A WORD FROM OUR INTERIM PASTOR:
Pastoral search, Self-search
September 2019

By the time you receive this issue of the *Vine*, our Search Committee will be examining *real* profiles of *real* pastoral candidates. These are exciting days, so step up your prayer support so they will be able to clearly discern the Lord's will for the *right* pastor for RBC.

You as a congregation, too, will soon be in "discernment mode." To help with that, in our first *Selectives* class this fall (September 29), I'll be sharing a fun way to look at leadership styles that will help us think about the role that pastoral leadership plays in the life of our church. All are welcomed to join us as we discuss this important issue together.

As you get ready to meet your new pastor, it's important to remember that there are many *learned* expectations we typically have of a pastor, built on great pastors who have led us in the past (but not always correctly)! Here's what one anonymous "wag" wrote several years ago (thus its forgivable gender-exclusive language):

The pastor teaches, though he must solicit his own classes. He heals, though without pills or knife. He is sometimes a lawyer, often a social worker, something of an editor, a bit of philosopher and entertainer, a salesman, a decorative piece for public functions, and he is supposed to be a scholar. He visits the sick, marries people, buries the dead, labors to console those who sorrow and to admonish those who sin, and tries to stay sweet when chided for not doing his duty. He plans programs, appoints committees when he can get them; spends considerable time in keeping people out of each other's hair; between times he prepares a sermon and preaches it on Sunday to those who don't happen to have any other engagement. Then on Monday he smiles when some jovial chap roars, "What a job—one day a week!"

Yes, there are certain responsibilities that a pastor must manage, but what, really, are they? Quite often, "traditional" duties of a pastor really belong to *you*, the members of the church. So, as I shared in my message on August 18, rather than ask "*What kind of pastor are we seeking?*" perhaps we should be asking "*What kind of congregation will we be?*" That is, will we be faithful in the responsibilities that are actually *ours*, or will we relegate them to our pastor? And perhaps right now, as you seek the right pastor, perhaps the right question is, "*What will pastoral candidates see in us?*" Ultimately, when we examine and change *ourselves*, we are always in a better position to work in partnership with new leadership.

In that same message, I shared an article written by Wilbur Rees that I was asked to include in this month's *Vine*. Reflect on these words regularly until your new pastor comes:

When we look at our church, do not ask; "How big are we?" But rather ask, "Is there room for me to grow?" An immense church can often be too small.
Don't ask, "What does it believe?" But rather ask, "How does it act?" How it acts is truly what it believes.
Don't ask, "What is its past?" But rather ask, "What is its future?" An alive church faces forward.
Don't ask, "What is it against?" But rather ask, "What is it for?" A church cannot live on a diet of negatives.
Don't ask, "How large is its budget?" But rather ask, "How large is its sacrifice?" A rich church can be poor in faith.
Don't ask, "Is the building filled with people?" But rather ask, "Are the people filled with the Spirit?" The church is people, not a building.
Don't ask, "Who is its pastor?" But rather ask, "What is its mission?" No drum major can lead a band which has neither music nor instruments.

So how are we doing? Are we meeting our *potential*? Are we ready to step out, take bold initiatives in ministry, and be the kind of congregation our Lord *needs* us to be in a changing world? May he, the Lord of this church, guide and bless both your *pastoral search* and your *self-search*, and may his Holy Spirit continue to shape you during the remainder of this waiting season!

RBC Youth

What is cool about this is that these three grew up in our Youth Ministry program and in our Church and wanted to be leaders and be a part of RBC and to give back to the youth program. Welcome to Terry Myers – RBC’s new Administrative Assistant

RBC welcomes Terry Myers who became the church’s new Administrative Assistant on August 1. Terry comes to us following 17 years of service in Bulgaria under appointment by American Baptist International Ministries with her husband Tom.

Terry’s work in Bulgaria was multi-faceted. She managed a literacy program with Roma (Gypsy) children as an outreach ministry of the Sofia Baptist Church. She coordinated the partnership between International Ministries and the Baptist Union of Bulgaria. She provided support to short-term mission teams that came from the United States to work alongside Bulgarian Baptists in their ministries.

As we seek to follow Jesus, the Holy Spirit may surprise us and draw us out of our comfort zone. This was true for Terry as she became aware of young women that were being trafficked on the streets and roads in the capital city of Sofia. As a result, Terry worked with other women to organize “Daughters of Bulgaria,” a ministry that reached out to those human trafficking victims.

Throughout their ministry in Bulgaria, Terry supported Tom’s development work that was primarily in job and small business creation. Tom was also involved in business-as-mission to support the ministry outreach of Sofia Baptist Church and provide a place for job training. During those years, Terry and Tom were also busy parenting their two sons who were eight and six years old when the family moved to Bulgaria.

