Uneasy Evangelism?

You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden.—Matthew 5:14

Evangelism, the act of sharing one's faith with others, is central to many religious traditions, but it frequently makes people uneasy. According to my research, this discomfort and uneasiness may stem from several factors—social, cultural, and personal.

To some, evangelism can feel intrusive. For many of us, religion is a private matter, and discussing it openly, especially with strangers, may feel like you are crossing social boundaries. People report that they fear they will be perceived as pushy, judgmental, or disrespectful of another's beliefs. Last month we looked at the differences between evangelism and proselytism. In pluralistic contexts, where diverse worldviews try to coexist, evangelism may be seen as an attempt to impose one's perspective on others as proselytizing rather than engaging in discussion.

Effective communication requires that we understand many aspects of religion that differ even among protestants. Most of us have read the *Bible* and even studied it, but many individuals feel unprepared or unqualified enough to engage in evangelism. We



worry about not having the "right" answers to difficult questions, not having studied the scriptures in great depth or understanding how the translation of a word changes meanings interpreted from the text. We often doubt our own spiritual maturity. This lack of confidence leads to anxiety about misrepresenting their faith or being rejected.

Negative cultural associations often associated with evangelism heighten discomfort. In recent decades, some forms of aggressive or politically charged evangelism have left lasting impressions. For many, the evangelism conjures images of televangelists, street preachers, or manipulative tactics, making even well-intentioned efforts feel suspect.

As with any fear of speaking, fear of rejection plays a major role. Sharing faith involves vulnerability, and we may worry that relationships will be strained if the other person reacts negatively.

Our uneasiness with evangelism arises from social expectations, personal insecurity, negative stereotypes, *and* relational risks. Overcoming this unease often requires reframing evangelism not as coercion, but as *authentic dialogue* grounded in respect and compassion. *Don Stacks*

Bread for All: Reflecting on World Communion Sunday

Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread.—1 Corinthians 10:17



The sand on the beach had this gorgeous reddish hue. It reminded me of the soft red clay we trod as we built two brick houses in a village near Kumasi, Ghana. The clay felt like I was walking on a cushion.

Exhausted from seven days of mixing cement, laying brick, and smoothing out the red clay floors, our group from Christ Church United Methodist in New York boarded a bus headed for Cape Coast for some well-deserved rest and exploration.

That Sunday morning, our group gathered to worship on the beach. As it was the first Sunday, we planned to share communion. Nineteen of us formed a square on the sand. We sang hymns, heard scripture, and our Pastor offered a devotion about our experience. Then, we prepared to share the Bread and the Cup.

Silently, two boys, not older than seven or eight, barefoot and dressed in shorts and loose-fitting shirts, joined our group and held our hands. I'm not sure they understood English, and none of us spoke Fante, the primary language in that part of Ghana.



But when we began passing the bread and cup between us, the boys seemed to know exactly what to do! I'll always treasure the sight of these two boys, whom we'd just met, uniting with us in Christ Jesus in a way that transcended nationality, language, culture, and color.

We never saw each other again. I wonder if they remember us, nearly twenty years later?

Every time we celebrate the Lord's Supper, we do so alongside faithful people who live all over our tiny blue planet. Our connection in Christ spans not only distance but

time—we celebrate alongside everyone who has believed, who believes now, and who ever will believe until Christ returns! Talk about a taste of eternal life!

When we next partake of the Lord's Supper together, let's envision ourselves sharing Christ's Body and Blood with people who seem completely foreign to us.

May we finally realize that we have more in common than we could have ever imagined!

had never considered the ancient art of Tai Chi until recently when Trinity United Methodist Church of Jensen Beach offered the opportunity to try "Tai Chi Ruler for Better Balance".


Though I began with some trepidation, the desire to learn a new form of exercise and the prospect of improving my balance helped me take the first step. From the initial session, the excellent instructor, Jessica Roberts put everyone in the class at ease, and we practiced some of the simple Tai Chi forms in a stress-free environment. No one had to execute the moves perfectly and we could proceed according to our own abilities.

