Body, Mind, & Soul

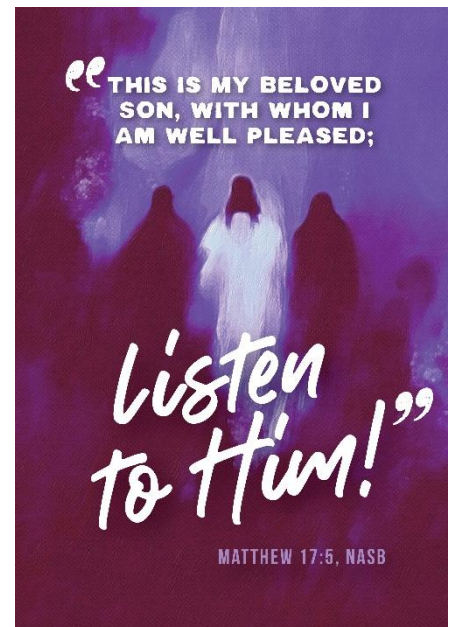
I recently finished reading *The Jesus Discoveries* by Jeremiah J. Johnston. If you are looking for a good read, one that looks at what we *know* of Jesus in terms of historical antiquity and a philosophical/logical interpretation of what has been physically found as evidence of both Jesus’ vision and mission on Earth, this will be an excellent read.

I have been fascinated with the historical Jesus for a long time. I remember my first reading about the Shroud of Turin as one of the first examples of the physical Christ. I’ve followed the scientific tests that have at first determined the Shroud to be a 12th century fake and then the later tests that offer support of its existence from the 1st century AD. I’ve also read about the ossuary of James and other indicators that Jesus not only walked the Earth but that His teachings make sense given an understanding of the times, culture, and impact He had then and continues today.

For the most part, Johnston’s evidence is based in what he calls *evidential apologetics*, where apologetics refers to a *reasoned defense* whereby historical artifacts, cultural practices (i.e., burial, cleansing, avoidance behaviors), and reporting of Jesus as a healer, miracle worker, and exorcist. This includes reporting from contemporary Roman and Jewish historians as well as references to others who attempted and failed duplicate the healing, miracles, and exorcisms He delivered.

But most important is the recovery of the *intellectual* Jesus. Here we are talking about taking Jesus into our minds, using His reasoning, and developing a Christian thought that follows His acts as moral, ethical, and behavioral understanding of self and others. Johnston argues that the intellectual Jesus leads us as “our Lord who not only saves but also teaches us to think” (p 134). He goes on to state that “[t]he call is clear: Let us love God with all our heart, soul, strength, and yes, with all our mind. For in doing so, we do not diminish faith—we display its brilliance” (p. 134).

Johnston goes into further detail of the time of Jesus and argues that the culture, social roles, and practices of the times support His mission and vision of the good life throughout time.

Though I remember that day like it was yesterday, only years later did I come to treasure the values upon which our Nation was founded:

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.

—The United States Declaration of Independence

Thousands of years earlier, Paul instructed the Galatians above all that we are all called to Freedom. That "Freedom," though, has a specific focus: To love God above all things, to love our neighbors as ourselves, and to serve one another.

Our nation's defenders secure our liberty by adhering to the various constraints placed upon them: Referring to the Uniform Code of Military Justice, obeying Lawful Orders, striving for the health and well-being of their fellows, and so on. The great irony of Freedom is that we must all still abide by values that demand self-regulation and care for all our People.

On this 250th Anniversary of the Founding of our Nation, may the Holy Spirit remind us that the freedoms which God bestows upon us are most faithfully exercised when we strive for that more perfect union: A union in which ALL—even those with whom we disagree—are also afforded the fullness of life, the blessings of liberty, and the ability to pursue happiness just as we enjoy them.

May the next 250 years witness our growing willingness to love God, love one another, and serve our neighbors. God in Christ Jesus frees us to LOVE!

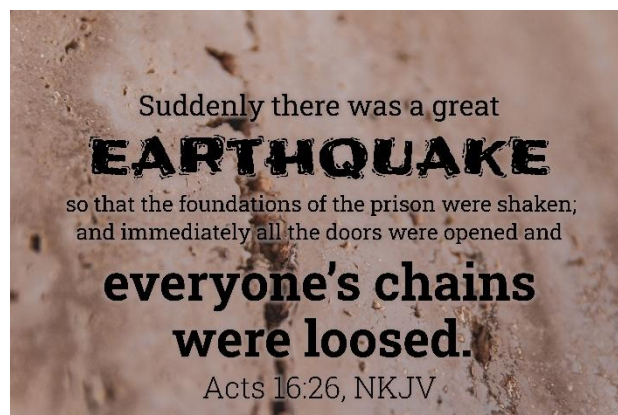

Whether moving their feet, clapping their hands, tearfully swaying to the melodious sounds giving honor to our Lord, all in attendance are participating in one accord.

