

Pension Watch



I am a former science teacher and doing experiments in lab class was one of my favorite activities. To set up an experiment, run it correctly, and either confirm or deny a hypothesis was something I really enjoyed. Several legislatures have been running experiments with pensions by moving from defined benefit (DB) pensions to defined contribution (DC) pensions. Except these "experiments" were not set up very well, run correctly, or had a clear hypothesis. There is no understanding that there is any real answer to the experiment.

The several states that have been experimenting with pensions have for the most part found that there are consequences to the rash and poorly understood decisions they made. Some key things found are:

Employer costs increase. The state of Michigan pension plan cost went from \$169 million in 1998 to \$1.3 billion in 2022 and the funding ratio went from 109% to 69%. Trying to

maintain the old DB plan that is now having to invest monies differently and running the new DC plan is very inefficient.

Difficulty attracting new employees. Alaska has found that attracting new teachers and public employees in the DC plan has been a problem. Alaska has had to offer tens of thousands of dollars in bonus money to try to attract workers.

Employees are not amassing enough retirement money. Many workers, nationally 41.4%, cash out their DC money as they move from one job to another. This brings up another point legislators claim that DC plans are more attractive to younger workers because they can take the money with them when they leave. This causes two problems: First, many workers stay in the job until they are vested in the pension. When they leave, they remove their money from the plan. In Michigan this has removed 40-50% of the fund's money. Second, I think there are jobs in which we do not want high turnover. Think of a school having a new coach every two or three years. How well do you think the coach would know their players. Parents having to deal with new teachers popping in and out of classes. The loss of consistency and the loss of getting to know a community. Think of a state worker maintaining the highways. I am sure experience is important in knowing where there are problems and what to do with the expensive machinery used to make repairs.

North Dakota has embarked on an experiment, a pension experiment. Will the costs to the state pension increase? Will the state be able to attract and keep employees? Will retirees have enough money? The sad thing about this experiment is that it may affect people badly for years to come.

2023 National Retired Teachers Advocacy Conference



From October 2 through October 4 of this last fall, Sherryl Weisenberger, NDRTA President, and Rita Freeberg, NDRTA Vice President, attended the National Retired Teachers Advocacy Conference in Washington, DC. The National Retired Teachers Association (NRTA) and the American Association for Retired Persons (AARP) sponsored two representatives from each state to first attend an intense day of informational sessions about protecting Social Security, lowering drug prices, curbing gun violence and violence in schools, with the major topic of concern, creating a Care Giver Reimbursement Act for all caregivers.

On October 4, the representatives from each state's Retired Teachers Association were then supposed to meet with their Senators and Representatives to discuss matters of concern and to encourage them to support the Caregiver's Reimbursement Act. Unfortunately, it

was the day after the House Speaker was ousted, so none of the Senators or Representatives were in their offices. Sherryl and Rita met with their staff in the ND Senators' offices and left contact information with a page of concerns that had been expressed by NDRTA members at the State Convention as well as at local unit meetings. Concerns ranged from keeping Social Security fully funded, to keeping pensions safe with diligent oversight, recruiting and retaining teachers, and

keeping ND communities safe, affordable, and healthy.



The weather in Washington, DC was beautiful for October, allowing Sherryl and Rita to walk to many of the buildings.

Dr. Ethel Percy Andrus (black and white cutout in the photo to the left) established the National Retired Teachers Association in 1947. NRTA became a national voice for Retired Teachers across the United States, promoting fair



state retirement programs and pensions while seeking such advantages and opportunities as offering group health insurance. The NRTA became so successful that other retired people desired similar advantages. From that desire, Dr. Andrus established AARP which has become a strong national advocate for retired persons and has far out-paced the "parent" organization of NRTA. At present, NRTA is designated as AARP's Educator Community.

The Fargo Retired Teachers Association (FRTA) meets on the first Thursday of each month from September through May, except for January. We support the Food Pantry and Backpack for Kids with member food and money donations. We also give several \$1,000 scholarships for prospective educators.

The September meeting is always a gala affair with a fashion show. Jennifer Fisher of My Best Friend's Closet supplied the fashion wear and members modeled them. Verlene Dvoracek emceed and has ably put together this program for several years.

For October, Steve Scheel, CEO of Scheels, was our speaker. Steve told us of the history of Scheels from a good potato crop in 1909 near Sabin, MN, leading to the purchase of a single hardware store to today's thirty-two stores in sixteen states. Scheels is now a national leader in sales of sports equipment. The "big" Scheels store in Fargo is one of the smaller stores in their system.



In November Don Tucker, an engineer, outlined the work on Fargo's expansion of its sewage treatment plant. Don told us how the growth of Fargo and the surrounding area necessitated this expansion. He also explained the operation of the plant from introduction of the wastewater to "drinkable" treated water at the end that is put back into the Red River.

Our December meeting was a musical affair lead by Karen Tabor singing solo or leading the members in a round of Christmas carols. Each month Connie Knain and the hostess committee decorate the tables with seasonally appropriate decorations, a much-appreciated touch.

It got so bad in Fargo they elected me president, the only male member in FRTA.

The last item will hopefully be good news. I was in Papa Murphy's Pizza earlier this year and noticed a poster advertising Pizza Donation Days. This is a program where we host an event at Papa Murphy's and encourage members and others to purchase pizzas on given days, we were given two days during Teacher Appreciation Week. For all the pizzas sold, that people mention they are buying teacher pizzas, Papa Murphy's will give us 20% of the sales money. We are going to use this money to augment the scholarship monies. I will tell you how and if this program is worth it at the unit meeting during the NDRTA convention.

Krum Kaka Every Christmas Sherry makes dozens of delicious krum kaka (krumkake) for friends and neighbors.

3 eggs
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup whole milk
1/2 cup butter (melted)
1 1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat the eggs and sugar together. Add milk and vanilla. Then add the melted butter slowly. Add the flour little by little. If it gets too heavy, add more milk. Cook on a Krum Kaka griddle and immediately roll on wooden cones until cool. Repeat. Store uncovered.
