



Re: Presentation of Colours - University of W. A. Regiment: 25th. May 1958.

It has been brought to my attention by several members of my Council that a decision has been taken that the Regimental Band of the University Regiment, which was scheduled to play at the Presentation of Colours to the W. A. University Regiment on Sunday, 25th. May, has now been replaced by the Western Command Band.

I have conducted some investigations into the reasons for this decision and understand that it is based upon the allegation that the University Regiment Band is not up to the standard that is required for such an occasion. Should this be so, it would seem to me to be hardly a justification for removing the regimental band from such a parade, but would rather indicate that the arrangements in hand for this function are premature and should be deferred in order that the regimental band might receive further training.

I would point out that to my knowledge the regimental band has been in training for some considerable period, and I know that a great deal of enthusiasm has been put into the band by its members. In fact it is my impression as an impartial observer that the esprit de corpsof the University regimental band is far greater than that of the rank and file of the Regiment, and I know that this decision that has been announced has reduced most considerably the morale of the troops concerned.

Associated as I have been with this University for a period of almost six years, and having endeavoured to represent student opinion for the greater part of that period, I must state that this recent decision of the University Regiment with regard to the band is the most disappointing one of which I have yet heard.

My Council, and the students of the University of Western Australia, despite some flippant comment that may have been made from time to time concerning the National Service Training Scheme as introduced by the Menzies Government, have at all times been proud of the achievements of the W. A. University Regiment. Moreover, I understand that the Regiment has on many occasions been presented with medallions and trophies, which would indicate its superiority on various fields.

I have always understood that the receiving of Coloursby a Regiment is one of the most important and ceremenial occasions that can be imagined. I would suggest that there is a certain amount of hypocracy in presenting the Colours at a peak of regimental history and masquerading what might be described as an amateur Army organisation (by "amateur" is meant part—time National Service) behind the professional Western Command band.

I would be pleased to discuss this matter with you at any time that you might desire, and would advise that Ireserve the right to publish this letter and the views of my Council, should the occasion so warrant, as widely as possible.

PRESENTATION OF COLOURS A UMIVERSITY REGT 25 May 58

Reference consultation between Mr.F Johnson, Maj HOARE (BM 13 Inf Bde) and Capt TAGGART (Adjt WAUR) on 10 Apr 58.

It is requested that, if possible, authority be granted for this unit to rehearse for the above parade on Whitfield Court on Sun 20 Apr 58 in addition to the 11 May 53. The additional rehearsal is deemed necessary due to a change in the procedure as discussed during the above consultation. Both these rehearsals will be performed in shoes in order to preserve the grass.

In order to decorate the area for the parade approval is sought for the erection of a number of flagpoles. The principal used in the erection of these flagpoles will be similar to that used by greenkeepers when placing the hole in the golf greens, that is by using a special auger which cuts a neat hole and allows the turf to be replaced after

Approval is also sought for the use of the students car park wherein guests may park their cars during the parade. Traffic control would be essential both at the entrance to the University proper and the car park. Therefore, in order to facilitate this control it is proposed, if authority is granted, to close both the roads leading into the University and employ Military and civilian police in order to achieve this control.

Sesting accommodation creates a problem due to the limited space available around Whitfield Court, however it is hoped that coating will be available for all guests. In prder to achieve this it would be appreciated if the balconies of Winthrop Hall could be made available for the seating of certain guests. Also the provision of chairs creates a problem of collection, cartage and handling. If the University could supply Twenty (20) arm type chairs for distinguished guests and Seven Hundred (700) chairs letal lesting or

Ourt will cause an obstruction to the bands. If authority could be given the Army Engineers could remove the sign and replace it after the Parade.

After the parade the Regiment hopes to entertain all the greats at afternoon tea in the mardens. The ereca selected during the consultation were as follows :-

- (a) Official guests in the summen gardens and if the vecther is inclement in the students relyctory.
- (b) Other guests on the Lawns SOUTH of Tinthrop Wall.

These selections were made pending the approval of the necessary University bodies. An additional requirement for afternoon tea would be the allocation of preparation rooms and if possible the facilities for boiling water for the afternoon tea.

7. Finally, authority is sought for the commencement of Hay. preparation on the preceding day, Sat 24 May 58.

Dear Dr. Currie,

I wish to draw your attention to certain recent activities of members of the Western Australian University Regiment.

During the afternoon of Tuesday, 6th instant, several rounds were fired straight across Whitfeld Court from an emplacement in the undercroft, from a .303 Vickers machine gun. The racket which the firing made interrupted discussions taking place between members of this Department in the Tower at the time. Such displays should not be permitted too much freedom to interrupt the serious work of the University. The ammunition was supposedly blank, but the number of unfortunate accidents which have occurred in military establishments as a result of the unsupervised use of blank ammunition should show the danger of such a procedure.

