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authority to certify candidates during my report, but I'll ask Attorney Brewer (ph) to come to the microphone right now to --

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: No, at this point we're only talking about amending the agenda. you want to talk about the underlying merits of the motion -- of the resolution, I think it's appropriate when we get to that resolution.

Further, under the City Charter, I am the City Attorney. I don't know who Mr. Brewer is, or whether he's a city -- or an attorney, but his advice on this matter would not be appropriate, because he was not authorized to give legal advice by me.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Well, first of all, your -- as a member of this Commission, you cannot serve -- you cannot advise the Commission and be a voting member of the Commission. I've never seen that before. We have had those discussions previously that you cannot be a voting member of the Commission and also provide legal advice to that Commission. And --

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: That's absolutely inconsistent with the Charter. The Charter very specifically notes at Section 4.202 that I'll give

all legal advice with the exceptions as provided in the Charter. The Charter then, with regard to the Election Commission, names the City Attorney as sitting on the Election Commission, but does not provide an exception that would disallow me from giving legal advice to this Commission. I think it's quite standard that that would happen. And I think that there's a reason that the Charter does put our positions on this Commission by position, because it is based upon our background and experience with the City that we are appointed to this Board.

That, again, though, has nothing to do with my motion to amend the agenda.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Okay. We can take a vote on the amendment. Call the roll, please.

MS. WILLIAMS: Bawa?

certification list for certain office, because you

two have a conflict of interest. You work for one

of the people who it has been ruled is ineligible to

run. So you need to disqualify yourself.

The second thing I want to say is, the decision you make today will have an effect on our children in the future and on any future leaders that may come forth. If you certify people who broke the law, who committed a felony, and perjure themselves, then you are telling our children that they don't have to follow the rules for anything. They can do whatever they want to do and still come

1	forth and be a City leader in this community. So

guys. As a preliminary issue, I'd just like to note that Attorney Chubb's statement about his counsel to this Commission is incorrect.

Under Chapter 2 of the City Charter
4.202, commissions are not listed amongst his duties
to provide advice and counsel to. It is the
business of the City and its departments. This
Commission is an independent commission separate and
apart from the City and its departments; therefore,
this Commission is entitled to have its own separate
legal counsel for the reasons that Chairman Doyle
stated.

Beyond that, I would like to emphasize that the Supreme Court of Michigan has declared that strict compliance with the Michigan Election Law is required in all instances. Substantial compliance, partial compliance, close enough, is not the standard that is applied to Michigan Election Law. And in this case, the statute is clear, MCL 168.558 Subsection 2 regarding the affidavits of identity.

The three candidates that are challenged by Ms. Hatchett did not comply with the statute; and in the case of candidate Waterman, her non-compliance constitutes a violation of the law.

Now, just a moment about the roles and

duties of this Election Commission. The Election Commission is a body established by the Charter. And under the Charter, it has no discretion. It's ministerial duties. And its duty is to correct any errors that are to be made. There is no error in the certification of candidates made by the City Clerk. His report is clear and his recommendation is true and correct and in compliance with the law.

Each of you took an oath of office, and your oath of office was to uphold the laws of the City, and of this State. You represent the people of Pontiac, not an individual officer or not an individual candidate. And the failure to not follow the law and the clear edict of the report of the clerk is a willful neglect of office that risks criminal prosecution.

I would urge each of you to consider your oath of office to the people of Pontiac when casting your votes.

I would also like to draw the attention to a decision issued by the Court of Appeals this morning, a published decision in which they make it clear that the inclusion and exclusion of the name on the ballot is ministerial in duty, and the clerk of a city has a clear obligation and

duty to verify that an affidavit of identity is true, and to confirm that when a candidate signs that affidavit of identity, all of their campaign finance reports are up-to-date and all of their fines are due. It is a published decision --

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: That is your time. That's your time.

MR. TREBILCOCK: I appreciate that. It is a published decision and it is controlling on this body. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: So the next person on the list -- I'm sorry, I can't -- I can't read the printing. The address is on the -- Hubbard.

MR. MAXEY: Maxey.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Oh, that's you, Mr. Maxey? Okay. Bill Maxey. I'm sorry.

MR. MAXEY: Loud and clear, good afternoon, Commissioners. It's already been stated by Mattie Hatchett and her attorney. I support Mattie Hatchett. My name is not on this, however, Commissioners, did you not take the oath to uphold? Candidates, did you not take the office? You placed your hand and you were sworn in and you must rise that you had your hands on the Bible. What happened

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here with our mayor candidates is loud and clear. A false statement on the quarterly report made to Oakland County Clerk.

We have youth in this City who are moving up academically and applying -- not applying, but seeking office. They must have the truth. do we have to show them but a lie if you don't uphold it? And conflict of interest, yes, Attorney and Treasurer. It's a conflict of interest. get the same paycheck; if you do not uphold this oath, it's perjury. To let you know that the people of Pontiac are very much aware, and I'm one of the leaders here, I speak loud and clear. And many of the times we're asked, Mattie Hatchett and I and Bob Bass, and others to speak after we have talked to them. Don't think that because you violated this oath that it's in this room, please don't think It's all over Pontiac. And we know the conflict of interest. Had a meeting last night and this morning. No one gets the same paycheck. attorney and the treasurer, you're paid by, how can you say something against your boss? nevertheless, the young people are watching you. They are looking to us and we do have transparency and integrity. And to -- to not vote this as

ineligible, you are setting a pattern. You are giving an edge to our up and coming youth leaders.

Oh, yes, you got this so you can break the law. No, you can't.

