 Program


Since then, several Marines have expressed interest. I've shared the necessary information and directed them to the National website. For those still considering, you can find full details in the Member Library under VSO and YPF.

NEW ENGLAND DIVISION MARINE CORPS LEAGUE CELEBRATES HISTORY





On June 6th, the 81st anniversary of D Day, The New England Division of the Marine Corps League set sail aboard the USS Constitution. The event was arranged by PNC Warren Griffin. USS Constitution departed from the Charlestown Navy Yard, Massachusetts, on Friday, June 6, at 10:00 a.m. This underway honors the Allied D-Day invasion of Europe during World War II and serves as a salute to all Marine Corps veterans, active-duty service members and their families as we celebrate the Marine Corps' 250th birthday. The ship will be closed to the public in the morning and will reopen to the public from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. following her return to port.


During the underway, USS Constitution will render a 21-gun salute off Fort Independence on Castle Island at approximately 11:30 a.m., followed by a 17-gun salute as she passes the U.S. Coast Guard Base Boston—the former site of Edmund Hartt's shipyard, where the ship was built and launched on October 21, 1797. The underway will be visible from the Boston Harborwalk, Castle Island, and the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The first time Marines fought aboard the Constitution was in the war of 1812. Lt. Lemuel Clark commanded the first 55 Marines assigned to USS Constitution. Today, Marines sailed on the Constitution again as her guns echoed loud salutes as it navigated the Boston Harbor. The Marine Corps Flag proudly flying high above the deck, as Marines from many different periods in History. Semper Fidelis Marines, Good Times.

November 10th, 1775 -

We have our work cut out for us this fiscal year. Full steam ahead.

LIVING THE MARINE CORPS VALUE OF HONOR

Four Years of Remembering

It was time to leave Afghanistan for the last time, and the work was nearly finished on that hot summer day of August 26, 2021. The mission was to ensure the safety and security of the evacuation process at Kabul's International Airport, but that day would end in disaster. The suicide bomber killed at least 182 people, including 169 local civilians and 13 U.S. service members; 11 Marines, one Navy Corpsman, and one Army soldier.

I recall the anguish that day when these brave heroes ventured into the crowd to gather the last of the civilians to be screened for the flight out of Afghanistan. It was heartbreaking to hear and process the news, especially after being so close to leaving that 20-year war. One of the fallen Marines was from Lawrence, MA. I attended the funeral service to bear witness to this fallen female warrior, Sgt. Johanny Rosario, who loved life and loved being a U.S. Marine. Her entire extended family was present. It was a sad but moving experience. Doing nothing was not



an option for me so I went for a hard 4-mile run in 95 degrees heat through the hills of my town to remember our brothers and sisters we tragically lost. Since then, I remember and honor these young warriors each year on August 26 th with the same run through the hills. These are the names of those lost in the closing day of the Afghanistan War: U.S. Marines: Staff Sgt. Darin T. Hoover, Sgt. Johanny Rosario, Sgt. Nicole L. Gee, Cpl. Hunter Lopez, Cpl. Dae-

gan W. Page, Cpl. Humberto A. Sanchez, Lance Cpl. David L.Espinoza, Lance Cpl. Jared M. Schmitz, Lance Cpl. Rylee J. McCollum, Lance Cpl. Dylan R. Merola, Lance Cpl. Kareem M. Nikoui. U.S. Navy: Corpman Maxton W. Soviak U.S. Army: Staff Sgt. Ryan C. Knauss. Let us all take a moment on August 26 th to remember and honor the fallen and to pray for their Gold Star Families they left behind. We remember.

The Reemergence of Lance Corporal William Hart From The Ashes

There is a saying that no one is truly dead until he has been forgotten. If that's the case, then Lance Corporal William Hart, a 1981 graduate of Robert E. Fitch High School in Groton, CT has become a phoenix of sorts. On October 23, 1983, Lance Corporal Hart was among the hundreds who were killed in the horrific terrorist bombing of the Marine Barracks in Beirut, Lebanon. And after his burial in New London's Cedar Hill Cemetery, he pretty much disappeared from public memory.



A while later, she remembered that an old friend, Dave Kargul, a New London native and a Marine veteran of the Vietnam War, was then-serving as the Chaplain of the Thames River Detachment (TRD) #1334 of the Marine Corps League's Department of Connecticut. She notified him about Lance Corporal Hart's forgotten gravesite.