This display was, moreover, objectionable on another count, in that it made it appear that such military ostentation was freely welcomed within an institution whose first aim is, I feel, the quite different one of the objective pursuit of truth.

The other occurrence which I wish to mention took place at a dance organized by the W.A.U.R. in the Refectory on the night of Wednesday, 7th instant. Several rounds of, once again supposedly blank, ammunition were fired from the southern windows of the Refectory, from .303 rifles. On this occasion members of the Regiment and some young women fired the weapons which were not officially inspected, as is the strict military practice, before and after firing. In answer to certain enquiries which I made, I discovered that no one person was responsible for the firing of the weapons.

This occurrence shows a regrettable lack of adhesion to the most basic principles of military discipline in the handling of weapons on the part of the members of the Regiment concerned. The whole procedure showed, I feel, that far too little serious attention has as yet been given to the question of placing limits on the freedom of action of members of this Regiment.

MENG TO THE VICE CHANCEULOR:

Formation of a Militia Sub-Unit Within the University.

Extract from Minutes of Senate Meeting held on 21/6/48.

The Acting Vice Chancellor referred to a memorandum of the Registrar concerning correspondence between Western Command, the Guild of Undergraduates and the Vice Chancellor (Dr. G.A. Currie) with reference to the formation of a volunteer Militia sub-unit within the University (see copy attached). The Guild of Undergraduates had recently put the matter to a referendum of the internal male students and following the publication of the result there had been comment in the "West Australian" newspaper. However, in consequence of the referendum there were apparently 109 students prepared to join a volunteer Militia Company if established within the University and as a result, the G.O.C. Western Command (Major General J.S. Whitelaw) wished to know whether the Senate would be agreeable to its formation. If a sub-unit were established in the University, General Whitelaw stated, it would be possible to arrange a training schedule to conform to lecture hours and vacations. Moreover with University students it should be possible to accelerate the schedule and it was also proposed that the unit should carry a higher proportion of officers than ordinary units.

RESOLVED - to inform Western Command that the Senate is agreeable to the formation of a Volunteer Militia Sub-Unit in the University, and that 109 students have mentioned their willingness to join a unit if formed.

Extract of the Minutes of the Meeting of the Senate held on 19/7/48.

Miss M. Kerr, Secretary of the Guild. (29/6/48). - Creation of a Militia Unit within the University. (Sen.R.177)

The Senate received a letter from the Guild stating that while accepting the Senate's sanction for the formation of a militia unit, the Guild Council protested against the action of the Senate in allowing the formation of the unit without debating the fact that strong student opinion had been expressed to the contrary, and that in the opinion of the Guild Council such questions as "the formation of military units within the student body are primarily matters of the student body itself and that such questions should be decided by the student body".

The Acting Vice Chancellor in referring to the protest of the Guild stated that the President of the University Ex-Servicemen's & Women's Association had informed him that the Association would do everything in its power to assist

the formution of the militin unit.

The Fro-Chanceller, who had been absent from the meeting on 31/3/40 when the metter had first been raised in the Senate, asked whether adequate consideration had been given to the student vios-point. Dr. he Sever in reply stated that the Senate had given consideration to the whole question.

ALSOLVED - (following a motion that the question be put - moved by Dr. Somerville, 188. seconded fir. Barker) that the letter of the Guild be acknowledged and that no action be taken.

Dear Sir,

- 1. The present plans for the post-war Army provide for the raising of regiments, or portions thereof, at the various Universities throughout the Commonwealth.
- 2. Where a University is incapable, through lack of numbers, of organising a complete unit on the lines of an infantry battalion, it is proposed to form a sub-unit which will be attached for training and administration to the nearest unit of the Citizen Military Forces. Such a sub-unit will not, however, form part of the Citizen Military Force unit to which it is attached—it will retain intact its own identity.
- Enlistment in a University regiment will be open to all male students of the University and the Teachers' College who fulfil the normal requirements for enlistment in the Citizen Military Forces.
- 4. Members of University regiments, except Company Commanders and above, on graduating from Universities and Teachers' Colleges may select one of the following courses:-
 - (a) Apply for a transfer to a CMF unit in the rank held in the University regiment or sub-unit. If qualified for either non-commissioned, warrant or commissioned rank, they will be eligible without further examination for promotion or appointment to that rank.
 - (b) If qualified for or holding a commission in the CMF, apply for a commission in the PMF.
 - (c) Take his discharge from the Army.
 - (d) If an officer with the prescribed period of service, be transferred to the Reserve of Officers.
- 5. (a) Home Training

University regiments and sub-units will carry out, if they so desire, all their 24 days Home Training parades in one or more camps or Schools of Instruction at periods most convenient to the University regiment or sub-unit concerned. Such camps, etc., will be in addition to the normal 14 days camp approved for all units of the CMF.