So you got to be mighty careful because I was sworn in also, by a judge here in Pontiac, 50th District Court. I swore to uphold and I will do that. And any time you see Ms. Hatchett, you'll see H. Bill Maxey. We are one and all, citizens of Pontiac thinking the same. I support everything that she said.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Mr. Maxey, that's your time. That's your time.

MR. MAXEY: I'm out of time. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: The next member of the public is Tim Greimel.

MR. GREIMEL: Good afternoon,

Commissioners. I appreciate the opportunity to

speak to you this afternoon. I am here in regard to

the challenge that was filed by John Townsend. I

have set in front of each of you a packet of

information together with a supplemental stapled

packet of information. The information that I put

in front of you clearly demonstrates that I have

been a resident of Pontiac since last July, well before the deadline to be a resident, in order to be a candidate for mayor in the City. And I'd like to walk you through that information.

I would begin by noting that Mr.

Townsend's correct in one regard, which is when he states what the City Charter says. And the City Charter is very clear that in order to serve as mayor, one must be a resident of the City of Pontiac for at least one year prior to taking office.

As he also notes, the next mayor of Pontiac will take office on January 3rd of 2022. Therefore, one must have lived in City of Pontiac since at least January 3rd of 2021, January 3rd of this year, in order to become mayor of the City and to run as mayor of the City.

I moved here last July, in 2020, approximately six months before the City Charter requires. And if you look at Exhibit 1 in the packet of information that I put in front of you, it is the complete lease with confidential information redacted, but it's the lease with all relevant dates. And you can see that I moved into my place in Pontiac in July of 2020.

If you look at Exhibit 2, in the

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packet, it's a photo of the back of my driver's license which clearly shows that the Secretary of State changed the date -- changed my address to Pontiac in July of 2020.

The basis of -- and I would also note that as the Election Commission and certainly Clerk Doyle, you all have access to government records indicating that I've been registered to vote here in Pontiac since last July, and that I have voted in Pontiac last year in 2020.

The basis of the complaint appears to be that there was a clerical error on one of my campaign finance statements for a different office, County Commissioner. That was a clerical error and in evidence of that, if you look at Exhibit 3, it's an affidavit from my previous landlord that says I haven't lived at that address in Auburn Hills since last July.

Furthermore, I've attached a couple of documents that clearly --

MS. WILLIAMS: That's the time.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: That's your time.

MR. GREIMEL: But I just want to finish my sentence, if I could. I have attached a couple of documents that show that I did change the

address on my County Commission report previously. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: With respect the time, everybody is only given three minutes to speak.

So the next person on the list is Trachelle Young. Did I pronounce your name correctly?

MS. YOUNG: You did.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Okay.

MS. YOUNG: Good afternoon,

Commissioners. As indicated, my name is Attorney
Trachelle Young, and I represent Mayor Deirdre
Waterman. I represent Mayor Waterman on a challenge
that we have taken upon based upon the position of
Mr. Doyle as City Clerk in terms of not certifying
her as a candidate.

Most of you are aware that we have filed a Complaint in court, as well as a motion for a writ of mandamus. That matter is set to be heard on Wednesday of next week at 8:30 a.m.

I am here to ask you to do the right thing right now, and that is to uphold your charge of certifying all eligible candidates for this August primary ballot. The position that we have

stated is consistent with what is going on right now in this entire area. The City Clerk in Detroit received the same type of challenge that Mayor Waterman received, and the City Clerk has taken a position that her function is ministerial. She does not have the authority to investigate beyond the four corners of the affidavit of identity, and she did not refuse to certify the candidate based on that challenge.

We do not believe that the clerk in this position has the authority to refuse to certify Mayor Waterman as a candidate. And I would ask you to remember that the Voting Rights Act of 1965 was designed so that the people could elect representatives of their choice.

By eliminating the candidate, you are minimizing the choice of the people. And that should not be the goal of what this Commission is designed to do.

So we are asking you to certify Mayor Waterman, to follow the local authority. I would also note that the Taylor Mayor had the same type of challenge, and he was just given a temporary restraining order, and that Election Commission was ordered to certify him as a candidate for Mayor of

Taylor. They did follow that court order. And, again, the Detroit City Clerk took the same position.

So it is not unprecedented for this
Election Commission to certify her. It is
consistent with the law right now. And if it is not
done here, we will end up in court. If it is done,
we will withdraw our petition and we will simply ask
that the voters of Pontiac have a full opportunity
to really vote for the candidate of their choice.
Thank you so much for your time.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Next person on the list is Mark E. Holland.

MR. HOLLAND: To the honorable

Commission, first let me just say for those that are watching I hope you guys are paying attention to all of this pettiness. And for those that are listening, I hope you guys are paying attention to all of this pettiness and all this dirt. We haven't even started yet and this is ridiculous.

My thing is this, the process, if I brought in my paperwork on the 19th, no one called to say that my paperwork wasn't correct. It was stamped by the notary public. Everyone seen it.

And so from that day the 19th we had all the way to

the 20th at 4:00 to say that your paperwork is incorrect.

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I had to find out that my paperwork was incorrect from the streets. I had no formal response from anyone and I don't know if that's the process or not. But then I heard someone else say that they got an opportunity to verify that they either changed the address or not, or verify if a law was broken. Well, let me just say for clarity, there is no way that I can have broken the law personally myself because we didn't see a box. box -- or didn't say didn't say check here. definitely was overlooked. I haven't had my glasses for a year yet, for those that care. I have a prescription. But just let me say this. I had to go home and ask my mom was I a United States citizen, because there's no one in this room that is watching or no one else can tell you where they were born.

And so, knowing that I used to be a city councilman, knowing that I was the last person to come out of last primary for mayor, and to question that I'm a citizen should have been brought to my attention way before 4:00 on the 20th to say, well, look, not only did the office miss it, you

missed it, the notary public missed it that a box wasn't checked that didn't say check here.

