Use

You use the verb + *ing* when you talk about *liking or disliking* something.

Verb + *ing* is also used when asking about liking or disliking something

When you use the phrase '*be good at*', you follow it with a noun or the verb + *ing*.

When you use the verb '*mind*', you also follow it with verb + *ing*

	Question	Answer
<i>Like or dislike</i>	<i>Do</i> you like playing <i>ing</i> football?	No, I <i>don't like</i> playing <i>ing</i> football
	<i>Do</i> you enjoy learning <i>ing</i> the guitar?	Yes, I <i>love</i> learning <i>ing</i> the guitar
<i>Be good at</i>	Are you good at <i>sport?</i> (<i>noun</i>)	Yes, I am good at <i>sport</i>
	Are you good at swimming <i>ing</i> ?	No, I am not good at swimming <i>ing</i>
<i>Mind (as a verb)</i>	<i>Do</i> you mind working <i>ing</i> late?	No, I <i>do not mind</i> working <i>ing</i> late
	<i>Do</i> you mind spending <i>ing</i> time with us?	No, I <i>love</i> spending <i>ing</i> time with you
