Is Christianity Declining?

A recent survey of religion in the United States by the Pew Research Center presents some interesting findings and suggest that the decline in Christianity we have seen may be slowing or even leveling off. At the same time, spiritual belief is widespread among Americans.

The Pew report is based on a survey sample of over 35,000 over the 2022–2023-time frame. The report can be found at https://pewresearch.org/religious-landscape-study and presents some interesting nation-wide data. For instance, 62% of respondents reported identifying as Christians, with 23% as Evangelical Protestant, 11% Mainline Protestant, and 19% Catholic. Of the 29% who identified as unaffiliated with any religion, 5% identified as atheist and 6% as agnostic.

When asked about the importance of religion to them personally, 64% reported religion was important, but only 25% reported attending church one or more times weekly. Sixty-three percent of respondents felt the Bible was important, while only 25% read it at least once a week. Fifty-seven percent of the respondents considered themselves as a religious person, 67% felt that attending religious services when growing up was important to them later in life, and 63% reported that religion was personally important to them as a child.

Why are these findings important to Trinity? As Pastor Singh noted in a recent Church Council meeting, attendance norms have changed, especially since the COVID years. In person overall attendance has declined, although Trinity's attendance has leveled off for both seasonal and nonseasonal periods, other churches have faced declining attendance or have closed. Interestingly, Trinity's internet attendance (YouTube® and Facebook) has increased dramatically. Is the *status quo* where we want to be? Is internet attendance equivalent to in person attendance? Can it sustain Trinity's ministry? Probably, but there is a qualitative difference between attending church online and in person. We also need to work on strategies to bring younger families to Trinity and build on that Pew Research finding that religious services were important when growing up. More on this soon.


We can breathe in prayer anywhere, any time, in any circumstance

If, for whatever reason, we cannot find the words, we can simply reunite with God through our breath.

Some tips:

Find a quiet space with fresh air, or an open-air space where you can enjoy a bit of solitude. Sit or stand as you like. Or walk.

- *Relax* into an upright posture. Some of us may feel like we have to "work" at keeping our backs straight. If we simply allow the crown of our head to "float" up towards heaven, we may find our spines aligning naturally.
- *Breathe* from the lower abdomen. Expand and contract easily, gently, slowly. Let the exhale last longer than the inhale. Don't "work" at it, just become aware of it.
 - *Cultivate* a sense of gratitude with every inhalation. Let's remember that this is God breathing life into us! May we be forever grateful!
 - Take only as many breaths as you need for that session. This doesn't have to be long, and I hope this never feels like "work." There is no success or failure here. Just "Breathing with God." And on the final inhale and exhale, thank God.



The Art of Stewardship—Testimony

Last November we had the opportunity to read in our newsletter and worship bulletins several articles about stewardship. The five T's of stewardship: our *time, talents, treasure, temple* and *testimony*. We were briefly introduced to The Stewardship Tree along with its parts: roots (time), trunk (talents and temple), branches (treasure), leaves and flowers (testimony) and soil (growth).



During 2025 we will explore in more detail each of the parts of The Stewardship Tree. Each month we will dig a little deeper into each part of the tree. So far, we have looked at *time*, *talents* and *temple*. This month we will look at *testimony*. We will look at other parts of the tree in coming months.

Stewardship is a timeless concept that has evolved through generations, yet its essence remains pivotal in our modern society. At its core, stewardship is the responsible management and care of resources, whether they be material, environmental, or spiritual. But beyond the practical aspect, stewardship embodies the art of witnessing and testimony, a profound engagement with our world that transcends mere guardianship.

Stewardship is deeply rooted in ancient traditions, where stewards were entrusted with the responsibility of managing the estates and assets of their lords. Looking Ahead: Sound Baths and Sacred Stillness

We're also *exploring* the possibility of offering *sound baths*—calming, meditative experiences where tones and vibrations help guide the body into deep rest. To be held in our Sanctuary, like prayer and worship, these moments create space to be still and reconnect with God and ourselves.

Why It Matters

These activities aren't about being trendy or adding "extras." They're about offering real, tangible ways for people to feel connected—to God, to each other, and to their own well-being. When we open up more ways to engage with our church community, we create opportunities for growth, healing, and belonging. The hope is that people will come for a walk, for the drumming, for the garden, and curiosity—then stay because they've found something deeper. Something Holy.

I may add here John Wesley, founder of Methodism, offers these thoughts: Wesley understood that physical and spiritual health were intimately connected. In a letter dated October 26, 1778, Wesley offers this telling advice to his friend, Alexander Knox. "Alleck ... it will be a double blessing if you give yourself up to the Great Physician, that he may heal soul and body together. And unquestionably this is his design. He wants to give you ... both inward and outward health."

