VOTE: VIRGINIA GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5

- October 29th is the last day to request an absentee ballot by mail for the November 5 General Election. Applications must be received in the Voter Registration Office by 5 p.m.
- Beginning Saturday, **October 26**, Alexandrians who qualify to vote **absentee** for the November 5 General Election may **cast their ballots in person at the Charles E. Beatley Jr. Central Library** (5005 Duke St.), or the Alexandria Voter Registration Office (132 N. Royal St.
- November 2nd is the last day to vote absentee in-person. Absentee in-person voting has already started at the Office of Voter Registration and Elections and will start at Beatley Library on 10/26.
- November 5th is the general election for Virginia State Senate, House of Delegates, and Clerk of Court. Polls are open from 6 a.m. 7 p.m. Earlier this year, Council approved two new precincts (Olympus and AlexRenew) that affected some voters who previously voted at Beatley, Tucker, Cameron Station, Lee Center, and Lyles Crouch.

THE BASICS

The **19th Amendment to the United States Constitution** (Amendment XIX – often referred to an the "Susan B. Anthony Amendment") granted American women the right to vote, a right known as women's suffrage. The Amendment prohibits the states and the federal government from denying the right to vote to citizens of the United States on the basis of sex. When the Amendment was ratified August 18, 1920, it ended **almost a century of protest**. <u>https://www.history.com/topics/womens-history/19th-amendment-1</u>

The 19th Amendment **enfranchised 26-million American women** in time for the 1920 U.S. presidential election, yet the Amendment **failed** to fully enfranchise **African American**, **Asian American**, **Latin American**, and **Native American women**.

The year 2020 marks the centennial of the Nineteenth Amendment and

the culmination of the women's suffrage movement. The year 2020 also marks the sesquicentennial of the Fifteenth Amendment (1870) and the right of black men to the ballot after the Civil War. The theme speaks, therefore, to the ongoing struggle on the part of both black men and black women for the right to vote including:

• The important contribution of black suffragists occurred not only within the larger women's movement, but within the larger black voting rights movement.

- Through voting-rights campaigns and legal suits from the turn of the twentieth century to the mid-1960s, African Americans made their voices heard as to the importance of the vote.
- The fight for black voting rights continues in the courts today.
- The rise of black elected and appointed officials at the local and national levels, campaigns for equal rights legislation, as well as the role of blacks in traditional and alternative political parties.



NATIONAL KEY DATES:

1848: Seneca Falls Convention – National-level launch of the movement for women's rights

Following the Convention, the demand for the vote became a centerpiece of the women's rights movement. Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott, along with Susan B. Anthony and other activists, raised public awareness and lobbied the government to grant voting rights to women.

August 18, 1920: Tennessee legislature ratifies 19th Amendment

Tennessee becomes the last of the necessary 36 states to secure ratification.

August 26, 1920: 19th Amendment officially certified by the U.S. Secretary of State

U.S. Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby **certified** the 19th Amendment and made the adoption of the Amendment official. Every year on this date, we celebrate *Women's Equality Day* in commemoration.

September: Voter Registration Month

October: Voter Education Month

VIRGINIA KEY DATES

November 27, 1909 - A group of women, including Ellen Glasgow, Mary Johnston, Kate Langley Bosher, Adèle Clark, Nora Houston, Kate Waller Barrett, and Lila Meade Valentine, found the Equal Suffrage League of Virginia.

1917-- Women suffragists force fed at the "Occoquan" Workhouse

<u>November 23, 1917</u> -- Suffragist prisoners released from Workhouse to attend hearing in Federal Court in Alexandria, VA Judge ruled that women protesters had been unlawfully imprisoned at Workhouse

<u>August 1920</u> - Virginia women gain the right to vote after the Nineteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution becomes law.

1924 - Kate Waller Barrett of Alexandria serves as a delegate to the Democratic National Convention.

February 21, 1952 - The Virginia General Assembly ratifies the Nineteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, thirty-two years after it became law.