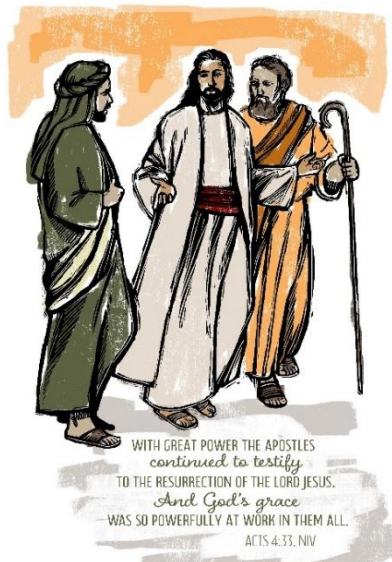
We are thankful and grateful for the abundant blessings and grace given to the team each Sunday morning as we present our offerings of praise.

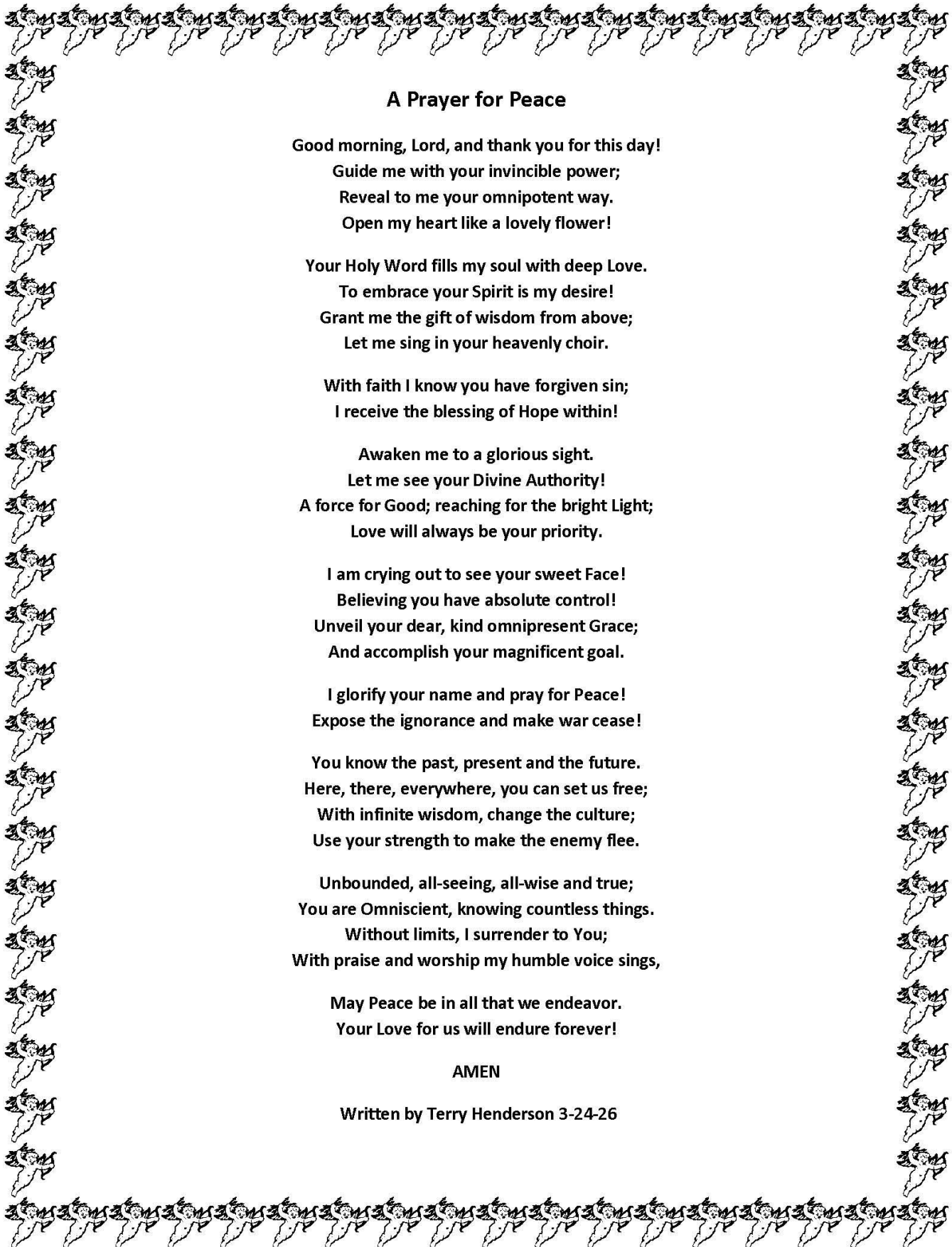
Come join us as part of the team or one of those in attendance. Let us worship Him, Christ our Lord, together.