I am so happy that I decided to try because after only a few weeks I noticed several fascinating benefits. I've learned that Tai Chi is deeply rooted in Chinese philosophy emphasizing balance, harmony, and the integration of mind and body. As I continue even my rudimentary practicing, I do realize that there's more going on than simple physical exercise. It's like "moving meditation" and I'm feeling something almost mystical as we do the slow deliberate movements and deep breathing. And yes, I do feel more grounded both during and after practice.


Tai Chi also affords a sense of community as we execute the forms as a group. Jessica emphasizes this at the end of each session.


Let's Invite Someone to Church!

C eptember and October begin a new season in church as we move into our Choir returning, the concert season, liturgical happenings, Pancake Breakfasts...

It is a great time to launch an *Invite-a-Friend Campaign*, and be ready to share Trinity and it's message, music, and ministries with our community.

Did you get into a conversation in a grocery store line? Wouldn't it be great to be able to give a personal invitation and an invitation card with service times and

other church information? When you carry a few cards with you, it's easy to invite people. What's our mission? To create disciples of Jesus Christ to transform the world. Do you think this world needs





change?

Inviting someone to church doesn't have to feel awkward, it can actually be as natural as inviting a friend to coffee or a family gathering. At the end of the day, it's just about sharing something that matters to you and offering a place where others can feel at home.

Ask God to show you who might be needing encouragement or community right now. Sometimes the person you least expect is the one who's been hoping for an invite.

Inviting others to Trinity also helps to share why *you* love your church. Maybe it's the music, the friendly people, or how

the pastor's message always seems to connect with everyday life. Whatever it is, tell your story; people respond to authenticity.

Don't forget to offer practical help, too. For someone new, even walking into the building can feel intimidating. Offer to pick them up, meet them at the door, or save them a seat. Those little gestures can make a world of difference.

And here's the important part: don't worry about the outcome. You're not trying to "convince" anyone—you're simply opening the door. Even if they don't come right away, your invitation shows them they're cared for and welcome.

Inviting someone to church is really just an act of love. You're saying, "There's a place where you belong, and I'd love to share it with you." And who knows? That one invitation might just change a life.

ZEPHANIAH, ZECHARIAH & JOEL

These three Minor Prophets are grouped together because they have something in common: All three alluded to the End Times, which many people believe we are living in. They prophesied about other things as well. Joel is an unusual book in that there is no reference to when he prophesied. Hence, many of the things he said could relate to the invasions of Israel in 722 BC or Judah in 586 BC. They could also relate to the destruction of the temple that happened in 70 AD. Or he could be referencing things going on today. Joel's order is #2 in the Minor Prophets. Zephaniah is #9. Zechariah is #11.

1.	. The prophet Zephaniah (Zef-uh-NUY-yuh) is famous for mentioning "the Day of the Lord" often, which is usually a reference to the Second Coming or the end of time. Zephaniah 1:7 tells us something about that day.	
2.	 Zephaniah 1:12 warns us about being this thing, which is like not caring, being lukewarm, or thinking you can get away with bad behavior. 	
3.	3. Zechariah (Zek-uh- RUY-yuh) talks also about the time of Christ. Zechariah 9:9 prophesies about Palm Sunday by saying the Messiah would enter Jerusalem in this way.	
4.	4. Zephaniah and Zechariah are entirely different prophets! Zephaniah prophesied around 100 years earlier. See if you can say their names above to hear the differences. Here is how they are alike: Both spoke about the Second Coming. Zechariah spoke of the New Jerusalem. He said people and animals would walk together and there would be none of these. (Zechariah 2:1-4)	
5.	5. The prophet Joel spoke a famous verse which was quoted at Pentecost. It said that God's sons and daughters would do this thing. (Joel 2:28)

Methodist Men

Trinity United Methodist Church's Methodist Men met for breakfast and fellowship on September 6, 2025, at 8:00 a.m. Twenty-one people attended the meeting, 19 males and 2 females, and enjoyed an environment of learning and fun.

