingdom would be handed over to the Gentiles, that the destruction of the Temple would occur in less than 50 years, and a famous description of the End Times.

Matthew recounts the 30 pieces of silver and suicide of Judas, Pilate's wife's disturbing dream, the earthquake at the Resurrection, and the great commission to share Christ's teachings with the world.

The Gift of Time

Time is one of the greatest gifts God has given us. It is priceless, continually moving forward—one second, then the next—and the moment that has just passed is gone forever. As someone once said, *Today is yesterday's tomorrow*. Every day we live is a day we once looked forward to, and now it has become part of our story.

When we give our time to something—or to someone—we offer a gift that can never be replaced. Likewise, when someone invests their time in us, we are blessed by that generosity. Their presence, attention, and effort are expressions of love and grace.

Because time is finite in this earthly life, how we choose to spend it matters deeply. We are called to use our hours and days with purpose, aligning them with the goals and

responsibilities God has placed on our hearts. Each moment is a unique opportunity to serve, to grow, to love, and to

reflect Christ in the world. How we manage our time is part of our stewardship, just as real and holy as how we use our gifts, talents, or resources.

Many people say the average human life is around 22,000 days—just over 60 years. Whether our number is higher or lower, the truth remains the same: our time here has an endpoint. This reality isn't meant to frighten us, but to remind us of the beauty and responsibility of each day. Time is *grace*. Time is *opportunity*. Time is a *sacred trust* given by our Creator.

So let us spend our time wisely.

- Let us give it freely and lovingly.
- Let us respect the time others share with us.
- Let us avoid wasting the moments we've been blessed with.

- And let us remember that part of honoring this gift is embracing joy—having a good time, sharing that joy with others, and helping them experience the goodness of God in the limited but beautiful time we all have.





During the month of November, we all shared Stewardship Emphasis month. During the first two weeks of November members, friends and visitors each received a stewardship brochure and a small United Methodist Cross and Flame plaque from the Stewardship Committee as they entered the sanctuary. The brochure provided contains a wealth of information about Trinity including a short history on the church's beginning as well as highlighting our on-going outreach and evangelism ministries and our 2026 budget. If you missed getting one of the brochures, please let us know.

Each Sunday in November Pastor Anil shared meaningful stewardship-based sermons. We also heard from members of our congregation sharing what Stewardship means to them. Each shared a unique and heart-touching message. Thanks to Barry Brunner, Levi Miller, Rob Roadman, and Jennifer Baker. They all said yes without hesitation when asked to share their personal message.

I would like to report that our church's financial picture remains very good. This is due to the support and commitment from each of you. TUMC is blessed to have a faithful and giving congregation. Thanks to all of you for making that possible.

Overall, we do have a budget increase of approximately 10.1% over 2025. Along with some staffing adjustments, the Trustee's budget was increased as routine maintenance costs have increased. Also, we are seeing an increase in the church's property insurance and Trinity's Connectional Giving. Trinity proudly and continually supports 100% our Connectional Giving.



Saturday's Breakfast


Jim Williams then presented the Treasurer's Report that included the November Pancake Breakfast, which drew over 110 community members, raising \$1,067 in ticket sales as well as \$113 in World Hunger donations. He reported a current checking balance of \$2,464.04 with not all Pancake Breakfast expenses yet reported.

Don F. then brought up the next Pancake Breakfast to be held on January 10th, 2026. Discussion focused on making the process smoother to ensure that orders don't get backed up with discussion on ways to ensure a positive experience for all who attend. There will be two other Pancake Breakfasts to be held on February 14th and March 14th.

Rick Decker then suggested that taking down the holiday greens be done on January 3rd after the men's Saturday meeting. Discussion then turned to helping the congregation to communicate more with Rick about members being hospitalized or missing services so he can send out cards. Don Stacks noted that a new "relational campaign" was kicking off in mid-January and tied into Barry Brunner's 2026 theme of connectivity, raising awareness of Trinity in the community, and building membership.

The meeting ended with ideas to help build the group's membership. Several strategies were suggested, including creating "Methodist Men" badges for members to wear with their name badges and creating business cards for the group.

Recipe of the Month:

Marinated Flank Steak

Flank steak (or other strip steaks) is a healthy and easy meat to grill or pan fry. The recipe is quick to put together and cooks fairly quickly. The first step is to make the marinade. The second is to marinate the meat. The third is to grill!


Ingredients

- One small bottle of soy sauce (5 oz.)
- One tablespoon (or more) of minced garlic
- Two tablespoons (or more) of mustard (Dijon, spicy brown, honey)
- Tablespoon of peanut oil (or other oils)

Instructions

- Select the flank steak and pat it dry
 - You may cook the entire steak or cut it into strips)
- In a bowl combine ingredients and stir well
- Pour the marinade into a large storage bag
- Marinate the steak for at least 30 minutes in the refrigerator
 - The longer you marinate, the stronger the flavors
- Remove the steak (or strips) from the refrigerator and let stand for 5-10 minutes
- Over high heat, sear the steak on both sides (about a minute)
- Reduce the temperature to medium and cook for 4-5 minutes per side, this should produce a medium steak. Add or reduce time for rare to well-done.
- Enjoy

- **Micah 7:18:** Who is a God like you, who pardons sin and forgives the transgression of the remnant of his inheritance? You do not stay angry forever but delight to show mercy.
- **Proverbs 14:29:** Whoever is patient has great understanding, but one who is quick-tempered displays folly.

THREE VERY IMPORTANT NEW TESTAMENT SCRIPTURES ON THIS SUBJECT:

- **1 Corinthians 13:4-5:** Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs.
- **Matthew 9:13:** But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners.
- **James 1:19:** My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry.

God's Important Messages about Anger:

Nearly all sins committed show some degree of emotions not being checked. A very important lesson for today is "faith first, facts second, and feelings third." With the reduction of faith in our society, feelings are rising to almost become facts. And yet they are much more likely to lead us astray than faith or facts.

BIBLE STORIES SHOWING ANGER:



- The classic example of anger gone awry is the Cain and Abel story found in Genesis 4.
- A second example is Moses murdering the Egyptian, for which he was banished to the desert for more than 40 years. (Exodus 2:11-14)
- Jonah 4 is a good example of the kind of anger Christians should avoid (as opposed to righteous anger). Jonah became angry with God because of his mercy toward the Ninevites. Jonah's anger did not produce good fruit and, as we all know, did not send him in the right direction.
