
Get Involved with Trinity

Ever wondered how things get done at Trinity? Basically, a church is like any organization. It has a vision based on a set of values that creates its mission. To carry out the mission, however, requires many people organized into committees to drive the church's vision and values. Some committees are dictated by *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church* as permanent while others are created as *ad hoc* or established committees as needed. In almost all cases the Pastor is an *ex officio* member of each committee.


Basically, there are five established committees required by *The Book of Discipline*. These include the Church Council, the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee (PSRC, called SPRC at Trinity), the Nominations and Leadership Development Committee, the Finance Committee, the Trustees. Each committee, led by a "professing member" of the Church, focuses on specific Church needs and must demonstrate spiritual and experience skills as qualifications for the job. Trustees are responsible for Trinity's corporate, fiscal, and property needs. The Finance Committee is responsible for the annual budget, communicating about fundraising, and disbursement of funds. The Nominations Committee, led by the Pastor, seeks to find and develop Trinity's leadership. Finally, the SPRC leads the congregation, recommends staff compensation,

Trinity has several established committees (Congregational Care, Methodist Men, Music, Priscilla Circle, and Newsletter) composed with a leader and often with *ad hoc* subcommittees devoted to particular missions (Blessings in a Bag, Hooks & Needles, Line Dance, and House of Hope).

Overseeing this organizational structure is the Church Council. The Council, led by an elected member leader meets regularly to hear reports from Trinity's committees and staff members to review progress in meeting benchmarked goals and objectives. The Newsletter will provide a monthly report of the Council's meetings beginning with the April Council meeting (see page 7), as well as other established committee activities.

Can we pray a little longer? Or a little more often? Can we develop a habit of scripture reading? Or walking in prayer? Could we join our voices with our neighbors in Church when we sing, creating a shared melody? Could we take two minutes of our day to tell someone we love them?

Practicing and expressing our faith, even in the smallest ways, can have a life-changing impact on others AND ourselves! If there's something you've always wanted to try, but thought it too scary—try it! God just might surprise you!

The Work Behind The Scenes

King David's death and King Solomon's ascent to the throne are covered in this book, followed by the division of the kingdom after its first 100 years. The book contains the famous stories of the prophet Elijah and his psychological battles with King Ahab. Ahab's pagan terrorist wife Jezebel plays a central role.

Both Books of Kings cover the history of kings in Judah as well as Israel, using a back-and-forth, chronological style. So while the kings' names are listed below, their kingdoms are not; however it is very clear in the books themselves.

The remaining history of the kings plays out. Elijah becomes the second person taken up to heaven without suffering death, and then Elisha takes over as the greatest prophet. It is a very dark period, as all God predicted about kings being unfaithful, greedy, and selfish has come to pass. The only means to get the people to repent is through dual smack-downs: both kingdoms fall to invaders; only Judah repents.

Love thy Neighbor.... How Is that Accomplished in the Age of Technology?

The title is a question and this article isn't going to actually answer the question, but hopefully it will cause you to think about what technology has done to our relationships. (**Note:** this may not be a technology friendly article.)

We live in a time where technology is the norm. Just about everything we do involves technology, but at what cost? Let's delve right into it! Look around when you are out and about, or maybe even in your own house or at a family gathering, and what do you see? A bowed head and a phone in hand. Trust me, no one is praying with that bowed head, everyone is checking their messages, reading something on social media, or playing games. What they aren't doing is *talking* to each other. My daughter and I exchange a single text message every morning and we say, "Good morning, I love you!"

Some would say that's really nice, but that's it, we don't talk on the phone and when we are together very little is said because of the phone in our hands and its technology. My grandkids are at that age where technology is all they know. I recently visited them and the whole time they were on their phones. How can I show my family love when they don't even look up from their phones? If I can't show my family, how am I supposed to show my neighbor the love spoken of in the Bible?

