The final set of league fixtures in the Wales Walking Football League South for the Cardiff City 60s teams was held at Haverfordwest on Sunday July 20th. This season saw a departure from the previous two league format of east and west leagues into a combined single league competition consisting of 14 teams played over three rounds in Neath & Haverfordwest. Whilst some would consider this a disappointing season it is worth noting the final league positions were a marked improvement over the previous year. The coaching and preparation for the start of the league fixtures resulted in neither team losing in the first round of games. However, this level of performance was not sustained for the remainder of the season. A detailed examination of the league table exposes the areas that both teams need to work on if further improvement is to be achieved. In the case of Cardiff City A, four of the 6 losses were in the final round and all by a single goal and overall with only 12 goals scored in the 13 matches the resulting mid-table position should not be a surprise. The results for Cardiff B, having scored only 6 goals, whilst conceding nearly the same number of goals as the A team, masks a number of hard earned draws, whilst disappointingly gaining only two wins. Going forward the teams need to find a solution to the over-reliance of only a few capable goalkeepers, build variety and consistency in the style of play and work on converting more of the chances created into goals which will hopefully turn 1-0 defeats into at least draws, if not wins.

The Cardiff City 60s team went into the last round of league games at the Haverfordwest FC ground knowing that only wins would enable the team to finish in a mid-table position or perhaps even higher if other results were to go in their favour.

The team started well with a 2-1 win v Cwmbran with Jeff White scoring both the Cardiff goals. This was followed shortly afterwards beating Aberavon 2-1, Jeff white again on the scoresheet along with Ian Herbert. The other four fixtures versus Neath, Abercynon, Barry A and Merthyr Police, all teams who finished in the top 5, saw the team on the wrong side of a 0-1 defeat in each game.

Paul Heginbothom, manager and captain for the day commented, "Yes those defeats were disappointing, but the squad was very good in all of those games and it was only resolute defending and excellent goalkeeping by the opposition that kept us from scoring."

The final table showed Cardiff City in 9th position and whilst this represents an improvement on previous seasons, it is still below the expectations set by the team at the beginning of the campaign.

Leighton Elward was mentioned in dispatches for responding to the last minute SOS call when Graham Rees had to withdraw at very short notice. He did not let the team down.

The squad will now plan for the 60s cup competition, scheduled for 7th September at Neath

It was a disappointing start to the day with a 0-2 loss to Aberavon. Cardiff controlled possession for the first 10 minutes without creating many opportunities. A defensive lapse led to Aberavon's first goal. Rob Firth, usually deadly from the spot, then missed a well saved penalty before Aberavon scored again following a deflection.

Despite playing much better in a very even game against Caldicot, at 1-1 with a minute left on the clock, a defensive lapse led to the opposition's winning goal. Rob Firth scoring the only Cardiff goal of the day.

In a competitive game 3 finished with a 0-0 draw. Despite the fact that Merthyr created a number of chances, a combination of poor finishing and good goal keeping resulted in a well earned point.

In the penultimate match, Cardiff came across the very well drilled and disciplined Trefelin, resulting in a 0-3 loss. It was a deserved win by the opposition who showed good movement and clinical finishing.

The day was completed with a 0-0 draw against New Hedges in what was probably the team's best performance, better accuracy in front of goal would likely have resulted in 3 points.

In summary, the team spirit was excellent and well managed by Roger on the day, with captain Dickie constantly giving encouragement and direction from the goal line. The team never gave up against some stiff competition and kept good discipline despite a style of refereeing which seemed lenient at times compared to the Thursday squad sessions. Defensive lapses and inconsistency in front of goal were the team's Achilles' heel.

The Cards controlled the remainder of the game and won the game 1-0. Next up was Merthyr and the Cards gave the opposition too much respect in the first 5 minutes and they were second best but they slowly came into the game and finished the stronger team but without causing the Merthyr keeper many anxious moments. The Cards shot-stopper, Dave Tracey pulled off one great save late on from a blocked and deflected shot that made the save an even better one. The 0-0 final score was if truth be told a fair reflection of the game.