Don Frye called the business part of the meeting to order at 8:21 a.m. He noted that the group had a very successful last year and that the men would be planning for another successful year.



Archie Satchell presented a devotion on Psalm 16, the Song of David, relating how the chapter and verses reflected on today's environment and Trinity. He followed his devotion with prayer.

Treasurer Jim Williams then told the group that it was in good financial condition. He reported a balance of \$2,809.31 in the Men's account, with costs associated with the Labor Day Picnic yet to be included.

Don F. expanded on the Labor Day Picnic, noting that 100 or so attended the picnic and that he was proud of the work that seven of the men and women did to make the event work so smoothly. Discussion was then focused on improving traffic flow by moving the condiment table away from the serving area and allowing for both table sides to be used, thus reducing the backup when picnickers were fixing their hamburgers and hot dogs. A shoutout to Rich Dampf was made for his continued work before, during, and after the picnic.

Don F. then introduced John Gear and George Burkhardt as new members to the Men's Ministry. George provided some background on his career and why he has been attending Trinity. This led to a discussion of maintenance of the property and the HVAC ducts that George and Rich found needing cleaning. Sam Rhodes noted that they had never been cleaned and probably should be. After discussion, Barry Brunner said that the Trustees had already approved getting the ducts cleaned.

Don F. then discussed the next Pancake Breakfast would be November 8th and that the "Hanging of the Greens" was coming up. Rick Decker suggested that November 23rd would be the best date and that maybe the Men and Priscilla Circle could work together and possibly share in pizza after the work was done. Don Stacks then notified the group that Priscilla Circle was looking into reintroducing having poinsettias in the sanctuary for Christmas. Several members voiced support for the idea. Don F. also noted that the new coffee pot had been ordered but had not shown up. It will be needed for the next Pancake Breakfast.

Barry then asked to give a "bravo" to the Trustees for updating facilities and discussion focused on second floor rooms that needed work to be usable. One room is piled with junk and old paper and it needs to be cleaned out and mold and mildew eliminated. It was noted that pool table was also there and might be updated and used as a recreational area for members. Brent Rasmussen thanked George and Rich for working on improving Trinity's facilities.

Don S. asked for email address updates to maintain the group's email folder. Don F. announced that Darryl Baker would present the October devotional.

Prior to concluding the meeting, Don F. and Joyce Monticelli raffled off a prize. Glenn Kunkle won the drawing for a smokeless grill. Finally, Joyce announced she would like to do another Men's breakfast; after discussion it was decided she would do the November breakfast.

With no other business to be conducted, Pastor Anil closed the meeting with prayer at 9:14 a.m.

Recipe of the Month: Al's Pancakes





Ingredients

- 2 c. flour
- 3 Tbsp. baking powder
- 3 Tbsp. sugar
- ½ tsp. salt
- 4½ Tbsp. Canola oil
- 2 eggs
- 1 c. milk (add more if batter is too thick)

Directions

- Mix flour, baking powder, and salt together.
- In a separate bowl, mix oil, eggs, and milk.
- Mix well and blend in dry ingredients.
- (Add blueberries or other fruit at this point)
- Use ¼ cup scoop/measuring cup to drop pancake batter onto heated griddle.

God's Important Messages about Mercy:

Mercy and justice are seen as types of opposites in the Bible. The Old Testament focuses on justice (an eye for an eye); however, Jesus changed the world with his messages of mercy (forgive 70 times seven times). Children will often try to seek justice on their own. Hence messages of "revenge is mine, says the Lord" should be given often.





BIBLE STORIES SHOWING MERCY:

- 1 Samuel 24 tells the story of David sparing King Saul's life. Saul had been hunting David and trying to kill him for years. When David finally had the opportunity to kill Saul, he didn't.
- Joseph had profound mercy on his 10 brothers after they sold him into slavery. Years later
 when he recognized them, he gave them land and food and much of his kingdom. The story
 begins in Genesis 37 and threads through to the end of the book.