However, in 2018, Jennifer McNeil-Donnel, a Fitch H.S. classmate of William Hart's, and who in adulthood had become the mother of two Marines herself, realized that William was not listed as being among the deceased Connecticut servicemen killed in the Beirut bombing. Jennifer took it upon herself to notify Fitch High School, which resulted in a plaque in honor of Lance Corporal Hart's service and sacrifice being installed in their alma mater's lobby.



Representing New London County, CT each year on the weekend of Memorial Day, it has become a tradition for the TRD to visit the graves of its deceased detachment members, to place new American and Marine Corps flags on their graves, to show that despite the fact that they have departed from our physical presence, they have not been forgotten. Prior to 2023, the TRD was neither aware of Lance Corporal William Hart's existence, nor that he was interred in

New London. But after learning about the burial-site's location, Marine Kargul passed the word, and each year since then, that long-forgotten grave has been decorated with new flags. The fact that Lance Corporal Hart's death predated the founding of the TRD by 26 years didn't matter. He was a New London County Marine, and the TRD had to honor our brother Marine.

In 2024 the TRD felt that was not enough, so the members decided to establish a \$250 cash award in memory of Lance Corporal Hart, for a graduating senior from Fitch H.S., who plans on enlisting in *any* branch of the Armed Forces of the United States. Since expressions of patriotism in the United States have been waning in recent years, it was hoped that this modest cash award would further honor Lance Corporal Hart's service and sacrifice, and might inspire others to follow in his footsteps, in service to our country.

For the initial year of their cash award (2025), TRD #1334 has provided the seed money, and will administer it in future years, soliciting funds from donations, bequests, grants, Fitch H.S. alumni, and targeted fundraisers. Hopefully, the generosity of New London County citizens and businesses will enable the TRD to present annual cash awards indefinitely into the future. In that way they will continue to remember the name and sacrifice of one of their own, while supporting Fitch High School graduates, who choose to follow the path of military service.

The TRD's application form is available from Ms. Jennifer Allanach, Fitch High School's College and Career Counselor, and the first award was made on June 3rd of 2025, in this, the Semi-Quincentennial year of the Marine Corps' founding in 1775 as The Continental Marines.

The recipient was Omkari R. Mehta of Groton, an outstanding student and a member of the Navy Junior ROTC at Fitch High School. In reading her application, and the endorsement of her Senior Naval Science Instructor, Terance J. Henkle, LCDR USN (Ret), who wrote, she will "succeed in any program or direction she chooses." She will soon be entering the U.S. Air Force, with hopes of becoming an astronaut and one day to work for NASA.





At the AHM this weekend! WWII Pacific War Re-enactment – Battle of Okinawa, July 12th & 13th, 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM The American Heritage Museum will host a WWII Pacific Theater re-enactment. Infantry representing Japanese and American forces will clash in this extraordinary living history event. Camps will be set up with authentic gear and appearance. WWII aircraft will fly in the battle (weather permitting). The Battle of Okinawa, fought from April to June 1945, was the largest and bloodiest battle of the Pacific Theater in World War II. The intense combat was marked by kamikaze attacks, brutal ground fighting, and high civilian casualties. The battle was the fiercest in the Pacific Theater, with some 50,000 Allied and 100,000 Japanese casualties, not including the local Okinawans who were conscripted into the Japanese Army. It is estimated that over 149,000 Okinawan people were killed. The Allied victory at Okinawa provided a critical staging ground for a potential invasion of mainland Japan, but the staggering loss of life and the fierce Japanese resistance significantly influenced the U.S. decision to use atomic bombs to end the war swiftly. Okinawa underscored the heavy cost of victory in the Pacific and hastened the final chapter of the war. Pacific war camps and aircraft will be set up and on display throughout the day. The battle re-enactment starts around 1 PM

My HAMSAL presentation can also be found on the MCL Library under the member section. As a retired Police Officer and Marine Corps veteran in recovery, I understand about suffering in silence and fighting that stigma, especially within the First Responder and military/veteran community. Sergeant Richard Arthur Kowalker, known throughout Connecticut as "The Riderless Horse Marine," passed away on May 2, 2025, at the age of 76. Born September 21, 1948, in Middletown, Connecticut, Sqt. Kowalker devoted his life to honoring the fallen with an unmatched spirit of pat-

riotism, compassion, and duty. He was laid to rest with full military honors on June 6, 2025, at the State Veterans Cemetery in Middletown.

ment of military tradition and love for fellow service members. Together, Richard and Melody honored over 700 veterans. On countless occasions, he was not officially scheduled to participate—but that never stopped him. He made it his mission to be there for as many veterans as possible, regardless of time, distance, or weather.