And so by signing that box -- signing my signature, it's definitely saying that I am a United States citizen. And if that was questioned, I should have been afforded the opportunity to bring in a birth certificate to say I was born here at General Hospital.

But if politics has gotten this petty that the leaders here that claim to be our moms and pops that care about us, that watched us grow up, to go out and get somebody from three cities over to come to be this petty, you know, not only am I hurt, I'm more disappointed of this process.

Let everyone get on this ballot to be voted upon. And another part of this process, I didn't see nowhere where it say you get to get kicked off a ballot because of human error. You get to get kicked off of the ballot because you have a handicap with vision. Just like a person who couldn't hear, you tell them to move their spot. I couldn't see. And if that's what it is, well, I know you guys have a job to do and I'm not going to criticize that. But thank you for my opportunity.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Next person on

the list is Jim Kelly.

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MR. KELLY: Good afternoon. My name is Jim Kelly. I'm an attorney here on behalf of Jonathan Townsend with regard to a complaint that was filed challenging the candidacy and the eligibility to serve in office of Timothy Greimel.

We heard Mr. Greimel speak earlier today. I was surprised at that because the complaint is not on the agenda. I was disappointed to see that despite this well-founded complaint, the Clerk did not put it on the agenda. I would urge the Commissioners to take up this complaint when they discuss the eligibility of the candidates.

The complaint is very well-founded.

The timeline of things are not in dispute. You heard Mr. Greimel admit earlier today that he needs to be a resident of the City of Pontiac after

July 1st, July 3rd, 2021 to qualify to be mayor if he's elected because the term begins July (sic) 3rd, 2022. He must be a resident for one year before that.

Equally clear is his filings that he made with the Oakland County Clerk. Those are a matter of public record. And unlike a lease or unlike other documents, not something you could

manipulate after the fact, because they're online and everyone can see them.

His campaign statement that he filed
July 25th of this (sic) year, so after July 25th,
after July 3rd, clearly showed his address in Auburn
Hills, Michigan, not the City of Pontiac. He
declared and attested under oath, under penalties of
perjury that he was a resident of the City of Auburn
Hills. As such, he's not eligible to serve as mayor
if he was elected. He's not even eligible to be on
the ballot for this election. He should not be
permitted to contest this election because he does
not meet the resident qualifications of the City
Charter.

The City Charter is an important document. It is the most important document for the City. It is the Constitution, and it is the spirit of this City. It's approved by the voters and the people.

I'll refer you to Section 4.101 of the Charter which clearly states this one-year residency. Clearly sets out the timeline. I would also urge you to take a look at the campaign statement -- the campaign finance statement that Mr. Greimel filed under his own hand signed by himself

January 25th, 2021. It clearly shows the Auburn Hills residence. He's not a resident of the City of Pontiac. He's not eligible to run for election. He's not eligible to serve if he's elected. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: The next person to speak is Deirdre Waterman.

MAYOR WATERMAN: Good afternoon, honorable Commission and citizens of Pontiac. I am Mayor Deirdre Waterman, second term, who has proudly served the City of Pontiac. I am here to make very certain that I am a candidate for re-election for mayor of the City of Pontiac, and I will be a candidate for the mayor of the City of Pontiac.

I'm very proud of what we have accomplished. And my message will be continuing the progress we have made together with the City of Pontiac, with the many partners we brought in and many resources we have made available to the City of Pontiac.

Last week, in accordance with the Charter, I delivered my eighth budget to the City Council. The balanced budget is required, but not only that, even after a year of COVID-19, economic problems, I reported that we are going to forecast a

surplus not only for this year, but for the next fiscal year as well. That is an extremely good position for the City to be in, in terms of financial stability, considering we have fought our way back from disrepair when I started as Mayor; not to mention the fact that we've improved our neighborhoods, made them more beautiful, we have improved public safety. We have contributed to the infrastructure, and are going to use more money for our infrastructure repair and we're going to do the things to help increase the pride of the citizens of Pontiac, not only in the neighborhoods, but bringing in so many new businesses and jobs and jobs and jobs and security for our community.

So that's the message I'm going to take out during my candidacy, and that's what I hope the citizens of Pontiac are going to consider. I want and should be on the ballot, because it should be the citizens of the City who get to determine who they vote for. And that is why I'm here. I've served the City of Pontiac citizens proudly. I will continue to do that in whatever role they want me to play, but those are the people that we should be hearing. With all of the attorneys speaking, that's the missing element in this decision today.

Depending upon the Election Commission for you to do your job. Thank you. I appreciate the chance to be heard.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Next person on the list is Maurice Mahone.

MR. MAHONE: Hey, how you all doing?

Actually I was just signing in, I didn't know I was supposed to be up here speaking, but since I'm up here I'm going to say something.

I have been a citizen of Pontiac all my life. And this City need to focus more on the kids here. I coach football. I coach basketball. The whole -- every kid in the City know who I am. And I think it's time that we focus more upon our youth here.

Our youth need the City of Pontiac more. And there is so much going on with our kids, and it's like no one is paying attention to it. And the point I'm trying to make is, whoever -- and give these people who are coming up here to be -- have a position of mayor a chance to run. Let the citizens have a chance to vote who they want. But whoever -- and I'm asking you, whoever gets in, focus more on our kids. Focus more on our kids. These kids need us. And there's just a saying every time you look

up a kid is either this or that in a bad manner. There's no motivation for our kids any more. Open our eyes up and focus on these kids. We are so focused on businesses coming here and this and that. Focus on these kids. That's what it's about. My brother other here bring the Bible, what the Lord say, love who first? Love the kids. We too focused on the wrong things right now and not focused on our kids. Look at our high school. Look at our middle school. Where all of these kids shut -- where do our kids have to go? In the streets every day.

