Message From The Division Commandant



Members,

Growing our membership is something every one of us can help with. It is not just an administrative task or an officer responsibility—it is a shared effort. Our ability to serve Marines, advocate for their needs, and provide meaningful support depends on a strong and active membership.

Many of us joined the League looking for camaraderie, purpose, and a continued connection to those who understand our experiences. There are Marines in our communities today who are still searching for that same sense of belonging. If they don't know who we are, or if there is no local Detachment for them to find, we miss the opportunity to support them when they need it most. Each conversation matters. Each invitation matters. Simply sharing what the League means to you can make a difference. Let's work together to strengthen our membership, protect our Detachments, and ensure the League remains a place where Marines can find support, purpose, and fellowship—now and in the future.

Looking ahead, we also have important oppor-

tunities this year to come together as a League. The Mid-Winter Conference will be held February 26–29 in Pentagon City, Virginia. For those traveling from New



England, I look forward to seeing you there. Additionally, the New England Division Conference will take place June 11–14 in Springfield, Massachusetts, hosted by the Department of Massachusetts. This conference represents an important change. After considerable effort to align bylaws across all Departments, this event will no longer be referred to as the Quad State Convention. This will be on a rotating basis among the six Departments. One of the driving factors behind this change was attendance. Participation at past Quad State conventions, as well as at individual Depart-

ment conventions in Massachusetts and Connecticut, had declined. The Division recognized that something needed to change, and this new approach is intended to bring more members together in a positive and unified way. We truly hope this change is met with enthusiasm and renewed participation as we continue working together to strengthen our membership. Hotel details have been provided to Department Commandants, and the agenda is still being finalized. Once complete, the agenda and registration information will be distributed in the coming weeks.

Welcome to 2026 and wishing all a Happy New Year ... however belated.

It's been quite a winter thus far. I've shoveled what feels like 100 inches of snow with more in the forecast. I cannot wait for spring.

That being said, be careful! Some sources indicate that anyone over age 45, but especially those with existing heart-related issues, should not shovel. A two-decade Canadian study said that for people over 65, there is a 16% increase in sudden heart attacks and a 34% rise in deaths after a big storm.

Use common sense. Don't lift and throw snow. Push it or use a snowblower. If you must lift it, don't fill the shovel, especially if it is wet snow.

Better to be slow and safe than quick and at risk.

Our Department meeting, originally scheduled for 1 February, is being postponed. Sunday the first, we are expecting dangerously cold temperatures with high winds and the possibility of more snow. Rather than putting people at risk driving to the meeting, we have moved the meeting to Sunday, 15 February. The eighth is Superbowl Sunday so another reason for the 15th.

When a Marine Corps League member passes, it is the duty of the Chaplain to represent the family on behalf of the Detachment and complete the Notice of Death (NOD). The fillable pdf form is easy to use and file electronically. [Notice-of-Death_2025_page_1.pdf](#).

Once complete, email or scan a copy of the NOD:

- 1) Detachment Chaplain sends a copy to the Department Chaplain and the Detachment Paymaster, retain a copy for detachment records.
- 2) Department Chaplain sends a copy to the Marine Corps League National Headquarters and National Chaplain, retaining a copy for department records.

This action will generate a notice to the Semper Fi Magazine

- 3) Detachment Paymaster must attach this form when submitting a Notice of Death via Transmittal

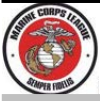

Veterans Count Check Presentation



At the December 9, 2025 GSD 542 Member meeting, Courtney Stairs joined the meeting for a presentation explaining about who Veterans Count a program of Easterseals is, and what they do for the veteran community.

Veterans Count has four branches in NH, and they offer many services to all who have served in the military, regardless of service era, discharge status, or VA eligibility. They help veterans access the services and support that they need. They offer mental health counseling, care coordination, substance use treatment coordination, housing stabilization, benefits and services connection, aging and senior needs, money management, and emergency financial

assistance. Their case managers go to the veteran where they are, and the veteran is not required to come into the Veterans Count office.

The Veterans Count services are free, but there may be some expense when the counselor passes the veteran over to another service, depending on the program. The only requirement is that the veteran lives or drills in NH.

