Course Description:

Introduction to Criminal Justice is the study of the agencies and processes involved in the criminal justice system, including the legislature, the courts, and corrections; an analysis of the roles and problems of the criminal justice system in a democratic society with an emphasis on 4th, 5th, & 6th amendment considerations during police investigations, arrest, in pre-trial procedures, and while moving through the justice system. Careers in policing will be examined, including ethical considerations and standard protocols and dilemmas facing law enforcement on a daily basis such as matters involving use of force and the force continuum, so that students can make an informed decision whether or to pursue the full range of careers and postsecondary opportunities the criminal justice fields.

Assessment Strategies:

The following will be used in the evaluation of students: Weekly assignments, Tests (after each chapter is completed), quizzes (to test for reading assignments and vocabulary), research paper (3-5 Pages), homework, various projects, presentations, cooperative learning activities, online discussions, and self-assessment.