When I was young, you couldn't go out to the streets. You had centers, you had schools, you had activities for the kids all -- none of that is around here no more. Stop being blind to these kids. These kids need us. Kids are the future. When we leave here, who has to run this place? We need somebody to put them in a right Stop having the closed eye to these kids direction. and wake up, City of Pontiac. Wake up, City of Pontiac. Our kids need us. I'm tired of going home nights and hearing about so and so has lost a child. I was looking at the news one day and how did they say Pontiac High School education is the bottom of the barrel. How you think that make us parents

feel? Focus more on these kids. We bring the job. We got the jobs. Bring the education pipeline to Pontiac. That's what you do. Bring the education and the kid is learning and want to learn in school, he will motivate his parents to go out and work but the --

MS. WILLIAMS: Time.

MR. MAHONE: You all -- focus more on these kids. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: And the last speaker for our public comment is Veronica Taylor.

MS. TAYLOR: Good evening, this honorable body. First, I would like to ask God for prayer for the City of Pontiac. We deeply need prayer here in this City, not just this City, this whole country. And, yes, I ask God to do the right thing.

First let me tell you a little bit of what I've been through in the last month or so. I have -- as a registered sworn in precinct delegate for two counties, I have some people want to challenge, bring a challenge here as I go and do my work as a real precinct delegate of helping getting people on ballots. Everybody that want to run for a -- for a seat has the right to. No one should be

able to tell no one they can't run for a seat. Now if they got their paperwork in order, they I's dotted and crossed, and all their stuff is did, then they should be able to run.

Now, we did, as me taking in and walking in this clerk's office with a lot of them that I helped, I have two which I seen, watch them do their affidavit, Mr. Mark Holland who ran for mayor of the City, trying to put his glasses on to see, to put his dot — to make sure he had did what he needed to do; and he just got his glasses, couldn't do them and get them right. And he passed his paperwork over to our clerk. And then she read it. She could have seen that the box was not checked there before she notarized it.

Now, to have people to come and sit and challenge knowing this man or any other like Perry Earl, that did his, he had two papers that he notarized right in front of me, and he did not see it either. And to challenge -- can't even run to sit on the ballot. Here is a youth, as I knock at them doors and got those signatures for over a bunch, seven to be exactly, I heard so much from the people. And the people are complaining that we are putting people in office look like they just our

friends, and not listening to them.

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Now to say they do want some new mayors here. They do want some new stuff did. we need to think about, not challenge these people that sitting up here if they work here. We all have candidates here that we all support. Ms. Mattie Hatchett has hers. We all have ours. candidate in here, even you all look they're working. That shouldn't even be a call. should be what kind of job is you all going to do for this City, because I have heard what this City need and God need to clean up Pontiac, not the people. Thank you.

FROM THE AUDIENCE: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: So that concludes public comment on our agenda.

The next item on the agenda is City Clerk's certification report.

I want to begin by reading the -- from the City Charter, Section 2.108 on which says primary election, nominations for each elected office shall be made by a City primary election, however, whenever not more than two persons file for nomination to an office there shall be no primary election for the office. The City Clerk shall

certify such persons as duly nominated for that office and the name of the person who filed shall be placed on the general election ballot for the office.

I also want to read so we're clear about who has the duty to do what. From the Election Commission section, Section 2.105. The City Election Commission is composed of the City Clerk, the City Attorney and the City Treasurer. This is amended in March of 2016. An initial Charter was the City Assessor who was a member of the Commission.

The Commission has general supervision of all elections in the City and may hire assistants, inspectors and other election personnel. Except as otherwise provided by this Charter Ordinance, the Commission shall perform all duties required for the Election Commissions by law and may subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, take testimony and require the production of evidence, to enforce the subpoena or order for production of evidence or to impose any penalty prescribed for failure to comply a subpoena or order the Commission shall apply to the appropriate court.

All meetings of the Commission shall

be open to the public. In case of any doubt, concern in election procedure, the Commission shall prescribe the procedure to be followed.

Then, I also want to read from the Michigan Election Law. And we all do know that State Law supersedes municipal law. And this is Michigan Election Law Act 116 of 1954, 168.558, Filing nominations, qualifying petitions, filing fee, or affidavit of candidacy; affidavit of identity; requirement to indicate name change; exception; statement; noncompliance; selection of office to which candidacy restricted; failure to make selection; perjury separate violation.

Section 558(1). When filing a nominating petition, qualifying petition, filing fee, and affidavit of candidacy for a federal, county, state, city, township, village, metropolitan district, or school district office in any election, a candidate shall file with the officer with whom the petitions, fee, or affidavit is filed 2 copies of an affidavit of identity. A candidate nominated for a federal, state, county, city, township, or village office at a political party convention or caucus shall file an affidavit of identity within 1 business day after being nominated with the

Secretary of State. The affidavit of identity filing requirement does not apply to a candidate nominated for the office of President of the United States or Vice President of the United States.

(2) An affidavit of identity must contain the candidate's name and residential address; a statement that the candidate is a citizen of the United States; the title of the office sought; a statement that the candidate meets the constitutional and statutory qualifications for the office sought; other information that may be required to satisfy the officer as to the identity of the candidate; and the manner in which the candidate wishes to have his or her name appear on the ballot. If a candidate is using a name that is not the name that he or she was given at birth, the candidate shall include an affidavit of identity, the candidate's full former name.

(3) The requirement to indicate a name change on the affidavit of identity does not apply if the name in question is one of the following:

A name that was formally changed at least 10 years before filing as a candidate.