Getting to Know Barry & Kathy Brunner

In 2021, Barry and Kathy moved to Jenson Beach, Florida from Gurnee, Illinois, leaving two daughters and their families in Wisconsin and one daughter and her family in Iowa. Don't worry though, because they share their love continually with all three families through many trips throughout the year. Upon moving here, they wanted to find a church that was close to home. This was during Covid and there were not many churches open for services. During their daily bike rides, they noticed the electronic sign in front of Trinity, indicating the church was holding services with safety features and the Brunner's decided to attend a service. They came and loved the music, and Anil's sermon, and attended more services. And then the services were discontinued (again due to Covid), but not for long. Barry and Kathy came back to Trinity after Covid and Mr. Frye, who is the 9:00 a.m. Trinity cheerleader (and I say that fondly), gave them his "spiel" which is always provided in total sincerity. They were convinced that Trinity was their Church Family.

I asked them both what their weaknesses and strengths were, and Barry said listening and communication were his strengths. His weakness was occasionally exhibiting outbursts in a private scenario (which he continues to work on today). Kathy felt that her friendliness was her strength. Barry said, "she is truly the Rock of our family." She said her weakness is sometimes "overthinking" situations.

Barry, with his communication skills, is very involved with leading the Church Council as Council Chairperson. His primary role is to help motivate and lead the various committees within the church council. Both Barry and Kathy use their multi-tasking skills with their involvement in Priscilla Group and Blessings in a Bag. They recognized other people's needs and wanted to help. For instance, with Family Promise, Barry and Kathy helped to keep these programs going and encouraged and motivated others to use their gifts for the betterment of the church and community needs.

When asked what new programs might be coming, Barry said that an "Outreach Committee" has been created to bring new members to the church and the committee will address the needs of all ages (as will be seen in the individual representation within the committee). Being very new, there have been only a couple of meetings to date, and this group will be a part of Church Council. They will be finding new ways to reach out in the community, be it via groups, online and social media, as well as other not yet known opportunities filled with creativity and momentum to carry these goals forward. These programs that Barry and Kathy are involved in require a lot of time, effort and prayer and I for one am thankful for them and many others in our church family who are so devoted to these endeavors.



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When asked what very few people knew about them, Kathy said she has traveled to all 50 states. Most have been with her parents starting as a young child on family vacation trips, and her visit to Hawaii was the only one done with Barry.

Barry offered that he tried out for the Philadelphia Eagles two years in a row as the field goal kicker. They also have a small ownership of the Green Bay Packers.

When I asked them what they wanted their legacy to be, their 45-year relationship was evident in that both wanted to be thought of as loving spouses, a loving father and mother, and loving grandparents creating lifelong memories, as well as their devotion to Trinity for the purpose of strengthening and growing the church community.

June Trinity Events



Church Council Notes

Trinity's Administrative Council met on June 28th and was opened at 2:00 p.m. with prayer by Pastor Singh to review the work done by various teams working to make Trinity vital to the community and its congregation. The meeting began with Council Chair Barry Brunner doing a quick review of Trinity's status to date and then asked the Council to reconsider the Council meeting changes voted on in May's meeting. He first asked the Council to put the November meeting back on the calendar; the motion, moved by Jim Williams and seconded by Don Stacks passed unanimously. Second, he asked the Council to change the August 16th meeting to include Trustees and Finance along with the Council. Don Stacks moved the motion to include all three meetings on the 16th and was seconded by Roz Miller and passed unanimously. The Council then heard the following 17 reports.

Outreach. Outreach committee chair Gail Rader reported on progress in creating the new committee, strategic directions and projects, programs, and ideas from the committee's first meeting. She also noted that the committee was also looking at "in-reach" (see June *Newsletter*) to meet the needs of the congregation.

