
Attracting Hummingbirds to your Gardens



Hummingbird

Everyone loves hummingbirds — gardeners and nongardeners alike. One way to attract hummingbirds to our gardens is to hang a feeder outside and then watch them gather as they enjoy the faux nectar. A better way to attract them is to plant flowers that provide real nectar.

Hummingbirds are our tiniest of birds, usually measuring no more than three inches long. Their primary food sources are nectar, pollen, and tree sap.





Salvia

Salvia. This is one of the hummingbird's favorite flowers. Salvia is also pleasing to gardeners, as it comes in colors ranging from blue and purple, pink

to mauve, and sometimes shades of salmon. A bonus is that they do very well in our growing zone (9b), as they thrive even in dry soil and baking hot sun.

Yarrow. Another brightly colored addition to any garden, yarrow comes in white, yellow, pink, coral, and a dusty orange. A bonus of growing yarrow is that it blooms in early summer and can last until mid-fall, depending on variety and species. Although it prefers well-drained, average soil, it has learned to be okay with our clay soil.

Butterfly bush. True to its name hummingbirds and butterflies are attracted to this colorful species, which provides thick bunches of flowers that come in bluish-purple and pink shades, and blossoms repeatedly from midsummer to fall. Butterfly bushes do well in full sunlight and are fairly drought-tolerant, although they should be well watered in the early growing stages.