A name that was changed in a certificate of naturalization issued by a federal

district court at the time the individual became a naturalized citizen at least 10 years before filing as candidate.

The name that was changed because of marriage.

The name that was changed because of divorce, but only if a legal name by which the individual was previously known.

A name that constitutes a common law name as provided in Section 560b.

An affidavit of identity must include the statement that as of the date of the affidavit, all statements, reports, late filing fees, and fines required of the candidate or any candidate committee organized to support the candidate's election under the Michigan Campaign Finance Act of 1976 PA 388, MCL 169.201 to 169.282, have been filed or paid; and a statement that the candidate acknowledges that making a false statement in the affidavit is perjury, punishable by a fine up to 1,000 or imprisonment up to 5 years, or both.

If a candidate files the affidavit of identity with an officer other than the county clerk or Secretary of State, the officer shall immediately forward to the county clerk one copy of the

affidavit of identity by first-class mail. The county clerk shall immediately forward one copy of the affidavit of identity for state and federal candidates to the Secretary of State by first-class mail.

An officer shall not certify to the Board of Election Commissioners the name of a candidate who fails to comply with this section, or the name of a candidate who executes an affidavit of identity that contains a false statement with regard to any information or statement required under this section.

If petitions or filing fees are filed by or on behalf of a candidate for more than one office, either federal, state, county, city, village, township, metropolitan district, or school district, the terms of which run concurrently or overlap, the candidate so filing, or on behalf of whom petitions or fees were filed, shall select the one office to which his or her candidacy is restricted within three days after the last day for the filing of petitions or filing fees unless the petitions or filing fees are filed for two offices that are combined or for offices that are not incompatible.

Failure to make the selection disqualifies a candidate with respect to each office for which the petitions or fees were so filed and the name of the candidate must not be printed upon the ballot for those offices.

A vote cast for that candidate at the ensuing primary or general election must not be counted and is void.

A violation of this section for perjury is distinct and separate from any violation of the Michigan Finance Campaign (sic) Act, 1976 PA 388, MCL 169.201 to 169.282.

And I read that to start off before my certification report so it is very clear as to who is the certifying officer is clearly stated in the Charter, the responsibilities of the clerk, and the responsibilities of this Election Commission, is further stated in the State Law. It further states in the state law what I shall not do.

So, I've also ask Mr. Brewer if you could come to the podium, because I've asked for some legal assistance, because I too may have thought some things could have been possibly petty or whatever but I wanted to make sure that as the clerk -- because I took the oath of office, that I

1 was following the duties of my office. So, that's 2 why Mr. Brewer is --3 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: I would absolutely object to Mr. Brewer talking --4 5 COMMISSIONER BAWA: Yeah, so would I. 6 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Elections --7 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Excuse me. 8 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Let me state my 9 objection. 10 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: You're out of 11 order. You're out of order. 12 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: This is a point 13 of order and you're --14 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: No, no. This is 15 during my report. You're out of order. I'm the 16 chair of the meeting. Go ahead, Mr. --17 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: No, your report 18 is you talking. He has not been hired by this 19 Commission, and this Commission does have the 20 authority to hire consultants. We have not done so. 21 He does not give legal advice to us. He can speak 22 during public comment. He is nobody to this Board 23 other than an individual member of the public. 24 absolutely is inappropriate in speaking. 25 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: You're out of

1 order and you're incorrect. 2 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Absolutely not. 3 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Furthermore, an 4 Ordinance that was actually done while your law firm 5 was the City Attorney, gives the City Clerk the authorization to hire anyone as long as there is 6 7 funds in the City Clerk's budget. So please check the Ordinance that is enacted so --8 9 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: I clearly 10 understand that, and that's when you're acting as 11 the City Attorney -- or City Clerk. We are sitting 12 here as the Charter Commission -- as the Election 13 Commission and we're having a meeting of the 14 Election Commission. He has no authority to speak 15 on this matter. If you want to --16 COMMISSIONER BAWA: I agree. 17 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: -- then we can 18 have -- it's wholly inappropriate. 19 COMMISSIONER BAWA: I think I agree 20 with that. You know, we have not appointed him as

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: I would like a motion not to hear the statements of Mr. Brewer.

COMMISSIONER BAWA: I second it.

our consultant. So I don't think it's appropriate

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for him to speak.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: I believe you're 1 in essence out of order, because as part of my 2 3 certification report, is, in essence, my particular, 4 in essence, report. And it's the City Clerk's 5 certification report. It's not Commission's 6 certification report. It's the City Clerk's 7 certification report. So as a part of making my 8 certification report, and as a part of the Ordinance 9 that is enacted, he is operating in the capacity of 10 advising, in essence, the City Clerk. 11 So this is totally -- but Mr. -- he 12 can then therefore could have spoken under public 13 comment, so he can be given, in essence, three

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Public comment is over.

minutes like any member of public to, in essence,

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speak.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Public -
COMMISSIONER CHUBB: It is not

appropriate and there is a motion on the floor.

FROM THE AUDIENCE: The Chair can make an exception.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: I mean, I want it very noted that I think this Commission is acting totally out of order on several different particular

instances. But, neither in essence of said, I believe that the -- there was a case by the Court of Appeals that, in essence, has ruled as to what the authority of the Commission, and in essence I guess the clerk on these types of matters. But, enough. I'll continue with my certification report.

If the Commission so chooses, I guess for not Mr. Brewer to speak, then I just want it noted that I believe that the Commission is out of order. That's why I have a stenographer here to take verbatim word by word.

I also want it noted that I believe that the City Attorney is acting out of the capacity, because I stated -- I want this on the record, that as a member of the Commission, you cannot be the legal advisor to the Commission.

