Countable Nouns			
Example			
Can be counted	one house		
Can have singular and plural forms	five houses		
Use singular and plural forms	the house has a garden the houses have gardens		
Use a or an in front of them	a house		
Use not many and a few in front of them	There are not many houses There are a few houses		
Examples of countable nouns in a sentence	There are fifteen <i>apples</i> in the bowl She has seven <i>cats</i> I only have one friend		

Uncountable Nouns			
	Example		
Cannot be counted	rice		
There is only one form	rice (not rices)		
Use a singular verb	There is no rice (NOT – There are no rice)		
Use not much and a little in front of them.	There is a little rice left there is not much rice left		
Examples of uncountable nouns in a sentence	Do you have <i>sugar</i> ? <i>Information</i> is available here There is no <i>furniture</i> at home
