Understanding Biblical Virtue(s)

What is a virtue and why are virtues important in understanding our relationship with God, society, and others? *Virtue* is often defined in several ways. It can be approached as morality or as a way of conducting our lives. It can be seen as strength or courage. Virtue may be defined in terms of a commendable quality or trait. It also can be seen as a capacity to take action in accordance with some defined end goal. And, virtue, when used in the plural, defines a hierarchy or order of things.

What virtues does the Bible advance—both in terms of a way of life and in terms of the *actions* we should strive for? Virtues and discussions of them are found throughout the Bible. Some virtue emphases change over time, especially looked at from an Old Testament and a New Testament perspective. *Love* and *faith*, although found throughout the Bible, are emphasized more in the New Testament but are laid as foundational virtues early in the Old Testament. It has been suggested that there are many values to be found in the Bible; we will look at twenty prominent virtues found across both the Old and New Testaments. Can you name five off the top of your head (not including the two already stated)? What Biblical passages provide examples of their use?

Newsletter readers already know we are covering the Bible chapter monthly, chapter by chapter, from the Genesis to Revelation. Beginning in the May issue we are adding a series on *virtues* over the next twenty months to our Christian education curriculum. As with our coverage of biblical chapters, each month we will cover one of twenty virtues as found in the Bible, scriptural examples of each, and an interpretation of use over time. Elsewhere in the *Newsletter* will be a worksheet to help drive home what was presented earlier.

We hope that you will find this addition a valuable experience in your continuing Christian education and will be able to use this knowledge in your understanding of virtue in daily life.

Love this final verse in John's Gospel. In his very last words to us, John tells us that there is so much more to our Lord and Savior than has been written. And then think of what's to come! There is so much more to the Salvation Story than meets the eye!


From the Media Department







TUMC's Finance Committee

The Finance Committee at Trinity is composed of volunteers who, by virtue ▲ of other leadership responsibilities, link the committee to other areas of congregational life.

The committee's basic activities include overseeing stewardship, compiling a budget annually, raising sufficient income to meet the budget, administering funds received by the church, disbursing funds, counting and depositing offerings, establishing internal control polices, recommending proper depositories for church funds, using contributions in accordance with donor intent and providing an



annual audit of church's financial statements. Quite a list of responsibilities! Each year Trinity's ministry teams prepare and submit their annual budget requests. A budget that reflects the mission of the church to "make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the

world." The total church budget is reviewed and approved by the Finance Committee and presented to the Church Council for final approval. Once approved, each ministry team then implements their programs throughout the year. The committee reports the status of the church's financial picture to the Church Council each

month. They also meet quarterly to discuss, review, and approve both budgeted and unbudgeted expenses.

The Finance Committee works closely with the Trustees who are charged with maintaining the church's physical plant. The recent parking lot repaving is an example of teamwork within both committees. A fundraising campaign was announced which resulted in a sizable level of donations which enabled the project to be completed in a timely manner.

Other projects underway in 2024 include window replacement in the Fellowship Hall, upgrades to the fire alarm/phone system with a dedicated prayer line, and skylight upgrades in the Sanctuary. These projects have received generous donations.

Trinity's financial picture is extremely positive. We recently received a letter from our Bishop, Tom Berlin, thanking the church for paying 100% of our 2023 apportionments. We are truly blessed with dedicated members of the congregation who pledge their support of the church's ministry through generous giving. Each of our gifts make a difference in people's lives and enables Trinity UMC to continue to be a beacon of faith, hope, and love in our community. Thanks to each of you for making this possible.

From the Music Program

Meet Donna Ross

Editor's note: One of the goals of the Trinity United Methodist Church's Newsletter is to let members get to know others better. This article is an interview with Choir member Donna Ross conducted by our Music Director, Joyce Grubb.

Why is music important to you?

Wusic is my lifeline to my Creator and Savior. Without music, I would not be anything or anyone. Music helps me to remember scripture as I talk with God. Yes, that's it. He walks with me and talks with me through music. He really reminds me that I am not alone, and He loves me especially when I don't feel loved, or I feel overwhelmed.



Music has been an intricate part of my life for as long as I can remember. Our mom was a pianist for many churches during our years of growing up and until God called her home at the wonderful age of 93. She was a single mom of 5 rambunctious children as she tried to plant and nurture good habits and an upbringing that would reflect her faith in God. That was not easy as we were slated to be less than nobody by family members, neighbors, etc. because we were poor in material things and lived in Dunbar Village Project Housing. Little did they know just how rich were in our Father's eyes!

How does it affect your life?

Life was hard, but God always provided what we need in His time (something that was very difficult to understand in the early years). However, as I look back it was very timely when our needs were met. Even in my younger years, I always felt a special bond with the Lord as I sang in the church choirs and as a family with my mom singing and playing the piano and my sister, brother, and me accompanying her vocally. I would even learn the "grown up" songs when she took us with her to rehearse the choirs in the evenings. There was no such thing as a babysitter for us. Mom couldn't afford such a luxury. When my brothers left home, I became the babysitter of my younger sister and brother.

