

BRIEF FOR THE CHAPLAINS

Parade Ground

1. WHITFIELD COURT, the University Campus. See Annex A (Site Plan).

Robing Room

2. The Students Common Room. See Annex A.

Chaplains Car Park.

3. See Annex A.

Reception Arrangements.

4. Chaplains are requested to arrive at the entrance of WHITFIELD COURT by 2.10 P.M. Wives will be received at the entrance and escorted to seats on the terrace.
5. Chaplains should then drive to the Car Park and walk to the Common Room.
6. After robing, and in procession under the guidance of Chaplain-General, the Right Reverend C.L. RILEY, CBE, VD, the Chaplains should move to the seats reserved especially for them and their wives on the WEST side of the terrace.
7. The route to be followed is marked in blue on Annex A.
8. The Chaplains should leave the Common Room at 2.20 P.M. and be seated by 2.25 P.M.

Sequence of Events

9. The Following persons are received by the parade at the times shown :-

2.40 P.M.	The Commanding Officer
2.42 P.M.	The Honorary Colonel.
2.43 P.M.	The Chancellor of the University of Western Australia.
2.44 P.M.	The Commander 13 Infantry Brigade.
2.45 P.M.	The General Officer Commanding Western Command.
10. His Excellency is received with a Royal Salute at 2.52 P.M.
11. His Excellency then inspects the parade.
12. During the inspection of the centre and rear ranks the following action is to be completed :-
 - (a) The two majors will rise and together they will move to their positions on the parade ground. See Annex C.

- (b) As the two majors step off to descend the steps, the Chaplains should rise, as one man, and form procession and under the guidance of Chaplain-General Bishop C.L. RILEY, move to their places on the parade ground. See Annex C.
 - (c) The drums will be piled, microphones and kneelers positioned. See Annex C.
13. When His Excellency begins his inspection of the Western Command Band the two majors and the two subalterns will march to their positions.
 14. When the majors step off the Chaplains will turn to the right and, on a sign to be given by Chaplain-General, Bishop C.L. RILEY, left wheel and move to their places for the consecration ceremony. See Annex C.
 15. The Colours are uncased and placed on the drums.
 16. His Excellency and officers in immediate attendance move to their positions. See Annex C.
 17. When all are in position the Commanding Officer will commence the service. See Annex D.
 18. Following the avowal of dedication the troops will be called to attention and the Chaplains, in turn and in the order shown in Annex D, shall consecrate, bless and dedicate the Colours.
 19. The service is then completed, the Colours presented and the parade ordered to stand easy.
 20. His Excellency now addresses the parade and the Commanding Officer replies to His Excellency's address.
 21. On speaking the last word of his address the Commanding Officer will step back one pace and salute His Excellency.
 22. This is the sign for the Chaplains to turn left and move back to their original positions at the foot of the terrace. See Annex C. The distance between Chaplains should be a space in which a man can stand comfortably and shake hands.
 23. His Excellency is now escorted to the place where the Chaplains are now standing.
 24. The Chaplains are presented to His Excellency by the General Officer Commanding Western Command. As each Senior Chaplain is presented, his Assistant Chaplain should step forward to a place on the left of his senior and be presented. After presentation the Assistant Chaplain should step back.
 25. His Excellency and officers in immediate attendance now ascend the dais. As His Excellency turns away, the Chaplains should turn right and leave the parade ground and resume their seats on the terrace.
 26. On the conclusion of the parade afternoon tea is to be served in the Sunken Garden.

The Chaplain General, Roman Catholic, blessing the Colours, shall say :-

Bless, O Lord, these Colours which we bless in Thy Name, that those who follow them, may be ever mindful of Thy Presence, guided by Thy Will, and guarded by Thy Providence:

Making the sign of the Cross over the Colours he continues :

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

The Colours are now sprinkled with Holy Water.

The Chaplain General, Protestant Denominations, laying his hand on the colours, shall say :-

In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, we do dedicate and set apart these Colours, that they may be a sign of our duty towards our Queen and our Country in the sight of God. Amen.

The troops will be stood at ease.

Then all on parade shall say together :-

O Lord our God:

He beholdest all the kingdoms of the earth; have regard unto our land; that it may continue a place and a people; who serve Thee to the end of time.

Grant that all who live beneath our flag; may be so mindful of its crosses; that they may work for the good of others; according to the example of Him; who died upon a cross in the service of men.

Let Thy gracious favour rest on all; who shall follow the Colours; now about to be committed to our trust; May our courage ever rest; on our sure confidence in Thee; May we show self control; in the hour of success; and patience; in the time of adversity.

May our honour lie; in seeking the honour and glory of Thy great Name; through Jesus Christ; Our Lord; Amen.