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: So are you requesting -- or are you withdrawing your request that Mr. Brewer speak; or do you want us to move forward?

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: I have made a request for Mr. Brewer to speak. I said as part of my certification report I was allowing Mr. Brewer to be a part of that, in essence, presentation. And I don't think the Commission has the authority to tell

me what should be, in essence, in my report. It's my report. So as a part of my report, I think it's more than appropriate for Mr. Brewer to speak.

report. You could have put it in the written report or you could have included him on the agenda or added him to the agenda at the proper time. This isn't the proper time. Like I said, we have a motion on the floor, so if you're going to withdraw your request to have him speak, then I'll withdraw the motion and we can move forward.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: I'm not withdrawing my request to have him speak because I did make a request to have him speak.

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: I call the vote on the --

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Because he is a part of -- I mean, I'm giving my certification report. I don't believe the Commission has the authority to tell me how to, in essence, do a report. And I am the certifying officer of --

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Call for a vote on the motion.

COMMISSIONER BAWA: Second.

MS. WILLIAMS: Motion. Bawa?

1 COMMISSIONER BAWA: Yes. 2 MS. WILLIAMS: Chubb? 3 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Yes. 4 MS. WILLIAMS: Doyle? COMMISSIONER DOYLE: No. 5 So I will 6 continue with my certification report. 7 As a matter of fact, I think I need to read this, so that this is in the record. 8 9 Enclosed is my certification report. As the certifying officer for the City of Pontiac, I 10 11 am providing you with a list of certified candidates for the office of Mayor, City Council, and Library 12 13 Board. 14 If I was unable to certify a 15 candidate, the reason is stated. In addition, I 16 have included the list of candidate eligibility 17 challenges that I received as well as candidate 18 responses to a challenge. So I did pass -- I did 19 make sure that there were copies of the agenda 20 packet. 21 So as it relates to candidates for 22 Mayor: Jeremy Bowie, the City Clerk has certified; 23 Wanda Denise Coates, certified; Tim Greimel, 24 certified; Mark Holland, ineligible. Mr. Holland is

ineligible because he did not complete the

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attestation section of the affidavit, I'm a citizen of the United States and I meet the statutory and Constitutional requirements for the office sought was not completed. I did contact, just for the benefit of the public and all, to see if that was something the Clerk did have discretion on; and unfortunately the Clerk did not have discretion. If that box was not checked then you have to be -- it was my duty to have to rule you, in essence, ineligible.

Alexandria T. Riley, clerk certified;
Deirdre Waterman, ineligible. Candidate made a
false statement on an affidavit Ms. Waterman failed
to file a 2020 annual report, 2020 October quarterly
report, a 2020 July quarterly report, July 2019
annual report, a 2019 October quarterly report and a
2019 July quarterly report; and -- with the office
of the Oakland County Clerk on or about the date she
signed the affidavit on April 13th, 2021. As I have
previously read, if -- an officer shall not certify
to the Board of Election Commissioners the name of
the candidate who fails to comply with this section
or the name of the candidate who executes an
affidavit of identity that contains a false
statement with regards to any information or

statement required under this section. It was -- so as relates to Deirdre Waterman, I received a communication from Joseph Rozell, the Director of Elections for Oakland County Clerk Register/ Register of Deeds on April 21st. Said, Dear Mr. Doyle, my office is in receipt of the affidavit of identity from mayoral candidate Deirdre Waterman. After review of our records, we have determined that Ms. Waterman failed to file the 2020 annual report, a 2020 October quarterly report, a 2020 July quarterly report, a 2019 annual report, a 2019 October quarterly report, a 2019 July quarterly report. MCL 168.558 subsection 4 as amended states in part, an affidavit of identity must include a statement that as of the date of the affidavit, all statements, reports, late filing fees and fines required of the candidate or any candidate committee have been filed or paid.

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The statute further states that as an officer shall not certify to the Board of Election Commissioners the name of the candidate who fails to comply with this section or a name of a candidate who executes an affidavit of identity that contains a false statement. Please consider this as a notice to not certify Ms. Waterman as a candidate to your

1 Board of Election Commissioners. 2 So that concludes the candidates for 3 Mayor. 4 Candidates for City Council, District Mark Bowman, certified; Karen Platen Jorgensen, 5 1: 6 certified; Sean Preston, certified; Julia M. Ruffin, 7 certified; Melanie Rutherford, certified. 8 Candidates for City Council District Brett Nicholson, certified; Megan E. Shramski, 9 10 certified; Coleman Yoakum, certified. 11 Candidates for City Council District Michael Goodman, certified; Mary E. Pietila, 12 3: 13 certified. 14 Candidates for City Council District 15 4: Ashleigh Altemann, certified; Randy Carter, 16 certified; Kathalee W. James, certified. 17 Candidates for City Council District 18 Gloria Miller, certified; William Parker Jr., 19 certified. 20 Candidates for City Council District Doris Taylor Burks, certified; William A. 21 6: 22 Carrington, certified. Candidates for City Council District 23 24 Perry D. Earl, Jr., ineligible. Mr. Perry is 25 ineligible because he did not complete statements

and attestation section of the affidavit on the citizens of the United States, and I meet the statutory and constitutional requirements for the office sought was not completed.

Candidates for Library Board: Angela Allen, certified; Ashelin R. Currie, certified; Perry D. Earl Jr., ineligible. Did not complete statements and attestation section of the affidavit I'm a citizen of the United States and I meet the statutory and constitutional requirements for the office sought was not completed; Mattie McKinney Hatchett, certified; Dion A. Johnson, certified; Lacey Krout, certified; Yvette Brinker Marion, certified; Holbert Maxey, certified; Rosie Lance Richardson, certified; Melanie Rutherford, certified; Shalell N. Weatherspoon, certified.