As a Baby Boomer, I grew up in a different era, most of us at Trinity UMC grew up in a different era. A time when people reached out to people in person, made phone calls, and random visits were common practice—and not just when someone was sick. The onslaught of technology and social media has had a huge (dare I say, negative) impact on relationships. I know the "techies" will say you can express it through a message, text, email, etc., but like Don Frye's message last month about hugs and how we need them, we need to say the words "I love you" or express care and concern to people in person. *Reach out and really talk*.

Technology isolates us. It may even make us feel disconnected from humanity. Studies have shown that the lack of human contact even causes depression. Technology may even cause eyestrain and difficulty in focusing, but those are different issues; let me get back to the lack of expressions of love caused by technology. Think about it, when was the last time you just picked up a phone and called someone or when was the last time you unexpectedly visited someone or had someone visit you? We have isolated ourselves so much whether through technology or privacy issues we don't dare visit unannounced, we don't reach out and make personal connections. We live in our social media world. I would love to say it's the Millennial generation that does this, but it has crept into all of our generations.

Remember the old saying "Stop and smell the roses." We don't even see the roses nowadays! Better yet, don't just "Stop and smell the roses," why don't you pick a rose and take it to someone and share some love with them. I guess if there is an answer to the title question, it is this: lay aside technology and lift your head and heart and reach out to people the old-fashioned way, in person!

Church Council

[Editor's Note: As part of our communication plan, the *Newsletter* will begin reporting to the congregation the activities of TUMC's Church Council. According to the *Book of Discipline*, "The **church council** shall provide for planning and implementing a program of nurture, outreach, witness, and resources in the local church. It shall also provide for the administration of its organization and temporal life. It shall envision, plan, implement, and annually evaluate the mission and ministry of the church. The church council shall be amenable to and function as the administrative agency of the charge conference" (¶ 244).]

Trinity United Methodist Church's church council met on April 21st at 3:00 p.m. to review current and future implementation of the various programs and departments of the church. After opening with prayer, the previous meeting's minutes were approved, and the Council turned to hearing reports from the Facilities and Financial Committees.

Facilities. Doug Evans, Director of Facilities, reported several projects were in various stages of approval and implementation, with the focus on eliminating some window leakage, remote control of building thermostats and window tinting of the Memorial Garden windows to reduce energy consumption. He also noted that under the new communication contract internet speed has been increased to 250 MPS.

Finance. Jim Williams and Dale Forbes reported on financials, noting that as per normal practice TUMC has started paying its apportionment fees, paid the first insurance installment, and that finances obtained a net gain for the month. They also noted a need for additional committee members and asked the Nomination Committee to begin the process identifying potential members.

Staff/Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC). Jennifer Baker reported on Martin County's Scholarship Night and noted that thousands of dollars of scholarships were awarded. She also informed the committee that Joyce and John Grubb will be leaving TUMC at the end of June (see notice on page 2). A search committee is being formed to find a new Director of Music and someone with the skills to replace John's contributions.

Council Chair. Barry Brunner reported the Easter Sunrise Service went off without incident and estimated between 1,500 and 1,700 people attended.

Lay Delegate to Annual Conference. Sue Nance reported on outreach into the local community to grow the church, noting the Line Dancers as an example growing the congregation by creating events that interest the local community.

Pastor's Report. The pastor reviewed and commented on data regarding attendance and other benchmarks.

Congregational Care. Rick Decker reported that the Prayer Line is now up and ready to be announced on the first Monday in May (prayer line number: 772-334-3411). He also reported the creation of a missing member postcard that will be used to maintain contact with members who miss services.

Priscilla's Circle. The Tea and Fashion Show is sold out.

Methodist Men. Don Frye reported on the Easter Sunrise Service and working on a way to restart the Chili Cookoff next year. He noted the next meeting will be May 4th.

Communication. Randi Schwartz reported approval by the Trustees to begin a "Food Forrest" on the TUMC campus, tied to the herb garden at Wesley's home.