WOUNDED WARRIOR REGIMENT

WWR Fact Sheet

District Injured Support Coordinators & Field Support Representatives

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) and Field Support Representatives (FSRs) are an integral part of the Wounded Warrior Regiment's (WWR) support structure. They act as a conduit to Marine Corps, Veterans Affairs (VA), and civilian resources for Marines recovering away from a military installation or transitioning to veteran status. DISCs are Marine reservists and FSRs are contract support geographically dispersed to provide assistance and community liaison where needed.

The goal of DISCs and FSRs is to return well adjusted wounded, ill, or injured (WII) Marine veterans to their communities with the knowledge and skills to self-advocate and assist other WII Marines.

What Services do DISCs and FSRs offer?

- Outreach through calls or face-to-face contact with WII Marines and their families requiring assistance.
- Assistance with accessing VA and community resources.
- Facilitate veteran medical care through VA patient advocates or OIF/OEF Coordinators.
- Information on family and caregiver support services (i.e. respite care, scholarship opportunities, counseling support).
- Access to education and employment resources in their local communities (i.e. resume development, interview skills, network/employment opportunities, and application completion).
- Support in working with representatives from medical facilities, the VA, legal authorities, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Immediate access to the WWR's medical section and VA for psychological health resources and support, including referrals to local resources to ensure WII Marines receive timely and appropriate care.

Who They Support

- Marines transitioning to veteran status
- Reserve Marines
- Marines recovering in remote locations away from military or federal resources
- TDRL/PDRL Marines

Where They are Located

DISCs and FSRs are geographically dispersed across the country and are generally collocated with VA-operated medical centers, vet centers, and out-patient clinics offering primary and specialized care.

Because each one will be better than the day before.

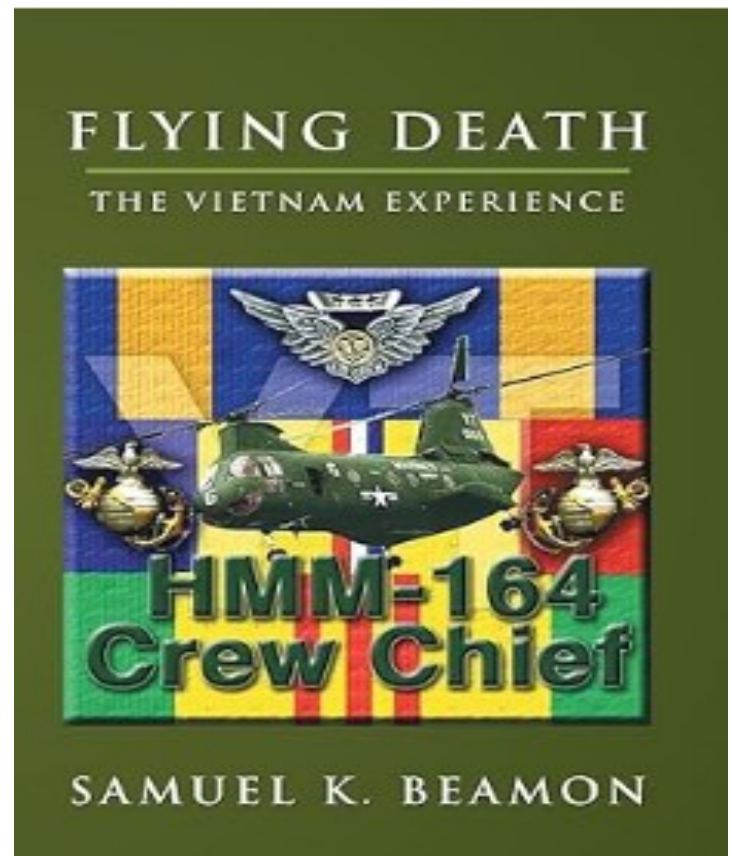

ADELE E. HODGES OF STRATFORD – U.S. MARINE CORPS **WAS INDUCTED INTO THE CT VETERANS HALL OF FAME**



Adele E. Hodges enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps following her graduation from Southern Connecticut State University. She was accepted into the Enlisted Commissioning Program and was commissioned in December 1980.