One of the most memorable examples of his dedication came when a fire destroyed his horse trailer. Rather than cancel his appearance, he walked over 15 miles with Melody and

a borrowed horse to keep his promise. This act led to a communityled fundraiser to replace his trailer—a testament to the respect he had earned across the state.

Even after Melody passed away peacefully in 2018 at the age of 33, Richard continued his mission. Her final days were spent at the Connecticut Draft Horse Rescue in East Hampton, where Sgt. Kowalker stayed by her side, speaking gently as she passed—a Marine to the end.

Sgt. Kowalker served in the United States Marine Corps for 11 years, including a combat deployment during the Vietnam War from April 1968 to May 1969. For his courage and sacrifice, he received the Purple Heart, Vietnam Service

Medal, and the Presidential Unit Citation. Upon returning home, he served his community working security at the Long Lane reform school in Middletown. But it was his later calling—to honor fallen veterans—that came to define his legacy. After facing the challenges of post-traumatic stress, Sgt. Kowalker found healing through a mission rooted in reverence: ensuring no veteran was laid to rest without honor.

In 2005, Sgt. Kowalker adopted a Morgan mare named Melody. With no prior horsehandling experience, he trained alongside her until

When you would ask John how he was doing he would respond not bad for a fellow my age.

John's wife was Polish and John spoke Polish, I never though to ask why he spoke Polish but he brought it up often that he could. We used to talk about the school my daughter went to as it was a Catholic Polish school St. Hedwigs. He knew the school

and used to attend some of the events there.

He spoke at every celebration and holiday. Every awards dinner and picnic. He attended parades and fairs and if you were at the event you were sure to

be entertained all day. At the end of the day he would always comment he was going home to the princess who demanded all his devotion and respect. John and Mary Jane would be celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary in July, which I am sure would have been a great event for them. WWR Fact Sheet

District Injured Support Coordinators & Field Support Representatives

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) and Field Support Representatives (FSRs) are an integral part of the Wounded Warrior Regiment's (WWR) support structure. They act as a conduit to Marine Corps, Veterans Affairs (VA), and civilian resources for Marines recovering away from a military installation or transitioning to veteran status. DISCs are Marine reservists and FSRs are contract support geographically dispersed to provide assistance and community liaison where needed.

The goal of DISCs and FSRs is to return well adjusted wounded, ill, or injured (WII) Marine veterans to their communities with the knowledge and skills to self-advocate and assist other WII Marines.

What Services do DISCs and FSRs offer?

- Outreach through calls or face-to-face contact with WII Marines and their families requiring assistance.
- · Assistance with accessing VA and community resources.
- Facilitate veteran medical care through VA patient advocates or OIF/OEF Coordinators.
- Information on family and caregiver support services (i.e. respite care, scholarship opportunities, counseling support).
- Access to education and employment resources in their local communities (i.e. resume development, interview skills, network/ employment opportunities, and application completion).
- Support in working with representatives from medical facilities, the VA, legal authorities, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Immediate access to the WWR's medical section and VA for psychological health resources and support, including referrals to local resources to ensure WII Marines receive timely and appropriate care.

Many may not be aware but Congressional funding the Young Marines receives support different levels of administrative and operational costs to include support for Leadership Schools and our summer programs. We are **NOW** at a critical point. Our FY26 funding was not in the House, and we have a very small window with the Senate. With a few previous gap years that were not funded many know the challenges we faced. We cannot do this alone, and we need your help.

In past years Congress authorized and appropriated funding to ensure the Young Marines program was able to provide youth leadership education, development, and drug prevention and resistance education for the next year. In Fiscal Year 2022 (October 2021-September 2022) and FY 2023 (October 2022-September 2023), the Young Marines was cut out of the budget process because of the way the budget was passed, which means that we received no federal funding to continue the mission of "strengthening the lives of America's youth" for 2023 and 2024. With your help, we received the restoration of our funding for FY 2025. As budget negotiators are working now on the annual budget for FY 2026, we really need your help. Please contact your Congressional Representatives to ask for their support in ensuring the Young Marines receive the funding for the upcoming year.

We've have had to dramatically cut back on our programs the last few years due to the funding cuts. This has greatly impacted or eliminated many of the following: summer programs, National Director programs, National Leadership Schools, Adult Volunteer Training, Esprit magazine, our support for materials to the field, and so much more. This funding is critical to our full operations in the future.
