Over the past year we have experienced change, and lots of it. Our lifestyle does not look like what it did before March 2020. And as we approach this one-year mark of living in the midst of Covid, our youth have been discussing and reflecting on what was, what is and what we hope to become.


We acknowledged long ago that this new lifestyle change was not welcomed kindly. We agree that this is tough for all of us in different ways and in some ways similarly. Week after week we talk at around the Zoom table with Covid as the center piece, with sentiments such as, "when we can meet back together, we will..." or "being stuck in Zoom calls all day is the worst!" These conversations have become normal, and we find ourselves accustomed to "the way things are." We can discuss and agree this is not ideal, while emotionally accepting that it is what it is.

It is important to reflect and be in tune with where we are. We reach this one-year mark, understanding that this has been a long and quick year, but that this current way of living is temporary. We may not go back exactly to how they were, but change is on the horizon. So, one of the things we have been acknowledging is how we have grown over this year, and how resilient we truly are. We are capable of learning new things fast and adapting even faster. We learned that we CAN in fact spend this much time with our family and not melt away. And we learned that we can still be productive and active in a safe and distant manner that shows love and concern for those around us.

This is no longer a hypothetical statement. We have lived socially distant from one another for a year. We have not met together in our Sanctuary, or in our Youth group room as a full group in a year. This is hard to swallow and coming together in this sadness is important. We have missed out on Summer trips, retreats and lock-ins. Seniors who are missing their last chance to go to REACH (at least as high school students) are mourning that loss. We acknowledge this pain and challenge. But we adapt, we grow, we change. I am not the person I was one year ago, and I would be willing to be most of you and most of our students are not either. But new opportunities are ahead of us, God has a plan of redemption and glory through this. The hope of what is to come can carry us through our times stuck at home.

So, as we say happy birthday to Covid... lift one another up! Send a text, email, card, or phone call to one another to check in. Pray for one another regularly and celebrate our strength together. Let us replace Covid from the centerpiece of our Zoom table, and replace it back with Jesus, who is the one who truly binds us together.

#### 2021 America for Christ Offering "Love Your Neighbor"

Thanks to your America for Christ (AFC) Offering contributions, American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) ministers to families who have lost homes to floods, to children living lives of limitation in poverty, to seminarians preparing to devote their lives to sharing the Good News, and many more. We have been answering God's call to heal broken families and communities—as well as cultivate strong Christian leaders and equip passionate disciples—since 1832.

The world's needs are great, and we are extending our ministry by awarding grants to mission partners across the United States and Puerto Rico. In 2019, ABHMS awarded grants totaling more than \$300,000 to partners who are empowering Christian leaders, nurturing disciples and intercultural awareness, and transforming congregations and communities with the healing power of God's love.

One grant enabled Heart Reach Neighborhood Ministries in Campbell, Ohio to purchase mattresses above and beyond the 104 already delivered to prevent children and teens from sleeping on the floors, couches and piles of clothing in its three housing developments.

A grant of \$8,400 was awarded to the Los Angeles-based Innovative Space for Asian American Christianity (ISAAC) to help fund its "Imagining A More Equal Pulpit" initiative, including a Gender Summit that addressed the challenges faced by women of color in ministry.

And a \$15,300 grant included support to Iglesia Bautista Betesda, Indianapolis, Ind., and its "Walking With the Immigrant" project, which has helped 60 families, including a family that senior pastor the Rev. Jaime Flores and a church brother accompanied to immigration court in Miami, Fla.

On behalf of ABHMS, thank you for your past generous support of our transformational mission. Our ministries—along with the ministries of our mission partners—are making a difference in the lives of so many individuals and families. With your help, we can bring God's healing touch to so many more.

### **APRIL MISSION OPPORTUNITY**

Easter eggs and baby chicks go hand in hand. But in South Africa, baby chicks are lifting families out of poverty!

In 2012 American Baptist medical missionaries, Drs. Anita and Rick Gutierrez introduced a new program that has helped more than 130 families! The **Poultry and Protein** mission project is self-sustaining and easily reproducible which is important in a province with 65% unemployment.

Participants in the program are trained and supervised as they raise poultry, incubate and hatch eggs, raise the birds, grow Chaya plants to produce their own feed and develop markets to sell their produce. They receive a basic housing unit for laying chickens, two incubators for eggs, two quail starter kits, some mature laying hens and roosters, quails, feed for 2 months, antibiotics and instructional materials.

This innovative project includes creating a 16' geodesic dome out of PVC pipe and zip ties that contains the poultry and protects them from predators. The inexpensive, lightweight dome can be easily moved to give the chickens fresh ground every few days. (See the photo below of a finished dome assembled in 25 minutes during a workshop at the World Mission Conference.)

A gift of \$25 can provide over 150 pounds of feed or provide a laying hen and rooster. A gift of \$50 will provide a forced air incubator that can hold 60 eggs.

### Don't Be Bitter-Pick Up Litter!

As we head into warmer months, we have an opportunity to help the Earth in yet another way... picking up litter. I know a very small percentage do this year round, but it's not on too many radar screens when the weather is daunting. Since this newsletter is for March – when Spring begins (officially anyway), and April, which is Earth Month, I thought it would be a good time to encourage folks to join in the effort to pick up litter. First, the facts. Annually, in the USA, over 250 million tons of litter are flung out a window, or carelessly let go of. Research shows that 81% of this is done intentionally. Really??? This costs over \$11.5 billion in repair and clean up. One half of this, around 4.5 trillion, is, what do you guess? Cigarette butts. They are the biggest bulk of our litter. Made of cellulose acetate, they are mistaken as food by animals and birds, which leads to nausea, vomiting and seizures. They take 5-400 years to decompose, leaving a legacy of damage beyond what we will ever see. Lids, caps, and food wrappers are next, with leaves and broken glass also being a large percentage. So, why


#### Here are Ten Reasons:

do we pick up litter?

- 1) It is unsightly. It can bring down both housing and town values.
- 2) If there is litter in an area, it encourages more litter. Think about it. Who cares anyway?
- 3) The clean-up costs a lot, as mentioned earlier. \$11.5 billion a year. In just the
- 4) There are benefits, such as physical exercise, and getting outside in the fresh air.
- 5) Another benefit is social: that you can sometimes meet other cool people.
- 6) Open containers can breed mosquitos and rodents.

- 7) The dyes and hazardous chemicals in the litter can leach into the water, soil, and air.
- 8) Animals are endangered from eating or being caught in litter such as plastic bags and 6 pack rings. This causes suffocation, starvation, and drowning, killing one million a year.
- 9) Marine life are suffocated, starved, or drowned by the litter, killing one million seabirds and 100,000 marine mammals such as turtles, dolphins, whales and seals, a year.
- 10) Litter is dangerous to our safety, especially children, our wildlife, and our economy.

On one Earth Day a couple years ago, I took "my boys" to Norristown Farm Park, to hike, and play in the stream. Fortunately we had nice weather that day. I looked across the stream, and saw a plastic bag caught in a bush. And then I saw a squirrel eating it. No kidding! So Julian crossed the stream and scaled the bank, and got the plastic bag. We saw another, and got that one too. Then we looked up and saw a bald eagle. We went back to their home, and circled their large block collecting trash. One of the neighbors thanked them with a monetary donation. All in all it was a very cool Earth Day. It seems like when we reach out to help, nature thanks us, if we have the eyes to see it. So I invite you too, to join in the litter clean-up effort. It can be done safely (in these days of the pandemic) with good gloves. We have a huge mess on our hands, and you can be part of the solution to help take care of this beautiful Earth of which we all are the designated stewards. Will you join us?