We are grateful that God has brought Terry to join us in ministry at RBC with her warm personality and multiple skills. Welcome, Terry!

FROM THE GREEN TEAM:

Why Use Renewable Table Service at RBC?

There have been many reports in the news recently about global warming, and a crisis that is looming. We hear of extreme weather, melting polar caps, rising, warming oceans, and most recently the burning fires in the Amazon, known as the lungs of our planet. These impact our immediate life, our health, communities around the world, of course our beautiful hurting earth, and especially our future. Many experts predict that we have just a few years to turn the crisis around before it is too late. Folks ask me, "What can I do?" What follows is a suggestion for not only us at RBC, but any home or workplace or school. We have both an opportunity and a responsibility to make a small change which has a big impact to help the environment. We can stop using plastic and paper goods (plates, silverware, cups, napkins), and replace them with reusable items. Yes, it takes more time to wash them up and dry them and put them away, but fortunately we already own (almost) everything needed to accomplish this task. Who will do this? You might ask. But first, an explanation of how it impacts our planet and why it would be helpful to take this step:

First, a discussion of Raw Materials used.

- 1) Plastic. This takes several forms: Styrofoam, (which uses benzene, a known carcinogen), plastic silverware, or tablecloths, all made from a by-product of oil refining. The petroleum is first extracted, then separated, to be available for the production. Next, the manufacturing takes not only the petroleum, but also much water. Also involved in the process are toxic chemicals and dyes, all causing pollution.
- 2) Paper. One of the biggest culprits in the destruction of forests is the paper industry. Americans use 50 million tons of paper each year, costing 850 million trees. Not only does the manufacture of all this paper destroy whole forests, and all the plants, wildlife, nutrients, soil and insects depending on them, but often the forests are destroyed by "slash and burn", using the land for agriculture or development. This causes erosion, death, landslides, and watershed destruction along with the other issues. It also adds carbon dioxide to our atmosphere, one of the worst gasses in global warming.
- 3) Fossil fuels. These are used in the ingredients, the manufacture, the packaging, the storage, and the transportation of both paper and plastic goods. Harmful dyes and chlorine bleaches which create dioxin, a deadly toxin, are used in making colored and white paper products. In the production of chlorine, dioxin can leak into the air, ground and water, and then into our bodies, causing health problems including liver damage, reproduction problems, rashes and nervous system damage. All this to get nice white paper.

Second, notes about Packaging and Transportation:

The packaging of both paper and plastic goods takes even more paper (cardboard), and more plastic (wrap), and more transportation, of course using more fossil fuels. It also takes fuel to run the plants. Even paper goods are packed in plastic, very little of which is recycled. Once they are packaged, it still takes fuel to store them, then transport, (to the warehouse), then again store, and transfer again (to the store). One fact: paper and packaging waste is about 30% of all garbage, roughly 5 million tons a year.

Finally, Disposal:

Eventually, the paper and plastic goods make it to our stores, then our homes, and churches for use. We usually throw away the packaging, then after we use the products (soiled paper cannot be recycled), we throw them "away". But where is "away"? They are picked up by the garbage trucks (using more fuel) then taken to a landfill. Sometimes these landfills are far away, even overseas, taking more fuel to transport them. Even though paper is biodegradable, the landfills are designed to isolate the waste from the air and water to prevent ground, air and water contamination. Styrofoam cups, even if they were exposed to air, can take up to 1,000 years to biodegrade. Trash that is burned releases toxic chemicals into the air causing more pollution and health problems. When the trash does eventually break down, it leaks methane gas into the atmosphere which is very harmful, and one of the major causes of global warming.

Final thoughts: The good news is that we have everything we need to stop making a negative impact on our earth, and join the Healers. We have ceramic plates, bowls, stainless steel silverware, and some newly purchased reusable glasses. We are working on getting the napkins and mugs. It won't be long and we will have those too. Yes, these all took natural resources to manufacture and then to wash, but not nearly as much as the water, petroleum, and paper needed to manufacture, package, transport, and dispose of their plastic and paper counterparts. We are fortunate here to have an abundant supply of resources with which we can honor each other, the environment, the earth itself, and most of all, God. Let us work together to accomplish this goal, even if it takes a little more of our energy. Many great conversations take place when doing dishes, and I consider this holy ground too. Perhaps we could have a list of people who would be willing to help wash the dishes and put them away when there is a function. Are you willing? Contact Kay Rolfs Massaglia if you are?

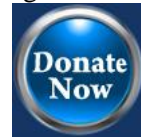