In addition, I received a number of candidate challenges to the eligibility of candidates. I received several challenges from Mattie McKinney Hatchett. The first challenge was the candidate Deirdre Waterman for mayor. My decision is noted, and I stated before that Ms. Waterman is ineligible for certification.

Mattie McKinney Hatchett also challenged Mark Holland's candidacy. Again, Mr.

Holland is ineligible for certification.

Mattie Hatchett challenged Perry

Earl's City Council District 7 candidacy. Again,

Mr. Earl is ineligible for certification. She also

-- Mattie McKinney Hatchett also challenged Perry

Earl's Library Board candidacy. And, again, he was ineligible for certification for the previous reasons stated.

I also received a challenge from

Jonathan Townsend in regards to Tim Greimel's

candidacy for mayor. I reviewed the documents. He

made a challenge as it relates to Mr. Greimel's

residency and that he made a false statement on his

affidavit.

The -- Mr. Greimel has been certified and his residency is verified, therefore, no false statement was made on the affidavit that he filed with the Office of the Clerk. So I was unable to verify that a false statement was made on his affidavit that he filed with the Clerk; and that was the determining factor.

In addition, Mr. Greimel submitted a response to Mr. Townsend's challenge. So I just wanted a very clear and on the record, that the -- per the Charter, the clerk is the certifying officer

for the City of Pontiac, not this Commission. The Commission has the authority to approve the ballot. The Commission does not have the authority to certify any candidates. And if the Commission takes the position to certify — to try to attempt to certify any candidate that has not been certified by the City Clerk who is the certifying officer for the City of Pontiac, then the Commission is acting beyond its authority that was given to it by the Charter of the City of Pontiac which, in essence, is the governing document; and then in addition, as well as is stated within the State law.

Clearly if the Commission had the authority to certify, then it wouldn't say an officer shall not certify to the Board of Election Commissioners right within the Michigan Election Law Act 116 of 1954.

And if -- I want it also noted, and if this Commission takes the position of failing to do its duty, then this clerk will therefore look into legal action against this Commission, because it's clear that I personally have felt that a lot of things have been done that has not been proper. And therefore, to me documents, charters, and things of that nature from the standpoint of a clerk are, in

essence, your governing documents.

So, therefore, I think we need clear and concise and we'll maybe need a court, in essence, intervention, because not -- like I just was stating, that I would hope the Commission would not act beyond its authority. But as the Clerk, it has to be clear, what the authority of the clerk is and what the authority of this Commission is.

So with that, that's what I want on the record.

So, does any Commissioner have any question about my report or want to discuss any particular item?

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Sure. You just referenced acting within the scope of your authority, and I think that's a good place to start, because there's a lot of pieces of this report that I find wholly outside the scope of your authority.

Several attorneys spoke today, and I believe everyone was on the same page about one thing, and that's that we have a ministerial function as this Board. And so, when we received the affidavits of identity, and when you received the affidavits of identity of the clerk that is and you went through them, and you found that three

people did not complete the affidavit properly, the law is clear, that they are not able to be on the ballot. I don't necessarily agree with the law, it's -- I think it's unfortunate, but that is the state of the law right now, and we are bound to comply with it.

But the remainder of the law is that your actions, again, are ministerial. And so, the courts have been very clear about your ministerial authority. And as I've noted, in both the very case, Berry V Garrett, which noted that your -- you have the ministerial task of completing a facial review of the affidavits, and the Bsharah V Wayne County Clerk case, which notes ultimately you conclude the Plaintiff's proposed construction of 168.558 (4) would read an additional requirement into the statute, requiring a county clerk to become the arbiter of truth or falsity -- or falsity of statements made in an affidavit of identity. We refuse to do so.

And as Mr. Trebilcock pointed out -this is actually an unpublished opinion, but as Mr.
Trebilcock pointed out, the Court of Appeals ruled
today in the matter of Victoria Burton-Harris V
Wayne County Clerk, and that case actually cited to

the Bsharah case. So to the extent that it wasn't controlling authority, it is beginning today, pursuant to the Victoria Burton-Harris case.

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And what that means is that when you have decided arbitrarily to go beyond the four corners of two of all of these people's certification reports, that was wholly arbitrary and wholly inappropriate. The affidavit, as filled out by Mayor Waterman was complete on its four corners pursuant to the controlling law. And she absolutely should be on the ballot.

Likewise, with Mr. Greimel, there was a substantive challenge, but you're not the arbiter Lawsuits can be filed to challenge these of truth. things. Other -- other actions can be taken by prosecutors. And as you noted, the standard is that you shall not certify the -- an election person -person for election that files a false affidavit of identity, but the issue is -- or that contains a false statement, that is. The issue is what it says that it doesn't make you the investigator. you've chosen to, again, hand-pick two people, politically-motivated or not, and do a deep-dive on their actual applications and the status. likewise, as you noted, Mr. Rozell did -- the

Director of Elections for Oakland County did send you a letter on April 21st, saying that he's determined it's a false statement.

So I responded and told him I need a letter from Corp Counsel saying that you're the person that has the authority to determine that it's a false statement. He never said a word. He never said another word to me. And I never received anything of that nature from Corp Counsel because he doesn't have that authority. That is properly rested in the judiciary or by a prosecutor that ultimately has a guilty determination by a -- by a court.