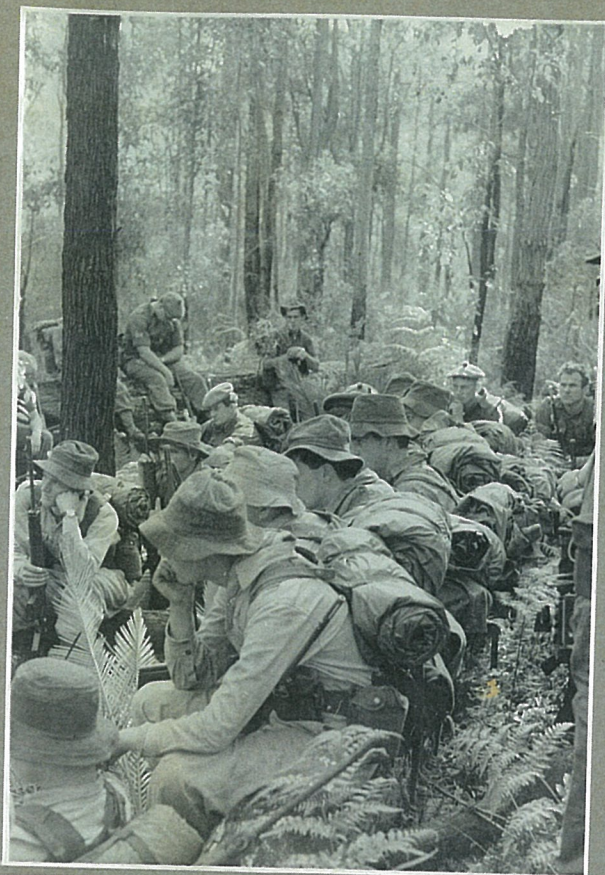

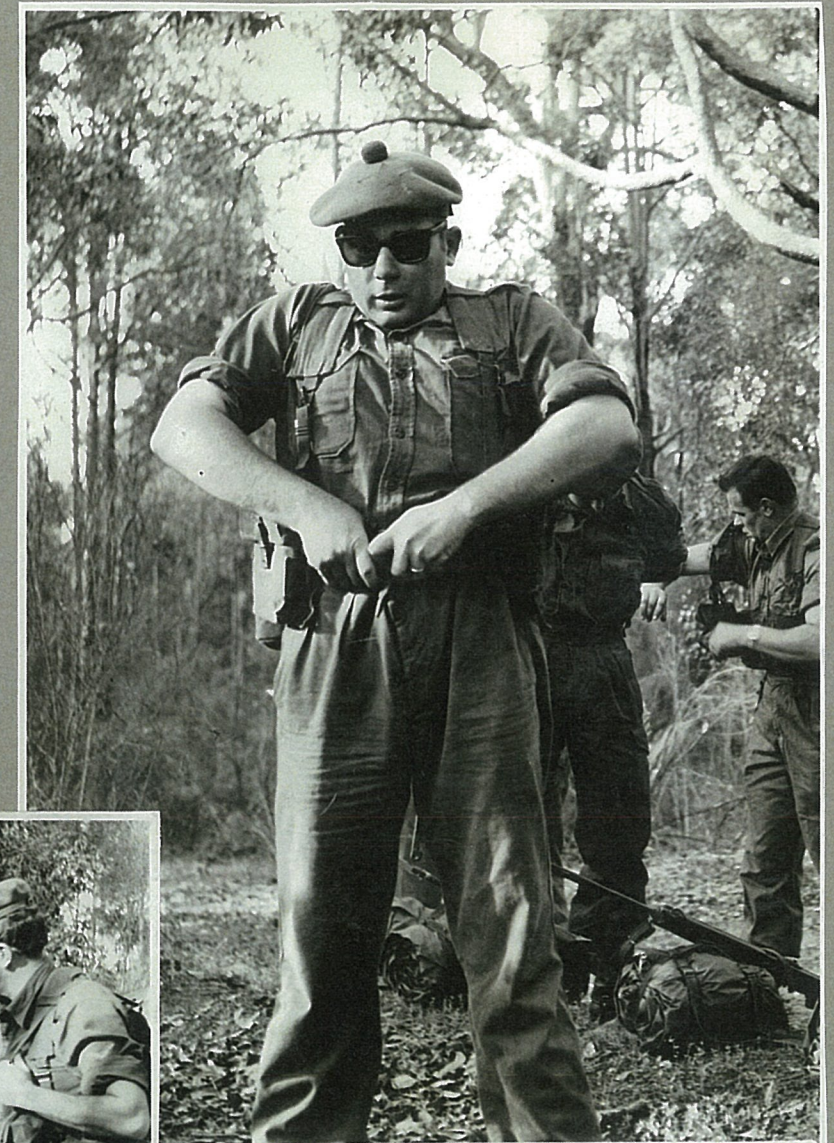