Trustees. Levi Miller went over the 14 completed Trustee projects that included air conditioning and humidifier updates, ongoing upgrading of the Sanctuary sound system, work on the Sunday School rooms and furnishings, and the Memorial Garden. He noted that a new project was improving Trinity's security system with upgraded cameras.

Finance. Dale Forbes provided the Council with data on Trinity's finances, noting that finances were good and that 32.8% of last month's donations came on-line. He and Jim Williams told the Council that the Outreach Committee would now be included as a budget line item.

Stewardship. The Stewardship Subcommittee of the Finance Committee chair Archie Satchell reported progress on the 2026-27 stewardship campaign and introduced and discussed *Thank God*.

Thank You, as the stewardship campaign that would highlight what Trinity is doing as a church (see page 4).

Lay Leader/Family Promise. Roz Miller reflected on her first time attendance at the Annual Conference and the impressions it made on her. She reported that Trinity currently has a Family Promise mother/son in residence.

SPRC. SPRC Chair Becky Binder informed the Council on personnel updates. She then talked about a House of Hope plan on building the world's Cuban sandwich on September 12th and urged that Trinity members to volunteer for the project and even having a Trinity team complete in helping build the sandwich. More will come on this topic in the August *Newsletter*.

Lay Delegate/Line Dancers. Sue Nance reported an expected seasonal dip in Line Dancer attendance and that the Line Dancers would start an *absolute beginner's class* on September 9th for those interested in learning the basic dance steps. Line Dancers will meet three times a week starting in September.

Pastor's Report/Media. Pastor Singh noted that attendance has been good and that we are trending towards total attendance over last year, noting that 2026 attendance has been higher per month than 2025. He also discussed media statistics provided by Mike Fields, reporting online viewing for the year to date and what surprised him by the data. He and Don Stacks will work on refining the online numbers into something that to detect viewing trends.



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Congregational Care. Rick Decker discussed the plans for Sunday School that will kick off in August. He also stressed that congregational members who were in need should contact either him or staff so that they can be helped however Trinity can. He focused on one request for food that had yielded anonymous gift cards for an individual Trinity member and on not finding out about needs and/or hospitalizations from members. Discussion focused on message strategies to make help known when needed. He also went through visitor card statistics, noting that word of mouth was the highest contributor to visitation.

Priscilla Circle. Pat Williams reported that, while not again meeting until September, that Priscilla Circle had raised \$20 and sent 260 pounds of food to House of Hope and that \$372.00 had been collected through May's Noisy Change Sunday ministry.

Methodist Men. Don Stacks thanked Rick Decker for highlighting that the Men wouldn't be meeting on the 4th of July, instead meeting on July 11th. He reported that a project with Jon Smith with the help of Rick Decker had identified all male Trinity members and had created a new email list with emails and full names as well as cleaning up the current Men's email list.

Communications. Randi Schwartz informed the Council of current and future website event communications and measures being taken to publicize Trinity events. She also noted that an *Acts of the Apostles* Sanctuary display was being prepared.

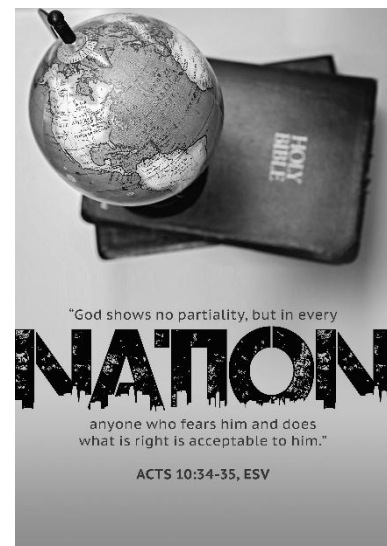
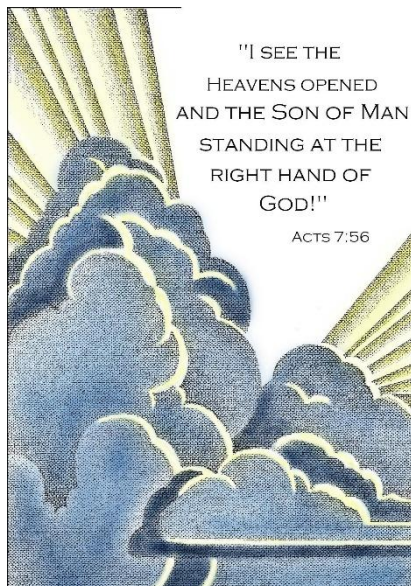
Newsletter. *Newsletter* editor Don Stacks reported that we would soon be entering the 5th year of producing a monthly newsletter and thanked all who had contributed. He also noted that a request for birthdays to be published in the *Newsletter* only yielded six (6) birthdays and was considering dropping it as monthly reporting. Discussion focused on getting the word out to the congregation again.