The Cards final game of the day was against Swansea. The 'boys' came out with a purpose, Bill Barnett was keeping things bolted down at the back, the midfield probing and patience from the trio of Andy McMath, captain Joe Quarini and Kevin Williams and with Steve Taylor causing chaos up front with his intelligent movement and first time shots. Cardiff A took a squad of 7 players, which was deemed perfect for the four matches. This allowed two players having a ten-minute break in rotation. Interestingly, the average age of the squad was close to seventy, with a few players turning out in Cardiff colours for the first time. Whilst not the strongest squad fielded by Cardiff, however, this was indicative of the approach taken by the other Welsh teams, who were also below full strength. The final table shows a mixed set of results, with Graham Rees in goals helping to keep the score lines respectable and Gatchy scoring goals at the other end. In summary, the team were complimented by their opponents for their ability to keep possession and could not be faulted for effort. Lapses in defensive concentration inevitable were punished by the opposition which could not be cancelled out at the other end with some weak shooting on goal. The Cardiff B team results reflect a more challenging afternoon. Conceding eleven goals in four matches was always going to make it difficult. The final round of games in the Clevedon Mini Tournament proved to be a difficult day for Cardiff losing all four games to the top 4 clubs. Whilst disappointing, manager for the day John Mac, commented that he thought the team played some decent football,

were comfortable in possession, though it was maintaining momentum in the second half of each game which proved to be their 'Achille's' heel. As in previous rounds, the goals conceded reflected defensive lapses against good teams who would not hesitate to take advantage of any errors. Special mention to Gatchy scoring three of the five Cardiff goals and Alun Harries and Chris Heavens, who 'put in a shift' in the words of the manager.

Cardiff finishing the league sixth out of eight is clearly as a result of losing nine of the fourteen games played. Whilst looking for the positives, the players who put their hand up and represented the team should be commended. Overall, the goals conceded needs to be addressed with Cardiff finishing with the worse defensive record in the league, conceding twenty two goals. It should be noted that the top three teams conceded only seventeen goals in total, no doubt with a combination of good goalkeeping, few defensive errors and tight marking in their own half of the pitch.

Focus on Health The Four Numbers That Matter Dr. Chris Heavens





A little while ago Alan Woodward and I were invited to speak before a football session, about some health issues that would be relevant to men of our age. I'm pleased now to have the chance in this newsletter to revisit what was said then and expand on some of the details.

It's a fact that men generally are less likely to seek medical advice, and that as we pass the age of 50, the incidence of many serious medical conditions starts to rise. You may feel it is too late to take effective action to prevent the onset of these diseases – but you would be wrong. Even in later life preventative action either through lifestyle change or by treatment can be very effective in reducing the chances of early death or serious life changing disease.

I believe that our Walking Football Club is an excellent way through physical activity and social interaction to improve physical and mental health, barring injuries sustained of course!

Before going on to talk about specifics it would be wrong of me not to mention the lifestyle changes that are the foundation of a healthy later life. I suspect you will know many if not all of them, but their real importance means they bear repeating.

Physical activity, greater than just our football sessions, controlling weight to a healthy level, sensible diet restricting sugars and fats, moderate alcohol and not smoking.

The 4 numbers you should know about yourself

- 1. Blood Pressure (Bp)
- 2. Average Blood Sugar Level (HbA1c)
- 3. Cholesterol Level (lipids)
- 4. Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA)

Look out for articles in the next newsletters where I will explain more and give advice on these important 4 numbers. Many of you will be working hard to keep yourselves fit and healthy, and there is always a balance between enjoying life and being as healthy as possible, but we all want to be fit and healthy enough to be playing football into advanced old age and we have some great examples to emulate within the club.

The focus of my talk and of these articles is just on 4 numbers that we should start by knowing about our own bodies. These numbers can tell us whether diseases are starting in our body and therefore can give us an opportunity to correct the problem or manage the issue before we develop serious and possibly irreversible consequences. Therefore, it's not about just knowing these 4 numbers but of knowing if they are abnormal and if necessary, of taking action, with medical help, to deal with issues those numbers may be revealing.


Focus on Health Automatic External Defibrillator - AED What you need to know



An **Automated External Defibrillator** (AED) is a portable electronic device that analyses the heart rhythm of a person experiencing sudden cardiac arrest and, if necessary, delivers an electrical shock to help the heart re-establish a regular rhythm. AEDs are designed to be user-friendly and can be operated by individuals with minimal or no formal training.







Note – It is dangerous to use an AED in the presence of water

Purpose:

AEDs are specifically designed to treat sudden cardiac arrest, a life-threatening condition where the heart suddenly stops beating effectively.

How it works:

AEDs analyse the heart's rhythm through electrodes, pads, placed on the chest. If a shockable rhythm is detected, the AED will prompt the user to deliver an electrical shock to the heart.

User-friendly:

AEDs provide clear, step-by-step voice prompts and visual instructions to guide the user through the process.

Accessibility:

AEDs are often found in public places like schools, airports, and workplaces, making them readily available in emergencies.

Importance:

Prompt use of an AED, along with CPR, can significantly increase the chances of survival for someone experiencing sudden cardiac arrest.

No prior training required:

While formal training can be beneficial, anyone can use an AED in an emergency situation.