Administrative. Anne Pappas reported that the 2025 Sunrise Service application has been submitted and approved. She also reported attending a membership class and will be implementing some new ideas from that class.

Adjournment. The meeting was adjourned at 4:18 p.m. with prayer.

What Is the Story Behind Our Celebrating Mother's Day?

Mother's Day was not initiated by women wanting breakfast in bed or some pampering for a day. It was a day that Anna Jarvis worked very hard to be recognized for her own mom. Her Mother, Mama Jarvis, also known as Ann Reeves Jarvis, cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the Civil War. At the conclusion of this conflict, she organized a "Mothers' Friendship Day", the goal of which was to foster reconciliation between former Union and Confederate soldiers by having them come together along with mothers from both sides.

At about the same time Ann Reeves Jarvis was working with mothers in the spirit of peace, Julia Ward Howe, another activist as well as abolitionist and suffragette, worked to have June 2nd be celebrated as Mother's Peace Day. Together they wrote a Mother's Day Proclamation calling on mothers to work toward world peace.

These two women and others were responsible precursors to Mother's Day in our culture. However, celebrations of motherhood go back deeper than that. Celebrations sometimes involved worship of a mother deity, such as the Goddess Isis in Ancient Egypt, or Cybele and Rhea in Ancient Greece. In other cases, celebrations were only tangentially about mothers: Mothering Sunday in the United Kingdom, for example, was originally dedicated to the "Mother Church," but was later broadened to honor human mothers, too.

Around the world, Mother's Day is celebrated in various ways and on different dates throughout the year. Proof of the impact of Anna Jarvis is the fact that many countries now observe the holiday on the same day as the United States.

The origin of Mother's Day as we know it began in the early 1900s. When Anna Jarvis' Mother died in 1905, she started a campaign for this official holiday to honor mothers. The first larger scale celebration of the holiday was in 1908, when Jarvis held a public memorial for her mother in her hometown of Grafton, West Virginia. Jarvis continued to push for formal recognition of the holiday and finally in 1914 President Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation making Mother's Day an official holiday to take place the second Sunday of May.

The Priscilla Circle Sisters wish to recognize and honor all mothers in our congregation on Sunday, May 12, 2024, by providing red and/or white carnations following each service. We recognize each of you for the important contributions you make to our Church family and this community. Continue your efforts to spread God's love and peace on a daily basis. God's Important Messages about Faith:








OVERVIEW

The Book of 1 Kings continues the stories that began in 1 and 2 Samuel. First Kings covers the reign of David's son, King Solomon, until his death in chapter 11. Following, Solomon's son Rehoboam causes an uproar when he increases taxes against the request of the people and the advice of elders. The kingdom splits into two and remains separate kingdoms until the Babylonian invasion and exile, around 400 years later.

The book also covers the stories of the Prophet Elijah and briefly describes whether each king did good or evil in the eyes of the Lord. Most did evil!

Second Kings covers the reigns of many kings of Israel and Judah, good and evil. It ends with the Babylonian invasion of Judah and the end of the line of kings.





The Book of 2 Kings begins where 1 Kings leaves off. Chapters 2 through 7 cover the ministry of the prophet Elisha after Elijah is taken up to heaven. Chapter 13 covers the death of Elisha.

The book covers the reigns of many kings of Israel and Judah, telling short stories about some of the most notable, good and evil. It ends with the Babylonian invasion of Judah, when Solomon's temple was destroyed.

ELIJAH was swept up to heaven in a WHIRLWIND (2:1)

ELISHA was able to keep a piece of clothing from Elijah and **DIVIDED** the river Jordan (2:14)

Elisha requested a **DOUBLE** portion of the **SPIRIT** when Elijah was taken (2:9)

Elijah multiplied the oil of a WIDOW so she could pay her debts (4:1-7)

Elijah raised a boy from the dead whose mother was a **SHUNAMMITE** (4:36)