Wesley taught that God cares for the health of our minds and bodies as well as our souls. The United Methodist Church continues in that tradition today.

And here we are at Trinity, embracing John Wesley's ideas on physical and spiritual health.

The choir will continue to sing through June, and then take a two month much deserved break. My hope is that you enjoy the summer break, and then we will reconvene in September to Worship together again with our music.




Originally serving as a volunteer on church council, Douglas stepped up when Trinity needed leadership. In 2022, he became the church's Director of Facilities, bringing not just technical expertise, but a heart deeply committed to the mission of the church.

"I saw the strain on our staff and volunteers, and I knew I could help," Douglas recalls. "It wasn't about finding something to do, and it was about freeing others to do ministry while I took care of what I know best: the building, the systems, and the details."

Douglas's role touches every part of church life, making sure the AC is on for Sunday services, coordinating maintenance, overseeing projects, and supporting the day-to-day operations that allow the ministry to thrive. Yet working at the same place he worships presents unique challenges.

His goal is simple: to support the pastor, staff, and congregation by handling what he can, so they can focus on growing the church's outreach and spiritual life. "At the end of the day," Douglas notes, "I am here because I love this church. I am not just maintaining a building, I am helping make space for transformation. That is holy work too.








OVERVIEW

On Saturday morning May 3rd 20 Trinity United Methodist Men gathered for their monthly breakfast meeting. After a breakfast of scrambled eggs, potatoes, sausage, coffee, and orange juice, Don Frye opened with a devotion and prayer after calling the group to order at 8:17 a.m.

Roy Emmett's memorial service to be held that afternoon was then discussed, and Pastor Singh thanked the group for its donation toward the service.



Pastor Singh then praised the group for doing a great job in helping build Trinity and spread its word throughout the community.


As there was no other business to discuss, Pastor Singh then closed the meeting with prayer at 8:55

- Psalm 17:7: Show me the wonders of your great Love, you who save by your right hand those who take refuge in you from their foes.

THREE VERY IMPORTANT NEW TESTAMENT SCRIPTURES ON THIS SUBJECT:

- Matthew 22:37-39: Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." This is the first and greatest commandment. 39 And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."
- Luke 6:32: If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those
 who love them. Change in the subject's nature from the Old and New Testament:
- John 3:16: For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.



God's Important Messages about Love:

God does not ever stop loving his children. He may be disappointed and correct them but he will never desert or forsake his children.


God's love is bigger and better than our human love. Our love only wants to extend itself to those we find easy to love, like family members and friends. God's love will extent to those who are not easy to love and who are not acting loving toward us.





BIBLE STORIES SHOWING LOVE:

- Luke 15 is a great resource for God's Love, containing both the Parable of the Lost Sheep (Luke 15:3-7), The Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). The Parable of the Lost Coin, a lesser known parable about God's love, falls between the two (Luke 15:8-10).
- Of course the ultimate story of love is Jesus' death on the cross. However, the explanations provided
 are in other passages that aren't imbedded in the story. John 3 contains not only the "God so loved the
 world" famous verse (16) but many others that bring understanding about the depths of God's love.



HOSEA







OVERVIEW

Hosea directed his early prophecies to Jeroboam II, the 13th king of the northern kingdom around 750 BC. Israel was full of idolatry, and God planned to allow Assyria to invade if people didn't repent (they didn't).

He prophesied early, around the same time as Isaiah and Jonah. Hosea obeyed God and married an unfaithful. He was thus able to relate to God's feelings of betrayal by Israel.



Israel is charged with CURSING, LYING, MURDER, STEALING and ADULTERY (4:2)

God's people are destroyed by their lack of KNOWLEDGE (4:6)

God desired MERCY even more than he desires SACRIFICES (6:6)

Israel is described like GRAPES and a fig tree (9:10)

This famous prophecy was fulfilled when Jesus' family fled to **EGYPT** (11:1)

EPHRAIM is one of the **TRIBES** of Israel that has surrounded God with lies (11:12)

Church Council

SPRC: Jennifer Baker reported that the pianist/accompanist position was now active and that the Committee was working on clergy evaluation.

Music Ministry: Cynthia Beam reported that music was slowing things down for the summer and focusing on collecting the congregation's favorite hymns for the summer. She also noted that she was planning in case a new pianist/accompanist was not hired in time for the fall.

and laid it in the car with Bruce and hurried to the vet, praying the dog could be saved. However it was in vain, the dog died before they could get there.