Music helps me stay focused on the important things in this life as I strive to do what is pleasing and right in the sight of God. Sometimes I feel like I am such a failure. Yet, music reminds me of my humanness and that I can't do this alone. I must rely on the words of the scriptures written in the music. Now, many of the lessons Mom taught come back to comfort me in the music I hear and sing. I am so grateful, humbled, and blessed to have been given such a great gift that has been nurtured so well by not only Mom, but in all my uncles and aunts. They, too, possessed and shared their gift of music with me and my siblings. My sister and I remain very active in music as we sing in the church choirs, together as a duet, and as soloists when the opportunity presents itself.

What got you started in church music?

Mom. We were her back-up when the choir members didn't show up and/or didn't want to sing. She was stuck either singing all of it by herself or teaching us to sing with her. I saw first-hand how some "Christian folks" really behaved even though they claimed they knew the Lord intimately and swore they were going to heaven anyhow! Wow! That brought back a memory. But I digress. . She also exposed us to different types of music from various faiths; Baptist, Seventh Day Adventist, COGIC, etc.

Are there any special ways in which music has blessed you and drawn you closer to God?

During my school years, I also learned about various types of music beside Christian/Religious. Not only gospel, spirituals, and anthems but jazz (love it), rhythm and blues, sonnets, big band, and many more. My youngest is trying to get me into rap. Some of it is ok, but I'm old school. As my knowledge of the Lord increased and my faith grew, I realized how blessed I was as God watched over me all the days of my life thus far. I have overcome may obstacles, not on my own, but by God's grace and mercy. I spent the beginning of my return time to the Lord after my separation and divorce from my now deceased husband. When we were first married, I wanted to be grown up and didn't see a need to regularly attend church. When I did, I sat in the back and did not participate. I knew better but I had to be convinced by God to get myself back where I belonged. Through many dangers, toils, snares, and then abundant blessings, I returned to my Creator. He was waiting with open arms. I have learned to praise Him openly no matter who says to be quiet. My worship is *not* to ask for something but to *thank Him* for all he has done constantly, for myself, my family, and loved ones.

The Lord has blessed me to be able to sing in many venues as part of church choirs and groups. Presently, aside from the honor of being a member of our church Praise Team and Choir, I am a member of the Ebony Chorale of the Palm Beaches. By God's grace we have traveled to many places spreading the good news of the Father, both in this country and overseas. Such places as Michigan, California, the Kennedy Center in Washington DC, as well as traveling to Ghana and Cape Town in Africa, Verona, Italy, and Austria, just to name a few. 



OVERVIEW

Second Samuel covers the reign of King David, who became known as the first good king of Israel. (There were only a few good kings!) The first half of the book shows David as an excellent warrior and leader who also is compassionate to the sick and poor and tries to follow God's will. The second half shows David facing tribulation, including a bout with adultery and many serious family issues.

Saul had a son **JONATHAN**, who was best **FRIENDS** with David (1:12)

MEPHIBOSHETH was the handicapped son of Jonathan who was given land by David (9:9-10)

Consider the Hug

In our busy and modern world there is one unexpected soul elixir that might rival the others and that would be the human hug. Although medical doctors may not agree with that, those doctors that work in the therapy profession are famous for saying "we need four hugs a day for survival. We need eight hugs a day for maintenance. We need 12 hugs a day for growth." Even hugging a pet or stuffed animal can lower blood pressure, take the edge off pain, and curb the effects of certain pro-inflammatory cytokines.




During a hug, preferably the 20-second variety, we can experience a drop in anxiety thanks to a decrease in the stress hormone cortisol and a friendly burst of the bonding hormone oxytocin. Hugging our spouse, a friend, or someone after church can ward off the common cold and help us feel less alone in a big world. Hugging is a language unto itself, showing others that they matter. Too often, we postpone physical contact, rushing out the door on the way to work. Couples sometimes reserve embraces only as a prelude to intimacy. Children can be deprived of hugs because of generational and cultural reservation. In the end, most of us don't have enough healthy, non-sexual touch, which can contribute to loneliness, depression, and feelings of separateness. Whether we are born huggers or hugphobic and warming up to the practice, lifting our arms to express affection or support another person can prove that there are safe places indeed.

Here are a few suggestions to add hugs to the day.

- 1. Compose "hug certificates" and put them in someone's birthday card to use throughout the year.
- 2. Hug a pillow when alone and surrender to the safe-place feeling.
- 3. Give a child a hug before and after school, after a job well done, or just because.
- 4. Schedule two hugs a day with a partner and make sure they each are at least 20 seconds in duration.
- 5. To respect possible past trauma around touch, ask someone if it's okay to give them a hug. Remember to always be kind; after you receive a hug, I guarantee you will leave with a smile.
