My theme and logo for this year are simple, yet meaningful. Please read my article on the website to explain my vision and what my theme means to each member of Nebraska Women of Today. Leaders and managers often must possess overlapping skills to excel in their roles. But there are key differences between the two:

- **Managers** are responsible for managing teams and subordinates to execute tasks. Managers are typically going to be more involved in daily activities and responsibilities of their staff to push through to get projects executed and deadlines met.
- Leaders are more focused on forward-thinking and innovation. Leaders aren't as operationally focused, rather focused on moving the organization forward through new opportunities.

Managers have a responsibility to manage their staff. Leaders have a responsibility to manage the organization. Your leadership style becomes more evident as you grow and evolve in your career, but typically leadership styles fall into three buckets:

- Autocratic: Leaders and those in charge have final decision-making power. Feedback and solicitation from others is little to non-existent.
- **Democratic:** Everyone is given the same opportunity to contribute to the organization. Team members are encouraged to provide feedback.
- Laissez-faire: Under this leadership style, team members are encouraged to take control of their decision-making. Team members are responsible for managing themselves with little input from leadership directly.

Knowing your leadership style taps into your emotional awareness and allows you to better understand how your style impacts those around you.

Developing your leadership skills is an on-going activity as you progress in your career. If you're looking to kick-start development, here's a couple ways to consider:

• Make Goals: Think about the goals you want to set for yourself in your role. How can you create goals that challenge you and encourage you to develop your skills further? Goals help provide a framework for thinking about

progress and gives you something you measure yourself against.

- **Take on Projects:** There's no better teacher than experience. The more projects you take on (especially projects that involve multiple stakeholders), the more opportunities you'll get to flex your leadership skills in real-time. Ideally, those projects should align with the goals you've set for yourself.
- Find Leadership Training: Consider taking structured <u>leadership training</u> that will provide a structured way to develop new skills and help you improve existing ones.

As we embark on this new year, take the opportunity to reflect on the type of leader you aspire to be and identify how you can further develop your leadership skills to reach your goals. Consider how the state board and your chapter leadership can assist in fostering and refining these skills. State Program – Sex Trafficking Awareness

Our members are honored to do this project again this year, as this is our last year to have this as a Chapter Priority program. Our members have heard and seen so many statistics on this situation.



- Sex trafficking in Nebraska¹²:
- <u>Sex trafficking is a Class II felony, but when a</u> <u>minor is involved, it is upgraded to a Class IB</u> <u>offense¹</u>.

- <u>In 2021, seven new criminal human trafficking</u> <u>cases were filed in federal courts in Nebraska,</u> <u>and four defendants were convicted²</u>.
- <u>100% of new defendants were charged with</u> <u>sex trafficking, while 0% were charged with</u> <u>forced labor</u>

Human Trafficking in Nebraska: Facts, Statistics, Shelters and Prevention Organizations Human trafficking is growing to be an issue in the United States, including in Nebraska. This modern way of slavery targets not only individuals living in poverty but also those in middle and upper-class society.

As much as it sounds unbelievable, human beings are being sold and bought like property. They are deprived of their rights and freedom to work against their will.

Human trafficking is a multi-billion industry operating under the noses of the national government. Furthermore, <u>over 20 million</u> <u>victims</u> are trapped in these enterprises' shackles. Human Trafficking in Nebraska comes in two forms;

- Labor Trafficking involves recruitment, housing, transportation, providing, or procuring a person for work or services using coercion, force, or deception.
- Sex Trafficking, on the other hand, involves harboring, transporting, providing, soliciting, or obtaining a person for a commercial sex act by compulsion, deception, or force.

Nebraska Laws Against Human Trafficking With the enactment of the <u>Trafficking Victims</u> <u>Protection Act in 2000</u>, the United States declared human trafficking to be a federal offense. Legislation outlawing human trafficking was also enacted in Nebraska in 2006, but it has several restrictions that make it challenging to implement and convict traffickers. This problem is significant because of the unfairness it inflicts on people who fall victim to this horrible act.

The National Center on Missing and Exploited Children estimates that the number of 10-17 year olds being trafficked for sex in the United States each year likely exceeds 250,000; 60% of these victims are runaway, throwaway, or homeless youth*. This does not include the thousands of youth being trafficked each year for purposes of labor. Traffickers often target homeless shelters and schools as recruiting grounds for new trafficking victims. As such, it is imperative that schools and providers of services to homeless and other at-risk youth be aware of the issue and understand how to respond.

Nebraska significantly raised its <u>trafficking penalties</u> in 2016. By toughening punishments, lawmakers want to accomplish two goals.

The Victims of Trafficking and Violence Protection Act of 2000 was the first comprehensive federal law to provide for the protection of trafficking victims and the prosecution of traffickers within the United States. This law aims to combat trafficking into and within the United States of America through the prevention of trafficking through public awareness, the protection of victims through the provision of a variety of supports, and the prosecution of traffickers by establishing trafficking as a federal crime with severe penalties.


