

# Using *will* for future arrangements

## Use

*will* is used to talk about an arrangement which is about to happen or is in the very near future, to make a promise or to offer to do something for someone or to ask someone to do something.

The negative of *will* is *won't* (*will not*). Use *won't* when refusing to do something

## Form

*will* is a modal verb. It is followed by the infinitive of the main verb without *to*.

*will* does not change its form according to person or singular and plural.

When speaking the contracted form of *'ll* or *won't* is used

		First person	Second person	Third person
Singular	positive	<i>I'll (will) go.</i>	<i>You'll (will) go.</i>	<i>He/She'll (will) go.</i>
	negative	<i>I won't (will not) go</i>	<i>You won't go</i>	<i>He/She won't go</i>
Plural	positive	<i>We'll (will) go.</i>	<i>You'll (will) go.</i>	<i>They'll (will) go.</i>
	negative	<i>We won't go</i>	<i>You won't go</i>	<i>They won't go</i>