Administration. Pastor Singh reported on progress on Hurricane Preparedness, that a member audit was being undertaken, and that Easter and Christmas candle preparation would be on December 2nd at 10:30 a.m.

New Business. Sue Nance inquired whether the Trinity campus could be used for hurricane shelter. Discussion focused on what would be required to create such a center and the Trustees were asked to investigate what it would take to create the shelter.

Chair Brunner asked for Pastor Singh to close the meeting in prayer at 3:40 p.m.

After canvassing the group, Don Stacks found that only three of those present would be available to help with a holiday July 5th picnic. In view of this, the group voted to postpone the July picnic to either September or October. Pastor Singh had indicated to Don, that in the event of such a situation, he and Rick would do a potluck lunch.

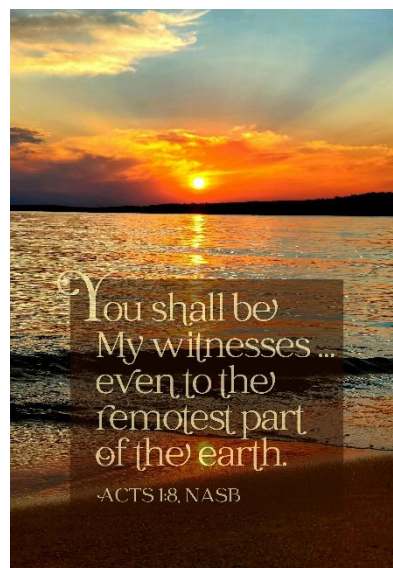
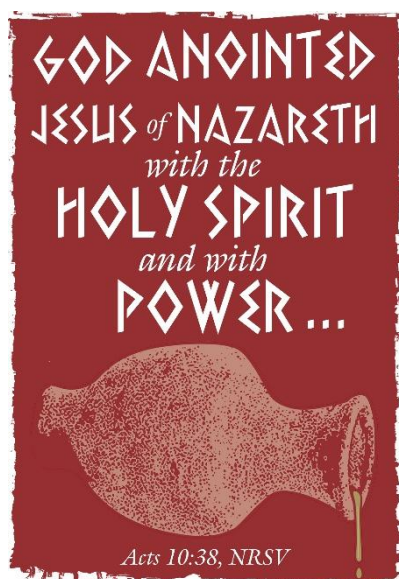

½ c. green pepper

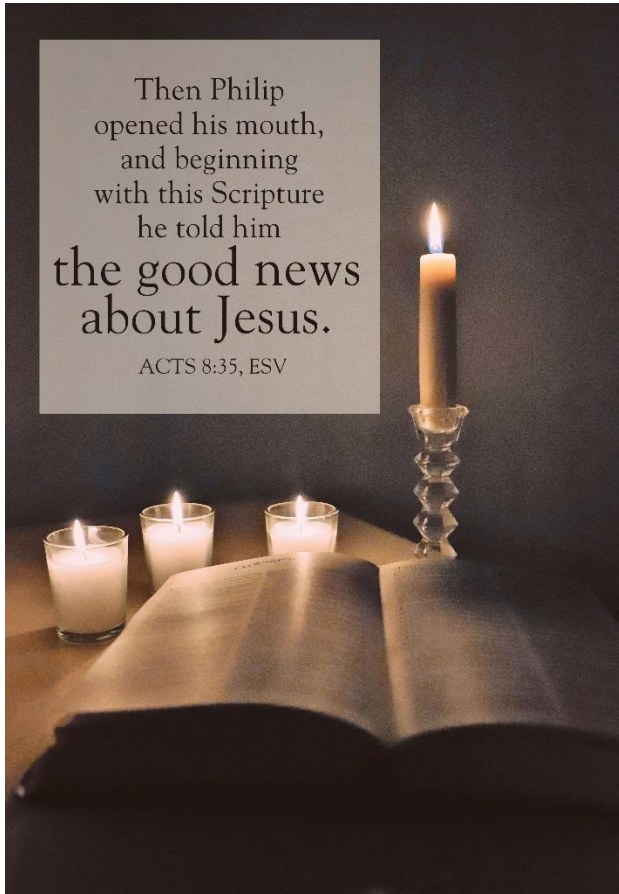
Dressing:
