2024—The Year of Change

The year 2024 will go down as a year of change at Trinity United Methodist Church. We said goodbye to two long-time members of Trinity, brought in a new Music Director, and have seen members come and go.

As Pastor Anil has addressed from the pulpit, change is not new nor is it something to

fear. It is a part of life, both personal and corporate. In addition to changes at Trinity, the larger United Methodist Church has also been undergoing change as it and its members strive to realign and reorganize as member churches face worldwide societal change.

Trinity's Church Council continually examines what changes have been requested, are seen as necessary, and then acts on those requests. This, of course, produces change. Although most of us fear change almost as much as standing up in public and making a speech, change is something that often helps us to be better citizens and organizations better reflect the wants, desires, and needs of its

members. Change, however, must be balanced between benefits and trade-offs. In this regard the question of how to better meet the needs of Trinity's Sunday services were a focus of new business in the Church Council's September meeting (see pages 11 and 12). The discussion focused on how to better meet Trinity's educational and organizational needs by

expanding the time between the Contemporary 9:15 a.m. and Traditional 11:00 a.m. services by moving the Contemporary Service back 15 minutes and providing an hour between the two services. This will allow Sunday School sessions to have more time to explore the Bible and provide more time

for the Choir to prepare for the second service. It will also more formalize the Friendship Hour and provide a bridge between the two if the Contemporary Service runs long.

The decision was not easy, and the discussion focused on the costs and benefits of such a move. Ultimately, the decision to move the Contemporary Service back 15 minutes was approved unanimously. More to come.

Beginning Sunday, November 3rd, the 9:15 *Contemporary Service* meets from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.



Ingenuity

The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah—1 Kings 17:16

Ingenuity. One word that aptly describes the Methodist movement of the eighteenth century. The photo below was taken from the upper level of The New Room in Bristol, United Kingdom. A port city near Wales, Bristol served as the planetary launching point for Methodism. From this room, the very first Methodist ministers were called and sent to the colonies in America!

Note the simplicity here, nothing ornate or frivolous. The boxy pews in the background aren't even original: During Wesley's day, everyone sat on benches.

This is where Methodism's ingenuity comes in:


The New Room, like many other Methodist Centers in England, was designed and built with multiple purposes: One configuration would serve for worship and preaching. Move the benches around and the room could be used for small or large gatherings, education, food ministries, medicinal dispensaries, and the like. One room, low overhead, endless configurations for ministry!

The spiritual power of the space, however, is expressed by the people within. In the story of Elijah and the Widow of Zarephath, both

survive a terrible famine by sharing what they have—the widow a little flour and oil, and Elijah the Word of God. By faithfully sharing what they have, their lives are transformed forever. Our Methodist ancestors used the New Room to build each other up in faith, and then pooled their resources to further the Gospel. How might we do likewise?

God has blessed us all with essential gifts, talents, and resources. We have a wonderful set of sacred spaces here at Trinity! We have our scriptures, our peculiar Methodist Way of Doing things, and we always have God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit with us! Let's employ our ingenuity and our "can do" American Spirit to launch the United Methodist Church into the rest of this Century and beyond!

As always, our mission is to bring people to Jesus to help transform our world. What an important role that is!




Family Fun Fall Festival! November 2, 2024, from 2 p.m. - 5 p.m.

Devotional on Psalm 139 NKJV¹

O Lord, You have searched me and known me. ² You know my sitting down and my rising up; You understand my thoughts afar off. ³ You comprehend my path and my lying down and are acquainted with all my ways.

⁴ For there is not a word on my tongue, but behold, O Lord, You know it altogether. ⁵ You have ^[b]hedged me behind and before and laid Your hand upon me. ⁶ Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; It is high, I cannot attain it.

When I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth.

When I awake, I am still with You. 19 Oh, that You would slay the wicked, O God!

Depart from me, therefore, you bloodthirsty men. ²⁰ For they speak against You wickedly; Your enemies take Your name in vain. ²¹ Do I not hate them, O Lord, who hates You? And do I not loathe those who rise up against You?

²²I hate them with perfect hatred; I count them my enemies. ²³ Search me, O God, and know my heart; Try me, and know my anxieties; ²⁴ And see if there is any wicked way in me and lead me in the way everlasting.

Reflection:

Psalm 139 is a powerful and personal declaration of God's intimate involvement in our lives. The psalmist, David, acknowledges that God has "searched" and "known" him. This isn't casual or distant knowledge, but a profound and detailed understanding of every aspect of his being.

God's Deep Knowledge:

Verses 1-4 remind us that God's knowledge of us is not limited to the surface. He knows our actions ("sitting down and rising up"), our thoughts, and even the words we are about to speak before they leave our lips. This is a reminder that nothing about us is hidden from God; He understands us better than we understand ourselves.

This realization can bring great comfort. We don't have to explain ourselves to God or hide our true feelings. He already knows. In moments of confusion or doubt, when we feel misunderstood by others, we can take refuge in the fact that God understands us perfectly.

God's Constant Presence:

In verses 7-10, David reflects on the omnipresence of God:

Where can I go from Your Spirit? Or where can I flee from Your presence? If I ascend into heaven, You are there; If I make my bed in hell, behold, You are there. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there Your hand shall lead me, And Your right hand shall hold me.

These verses emphasize that there is nowhere we can go to escape God's presence. Whether we are at the highest point of joy or the lowest depth of despair, God is there with us. His presence is a source of comfort and guidance, no matter where we find ourselves in life.

God's Purposeful Creation:

One of the most touching parts of the Psalm is in verses 13-16:

"For You formed my inward parts; You covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; Marvelous are Your works, and that my soul knows very well. My frame was not hidden from You, When I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth. Your eyes saw my substance, being yet unformed. And in Your book, they all were written, the days fashioned for me, when as yet there were none of them.

These verses remind us that we are not accidents or afterthoughts. We were skillfully and wonderfully made by God. Every detail of our lives was carefully planned before we were even born. This truth should fill us with a deep sense of purpose and value. We are loved and cherished by the Creator of the universe.

Response:

As we meditate on Psalm 139, we are invited to respond in worship and trust. Worship, because God's knowledge, presence, and creative power are awe-inspiring. Trust, because the One who knows us so well and is always with us has a perfect plan for our lives.

We can also pray like David does in verses 23-24:


Search me, O God, and know my heart; Try me, and know my anxieties; And see if there is any wicked way in me and lead me in the way everlasting.



Methodist Men

Trinity's Methodist Men met on Saturday, October 7th, for their monthly breakfast meeting, devotional, prayers, and discussion of TUMC's activities. Archie Satchell led with a devotion on Psalm 139 and prayer (see pages 6–7). Don Frye reported on a letter sent to Martin County Fire and Police inviting them to TUMC's pancake breakfast as our guests and Treasurer Jim Williams reported a healthy finance balance. Barry Brunner then informed the group that Ed Miller was donating a 6000Kw generator to Trinity, which will be used at the Easter Sunrise Service and other events.

Rich Deininger then spoke on his career in the military, police department, and his work with the United Nations with the International Police Task Force training police in Bosnia. He spoke of the differences and problems communicating with training local police in Serbia, Croatia, and Herzegovina as three states with differing religions. Rich has a collage of his times with the International Police Task Force hanging in Fellowship Hall.

 tenth of your spices—mint, dill and cumin. But you have neglected the more important
 matters of the law—justice, mercy and faithfulness. You should have practiced the latter,
 without neglecting the former.
- Luke 18:7: And will not God bring about justice for his chosen ones, who cry out to him day and night? Will he keep putting them off?
- John 7:51: "Does our law condemn a man without first hearing him to find out what he has been doing?"



God's Important Messages about Fairness/Justice:

The most important behaviors that impede justice among children have to do with them observing the outer person rather than looking for the inner one. They may show favoritism to people with a certain appearance or set of belongings. God wants them to look with their hearts.

Church Council

Trinity's Church Council met on Sunday afternoon, September 15th, to discuss matters of concern to the church, hear committee reports and recommendations, and act on motions brought before it. The meeting was opened with prayer by John Gear at 12:30 p.m. and the July 2024 meeting minutes were accepted.

Trustees: Levi Miller (and later Doug Evans) reported for the Trustees on campus and physical plant work. He noted that several projects—window leaks, rain gutters, office door replacement, two flag poles, and second floor blinds—were either completed or in

progress. New projects include enhancing sound for the hard of hearing, consolidating FPL accounts to save on charges, and changing the timers on parking lot lighting. The timer scheduling will not impact on building security during the night. Finally, it was noted that thanks to Nancy Burnett the Narthex prayer room had been redecorated.

Finance: Dale Forbes and Jim Williams reported that Trinity's finances were in good shape and that the 2023 financial audit should be completed soon. Finance is working on the 2025 budget and is seeking committee financial reports. Jim then reported on the upcoming stewardship campaign to begin in the fall months.

Council Chair: Barry Brunner focused on exploring community outreach ways and means and noted that stewardship both in terms of time and talent and financial are continuing needs.

Congregational Care: Rick Decker followed up on the earlier stewardship discussions, noting that outreach is becoming critical to Trinity's mission. He noted that the Fall Festival would be held on November 2nd and the *Flea Market* and *Pancake Breakfast* would be held on November 11th. Movie night will be held on October 18th and a possible Christmas Party in December.

Lay Delegate to Annual Conference: Sue Nance reported on the Line Dancers donation to *Blessings in a Bag* and said a beginning line dancing group could be established if there was enough interest.

Nominating Committee: Pastor Anil announced that the committee has a partial working list of congregational members for various committees and will probably need to fill six committee positions.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Anil reported on Sunday service attendance (summer average was 138) and led discussion on how to help younger visitors with such things as a baby room and young child toys to allow younger families to worship without fear of creating too much noise. He also reported that the 9:15 a.m. Contemporary Service was now being aired to the community and thanked Austin Parriott and Michael Fields for getting this done.

Music Director's Report: Cynthia Beam reported that the Choir is up-and-running and that plans were already in progress for the Christmas season.

Priscilla Circle: Pat Williams reported on outreach where 935 pounds of food were donated to *House of Hope* and whole milk was being funded by the Circle for *Blessings in a Bag*, new officers were elected, and the *Craft Sale* will be held on November 30th.

Men's Ministry: Barry Brunner reported that the Men's breakfast heard from Rich Deininger on his experiences serving with the United Nations in Serbia, Croatia, and Herzegovina. He announced that Ed Miller has donated a 6Kw generator to Trinity. (Continued on page 11)




Family Promise: Doug Evans reported a family was now in residence on the 2nd floor.

Newsletter: Don Stacks reminded the Trustees that the deadline for *Newsletter* submissions is the 16th of the month.

New Business: Discussion focused on possibly moving the 9:15 a.m. Celebration Service back 15 minutes to run from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m., with the 11:00 a.m. Traditional Service following Fellowship Hour and Sunday School classes. After discussion, Jim Williams moved that the Trustees approve the time change for the Celebration Service from 9:15 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. Levi Miller seconded the motion, and it was passed unanimously. The starting date for the change will be *November 3rd*. Cynthia Beam then asked if online memberships were a possibility. Pastor Anil will check to see if it would be permissible and report back.

Pastor Anil closed the meeting with prayer at 2:22 p.m.






Meet Dale Forbes



One way these folks raise funds is to have local artists participate in a calendar. Several of these artists will show their works at Trinity in October.



How Much Do You Know about Election Day?

In 2024 election day is Tuesday November 5th. On this day, citizens cast ballots to select public officials, from local to national government. Presidential elections are held every four years, in years divisible by four. Elections to the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate are held every two years. Local officials can be voted into office any year that is designated by the state.

Some history on election day. The first election was held on January 7th, 1789, the electors were chosen for the first US presidential election. George Washington was elected president on February 4th. He ran against, John Adams, George Clinton, Thomas Jefferson, and Aaron Burr; he won unanimously. By an Act of Congress on



January 23rd, 1845, the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November was designated Election Day for future presidential elections. Back then, we were more of an agricultural society and November was considered a good time for elections because the busy harvest season was coming to a close. Many country folks had to travel quite a long way to get to a polling station, so it made sense to hold elections on a Tuesday. This avoided religious holidays as well.

Before 1845, the states could hold presidential elections within a 34-day period and then send their electors to the Electoral College. However, this became problematic as communications and transportation evolved because states that voted earlier could influence states that voted later (not unlike earlier time zones versus later time zones today).

The first same day election day took place on November 7th, 1848. Whig party candidate Zachary Taylor won out over Democrat Lewis Cass and free-soil candidate (and former president) Martin van Buren. Taylor's running mate was Millard Fillmore, who became the nation's 13th president on July 10th, 1850, upon Taylor's untimely death.