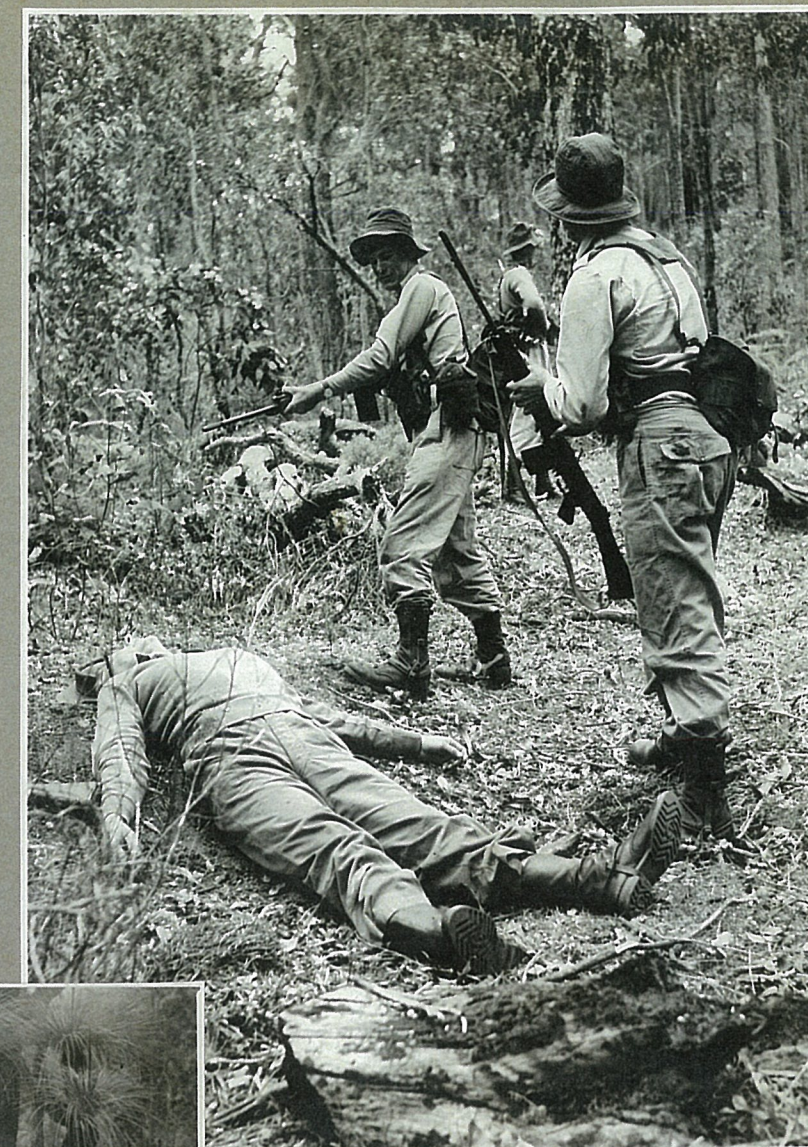

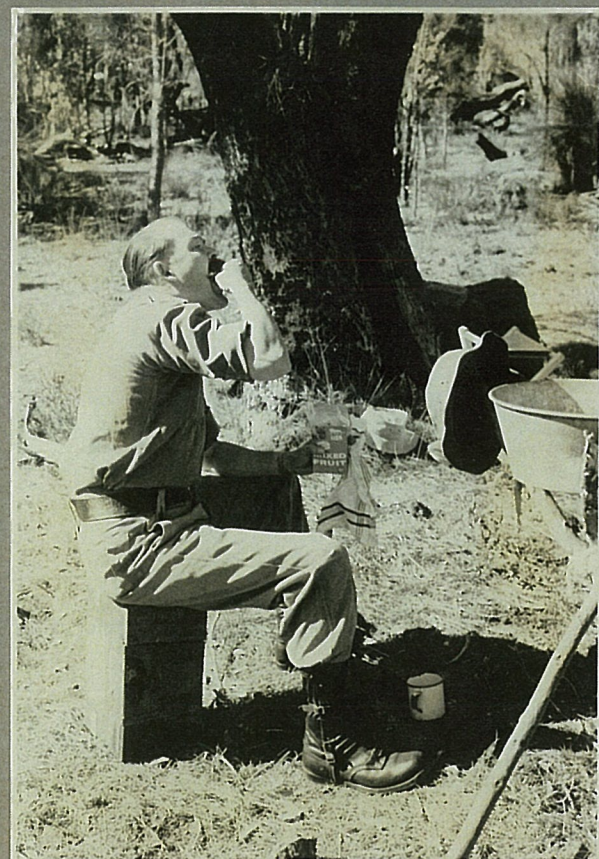