Again, I think it's clear that this certification process was further arbitrary and capricious because although you've gone on the hunt for Mr. Greimel, and he's prepared affidavits and things of that nature to prove his residency and the fact that he's lived there for over a year, I question whether you did that for any of these others, for Brett Nicholson, Mikal Goodman, Randy Carter, Kathalee James, Gloria Miller, William Parker --

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Excuse me, Mr. Chubb. I did not go on the hunt for anyone. I gave

you a list of all of documentations in essence that I received. You requested that information, and I provided that information to you. I did not go on a hunt for any particular body. All the challenges, which I believe people are within their authority to submit challenges, you received copies of those challenges, they were all date stamped in the Clerk's Office as well as the response that I received from the challenges as relates to -- I mean Mr. Greimel's response to the particular challenge. I don't necessarily even know how he became aware of that particular challenge.

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But, whatever was turned in -- and I'm sorry, I need to also add, because the report was prepared before this morning while I'm at it, we did receive two additional challenges. So I guess I do need to put them into the record as well. So after you finish your comment, I want to add those too in the record too. The report was prepared before.

just on the record you've noted that you haven't done any investigation into the underlying documentation provided or the truth underlying the documentation provided by a candidate unless there was a challenge. That is the definition of

arbitrary and capricious.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Excuse me.

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Totally -- it's totally inappropriate. Let me respond, and when I finish with my comments. It is wholly inappropriate and it's why this certification is wholly indefensible. This Board should not act to approve this obviously illegal action.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Let me be very clear. It is -- when the Clerk's Office receives an affidavit and petitions by its very nature, we have to, in essence -- we have to verify the petitions. So we have to go through to make sure that each particular candidate has enough nominating petitions. So that is what, in essence, in essence, that we do. And we have to, in essence, review the particular affidavits.

In addition to that, if somebody submits a challenge, then I think, in essence, it's incumbent upon me to receive that challenge, in essence, read the challenge as well too. The law does not tell me not to accept challenges from people. So --

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Well, the law doesn't tell you not to accept challenges, but it

also doesn't give you the authority to investigate and rule on them, and that's the piece that you're missing here. That portion of this certification is wrong; everything else is accurate; and the only change is that it would result with Deirdre Waterman

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being on the ballot.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Well, it -- I guess if the position of this Commission is either to accept because I talked to the County -- because previously, apparently, four years ago, the -- I wasn't in this capacity, apparently the certification of candidates was not even done by this Commission. When I reviewed all of the minutes from the 2017 meetings of the Commission, there was never certification item.

But, I was informed by the County when they certify candidates, the Commission simply receives and places them on file. So I believe all the authority that this Commission has to do can do, receive placement in file or accept it as—is or not accept it at all. But it does not have, because I'm the certifying officer, it does not have the authority to amend any certification. It does not have that authority.

I guess the guestion who is -- who is

the certifying officer for the City of Pontiac, per the Charter?

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COMMISSIONER CHUBB: The duties of the Election Commission are set out where it notes that it has an oversight of everything arranging the primary ballot, and you certainly have your obligations that are your ministerial obligations to review the applications for certification. But this Board clearly has a role and authority in that regard.

authority is to, like I said, receive it or I guess accept it or not accept it. But it does not have the authority to amend it, because the Board does not have -- is not the certifying officer. So the Board would be acting without its scope if it attempted to amend any certification.

But I do want to add into the record, that I received a challenge from Robert Bass from the Community EDC. Mr. Bass is challenging the -- Mayor Deirdre Waterman's failure to comply with annual reporting requirements. So this is challenge against Mayor Waterman's candidacy. I will share it and I can provide copies as well. It was received in essence today. And I also received a challenge

in H. Bill Maxsey from the New Pontiac Urban
Institute. And Mr. Maxsey is challenging Deirdre
Waterman and Perry Earl and Mark Holland. You
received all the other documents, so I'll make sure
that you get copies of those documents as well -too.

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So the next item on the agenda is actually -- I provided the overall, in essence, report. And is the certified -- the candidate certification list. So that is --

COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Consistent with our approved amendment to the agenda, I'd make a motion to amend the approved candidate list to include Deirdre Waterman.

COMMISSIONER BAWA: I second it.

COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Discussion on that that motion? I want -- as discussion on that particular motion, I want it clearly stated on the record that this Commission is acting beyond the scope of its duty. And since this Commission is acting beyond the scope of its duty, I will not certify Deirdre Waterman as a candidate because the Commission does not have the authority.

The Commission only has the authority to approve the ballot, that's why it's not an agenda

1 item, because we don't have the ballot. But the 2 Commission does not have the authority to certify. 3 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Call for the 4 vote. 5 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: Excuse me, I'm 6 talking. So do not be rude and interrupt me. 7 the Chair of the meeting. 8 So as I was saying, because there is a 9 discussion on the matter. So I definitely want it noted. I also want it noted that as the clerk, I 10 11 will take legal action against this Commission if 12 this Commission makes an unauthorized move and vote 13 to put Ms. Waterman on the ballot when it's clearly not -- was not certified by the City Clerk, the 14 15 certifying officer for the City of Pontiac. 16 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: Call for the 17 vote. 18 MS. WILLIAMS: Bawa? 19 COMMISSIONER BAWA: Yes. 20 MS. WILLIAMS: Chubb? 21 COMMISSIONER CHUBB: 22 MS. WILLIAMS: Doyle? 23 COMMISSIONER DOYLE: No. For all of 24 the reasons, in essence, as stated. And also I want 25 it also, in essence, noted on the record, the Clerk

will investigate as into the City Attorney, if it's a conflict for him providing this body legal advice, and also being a voting member of this Commission.

> COMMISSIONER CHUBB: We are adjourned.

So, yes, as noted, the Clerk will not certify Deirdre Waterman. So I don't know what the next particular steps for this body is, but I will not. So this meeting is


