Reunion 2000 Report

Unit History Part 1 Extract from the Unit's official History

This chapter sets out the very earliest days of the Western Australian University Regiment and shows the reader how modest a beginning this Regiment had. Few who served the unit in these times are in a position to add to the story of the early days and the writer must rely on existing printed matter to bring out the story. The organisation of the Australian Citizen's Military Forces provides for the establishment of University Regiments in all mainland States with the exception of the Northern Territory, which has no University. For many years, Western Australia was the only mainland States which had not raised a University Regiment. This was done four years after the end of the World War. On 22 April 1949, an establishment known as Perth University Regiment was raised in Western Command. This, however, was strictly incorrect nomenclature, as pointed out by the University, and the Regimental title was changed in August of that year to Western Australian University Regiment.

The original Training Depot was a large, iron-roofed building in the southeast corner of the University grounds at Crawley, originally erected as part of the flying boat base and used during the latter part of the War. This building now forms part of the Anatomy School of the Medical Faculty. From the Unit's inception, and until October 1951, the 16th Infantry Battalion fostered the Regiment, the Adjutant in the same capacity for both Units. Flight Lieutenant A.H Morton, DFC, of the RAAF Reserve, a lecturer in the Physics Department of the University, was appointed to the Reserve of Officers, Australian Military Forces and promoted Temporary Captain on 25 April 1949. He was appointed to administer command of the Unit which was placed on a Lower Establishment of one Rifle Company.

The Unit was provided with an Australian Regular Army Cadre of one Warrant Officer Class Two, Instructor, a Corporal Clerk and a Private Storeman. In January 1950, WO2 H.C. Vaisey and Corporal F. Perkins arrived to take up duties. At this time the Regimental strength consisted of one officer and seven other ranks.

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By August of that year (ie: 1950) the Unit had grown by only a further thirteen other ranks. As may be seen, enlistments were few and resulted in the main from the personal efforts of Captain Morton. Recruiting drives were held, one featuring a display of weapons and equipment at the University. Later, in March 1951, an impressive demonstration of the capabilities of DUKWs, Australian built Machine Gun Carriers and the PIAT was staged for the new students. During the afternoon this demonstration was attended by the then General Officer Commanding Western Command. Major General J.E. Whitelaw, CB, CBE. By May 1951 the Regimental strength was one officer and thirty four other ranks.



The Royal Green Jackets



As many of you will know, the Unit is affiliated with the Royal Green Jackets. What you may not be aware of is that our Association intends to forge close links with the Royal Green Jackets Association (RGJA) – in fact this process has already started. A Brief History of the Royal Green Jackets*

On 1st January 1966 The Royal Green Jackets was formed as a single Large Regiment. Its creation followed logically from the composition of The Green Jackets Brigade in 1958, which grouped together three single-battalion infantry regiments: The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry (43rd & 52nd), The Kings Royal Rifle Corps and The Rifle Brigade. A family tree of these regiments and their antecedents is to follow.

It was no accident that these particular regiments, each having had such a distinguished record in the past, should have progressively, voluntarily and successfully come together, avoiding the stresses which often accompany amalgamations, because they shared a large measure of their history and their traditions. They, and The Royal Green Jackets as their heir, lay claim to being the innovators who developed much of the new thinking in the British Infantry in the fields of tactics, training, equipment and man-management from the mid-eighteenth century onwards.

The leadership of such distinguished officers as Henri Bouquet, Francis de Rottenburg, Coote Manningham and Sir John Moore generated a succession of advanced ideas later to be adopted as ideals by the rest of the Army: open-order tactics and mobility in place of rigid drills and ponderous movement, camouflage and concealment in place of serried ranks of red coats, individual marksmanship in place of massed musket fire, and intelligence and self-reliance in place of blind obedience instilled by fear of brutal punishment. These themes are recorded in the stories of four regiments whose fortunes were often closely linked to the point where they fuse together in The Royal Green Jackets today.

We all feel like that, Reggie, now and then, especially when Spring is upon us, but few of us would care to put it on our cards. It takes a Turk to do that.