Col. Hodges assignments included: 1st Medical Battalion, 1st FSSG and 3rd Supply Battalion, 3rd FSSG in Okinawa, Japan; Marine Forces Pacific Headquarters in Hawaii; 4th Marine Aircraft Wing in New Orleans, Louisiana; Headquarters Battalion, 2nd Marine Division in Camp Lejeune; Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center at Twentynine Palms California; U.S. Army Command and General Staff College in Fort Leavenworth Kansas; Marine Corps Combat Development Command in Quantico Virginia; Brigade Service Support

Group One in Camp Pendleton California; the U.S. Naval War College in Newport Rhode Island; the NATO Joint Headquarters North East, and the NATO Joint Warfare Centre in Stavanger Norway. Her last assignment was at Headquarters United States Marine Corps, Office of the Inspector General as the Director of Readiness Assessments.

She commanded the 1st Maintenance Battalion, 1st FSSG at Camp Pendleton, California and Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, one of the largest installations in the Marine Corps.

Col. Hodges retired in 2011 after over thirty-three years of service to the United States Marine Corps. In 2013, she started a company, RALDFO Group LLC., where she is president and CFO.

Adele is a life member of the Marine Corps League, the Women Marine Association, Montford Point Marine Association, the VFW, and National Naval Officers Association.

She was named Onslow County, North Carolina's 2006 Woman of the Year in and most "Intriguing Woman" in 2007. She has master's degrees in business administration, military art and science, and strategic military studies. Her awards and decorations include Legion of Merit with one star, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with three stars, and a Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal.

Currently, Adele is the chairman for Veterans Heroes Foundation; Commandant for Greater Bridgeport MCL Det #654; member of the board of directors for Homes for the Brave; member of the board of trustees for the Connecticut Department of Veteran Affairs; chair of the advisory board for the Bridgeport Salvation Army; and member of the Greater Bridgeport Veterans Council. Adele sponsors the Greater Bridgeport Veteran Coffee House every other month, which is hosted by the Teamsters Local 191 in Bridgeport.

WAS INDUCTED INTO THE CT VETERANS HALL OF FAME



Michael (Mike) D. Monaco is a 41-year-old Marine Corps veteran, having served on active duty with 2d Low Altitude Air Defense Battalion from 2003 to 2007 and deploying to the Middle East twice. He achieved the rank of sergeant, earning numerous military awards and honors.

Mike was born and raised in Glastonbury, where he resides with his wife, McKenzie, and their two sons, Axel and Austin. He is the co-owner of Monaco Ford of Glastonbury and Niantic with his sister, Chrissy, where they employ 130 people at their fourth-generation business.

Mike serves as the senior past commandant of the Peter P. Monaco Jr. Detachment 40 Marine Corps League (MCL), past MCL Hartford County Department commandant, and vice chairman/parade adjutant of the Veterans Service Commission of Glastonbury. He is a life member of the MCL Detachment 40, VFW Post 12150, American Legion Post 210 and Disabled American Veterans. Additionally, Mike serves as a board member for Easterseals Capital Region and Eastern Connecticut, representing Veterans Rally Point, and is a Connecticut committee member of Building Homes for Heroes.

As the 2018 Connecticut Marine Corps League Marine of the Year, Mike has been instrumental in strengthening the MCL presence in the region, helping grow Detachment 40 from nearly nonexistent membership to more than 180 active members from all branches of the Armed Services. He also chairs the Hike to Remember, an annual event that draws approximately 250 veterans from all branches to hike in honor of veteran suicide prevention, raising awareness and support for mental health among the military community. Through this effort, the program has successfully raised more than \$300,000 in the past 12 years.

Throughout his work in business, community leadership, and veterans' advocacy, Mike remains deeply committed to service, continuing a tradition of dedication that reflects both his family values and Marine Corps heritage.

New England Division— is seeking a Legal Advisor and for this position you would need skills to advise the Division on all legal matters.

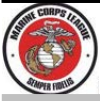
